

CSC IN FINANCIAL TROUBLE

Crisis at California — Part 1

In a statement issued to the press Monday, February 16 Dr. Roadman warned of an impending financial crisis here on the campus. Below is printed the statement in full.

"The financial crises in the Commonwealth is being felt by California State College as a result of a warning given by the Office of Administration in Harrisburg to Dr. Kutzman, Secretary of Education. College administrators have been notified by the President that it will be impossible to count on funds in excess of the 1969-70 budget. The 1969-

70 budget when approved will be more than 2 million dollars less than the sum requested to meet current expenses.

As a result, the administration, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, has taken steps to hold all full time and part-time registration to the September, 1969 figure and to curtail plans for the expansion of any new programs not yet in operation and to begin a comprehensive study of priorities in all programs now in operation. Admissions will be carefully reviewed to insure that college policy will provide for stu-

dents with CEEB scores and a record of high school achievement indication of college success. A freeze has been ordered on faculty appointments for the 1970-71 year pending the solution of the financial crisis. Legislation providing for funds for capital improvements is adding to the local problem since future growth of the college depends on several key projects including a comprehensive utility expansion project.

The Board of Trustees is planning to meet with legislation leaders to review the plight of the college."

Dr. Roadman stated to this reporter that he would not support nor ask for another tuition increase. He stated, "I CAN NOT DO THIS (ASK FOR INCREASE) KNOWING THAT THE STUDENTS HAVE DONE THEIR PART BUT THE LEGISLATURE HAS NOT COME THROUGH."

The failure of the legislature to act will also mean that the new administration building and the Student Union cannot be furnished. The new maintenance building will not be equipped. The proposed construction of new side-

walks and improved parking facilities will be stopped.

Buildings already under construction will be completed, but proposed construction such as the new library cannot even be considered until the crisis is over which will last at least one to two years.

"The ironic thing," Dr. Roadman states, "is that I receive letters from legislators asking why we cannot admit students when their own action (the politicians) cause us to deny an education to worthy students."



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Campus-Wide Elections Set For March 13 - 14

On March 13 and 14, there will be two important elections coming to a student vote at CSC. A referendum will be held to determine the necessity of class officers. The basic cons against class officers are that (1) they have no real function (2) there is a lack of interest in the positions. However, the affirmative arguments include (1) Congress should give the officers a job (2) tradition of class officers should be maintained. It is up to you, the student of CSC to determine the future of these positions and you are solely responsible for the outcome of this election.

An entire new system of representation has been established focusing on all parts of the student body. Student Congress is now composed of the following:

- (a) one representative for every 100 on-campus dormitory students.
- (b) one representative for every 100 students living in approved off-campus housing (dormitories, fraternities and sorority houses, private homes and apartments.)
- (c) one representative for every 100 commuters.
- (d) one representative from Women's Inter-Dorm Council.
- (e) one representative from Men's Inter-Dorm Council.
- (f) one representative from Inter-Fraternity Council.
- (g) one representative from Pan-Hellenic Council.
- (h) three representatives from Inter-Organizational Council.
- (i) President of the Student Union Board.
- (j) President of the college or his appointee, ex-officio.
- (k) Director of Student Activities Assn., Inc., ex-officio.
- (l) one representative from Commuter Council.
- (m) President of SAA, Inc.

As a full-time student at CSC, you will be classified under one of the three categories: (1) on-campus dormitory student, (2) commuter, (3) off-campus housing student (dormitory, fraternity, and sorority houses, private homes and apartments). Whichever category you come under will be the district you are in and also the district from which you will be elected if you would decide to run for Student Congress. As a member of one of the three districts you are entitled to vote for representatives from that district only.

Elections for new representatives will be held March 13 and 14th. Dorm-students, both on and off-campus, will vote the evening of March 13th in their respective dorms for representatives from their districts and also on March 14th, Friday, along with the rest of the Student Body.

All district representatives will serve for a term of two years. There will be one-half of the total representatives elected this election, with the remaining one-half being elected next year. This is being done because Student Congress would be too large to function properly if the total number of representatives were elected this year.

The following number of representatives will be elected: District One: campus dorm students (7), District Two: commuters (14), District Three: off-campus students (dorms, fraternity and sorority houses and off-campus housing) (4).

Petitions are now available in the SAA office. Pick one up today and start your campaign for a seat from your district.

