
#### Editorial



# Artist Series Opens Oct. 18

The Maryland Quartet will open the Lock Haven Artist Series on Monday, October 18, at 8:15 p.m. in Price Audi-

The quartet, consisting of piano, viola, violin, and cello, is a faculty-artist ensemble in residence at the University of Maryland.

The first work on the program will be a technically demanding work by Mozart, the Quartet in G Minor, followed by modern work, the Piano Quartet composed in 1947 by Robert Palmer. After intermission, the C Minor Quartet by Brahms will be presented.

The Maryland Quartet began as a trio with violinist Joel Berman, cellist William Skidmore, and pianist Evelyn Garvey. With the addition of former Cleveland Orchestra violist Sally Trembly in 1970, the group has developed a completely new repertoire -- masterworks for the piano quartet.

Other performances in the Artist Series will be presented by pianist William Ibes in December, the Goldovsky Opera Company in February, violinist David Madison and pianist Marion Filar in the early spring, and the Paris Chamber Orchestra in May.

The Lock Haven Artist Series is sponsored by the Community Concert Association, composed of members of the local community, the music department of LHS, and the college students government.

## Parade Again Is A Homecoming Attraction

After several years' absence from the local scene, the traditional parade through downtown Lock Haven will be a major attraction on LHS' Homecoming Weekend.

On Saturday, October 23, all organizations entering a float in the parade will be reporting in front of Thomas Field House at 10 a.m. The floats, illustrating the theme "A Brand New Start," reflecting the start of LHS' second century, are being sponsored by local merchants. Each merchant is contributing \$10 toward the cost of the float he is sponsoring and the SCC is providing an additional \$15 per float.

Three cash prizes will be awarded to the best entries.

Local high school bands, other marching groups, and the seven Homecoming Queen con-testants will also be part of the parade, which will commence at approximately 10:30 a.m.

The procession, being mar-shaled by Dr. Francis N. Hamblin, college president, and Gary Worthington, SCC president, will move down Water St. and continue to Henderson St., come back up Main St. and continue onto Bellefonte Ave. to Spring Street Stadium for the football game with Edinboro. Parade entry winners will be announced at halftime.

# 'The Tiger' Will Be the Next of free books has been lacking Readers Theatre Production

A Reader's Theatre presentation has been one of the increasingly popular events on campus in recent years. Since November 1968 when Readers' Theatre first performed before a LHS audience, the art form has steadily grown There will be no book returns in status with students and towns-

> "I would say there is more presentation than representation," says Kidder.

> In a sense the audience response to the play is less controlled by technical devices; much more is created by the audiences' imagination. It is sometimes more highly sophisticated than a traditionally staged play in that the audience and the actor must do the job of complex technical aspects.

A Readers\* Theatre presentation can often be readied in less time than a traditional stage play since movement and memorization are minimized, Dr. Kidder's presentations usually utilize stools and a copy of the script during the performance. These devices encourage the viewer to

through his imagination, an intimate part of the play.

Dr. kidder directs 2 to 4 proouctions yearly and selects the cast for a particular play through open try-outs. Although there is course entitled Readers' Theatre, these productions are not a direct outgrowth of the course. Anyone may participate whether or not he is enrolled in the course, and often a play is cast from theatre - lovers outside the course

One of the most popular productions given in the history of local Readers' Theatre was The Brick and The Rose, done in the Spring of 1970. After presentation on campus, it was so widely acclaimed that a downtown performance drew a crowd of 400 at the Lock Haven Y.M.C.A.

Currently Dr. Kidder is rehearsing the cast for the October 18 and 19 performance of The Tiger by Murray Schisgal, Lynn Miner and Ben Aptaker take the spotlight in Schisgal's play of abduction and terror. If the reputation of Kidder and past Readers' Theatre performances mean anything, The Tiger promises to be a delightful evening of theatre.

The Eagle grapplers open a 14-meet season, plus two exhibitions with the Alumni and powerful Athletes in action, at Lehigh University "snake pit" on December 4.
