Academic Attire

The traditional costume worn by Lock Haven University faculty, staff, Council of Trustees and distinguished speakers at Convocation and Commencement is a record of academic achievement.

The origins of academic dress date back to the 12th and 13th Centuries, when universities were taking form in England and other parts of Europe. The ordinary dress of the scholar, whether student or teacher, was the dress of a cleric. Long gowns were worn, and may have been necessary for warmth, in unheated buildings. Hoods may have served as a cover to protect the tonsured heads of monks and other medieval scholars in the winter.

European institutions have always had great diversity in their specifications of academic dress. In contrast, shortly after the traditional academic dress was brought to the United States with the founding of Kings College (now Columbia University), American educators opted for a standardized system that all colleges and universities might follow.

In 1895, the Intercollegiate Commission, a group of leading American educators, drafted a code of academic dress, which in addition to regulating the style, cut and material of the gowns, prescribed the colors which represent various degrees of learning. This code was revised in 1932 and 1959, and updated in 1986.

The wearer's level of degree is indicated by the gown's cut. Doctoral gowns have full sleeves which are round and open. Gowns worn by Masters have long, closed, somewhat fuller sleeves, which reach nearly to the wearer's knees. The arm goes through a slot, giving the appearance of short sleeves. Those worn by Bachelors have long, pointed sleeves.

The color of the gown also varies. Although most of the doctoral gowns are black, in some cases their color is that of the university conferring the degree. Trimmed with three two-inch velvet bars on the sleeves and a five-inch velvet border extending from the back of the neck down the two sides in front, the doctoral gown is usually black. The velvet trimming may be of a color that indicates the nature of the degree. Master's and Bachelor's gowns have no such facing.

The size and shape of the hood, which is the most significant part of the academic dress, indicate the degree of the wearer. The Bachelor's hood is three feet in length with a two-inch velvet border; the Master's hood measures three and one half feet in length with a three-inch border; and the Doctoral hood is four feet with a five-inch border.

The color of the velvet border and hood lining indicate the academic field and the color or colors of the institution granting the degree respectively. The hood worn by University President Craig Dean Willis is lined in the school colors of The Ohio State University—scarlet and gray. Other representative colors displayed by members of the University faculty and staff include:

The mortarboard cap, conventionalized from the skull cap worn by the monks of the 12th and 13th Centuries, is usually black. Tassels are worn over the left front quarter by degree holders; candidates wear the tassel over the right quarter until the degree is conferred.

The Academic Procession

The centuries old pageantry of the academic procession dates from ancient tradition rooted in the early universities. Since the first academic ceremonies were predominantly in the charge of the clergy, they followed the familiar order of the religious procession in which the place of highest honor was at the end of the procession. Accordingly, the academic procession is made up of members of the platform party, members of the faculty, and members of the graduating class, marching in that order.

The Mace

The staff carried at the front of the academic procession is called the mace. It is a symbol of authority and indicates that the activity is an official function of Lock Haven University. Since responsibility for the ceremony is shared by co-marshals, each of them carries a mace. The maces were fashioned from wood from old Sullivan Hall which once stood on the present site of Stevenson Library.

Commencement Speaker

Gary R. Seibert, '67
President/ Chief Executive Officer
Kidsports International, Inc., Reading, PA

Gary R. Seibert is the president and CEO of Kidsports International, Inc., a worldwide organization devoted to helping children become more physically fit, healthier and happier. He is also a consultant and lecturer and addresses such issues as "The Youth Fitness Crisis: What It Is and What We Can Do About It." His approach to child development has earned him appearances on national television programs such as the "Phil Donahue Show," "PM Magazine," and Turner Cable Network's "KIDS BEAT SHOW." Seibert has also been used as a media expert to such media as *People Magazine*, *The New York Times*, the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, and the *San Francisco Chronicle*.

Seibert holds a B.S. in health and physical education from LHU and has spent his entire career in the area of physical education and child development. A former teacher from Hempfield High School, he earned the title, "Lancaster County Physical Education Teacher of the Year." Also an entrepreneur, he first ventured into his own business in 1968 as the president and owner of the Lancaster Gymnastics School, a business open through 1974. A private gymnastics school for boys and girls, the center taught developmental gymnastics for children ages 4-17. It was here that he coached national caliber gymnasts.

Seibert was also the founder of the country's first gymnastics apparel manufacturing company named Gym-Kin. For the past 19 years, this company has been a world leader in the business and has outfitted numerous world championship and Olympic teams. He sold the company in 1983 and became co-owner of Playful Parenting Development Corporation, a parent/child play development program for children six weeks to six years of age and their parents. After this endeavor, he opened Kidsports Fun & Fitness Club, a movement/games/recreation facility for children four months to 17 years of age. The program was designed to help children develop motor skills, self confidence, and an appreciation of good health and fitness while having fun.

In May 1991, Seibert and his company served as co-sponsor, along with West Chester University, of the first International Conference on Children's Fun and Fitness. His community and professional service have earned Seibert numerous awards and honors, including the LHU 1995 Alumni Distinguished Service Award. He is also the 1994 winner of the Berks County Small Business of the Year Award and was a finalist in the Entrepreneur of the Year Competition sponsored by Ernst and Young and Meryll Lynch.
