Routine Business Disposed of at October Meeting

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees on Wednesday, W. Max Bossert was made acting head of the Department of Physical Education. A selection of a permanent head to succeed Dr. J. Wynn Fredericks, now head of physical education under the Department of Public Instruction, will be made at the next meeting of the trustees.

Four applicants were introduced to the trustees at the meeting and additional applicants will be considered this week.

All the trustees were present at the meeting. They included Dr. David W. Thomas, president; Dr. A. P. Akeley, Coudersport; M. Ward Fleming, Bellefonte; George F. Hess, Beech Creek; Scott R. McKean, Williamsport; Dr. W. Morton Pierce, St. Mary's; Harry C. Smith, Altoona; Harold Woolridge, Clearfield, and Mrs. F. E. McEntire, secretary. Dr. John G. Flowers met with the trustees.

The trustees authorized application for a WPA project for extensive repairs to certain of the older buildings.

Efforts will be made to obtain an abandoned CCC camp on a nominal rental basis for a college recreation center under college supervision. This plan is contingent on the abandonment of a

Kappa Delta Pi, Honorary Fraternity Names New Members

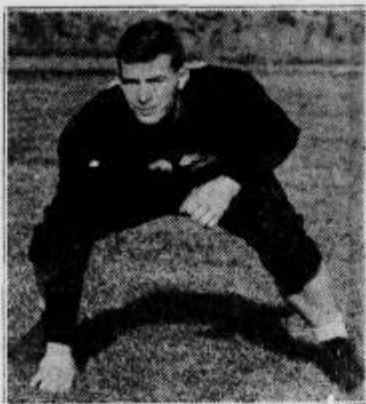

These self-same associates, "big" sisters and brothers the first week, turn oppressors next in order to take their proteges down a few "pegs"——

Of course Fred Freshman and little Miss Parvenu were just run-of-the-mill newcomers. 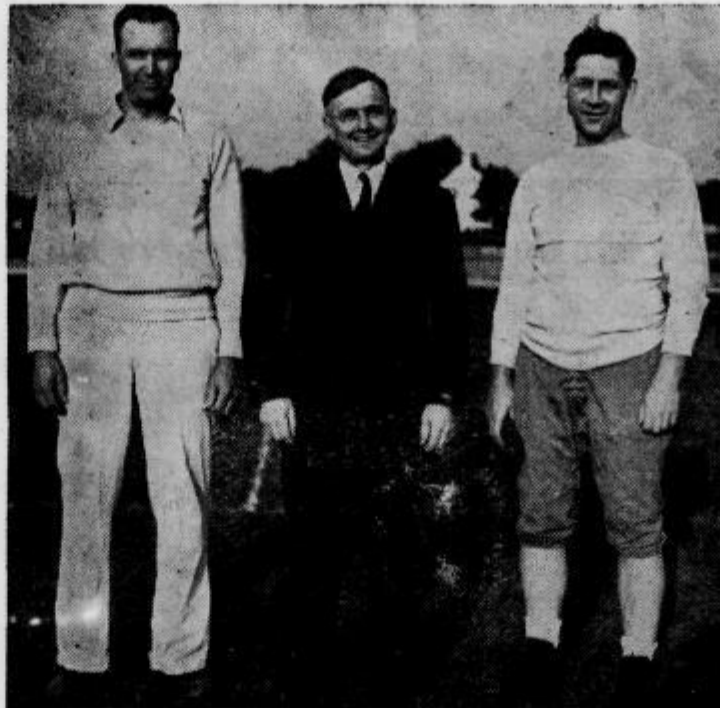

Lock Haven showed themselves woefully weak on pass defense as the Warriors made substantial gains through the ozone all afternoon, in addition to scoring both touchdowns on passes. Zwirek, Kearns and Morgan alternated in throwing the pigskin all over the Eagle field to various glue fingered receivers.

Walt Marusiak, DuBois freshman, again stood out for the locals, running and kicking beautifully.

Bill Grenoble, vice president, was elected president with Don Rathgeber as the new vice president.

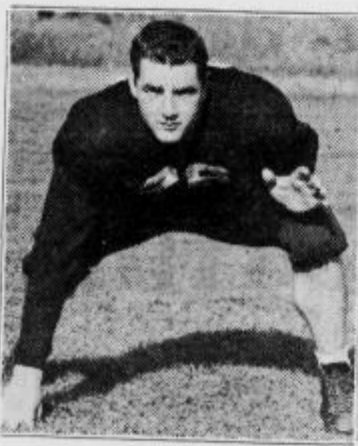
Mr. Grenoble read Mr. Swope's resignation letter to the class in which he extended his best wishes for a progressive year.

