If the word 'insectivorous' means nothing, watch the blade like leaves of a Venus's flytrap close around a stem of grass used to stimulate them. The horror of a blazing fire, students requiring hospital attention, or undesirable characters entering the dorms-how would you cope with this? The Administration and the Division of Law Enforcement are very concerned with the security and safety measures Lock Haven provides for the students and they're doing something about it.

With increased visitation hours in many of the dorms on campus, more efficient desk coverage is being provided. A further improvement is the guest registration for all non-Lock Haven students. This service offers quick access to home ad dresses in case of an emergency, enabling authorities to notify the proper people.

To prevent illegal entry into the residence halls, the glass in the front doors of the dorms has been replaced with safety galss. The possibility of having a crash bar on the front doors of dorms is even being considered.

Presently there are two poorly lit vicinities on campus: behind Glennon Infirmary and the parking lot adjacent to the tennis courts. This insufficient lighting problem demands time consuming security procedures. Such procedures are far more necessary in populated areas of the campus.

ridge Hall," stated Carl Nelson, director of the Law Enforcement Division. He feels there is a definite need for guard rails to be installed at that spot.

In the near future, three phones will be installed on campus for emergency use. Anyone picking up the phone will be immediately connected to the Law Enforcement Office.

FIRE-FIRST AID EQUIP-MENT LACKING

In many respects, fire safety equipment in the residence halls is inferior or lacking. There are no fire blankets or hoses in some of the dorms. As a precautionary measure, it has been suggested that all canvas garbage bags be replaced by metal containers. Another proposal is that all maintenance employees be trained in fire safety.

Still another major concern is the lack of first aid equipment in the residence halls. Simply, there are no stretchers or first aid kits available.

Although the Infirmary is closed nights from 11 pm to 7 am, the Law Enforcement Division provides 24-hour service in case of a student's sickness or injury. "We call for a great deal of cooperation from the students," commented Nelson. All students requiring hospital attention should call the office and they will be taken promptly to the Lock Haven Hospital.

However in pass percentage Bower is number one in the country with a mark of .578 on 37 completions of 64 attempted. He has passed for 349 yards, four touchdowns and a completion per-game of

The top ranked passer in completions per contest is Bob Lockett of Colorado Mines with 14.3 and second is Doug Dickey of Wooster College at 13.0. Rounding out the top five are Bower, Lock Haven Duesenberg, North park, Illinois, and Hanna, Southwestern,

Last week in Lock Haven's upset 25-14 win over California State College, Bower went 14-for24, 154 yards and three touchdowns.

Caimi Inspires Band

month-long After a month-long struggle, the LHS marching band appears to be returning to a competitive level.

The group dispersed last spring when the college was left without a band director. Mr. William Rost, last year's director, was filling only a temporary position.

According to Dr. Russell C. Nelson, Chairman of the Music Department, "there was no money to add a new band director. Not until the end of the summer was a director able to be hired."

The new director, Mr. Florentino Caimi, was hired shortly before the start of this semester. Despite lost time attributed to late organizing, the band expects to be able to perform at Homecoming. "In fact, we will be at the Shippensburg game this Saturday," said Dr. Nelson. "Not to march--we will play from the stands."

Concerning the Home-coming weekend, Dr. Nelson assured that "the band will be there--but in what capacity I am not yet sure." He hopes that the group will be ready to march both in the parade and at the game.

These goals are realistic despite a number of obstacles related to the late start.

"We usually are organized and playing before classes start in the fall," explains Dr. Nelson. "This year we weren't organized until seven to ten days after the semester had started."

The biggest problem involves the inability of all

the bandsmen to meet at a given time. "When the band was cancelled last spring," says Dr. Nelson, "the band arranged their members schedules for this semester, not giving allowance for a band practice time.

Now we can't get every-body together at the same time. It is hard for the menbers to calculate how far apart they are to stand in a formation when they are practicing with ghosts.

"The physical problems are worse than most people realize," continued Dr. Nelson. "In addition, we are having problems finding a suitable place to practice."

The most accomodating practice site is the high school stadium. But its use is being restricted because of the addition of a new turf. The only other field marked off by yard lines is Hubert Jack Stadium. But as the days are becoming shorter, darkness sets in early on the new. lightless stadium.

Night practices, therefore, have been conducted inside, in such restricted places as Price Auditorium. Marching precision is hampered severely by the lift of space--and time.

Dr. Nelson indicated that the band may put on a concert, probably in December. "But," he added, "We're not making any commitments we can't keep.

"The situation is only temporary," concluded Dr. Nelson. "I am optimistic that the band will come back."
