

Faculty Pass 2 Bills About Miller

The Lock Haven State faculty has passed two resolutions concerning the procedures followed in the dismissal of Harry I. Miller.

One resolution requests the board of trustees to dismiss the charge of "possible acts in violation of law" against Miller.

The other resolution placed the faculty in agreement with the state secretary of education that the charge of "immorality" should not have been used as grounds for the dismissal.

In proposing the two resolutions, Donald Day, assistant professor of history, said that he was not supporting or defending Miller's conduct.

Day said that, on the contrary, Miller "should be properly disciplined for what he did." However, Day added, any faculty member is entitled to "fair and reasonable treatment or

Parson's Reactions

LHS President Richard T. Parsons said yesterday that it was "very kind" of Day in not wanting the charge of immorality attached to Miller. He said, however, that as he has found the word defined, it does have meaning to this case. He suggested that the faculty should consult a legal dictionary for the meaning of the word as he used it.

due process.

The LHS professor noted that the faculty has already voted down a motion to reinstate Miller. Day added that if there is any doubt in the minds of the faculty about whether Miller was dismissed by proper procedure, this should cause the faculty to get involved and take proper action.

According to faculty minutes released this week Day's first motion reads as follows:

"The Lock Haven State College faculty requests that the Board of Trustees properly implement its public statement that Mr. Harry I. Miller was not removed from the fac-

ulty because of 'possible acts in violation of law' by formally dismissing that charge."

The motion, voted in secret ballot, passed 72-30, two abstentions.

The second motion states that "the Faculty of the Lock Haven State College agrees with Dr. David H. Kurtzman, Pennsylvania's Secretary of Education, that the charge of immorality should not have been the grounds for Harry I. Miller's dismissal from the Faculty and requests that the Board of Trustees formally dismiss that charge."

This motion passed 61-37, five abstentions.



Roth to Give Reading

Steven Roth, student poet, has recently published a chap book entitled *Drowning Season*.

The chap book, which is the second in an English club series (*Small Deceits* by Roth and Vincent Stewart of the English faculty was published last year), contains poems written from January through August.

Roth will read from the poetry book next Monday at 8:15 pm in Bentley Hall Lounge. He will include several of his newest poems.

Copies of the chap book will be available at this time. Each book costs \$.50.

Roth's volume is divided into three sections: morning poems, Hiram Calloway, and short newer poems. All three of the sections represent a continuing style, and there is some experimentation in rhythm in the poems.

"I wanted to call the collection *Drowning Season* because many of the poems were some sort of direction out of a drowning season. That is why the inscription 'For the time I was lost, I dressed in brick' is significant," Roth explained.

There are two Hiram Calloway poems. "Hiram Calloway is a very good friend of mine who collaborated with me in more

than two poems, but went unused except for two," Roth said.

He added that "the poems are much different than the ones found in *Small Deceits*. I don't know if it's so much that I relaxed or that my focus changed."

The volume is dedicated to Edward B. Hills, professor emeritus of English at LHS.

"Mr. Hills was my first real poetry teacher and along with Mr. Vaughn started it all in a sense. I am very indebted to him," Roth said.

He also extended his appreciation to Lawrence B. Lebin, English club adviser, for the opportunity to publish the chap book and to Peggy Reese, student typist, who set the copy for the publication.

Lebin stated that "it is fortunate that we have a student poet of Steve's quality on campus; and although it is not the best time of the year for a poetry reading, I believe that the students will find it an enjoyable evening."

Tickets for Julian Bond can be obtained at the PUB receptionist desk. There is no charge for LHS students.

Aquifins Present Annual Show

The theme of this year's Aquifins' show has been chosen to demonstrate America's traditional past, the conflicts of today, and the challenge of the sea, space and automation that will confront us in the future. The symbolism in the various numbers, along with the narration, will attempt to portray educational as well as moralistic ideals. The music will include such current hits as "Up, Up and Away," the theme from "The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly," and the love theme from "Romeo and Juliet."

There will be 65 participants in the evenings entertainment; several group numbers, a trio, a duet and a solo. The group numbers for "The Good, the Bad,

and the Ugly" involves couples and is designed to represent America's hawks and doves. The solo by Mimi Kramer explores life in the sea; Kathy Pelc and Mike Holdeman portray the "love generation" to the music of "Romeo and Juliet." The trio, performed by Bev Corson, Bonnie Miller and Ann Royer to the music from "Exodus" is built around the theme "this land is mine." This is the final number and it attempts to tie the whole show together with the thought that despite all its problems, all of us can still say of America "this land is mine."

McLaughlin Named To Board of Trustees

In brief ceremonies at Harrisburg Wednesday, LHS Student Cooperative Council Mike McLaughlin was named an advisory member of the Board of trustees at Lock Haven State.

McLaughlin was among 13 other student government presidents of the state-owned colleges and university to be named to such a post.

Saying it was "among the most important acts I have performed as governor," Gov. Raymond P. Shafer made the appointments as part of his administration's efforts to involve the 70,000 full- and part-time state college students in the official affairs of their individual schools.

"We are giving the students a voice on the policy-making body that governs their schools," Shafer said.

