THE ACADEMIC PROCESSION

The centuries old pageantry of the academic procession dates from ancient tradition rooted in the early universities. Since the first academic ceremonies were predominantly in charge of the clergy, they followed the familiar order of the religious procession in which the place of highest honor was at the end of the procession. Accordingly, the academic procession is made up of members of the platform party, members of the faculty, and members of the graduating class, marching in that order. After the commencement ceremony, the order of march is reversed.

THE MACE

The staff carried at the front of the academic procession is called the mace. It is a symbol of authority and indicates that the activity is an official function of Lock Haven State College. Since responsibility for the ceremony is shared by the comarshals, each of them carries a mace. The maces were fashioned from wood from old Sullivan Hall which once stood on the present site of Stevenson Library.

ACADEMIC ATTIRE

The traditional costume at commencement exercises is a record of academic achievement of the individuals taking part. Its use which originated at English and European universities during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries came to the United States in 1754 with the founding of Kings College (now Columbia University).

In 1895, the Intercollegiate Commission, a group of leading American educators, met at Columbia to draft a code which would serve to regulate the design of gowns and hoods for various degrees as well as to fix the colors that indicate the various faculties. This code has been adopted by most of the colleges and universities in the United States. It was revised in 1932 and again in 1959.

The level of degree held is indicated by the gown's cut. Doctoral gowns have full sleeves which are round and open. Gowns worn by Bachelors have long pointed sleeves and those worn by Masters have long, closed, somewhat fuller sleeves, which reach nearly to the wearer's knees. The arm goes through a slit giving the appearance of short sleeves.

The color as well as the cut of the gown varies. Although most of the doctoral gowns are black, in some cases their color is that of the university conferring the degree. The doctoral gown is trimmed in velvet, three two inch bars on the sleeves and a five inch border extending from the back of the neck down the two sides in front. Although usually black, the velvet may be of a color that indicates the nature of the degree. Masters' and Bachelors' gowns have no such facing.

The hood seems to have had a more practical origin. During the Middle Ages monks wore them to protect their tonsured heads in the winter and as a container in which to collect alms. It is the most significant part of the academic dress. Its shape and size indicate the degree of the wearer. The color of the velvet border indicates the academic field and that of the lining the color or colors of the institution granting the degree. The Bachelor's hood is three feet long and has a two inch velvet border, the Master's hood is three and one half feet long and has a three inch border, and the Doctor's hood is four feet with a five inch border. The Lock Haven State College hood is lined with crimson and white although the old school colors of maroon and gray are still seen.

The mortarboard cap, usually seen, has been conventionalized from the skull cap which was worn by monks of the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. They are usually black. Tassels are worn over the left front quarter by degree holders; candidates wear

the tassel over the right front quarter until the degree is conferred.

Representative colors that are often seen are: Silver gray — Oratory; Sage green — Physical Education; Citron — Social Science; Gray — Veterinary Science; Light blue — Education; Dark blue — Philosophy; Maroon — Home Economics; Gold — Science; Lemon — Library Science; Purple — Law; Pink — Music; Red — Theology or Divinity; Green — Medicine; Lilac — Dentistry; White — Arts and Letters; Apricot — Nursing; and Brown — Fine Arts or Architecture.
