ISP May Rise Again

The independent study program may be gone, but it is hoped that like Lazarus, it will have a miraculous resurrection, and soon.

Everyone is aware that the program no longer exists, but few understand the reasons for its demise. It was lost last fall when APSCUF, the bargaining agent for the state college faculties, signed an agreement with the Commonwealth.

One of the provisions of the agreement is that a professor

can only make three class preparations for the semester. He teaches more than three classes, because two or more sections of the same course count for only one preparation. However, there were no provisions made for the extra time a professor spends with students on their independent studies and, in the case of schools with a graduate program, the time spent on thesis-study programs.

The faculties of the 14 state colleges and university involved in the agreement are aware of the discrepancy and they want to move to correct it. The local faculty members of APSCUF will meet and discuss what exactly constitutes an extra preparation and agree on a small compensation for the faculty to cover the time they spend in such extra activities. Their findings will be submitted for approval state-level of APSCUF.

Dr. Daniel Showan, the president of the local APSCUF chapter, foresees that the independent study program at Lock Haven should be fully re-instated by summer school, or at the very latest, the fall session.

Results Of Dedication To Be Heard Tonight

The result of one man's lifelong dedication to music will be heard Tuesday evening in Price Auditorium. The Concordia Choir, under the direction of Dr. Paul J. Christiansen, will appear at 8:15 p.m. as part of the Lock Haven Artist Series.

Like so many other giants in the world of classical music, Dr. Christiansen comes from a family which has been rich in the musical tradition. His father, F. Melius Christiansen, founded and conducted the famous St. Olaf Choir from Northfield, Minnesota. The elder Christiansen wrote and arranged several original compositions. Three of these works will be performed by the Concordia Choir during Tuesday night's concert.

Dr. Christiansen received his bachelor's degree in piano and composition from St. Olaf College and his master's degree from Eastman School of Music. Like his father, he has composed many original works, one of which will be presented Tuesday evening.

Dr. Christiansen began his association with the Concordia Choir in 1937, and since that time, has developed the group into one of the nation's most respected choral companies. The *New York Times* has commended the choir for its "remarkable virtuosity" and its "rhythmic and dynamic transitions."

Because the majority of the choir members are of Scandinavian heritage, Dr. Christiansen took the group on a triumphant tour of Norway several years ago. Thousands of people and high flying flags greeted the choir at every stop. At many of the concerts, public address systems were needed to accommodate the overflow crowds standing outside the auditoriums.

MS in Business Now Available At Indiana U.

The Graduate School and the School of Business at Indiana University of Pennsylvania have announced a new program leading to the Master of Science degree in business.

Scheduled to begin with the 1973 summer sessions, the new program has been designed primarily for businessmen, industrial personnel and government employees of the region interested in continuing their academic study in business.

Students will be allowed to select within a business concentration a wide variety of courses from the fields of accounting, marketing or basic business. In addition, they can choose appropriate courses from related areas including economics, guidance, home economics, psychology and computer science. General electives in the social sciences and humanities may also be taken.

The School of Business's new graduate-level offering will parallel its current master's degree in business education that enrolls mainly teachers.

"We are attempting to attract," said Dr. Elwood B. Sheeder, School of Business dean, "persons who want a master's degree in business but who do not want to teach."

Tankmen Drop Meet, Close Season

Coach Harold Hacker's tankers ended their regularly scheduled season with a double loss, in a tri-meet against Shippensburg and Millersville Saturday in Zimmerli pool.

Through the efforts of the 400 Free Relay squad in the final event of the day, Shippensburg and Millersville finished the meet even at 76 points apiece. The Eagles gained second place in this event and finished the event with a very impressive 48 points.

The Raiders of Shippensburg captured first place in the 400 Medley Relay, the first event of the afternoon, with a time of 4:05.17, while Millersville's quartet placed second with a time of 4:07.03. The Haven quartet (Farren, Ritter, Werner, and Zuber) finished third in 4:28.89.

