LHS Tutoring Service Established

A program to provide tutoring services for children and teenagers in Clinton and Lycoming Counties has been established by representatives of schools, churches, and community agencies in the two counties, in cooperation with Lock Haven State College.

The community groups will identify youngsters who need assistance with their studies and the college will provide the tutors, consisting of students presently preparing to be junior and senior high school teachers. Interested laymen will also serve either as tutors or as administrators in a community's program. The tutoring will take place off of school property, in church facilities and in church facilities and in community agencies such as the YW and YMCA.

Coordinators of the program are Stephen Hockley, executive director of the Lycoming-Clinton Counties Commission for Community Action in Williamsport, and Dr. Francis Colabrese, director of secondary education at LHS. Hockley will coordinate the community efforts while Dr. Colabrese will administer the selection and guidance of the student tutors. These coordinators plan to begin operation of the program by February 1972. Efforts are being made to secure Federal funds for transportation of the tutors and the pupils.

Referrals from the communities are being coordinated by Neal Gallagher, head elementary supervisor for the Keystone Central School District; Mrs. Mary Jane Sarvey, Lock Haven Junior High School counselor; and Mrs. Janet M. Trice, community aide with the STEP program in Williamsport. FIRESIDE CHAT

With the past election Lock Haven many students feel that they needn't register to vote in this area because their vote will be negligible. This may be true, if that small number of students (less than 100 and more than 50) are the only ones who continue to register for Lock Haven City elections.

However, Lock Haven was not the only community with this minor showing, which received no encouragement from the local journalistic establishment. For example, New York City did not notice a great political influx by their students due to the passage of the 26th amendment. The reason given by most observers is that students from Brooklyn College, New York University and other schools had no issues that were exciting enough to mobilize the electorate.

However, this situation did not exist everywhere. West Chester State College students interviewed their county candidates at a student open forum.

Students at the University of Colorado turned Boulder politics head over heels. They flocked to the polls by thousands at precincts around the University. They elected two of their own to the Boulder City Council, a 28 year-old bookstore owner and a 26 year-old CU doctoral candidate. Their votes were also responsible for pushing a black attorney and a human relations specialist to the top of the list of 22 council candidates.

Young voters were also given credit for the winning margin over the controversial proposal to limit buildings in Boulder to 55 feet (five stories) in height.

Youth-oriented campaigns defeated a two-term incumbent for major in Bloomington, Indiana with a recent law graduate.

College students themselves won election to local offices scattered throughout the country. For example they won in Rhode Island, Ohio and Minnesota and not all of them were college towns.

Therefore, Lock Haven has several alternatives for upcoming elections, once they chose to register in Clinton County. They can support favorable local candidates or elect from within once they have become familiar with the issues and the candidates.

The match will also be broadcast on radio live by WPBZ-Radio in Lock Haven for local fans and on WGPA-FM-AM, Bethlehem, for the Lehigh Valley area.

The SCC Ticket Office announced today that the 125 reserved seat tickets allotted Lock Haven for the match are all sold-out. The "Snake-Pit" at Lehigh seats approximately 3,700 and several hundred general admission tickets will go on sale at the door at 4 p.m., on Saturday, Dec. 4. A J.V. match between the twopowers will begin at 6:30 p.m. The usual capacity crowd has been guaranteed again for the match.

Jacobs To Retire : Daley Named Successor

Stanley E. Daley, associate professor in the School of Health Physical Education, and Recreation at Lock Haven State College, has been appointed director of athletics. The appointment was announced by LHS president Dr. Francis N. Hamblin and is effective September 1972.

Daley will replace associate professor Stephen Jacobs, athletic director since 1956, who will retire on June 1 after 18 years on the college faculty.

The new athletic director is a 1942 graduate of LHS and received his master's degree at Penn State University in 1950. During the 1970-71 academic year he did additional graduate work at the University of Pittsburgh while on sabbatical leave.

Coach Daley has a long connection with many sports on the high school and college level, both as a player and a coach.

He was an outstanding athlete at Jersey Shore High School, from which he was graduated in 1938. At LHS, he competed in football, soccer, and baseball and was captain of the 1941-42 basketball team. That season he was selected for the All-State second team.

Following military service during World War II, Daley coached for two years at Renovo High School.

In 1948, he became head basketball coach and assistant football coach at Lock Haven High School. He coached the high school team to three straight Central State League titles and his 1953-54 team scored the school's only undefeated season in its history.

