When I last spoke with you I indicated that I would get you a history of Edinboro's athletic nicknames. Sorry it's taken so long to get back to you but this will most likely be the "only" exact listing of the nickname origins and mascot renderings as they occurred over the years.


Here is the chronology:

- I have enclosed a copy of that logo. At the time a rather informal poll was taken by the student newspaper, then called the Guardian, for a more appropriate nickname. The popular choice was "Highlanders" which was a step in the right direction with respect to the Scottish motif. A new logo was adopted that featured the British Guard bearskin hat which is part of the uniform the British soldiers wear in the Changing of the Guard ceremony at Buckingham Palace (see pictured sample).
- 1968: After a year on the job ( I started as Edinboro's and The Pennsylvania Conference's first full-time SID in July of 1967) with the blessing of the President, Dr. Chester T. McNerney, I changed the name to "Fighting Scots" which seemed a better action-type name associated with sports. Hank Mariotti, the Athletic Director at the time, as well as all the coaches overwhelmingly favored the change. The first official use of the nickname came with the advent of the 1968 football season where I used it on the cover of the football media guide I sneaked in a little alliteration with "Follow the Fighting Scots". By the way, the local media also eagerly endorsed and supported the change (see enclosed copy of the cover).
- 1969: In June of 1969 I sought to find a mascot that would serve as a logo for the nickname and I contacted Mickey Sego, a sports illustrator in Cleveland, Ohio. After listing mascots of the teams we were playing he not not only produced an excellent rendering of the Fighting Scot but one who was warding off mascots representing our opponents (see sample). I have also enclosed a copy of the correspondence with Sego which served as the genisis of the Fighting Scot mascot. The figure changed somewhat after Jim Prokell's bronze statue rendition. I was pleased that at least the general characterization and "Fighting Scot" nickname stayed in tact. By the way, I knew Jim Prokell well when he starred for us as a basketball player from 1968-69 through 1970-72.

I left Mickey Sego's ink-drawn originals in the SID files when I left in 1985. This should provide you with a very accurate history of Edinboro's athletic mascots.





#### Dear Paul Newman:



An aggressive ball player ... Finished second in rebounding with 218 grabs... Proved to have the best "shooting cye" with a torrid 55.1 percentage from the floor ... His leaping ability gives him an edge inside where he is a proficient scorer ... Will be a regular starter.

### FRED RILEY (20-21) G. 5-10, 150, JR., CLEARFIELD, PA.
