

## Job Market For Teachers Still Looks Gloomy

The predicted shortage of teachers in the 1980s is little consolation to the 417 students who graduated in 1972 from Lock Haven State with degrees in education. They are faced with the teacher surplus of the 1970s.

While 225 graduates, 54% found teaching jobs, there remained 110 still seeking teaching positions as of November, according to the annual report released by C. Herbert Larson, Jr., director of placement in Bentley Hall.

U.S. Department of Labor statisticians predict that the tightening teacher market will continue throughout the 1970s. Projections show that enrollment elementary schools will decline nationally by some two million and secondary school enrollment will hold steady.

U.S. Office of Education studies of the 1970 census indicate a need for teachers will be felt in the 1980s predicted on the basis that the largest single age group in the 1970 census were ten-year-olds. As these children reach child-bearing age, the grandchildren of the post-war boom babies will begin to arrive and enter school during the 1980s.

Notifications of teaching positions available, received by LHS's Placement Office, have remained constant over the past five years. Many of the positions for 1972 were from out-of-state and fewer 1972 graduates accepted these positions than in the past, 14% as compared to 22% in 1971 and 24% in 1970.

The largest number of out-of-state positions were accepted in Maryland, followed by New

York. Within Pennsylvania, Lycoming County continued to hire the largest number of 1972 teaching graduates followed by Clinton County.

Further indication of increasing job competition among teachers is seen in the number of former graduates in education who reactivated their files with the Placement Office, indicating they were seeking jobs. The number increased from 60 in 1970 to 88 in 1971, with 106 in 1972.

Peter Balestreire, job-counseling specialist from the Commission's recruitment office, will present a fifteen minute slide-and-taped talk, "Effecting Responsive Government". Following the talk, information a-

bout current examination programs will be available. Questions on State job requirements starting salaries and employment opportunities will be answered.

Sessions will be held at 9:30 and 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. for students in the following curriculums: Mathematics, Physics, Economics, History, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Social Welfare, Health and Physical Education.

Richard Saxton, Lock Haven attorney, will be the guest speaker at the career seminar on law in Ulmer Planetarium on Wednesday, February 28, at 4 pm.

Saxton will answer the question, "What is the Lawyer's Day?" He is a graduate of Lock Haven State and Dickinson Law School.

# Indians Ambushed 49-47; Eagles Set Second Record

LHS, with a 7-13 record, broke its second record in as many games Saturday night.

The Eagles defeated always tough Indiana University of Pa. 49-47 before 1,000 excited fans at Thomas Fieldhouse.

Indiana jumped off to an early 6 point lead to make the score 8-2. The Eagles fought back though and grabbed the lead 11-10. Indiana continued their fine shooting and managed a 9 point lead 22-13 with 7 minutes left in the half.

Then, as quickly as the "Indians" got hot, they cooled. In fact, they only scored two more points in the half. Meanwhile, LHS continued to hit. Russ Paulin hit a bucket at the buzzer to allow the Eagles to go into the locker room with a slim 2 point margin, 26-24.

The second half was nip and tuck all the way. The teams traded buckets back and forth. With 5 minutes left, Indiana led 41-40. Defense, LHS's specialty, was the name of the game but the Eagles managed a 4 point lead, 47-43, with a little over 2 minutes remaining. With about a minute and a half left the score was tied 47-47.

Defense by both teams got tougher and with 30 seconds on the clock showing, Warren Goodling hit a jumper putting LHS ahead to stay 49-47.

In the next 30 hectic seconds, Indiana missed 5 shots. Randy Allen of Indiana had a

chance to tie the game up with 1 second remaining. He was at the foul line shooting two but he missed them both.

For the Eagles, Russ Paulin led the scorers with 11 points and 14 big rebounds. Warren Goodling added 10 points.

For Indiana, Randy Allen led with 17 points.

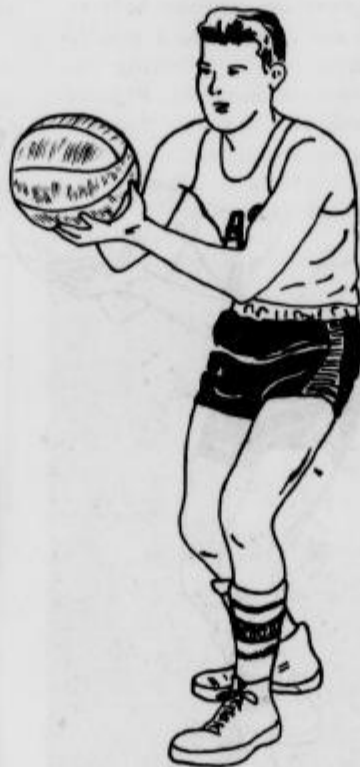
Thursday, Sigma Pi sneaked by the Faculty 45-43. Off-campus beat TKE, 51-48 and Second North raced past KDR 54-44.