He explained that the advisory membership allows the student body presidents to participate in all the discussions of the board of trustees.

Because the boards are established by law, the governor said he did not have the power to authorize the student representatives to register an official vote on final decisions of the board. This power could be granted by the general assembly, he pointed out.

"We must make way for a new democratic blend in governing of our society. And there is no better place to begin than on our college campuses. That's what we are attempting to begin today," Gov. Shafer commented.

The Pennsylvania governor signed special documents for each of the presidents attending. The student president from Edinboro was absent from the ceremonies.

The documents were official appointments of the 14 student body presidents to the trustee boards.

Harrisburg officials Tuesday said the governor's ceremony would be followed by a special press conference for the representatives of the college newspapers attending the proceedings.

However, Shafer left immediately after the ceremony for an official visit to Bloomsburg State College.



Cagers, Matmen Register Wins

Courtmen Top York On Offensive Show

The LHS basketball team of Coach James Christopher won their first game of the 1968-69 season Tuesday night with a 194-97 victory over York College. An estimated crowd of 1500 watched the "new look" Eagles even their record at 1-1, and give their new head coach his first LHS win.

The game started out poorly for LHS as they fell behind 6-0 before freshman center Ziggy Tauginas made two free throws. It was not until 15:30 of the first half that Ed Wright hit the first Eagle field goal to make the score 8-4 in favor of York. The Eagles then strengthened their defense and gradually caught up to York. Mike Coront put LHS ahead at the 12:24 mark with a jump shot. The lead then changed hands six times before Sam Vaughn put the Eagles ahead 22-21 at the 9:00 mark; York never lead after this Vaughn goal. During the final eight minutes of the first half LHS lead by as much as seven points and as little as one. The score at the end of the first half was 45-42 in favor of the Eagles.

The first half was highlighted by the fine defensive team effort that LHS put out. The scoring was led by Ed Wright who had 11 of his 27 point total; Cliff Billet who had 8 of his 15; and Sam Vaughn who scored 9 of his 14 point total. Ed Wright also led the defense with several important steals.

The second half started off fast with LHS running its lead to 51-44 in the early going.

The LHS lead varied from as many as twelve to as little as seven until York cut the lead to six at the 10:26 mark. York made a great comeback attempt and cut the Eagle lead to four points with eight minutes left to play.

However, anytime that York threatened to tie the game the Eagles would come up with the big play and hold their lead. York's last chance came at the 1:09 mark when they again pulled within four points at 100-96.

Freshman John Marzlak was fouled and made two free throws to put the Eagles ahead 102-96. Ed Wright closed out the scoring with a field goal and LHS won 104-97.

Coach Christopher commented, "This was a team victory. I am glad to have won this game for Lock Haven State College and its students."

Saturday night the Eagles entertain the very strong team from Ithaca College. This is the strongest test of LHS's cagers thus far this season. "This is a very strong team and we will have to play good ball to beat them," commented Eagle coach James Christopher. Christopher said that the starting lineup wouldn't be announced until right before Saturday's game.

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Grapplers Roll Over Raiders, 30-5

The Bald Eagle grapplers captured their first match of the year and evened their record at 1-1 with a crushing, 30-5 victory over Shiopensburg State College, Tuesday night.

Led by falls recorded by Shane Foley and Jim Batesky the Eagles were in command all the way. LHS captured the first five bouts and only dropped one and came up with one draw.

Will Vokes, a last minute insert at 158 lbs., was the only doser for the Eagles. Recovering from a recent automobile accident, Vokes was inserted into the lineup when Bob Ambrose failed to make weight. Still a little out of shape due to the accident Vokes dropped a close 12-8 decision to John Corman. "He needs work on conditioning. His moves looked good. I wouldn't have used him unless I had to," stated Eagle Coach Gray Simons.

The Red Raiders captured their other points in the 190 lbs. class when LHS's Hank Hawkins drew with Dwight Webster, 1-1.

According to Simons, "Hank did most of the shooting for a takedown, but just couldn't get him (Webster) on the middle of the mat."

Jim Rupp started things rolling for the Eagles with an 8-2 decision over Glenn Miller followed by Donnie Fay's close decision over Bill Corman. Both wrestlers drew praise from Simons, "Rupp did a good job. Miller was 11-1 last year. Fay looked good, he had a tough guy. Corman is tough, he's a natural 126-pounder and Donnie was wrestling up a weight."

Foley came along with his pin, clamping Tony Kuhn in 5:18 after building up a 5-0 lead.

Larry Rippey and Paul Brodmerkel upped the Eagle advantage to 17-0 with easy decisions. Rippey recorded a lopsided 14-4 verdict over Rick Lentz while Brodmerkel handled Ken Warner 7-4.

Bill Rhodes edged John Helter, 4-1 with three last minute points on a takedown and a penalty point.

Batesky, wrestling his first varsity match, recorded his fall in 2:49 over Paul Reed after holding a slim 4-3 margin. Reed was going for a guillotine when Batesky caught him.

Heavyweight Scott Brooks gave the Eagles their final points when he decided Roger Berkheiner, 9-5.