After seven years at Lock Haven, he served as Washington and Jefferson College's head basketball coach for two years. In 1956, he returned to his alma mater, Lock Haven State College, as head basketball and baseball coach where he continued as the college's basketball coach until his year of study at Pitt. This spring will

mark Coach Daley's second season as head golf coach at the college.

Stephen Jacobs was graduated from Lansford High School in 1925 and from Muhlenberg College in 1929. He received his master's degree from the Penn State University in 1951.

For 24 years, he was a very successful high school coach. At Tyrone High School from 1938 to 1953, he produced several undefeated football teams. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II and coached outstanding sports teams.

Jacobs came to LHS in 1953 and was appointed athletic director in 1956. He also served as football line coach for 15 years and head freshman football coach for two years. From 1955 through 1960, he also served as head track coach. His 1956 team produced an outstanding 5-1 record.

During Jacobs' long tenure as director of athletics, LHS has gained a national reputation for developing outstanding sports teams, athletes, physical education teachers and coaches.

Commenting on the retirement of Jacobs, Dr. Hamblin stated: "Mr. Jacobs is to be highly commended for his many years of faithful and devoted service to the physical education program at Lock Haven State as a teacher, coach, and athletic director. I'm certain that Mr. Daley, with his outstanding background over the years in sports, will carry on the fine tradition established by Mr. Jacobs."

SCC Meeting

At last night's SCC meeting, the results of the voting on the new constitution were announced. With 335 students voting the official count was 256 students in favor of the constitution and 79 against. The constitution was adopted at the meeting and everything is now into effect with the following exception.

A motion made by Ron Jury and passed by a majority states that the new executive committee will be elected before the spring semester; however, the SCC senators will be nominated in the spring and elected in Fall 1972. The reason for this amendment lies in the difficulty of organizing the commuters, fraternities, and dorms in terms of voting for their respective representatives in the short span of time originally allotted. In accordance with this amendment, the current board of directors will continue to serve until the tentative schedule for the Fall 1972 election of SCC officers, December 1 through 8 which is allotted for the submission of nominee's names to the election committee. An open forum is slated for December 9, which will consist of questioning of the nominees by the audience. The tentative date for the election is December 15.

An additional amendment was passed by the board which will provide the Nottingham students with gas money for their future trips.

Finally, an allocation was granted to the gymnastic team for exhibitions at two additional schools.

Dr. Ken Cox will pit some freshmen against Lehigh coach Thad Turner's equally young team when the meet begins at 8 p.m. in Grace Hall on the Lehigh campus. However, Lehigh has some returning wrestlers who will bear watching, including Randy Biggs (118), Greg Surenian (126), Herb Campbell (150), and Bob Lustica (HWT). Cox, however, will have some of his veteran charges going, specifically Jim Rupp (118), Don Fay (126), John Blackwell (177), and Tom Zimmerman (HWT).

Steve Harmish, junior, finished the grueling 26 mile, 385 yard race in 38th place with a time of 2 hours and 54 minutes.

George Bower, also a junior, came in 43rd in time of 2 hours, 58 minutes. Coming in 96th was sophomore Larry Wise. Wise covered the long distance in 3 hours and 27 minutes.

The times compiled by the three LHS distance runners qualified them to compete in the famous Boston Marathon held annually in the spring.

The Lock Haven State swimming team will open the 1971-72 season at home on Saturday, December 4 hosting a strong Carnegie-Mellon University team at 2 p.m. in the Zimmerli pool.

The LHS swimmers then face three more rugged opponents in the space of seven days before the long holiday break. The Eagles will take on East Stroudsburg State at home on December 8, and then will travel for two away meets with California on December 11, and powerful Clarion State, December 15.

Commenting on the upcoming season, LHS' veteran Coach Harold Hacker said, "Once again we have no depth and this will hurt us a lot in dual meets. However, we should be improved over last year."

Jack Weaver, sophomore, has looked terrific in practice and should have an outstanding season. Kevin Hammer, senior, our team captain this season, broke the 50 and 100 yard freestyle school records last year and should have another fine year.

Three freshmen, Mike Farren, Jeff Holmes, and Tom Hinaman, have looked good in pre-season practice and could give the Eagles some depth in long distance freestyle races.

Other returning lettermen include Larry Briggs (diving); Lance Edwards, (freestyle); Gary Fogelman, (diving); Warren Hammer, (freestyle); Rich Kacinko, (backstroke); and John McDaniels, (breaststroke).
