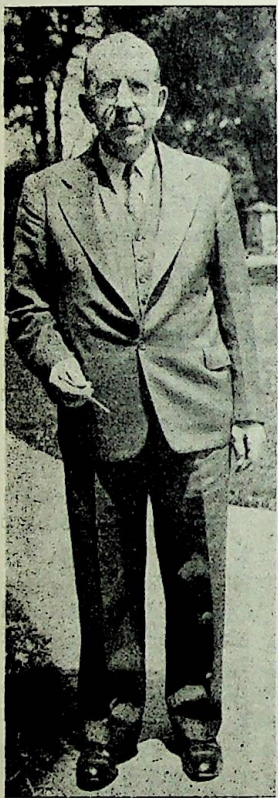

Mr. Heinaman to Retire

Mr. Frank A. Heinaman, after forty-two years of teaching, twenty-three of which he spent at Edinboro, will retire at the close of his school year.

Mr. Heinaman has always shown keen interest in the students individually and has been an enthusiastic spectator at all college



functions. His loss in the Math and Education Departments will be keenly felt. Since 1904, he has been teaching. First he acted as principal of the Derry Twp. high school and grades, then as principal of Brookstraw Twp. high and grades. In 1906 he became supervising principal of Youngsville high school and in 1917, he became supervising principal of Sheffield Twp. high school. During these last two positions, he instructed in mathematics and science. From 1906 to 1919, Mr. Heinaman had charge of Warren County summer school for teachers. He accepted a position at Edinboro State Teachers College in the Mathematics and Education Departments in 1923. Mr. Heinaman is a graduate of Columbia, Pa., high school; Lebanon Valley College (A. B.); and Pennsylvania State College (M. S.).

CLASS DAY EXERCISES TO BE HELD MAY 24

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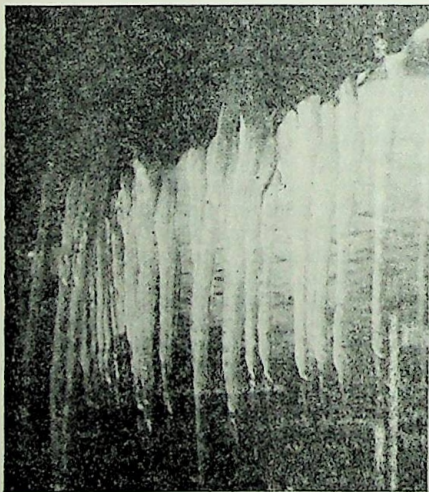
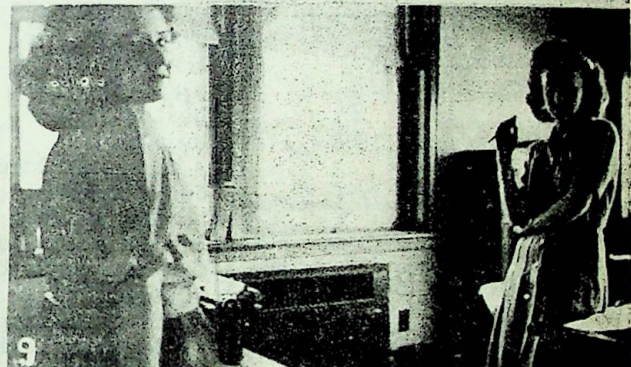
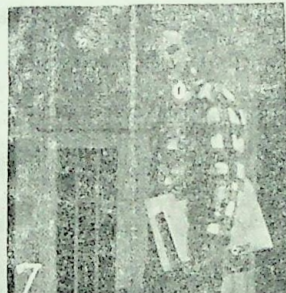
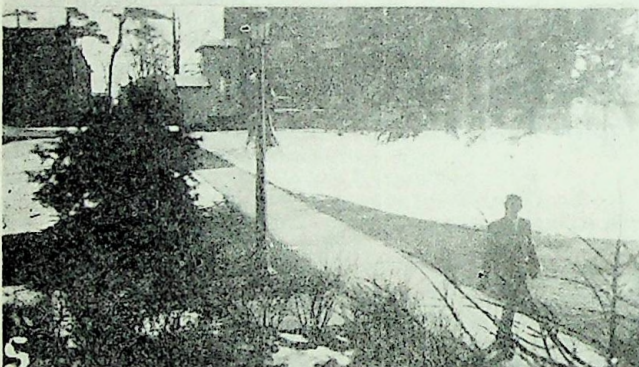
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Photography Club Photos