Student-Faculty Evaluation Committee

The student-faculty committees for the evaluation of the college campus are preparing their individual committee reports which are due on Monday, March 2. This evaluation committee is divided into seven "task forces" each of which has members who are students and faculty members. The committee is divided into the following "task forces": (1) Nature and function of the Institution, (2) Evaluation of the Product, (3) Student Body, (4) Faculty and Instruction, (5) Curriculum, (6) Resources and Facilities, (7) Administrative Organization. There is also a National Council on Teacher Education at work and this committee is also divided into seven forces: (1) Objectives for Teacher Education, (2) Administrative Organization, (3) Admission and Procedure, (4) Teacher Education Faculty, (5) Curriculum, (6) Professional Laboratory Standards, (7) Resources and Facilities. The host committee, the exhibits committee and more details will be worked on later in the year. The date for the committee evaluation has been changed to November 15 through 18.

NEW COMPUTING EQUIPMENT EASES STATISTICAL LOAD

California State College students have some new, incomparable tools at their disposal.

Four terminals, acquired by the college last spring, are now linked to a high-speed computer in New Jersey through a program operated by Com-Share Corp. Inc.

The equipment, located at 174 College Ave., is available to faculty, as well as undergrad and graduate students. The terminals are especially helpful in graduate research, reducing hours of manual statistical manipulation to mere seconds.

Their unique sound is the result of steel drums which when beat produce sounds similar to an organ. An independent agent was quoted as saying, "This group received the greatest ovation in the ten year history of the NEC." Monday night "Your Father's Moustache" and "Chicago Transit Authority" performed. They also received great acclaim.

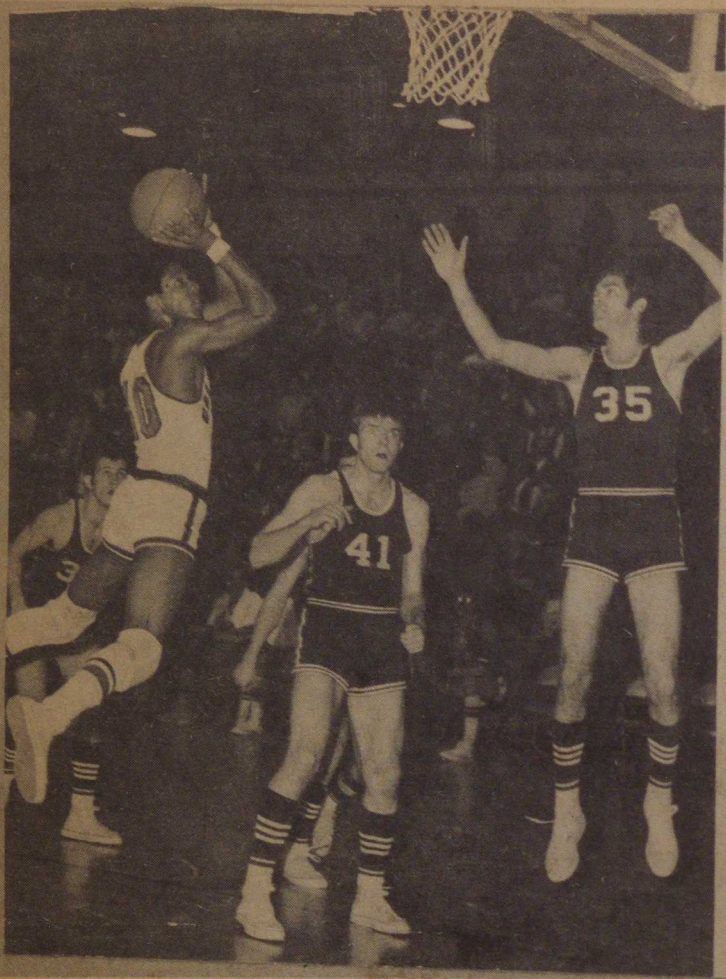
Glenn Yarborough spoke out against outrageous prices charged by artists. Perhaps the best performance by a folk-rock group was presented by "The New Hope".

Vulcans Take Two More, Point Park, Edinboro Fall

The Vulcan basketball team stretched its record to 13-3 last week by downing Point Park 94-79 and then knocking off second place Edinboro 77-68.

Against the Pioneers the Witcheymen jumped off to a quick 10-3 lead and were never really threatened.

The Vulcans, with a well balanced scoring attack increased this lead and went into the locker room with a 41-33 advantage.

