Science convocation slated for today

'Is there a Chemical Basis of the Mind" will be the topic discussed by Dr. Wolfgang Vogel at the 16th Annual Science Convocation in Ulmer Planetarium, Lock Haven State College, at 12:45pm on Tuesday, October 12.

The public is invited to attend Dr. Vogel's lecture on the latest research being done on the chemical, biological, and psychological aspects of the brain. Dr. Vogel is a professor of pharmacology at the Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia.

Born in Dresden, Germany, Dr. Vogel studied at the universities of Bonn and Tubingen, and did his graduate work at the Stuttgart Institute of Technology. He has done postdoctoral studies at the State University of New York at Syracuse.

Prior to joining the staff of Jefferson Medical College in 1967, he was a faculty member at the University of Illinois' College of Medicine.

In the past, the second VP was purely concerned with organizing social activities such as dances and coffeehouses. Recently however, the job of organizing social activities was turned over to the SCC Social Committee, making it possible for Shimer to turn his attention elsewhere.

Shimer confessed that the executive board was fairly ignorant of what was going on in the bookstore. "We had no one up there to represent us,"

stated Shimer. "Hopefully with direct supervision by students like myself, things will be better for the students in the future."

The Parson's Community Center Executive Board works closely with Shimer and helps him carry out his duties Shimer admitted that when his roles change from supervisor of social activities to manager of the PUB, he may have problems utilizing everybody on the board. "My big trouble will be knowing how to use them, " said Shimer.

EAGLE EYE Dean Maetozo discusses Mexico's sports program

Dr. Matthew G. Maetozo, Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation here at Lock Haven State spent two weeks in August in Mexico at the request of the Mexican government and its National Sports Confedera-tion. He was assigned to the state of Veracruz and resided in the city.

The program was set-up four years ago by the agreement between the National Association of Sports and Physical Education in Washington, D.C. and the Mexican government. Each year the association identifies eligible people in the United States and asks if there people would be willing to go to Mexico as guests of the Mexican government and the sports confederation. While there they would conduct clinics, seminars and workshops with students, professors, teachers, and coaches on how to improve their sports and physical education programs.

This past year there were four people on a team working in Mexico. "My particular task was tolecture on and help with problems concerning the organization and administration of physical education and sports" Maetzo said.

Each of the four members of the team presented a two hour seminar per day. One seminar was in track and field. another was on swimming, the third dealt with basketball,

and the fourth was organization and administration of the programs. The four conducted discussions, lectures and demonstrations to the participants. All of their work was done at the Central Physical Education and Sports Complex in Veracruz.

When asked about how the sports programs looked when he arrived in Mexico Maetzo responded, "In my estimation the people associated with physical education and sports, both in the public schools and colleges need considerable upgrading. They need considerable help on a consultative standpoint.

Maetzo suggested and recommended the kinds of things they could do to make their programs more viable and up to date. "This particular program is certainly benefitting physical education and sport in Mexico and that's the whole idea of the thing. The Mexican government feels the latest innovations in physical education and sport is here in the United States and they want to tap these resources.'

Some of the students and professors of Mexicowould like to come to Lock Haven for observation, discussion and/or course enrollment. Dr. Maetozo has been very busy corresponding with the Mexican government and he is working with the International Relations Committee on campus who have encouraged him to continue his correspondence. He hopes a couple of