The second event, the 1,000 yard Freestyle, saw Tom Shrader place fifth, and John Steele third for the Eagles first four points. Jim Love landed the number one slot to give Millersville a total of 12 points, while Rex Garmen finished second to give the Raiders of Shippensburg 12 points.

Next was the 200 Freestyle in which Marc Wingert and Warren Hammer came in fourth and fifth place respectively, to give the Eagle team a total of seven points. Mike Carvel and Bruce Genge gave Shippensburg the one and two spots.

Tom Burns gave Lock Haven the number two position in the 50 Free, while Lance Edwards finished fifth. Jeff McLaughlin gave the Millersville Marauders the number one position with a time of 24.44, while Tom Burns of Lock Haven had a time 24.46. It should be noted however, that Tom did have a time of 24.44 in the tri-meet against Lycoming and Wilkes just last Wednesday, in which he won the 50 yard Freestyle.

The next event, the 200 Individual Medley, also deprived a Lock Haven tanker of the number one position by one second of the clock. The Raider's Rick Marlin finished in 2:15.73, while the Eagle's Jack Weaver captured second with a time of 2:16.38.

At the start of the one meter dive the team scores were Millersville 32, Shippensburg 28, and Lock Haven 16. Al Rice was the only competitor for the

Bald Eagles, because the other freshman diver, Bill Edwards, suffered a foot injury in practice Thursday night.

As was not uncommon this season, Al Rice captured the number one spot for the Eagles. Shippensburg's Fred Winkelman and Steve Kreider took the number two and three slots.

The seventh event of the afternoon, the 100 Butterfly, found junior Jack Weaver swimming in lane three again, this time taking the number four position. Shippensburg once again took the first two positions with Rick Marlin beating out his own teammate by three seconds.

The 100 Freestyle was a close event all around, with Shippensburg taking first and sixth places. Bruce Genge had a time of 54.59 while his teammate had a time of 58.55. Millersville finished with the number two and four slots, as Steve Grahek finished with 54.81 and Jeff McLaughlin with 55.68. Tom Burns gave the Eagles third with a time of 55.56, while his teammate Steve Werner had 57.74.

Moving on to the 200 Backstroke, Mike Farren gave the Bald Eagles the number two spot by a four second loss to Millersville's Frank Jablonski. Rick Kacinko gave the Bald Eagles the number five berth in that event.

First and second place was taken by Millersville in the 500 yard Freestyle, but Marc Wingert and John Steele took the four and five spots for Lock Haven.

Jack Weaver finished fourth in the Breast Stroke, one second behind the third place winner from Millersville. The Marauders' Dan Wilkins took the top place in that event while Tom Kauffman of Shippensburg finished second. Dave Ritter ended in the sixth spot for Lock Haven.

Not using the optional three

meter dive, Allen Rice once again clinched the number one spot as he beat out his opponents for the Haven on the one meter board. Shippensburg, through the efforts of Steve Kreider and Fred Winkelman, took the second and third positions.

In the next to last event, the team scores were Lock Haven 44, Millersville 76, and Shippensburg 68. At this point Lock Haven was clearly out of the race, and apparently so was Shippensburg.

To everyone's surprise, Shippensburg captured the number one position in the 400 Free Relay with a time of 3:41.05. The Marauders' quartet was made up of two men who came in third place previously in the meet, one sixth place man, and Bruce Genge who came in first and second places earlier in the meet. Not a very likely quartet to take first place in this event.

Burns, Werner, Zuber, and Edwards gave the Eagles a second place standing for this final event with a time of 3:46.88. They deprived Millersville of winning the meet, on which several Shippensburg tankers later commented, "Thanks, if it weren't for you guys we would have lost the meet."

The final scores for the meet gave Lock Haven 48, and Millersville and Shippensburg had 76 points each. These three teams will meet again next week, along with several other teams from state colleges, at the Millersville pool.