Greene paced the Vulcan's scorers with 13 points in the first half, followed by Al Dade, Jack Taylor and Stan Williams with six points each. Bernie Floriani and Nate Milligan had four each and Guylord Hogue contributed two.

Greene and Floriani took over in the second half and enabled the Vulcans to open a 21 point lead at 64-43 with ten minutes left in the game.

Don Dudley, who scored 29 points for the Pioneers, managed to turn this lead, but was unable to rally his team-mates and the Pioneers ended up 15 points shy of the Vulcans.

Ray Greene's 33 points was tops for the night, Floriani added 21 points, Taylor had 12 and Dade finished with 11.

The Vulcans fine roundballers then put a vice-like grip on the Western Division Title of the Pennsylvania Conference by crushing a strong Edinboro College quintet 77-68.

California and E.S.C. battled on even terms in the early minutes with the score deadlocked, for the fourth time 13-13.

The Vulcans then took command and managed to hold a 32-22 advantage over the visitors at the intermission.

During the second half the Vulcans broke the game wide open taking a 21 point lead, 64-43 with seven minutes remaining.

It was R. Greene coming through with another outstanding performance contributing a total of 24 points, B. Floriani and Jack Taylor each rang up 15 points on the scoreboard.

Art Dickenson was the big gun for Edinboro State with 25 points, on nine fielders and seven free throws — Dave Prohell and Bob Burlingame followed in the ESC scoring with 14 and 11 points respectively.

Only three conference games remain on the Vulcan's schedule as they meet Shippensburg and Edinboro away and Lock Haven at home.

Swimmers Split Two Record Stands At 6-3

The Cal State swimming team stretched its overall record to 6-3 last week after dumping Millersville 53-44 and then falling to Bloomsburg 31-73.

Against Millersville, the Vulcans trailed 7-0 after losing the 40 yard medley relay but came flying to tie the score at 8-8 after Howard Sevel and Tom Harkness finished 1-2 in the 1000 yard free style event.

Jim Nairn and Fred Bonchosky repeated this feat in the 200 yard free and the Vulcans led 16-9. Jim Finn and Bob Patterson capped the 50 yard free style event by also taking first and second place respectively.

Harkness and Greg Glarrow finished second and third in the 200 yard individual medley and the score now read 28-15 in favor of the Vulcans. Sevel and Dale Serinek also took a second and third place in the 200 yard fly before Nairn and Finn added six points to the Vulcan total by placing first and third in the 100 yard free making the score 38-23.

Harkness finished first in the 200 yard backstroke event and Bonchosky first in the 500 yard free to give the Vulcans an insurmountable lead of 48-31.

Jim Kirk wrapped up the Vulcan scoring with a second place finish in the 200 yard breast stroke.

Millersville ended the meet by winning the 400 yard free style relay but the seven point victory was not enough and the Vulcans won the match 53-44.

In the Bloomsburg meet the Vulcans again lost both relay events and managed only three firsts, one by Harkness in the 200 yard individual medley. Sevel in the 200 yard fly and Harkness in the 200 yard back.

The Scottmen will wrap up their regular season schedule on Tuesday, February 24 when they travel to West Virginia University.



CSC's Winning Teams Head For Tourneys

The California State College winter sports teams will be busy preparing for post-season tournaments during the next few weeks.

A win over Lock Haven, Slippery Rock or Edinboro would assure the Vulcans of the Western Conference championship in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference and earn them the right to meet the Eastern Conference winner, most probably Cheyney, the number four ranked small college team in the nation, here at Hamer Hall on March 4 for the State Championship.

The Vulcans are also eligible for the NAIA district plays in March. The NAIA tourney will match the four best district teams with the winner earning the right to go to Kansas City and play for the national title.

The varsity wrestling team will travel to East Stroudsburg on March 6 to compete in the State College Conference wrestling tourney. Last year the Vulcans placed seventh in the tournament, held at Clarion and this year Vulcano's Vulcans may finish even stronger.

A decent showing in the State tourney may earn the wrestling team a trip to the NAIA tournament.

This will be an especially big event for East Stroudsburg is holding their centennial celebration this year.

Coach Scott will take his swimming team to the Penn.-Ohio Relay meet on Feb. 28.

After this meet the aquamen will then have a two week layoff before travelling to West Chester, where they will face their toughest competition to date in the Penna. State College swimming meet. Mr. Scott is hoping that a few of his swimmers will do well enough in these two meets to qualify for a berth in the national tourney.

All three have had extremely successful campaigns this year and should do an ample job of representing California State College.
