# Edinboro's President

Student Body Welcomes Professor In New Position

Appointed by the unanimous vote of the college board of trustees at their last meeting before vacation, Dr. L. H. Van Houten, formerly acting president, became the permanent president of the school. The action of the board has received the official approval of the governor of the

The appointment came to Dr. Van Houten after twenty years of active service at Edinboro College. came to Edinboro in 1921 and served in the capacity of psychology and education until his succession of e c-

In an informal speech at last Wednesday's assembly program, Dr. Van Houten received an enthusiastic response from the student body. Speaking with frankness and sincerity, he stated that the work for teaching was still the most important work of the school, and at no time did he wish the second floor. in his new position to be considered as being "over" anyone else.

"It is my desire," he said, "to continue seeing the spirit of good, kindly fellowship which I found as a member of the regular teaching faculty.'

\$250,000 Building Has All Modern Equipment

With the presentation of the keys of the building to Mr. Harry Cooper, president of the School Board, and Principal C. W. Ellenberger, Dr. Van Houten, president of the College, formally opened Edinboro's new \$250,000 training school building on Thursday, January 2.

The new building, on the north end of the campus facing East Normal street, is modern in every detail and ranks among the finest school plants in this part of the state.

Built under the Pennsylvania State Authority as a part of the extensive building program which has brought to Edinboro three other up-to-date pres dent Carmon Ross last August structures, its facilities will enable the college to carry on with greater effectiveness its program of training teachers.

> Both elementary and secondary grades of the Edinboro Public schools are now housed in this structure, with the elementary school occupying the first floor and the high school using

> The entire building is in full operation with the exception of the science and vocational departments which are still found in their old locations in Loveland Hall and in the old school building. With the arrival of laboratory equipment in the immediate future, it is expected to oring the complete school system under one roof.

Accomodations are excellent and provisions have been made for rooms and offices for the various departments and leading student activities. The school gymnas um is complete with dressing and shower rooms, and

#### United States Leads The World In New Research

In his assembly speech last Wednesday, Dr. John C. Johnson of the Edinboro Science department, told students and faculty of the proceedings of the convention of the Amercan Association for the Advancement of Science which he attended in Philadelphia over the holidays.

"It is in those countries of the world," he said, "where freedom, democracy, and Christianity flourish that science has the best opportunity for advancement."

He stated that the United States is now producing 30 per cent of all the world's new research with Germany, the nearest competitor, producing but 18 per cent. "The combined efforts of no two countries of the world approach the United States in the quantity and quality of scientific output," he continued.

He pointed out the benefits gained from attending the meetings of this organization which is one of the outstanding associations for the advancement of original research in the world. "Such meetings are inspirational as well as informational," he said, "Through the contacts made with the great men of science faith is restored and love is kindled and these two things are often more important than science itself."


"I was impressed by the honesty and integrity of the men," the speaker added. "It is glorious to meet the personalities of science. The contacts you make with the leading men of your field gives you an inspira-tional lift that lasts."

At the conclusion of his speech he complimented the students of Edinboro for possesing to a marked degree the qualities of decency and honesty which he found in his relations with the best of American scientists.

The game played at Greenville last Friday, was the second match of the season between the two schools, with Edinboro winning the first one by a 53-42 score.

With the score standing 41-41 at the end o tfhe fourth quarter, Frank Sosia completed a long shot from the very center of the gym, but the referee said "NO'.

Since there was a horn rather that a gun to indicate the end of the game, it was difficult to judge who was right with the tenseness of the situation and the roaring of the crowd.

In the ensuing overtime period, Volitich came back with two long ones, Andy Walsh and Soscia shot a foul apiece, and Vic Fuller sank an angle to bring the Edinboro tally to 49. In the meantime, Wallace, Mc-Namee, and McLimons, of Thiel, brought the score up to 48 for the home team. In the last one-half min ute of play, Wallace, of Thiel, came out of the tussle under the Thiel bas-

ket with the ball and shot the winning ball for the Greenvillers.

Winning their third game in as many starts, Edinboro's Red Raiders remained in the list of undefeated basketball teams. The third victim in this year's season was Lawrence Tech from Michigan. Lawrence Tech, which has lost three games in the last three nights, suffered a 46-44 setback at the hands of a hard playing Edinboro five. On the 6th, the Michigan combine met Long Island University in Madison Square Garden. The L. I. U., team, one of the outstanding teams in the country, could only gain a lead of five points throughout the game, finally winning,52-47. Lawrence Tech led until the final two minutes, when L. I. U. sunk long shots in a row while holding the other squad scoreless.

Lawrence Tech had a team of tall players, but their height was of no avail. The Red Raiders matched the vsitors in field goals, but pulled ahead on shots from the foul line. The visitors from Detroit only made eight out of fifteen trys, while Edinboro sunk ten out of fourteen attempts. As the score indicate, there was shooting all the time, each team playing at high speed. There was never a large gap between the two teams' scores, and the lead see-sawed back and forth. At the end of the first quarter, the score was tied 12 all. During the second quarter however Edinboro outscored the visiting quintet, and the Red Raiders were ahead by four points at the half. In the third quarter, Tech managed to score one more point than the Raiders so that as the game drew to a close the score was very close. Three of Edinboro's starting lineup were put out of the game during the fourth quarter by way of personal fouls, but the reserve who took their places held the visitors down.