Kuntz Shines As Grapplers Snatch Two

The 20th ranked (NCAA-CD) Eagle wrestlers won their ninth and tenth matches of the season this weekend, downing California State 28-9 and Waynesburg College 25-12. The young Bald-Eagle team completed their thirtieth consecutive winning dual meet season (10-5) and now prepare for the conference and national (NCAA) championships. Looking especially outstanding on the road-trip was 118 pounder Brian Kuntz, who scored an impressive 4-3 victory over California's Carlos Bryant and a fall in 6:00 over previously undefeated Dale Graham of Waynesburg.

Also winning matches both nights were Rob Johnson, 126; Don Eichenlaub, 150; Don Adams, 158; and big Jim Schuster, 240 pound freshman heavyweight. The Bald Eagles, currently ranked ninth in the East should move up in both polls this week.

According to mat mentor, Dr. Ken Cox, "the 1972-73 wrestling team is one of the finest dual meet teams he has had the privilege to coach in his 17 years of coaching." Team co-captains, senior Gary Ventimiglia, and sophomore Lou Conway have displayed outstanding leadership all season.

Five Champions To Defend Titles

Five defending champions will be in the field when the 30th annual Pennsylvania Conference Wrestling Championships begin next weekend at Heiges Field House on the campus of Shippensburg State College.

The returnees will be led by Wade Schalles of Clarion, who captured the PC 167-pound title last year and went on to win both the NCAA College Division and University Division crowns at 150. Schalles was voted the "Outstanding Wrestler" in both events.

Other champions back include Gary Ventimiglia (150) of LHS, Bill Simpson (177) of Clarion, Jim Zoschg (190) of Millersville, and heavyweight Tom Herr of Edinboro. Tom Cox of Slippery Rock, who won at 142 last February when the tourney was staged at Edinboro, is injured and will not defend his title. Schalles and Simpson will be seeking their third straight Pennsylvania Conference championships.

Also back are Ron Sheehan and Floyd Hitchcock of Bloomsburg, who won the 177 and 190-pound titles, respectively, in 1971. Bloomsburg did not compete on the mats a year ago.

The 12 teams competing for the championship will be Bloomsburg, California, Clarion, East Stroudsburg, Edinboro, Indiana, Kutztown, Lock Haven, Mansfield, Millersville, Shippensburg, and Slippery Rock. Clarion is the defending team champion.

Lock Haven State's outstanding senior, 150 pounder, has been named to the third team NCAA mid-season "All-American" wrestling team. The announcement was made by the Amateur Wrestling News and Associated Press.

Ventimiglia is currently 17-2-1 on the season and won the C.W. Post Holiday Tournament. "Venty" defends his conference title this weekend at Shippensburg. Former stand-outs, Donnie Day (1972) and Larry Rippey (1971) were also Mid-Season "All-American's".

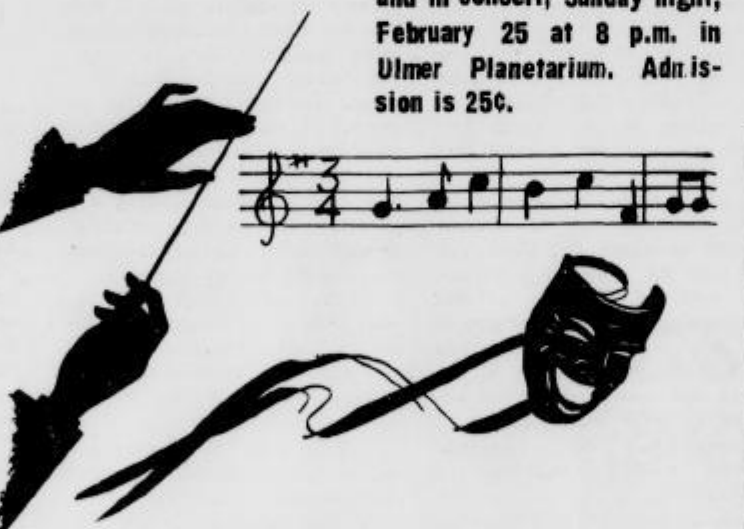


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