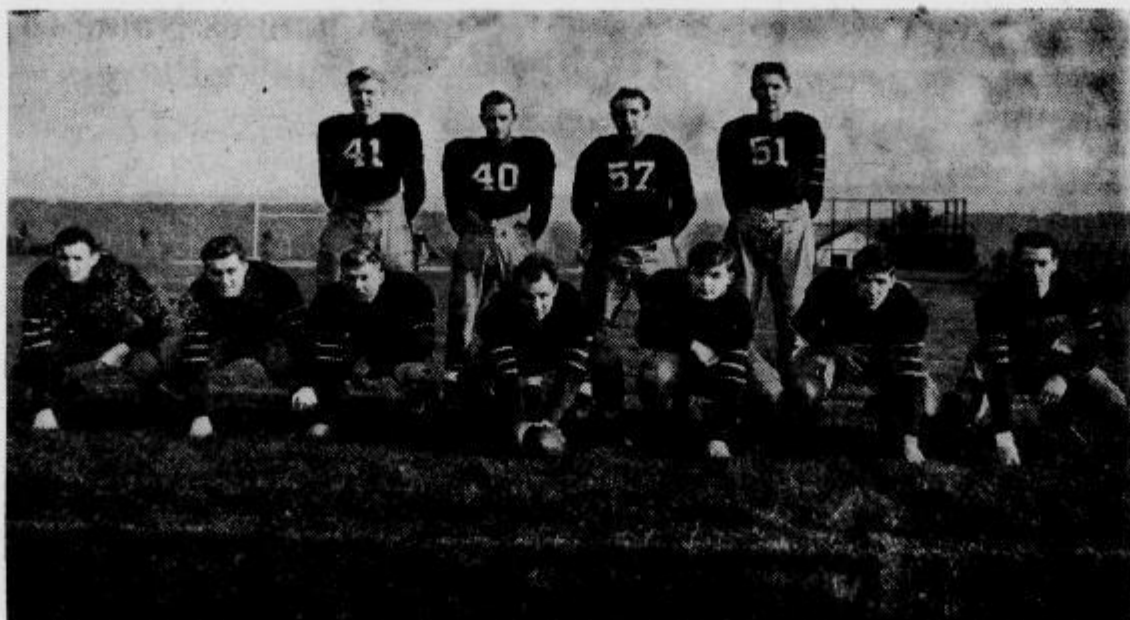

ized the squad since the start of the present campaign, but they still lack the necessary punch to put the ball across the last white stripe more times than the enemy.

Coach Bossert said this week that his line was in good shape and that his main difficulty lay with the backs. "We need a fast halfback or two, who can really run the ball," the Eagle mentor said, "and unless we can find one we're going to have a tough time of it this year." Following the loss of Vic Crocco, last year's sensational Freshman fullback, who transferred to the University of New Mexico, the Havenites have had quite some trouble finding a

satisfactory replacement. Ludge Marusiak, DuBois first year man, has done most of the ball-toting to date, and with good blocking could develop into a fine tail-back.

Today's game is expected to feature a Lock Haven aerial offensive, with Marusiak, Don Campbell, fullback, and Frank Lovich reserve, doing the tossing. Bossert said that the Eagles, because of a running offense that was practically nil, would have to rely on passes.

Tut Moore, 150-pound Phillipsburg Sophomore, will get his first starting berth today at quarterback, as Campbell, 200-pound Curwensville boy, moves to fullback. The remainder of the local

line-up will find Bob Foye, Lock Haven, and Glenn Miller, Pittsburgh, at ends; Hank Blake, DuBois, and Russ Yost, Lock Haven, tackles; Captain Bill Beightol, Clearfield, and Henry Meng, Williamsport, guards; and Melvin Dry, Bellefonte, center. In addition to Moore, Marusiak and Campbell, Clyde Tucker, former Ponchatoula, La., High grid flash, will start in the backfield.

Bloomsburg has also been unsuccessful in their three games to date, but the charges of Coach George Bucheit cannot be taken lightly, as the Bloom lads have more than once proved a costly stumbling block to Lock Haven's high-stepping progress.

"We believe that there should be increased financial support given by the state to State Teachers Colleges in order that an adequate supply of properly trained teachers may be provided for public schools.

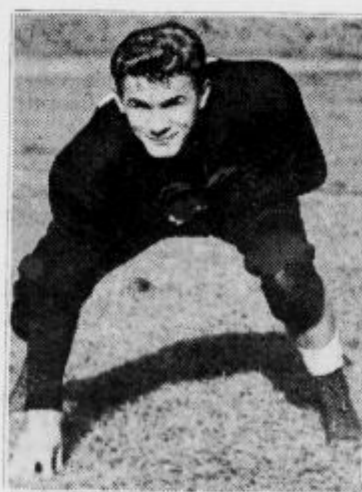
