

# Overflow Rally

Last night an overflow crowd assembled at the student Boycott Rally in Price Auditorium.

Larry Wise began the discussion by explaining the three stages of planned student action:

-Thursday; student boycott and major rally at 2:00 P.M.

 Monday: Governor Shapp's arrival on campus for a Democratic fund-raising dinner.

-Two weeks: Possible forum with State Legislators.

Wise pointed out that further student action depends upon the success of Thursday's rally.

The media which is scheduled to cover the boycott was also discussed by Wise. The AP wire service has been contacted. In addition, television station WBRE is tentatively scheduled to cover Thursday's events.

Tim Foltz then informed the students of the attempts to get the state legislators here for Thursday's rally. The legislature responded that the notice was too short for them to attend. Furthermore, the House and Schate have adjourned and will not be in session for two weeks.

Foltz announced that Sec. of Ed., John Pittenger recommended a budget cut for education. "We have a Sec. of Ed. who doesn't believe in education," stated Foltz.

Next, Mike Holter expanded on the list of problems and grievances. He discussed the necessity of the Law Enforcement Division and the Infirmary. Holter then pointed out the possible discontinuance of these services. "Students have to become educated, know the arguments and the problems," stated Doug Dows. He further stated that the reason the state colleges aren't getting money is because they don't have the loudest voice." He ended by saying: "TOMORROW IS DUR OPPORTUNITY, OUR CHANCE, IT'S A STEPPING STONE. LET'S DO SOMETHING!"

### Hamblin Hopes for Effective Boycott

"We hope it will be effective," said President Hamblin in support of the student boycott. He hoped the boycott would "attempt to bring our problems to the attention of people (legislators) who can do something."

He continued hat the boycott is "entirely within the rights of the students as long as they don't violate others' rights.

Hamblin said of state colleges, "these are the colleges of he people of Pennsylvania." These colleges "make it possible for people who aren't generally wealthy to receive a better education."

President Hamblin also stated that this is a problem of the state college system. "We're not saying Lock Haven is being discriminated against."

Hamblin, in an effort to show that some of the state's attempts to alleviate the colleges' monetary problems, read a letter from the Budget Secretary of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

# Faculty Supports Objectives

The Bargaining Unit I representing the Faculty of Lock Haven State College unanimously approved last night a resolution supporting the student boycott of classes. The resolution reads:

"The Faculty of Lock Haven State College supports the objectives of the student boycott of classes on Thursday, October 25, 1973. We recognize the problems and grievances that the student body of Lock Haven State College is trying to bring to the attention of the college administration and state officials."

This tremendous display of support by Lock Haven State's Faculty adds a greater degree of respectability to the class boycott.

The Student Directory will not be distributed on Thurs., Oct. 25, due to the boycott, but will be distributed again on Friday, Oct. 26 and Monday, Oct. 29.

Secreta'y McIntosh decided to take \$78,000 dollars from supplies and equipment allocations and add it to personnel allocations. The letter "doesn't ask if we can do it or if we want to do it. The letter just says that it has been done."

President Hamblin continued by saying that the immediate effects won't be felt right away because supplies have already been bought for this semester. However, "it will really hurt the second semester."

# **EDITORIAL**

# Impact on State Officers ??

"All state colleges have a lack of funds," he commented, "I feel the impact of all state colleges through a co-ordinated effort of student government associations might be more effective." He also said a demonstration in Harrisburg wou'd be more

offective.

Dr. Robinson explained he didn't know the plans of Gevenor Shapp being on campus Monday evening.

"I feel the boycott may have been scheduled at a good time."

When asked about teachers who will take attendance or give quizes today he said, "I would hope that they don't. Teachers are in a key position to understand student concerns," he continued, "but they should be available to teach students who elect to attend class."

Tina Bonci, sophomore"I agree with the idea behind
the boycott, I hope it accomplishes something. In order

Jeanne Bayuk, a sophomore, "I think the results from the student body will be favorable. Hopefully the legislation will recognize the problem. This may not have as much effect as many more future bigger rally's."

Other viewpoints were

The whole experience would be beneficial to those who remain open minded enough to have their own mind constructs revived.

At this institution as we attempt to expand our minds let us expand also our Prejudice and humility. stereotyping have no place in our society, and each one of us harbors the most effective weapon against them-our minds. # Professors Share Concern

Today, as yesterday, the student boycott of classes is the major topic of conversation on campus. Professors as well as students are concerned with the outcome, and here is what a few have

Mr. Vaughn: "I'm in favor of it. I hope it calls attention in the right places to the predicament of the state colleges. I'd like to see the budget of the Commonwealth go up and the college tuition of the students go down."

Miss Huttenstine: "I think its a great idea if its kept to its stated purposes. I think something must be done to make Harrisburg aware of the problems created by their recent budgeting patterns. Its ironic that as tuition goes up the quality of Education goes down--not because of the students and not because of the staff, but because of class size, library limitations, and other supportive services. I hope it works."

Mr. Young: "I feel strongly that we need and receive action from the students. I'm not sure whether a boveout is the right thing to do technique wise because of the 'missing classes' facet of it, but I'm glad to see they feel strongly enough to want to do something about it. It is going to be effective only if its really publicized."

Mr. Black: I think the objectives are okay. The protest came so quickly that it is hard to tell how effective this boycott will be until its over and we see the results.

Mr. Eberle: You're not going to know how effective it is till its over. I'm all behind it especially when 3/4 of the things we are trying to get deal with the physical education department. The only way it will work is to give it alot of publicity. The purpose of publicity is to make the people aware of the problem Something needs to be done we've got nothing to lose. As for my football game Thurs. every student wants to playthey are not being pressured. told them that this was the only day they would be able to play the game. It is not

in a classroom situation. All my other football classes will probably be boycotted."

Ms. VanDine: I'm glad to see the students moving out of the period of complacency If it succeeds I'll be excited. I feel though that the boycott is at the wrong time- It should come when all 14 state colleges are able to get together and hold one big gathering.

### Harrisburg Could Help

"I hope that it will make an indelible impression on members within Harrisburg." These were the words of Dr. Mathew Maetozo, Dean of Health and Phys-ed at LhoC. concerning todays boycott.

"Students have every right to make our plight known to the people in positions of power in Harrisburg, who could conceivably help us resolve our problems."

Maetozo also pointed out that "the administration has done all it can up to this point," and with appropriate faculty and student support we can all move forwar d in solving our apparent problems." The faculty and administration are conversent with our difficultiesat present" Maetozo

added, but we have reached a point where we are powerless to do anymore without the support of state legislators, the Commissioner of Education, the Commissioner of Higher Education, and the Governor.

In conclusion, Maetozo stated, "I hope that what ever measures students decide to take, they will have positive effects on the problems that we face not only in the Physical Education department but in many other departments in this institution.

"I believe that the students needs should be met and that the state has the responsibility to meet these needs."
