New Faculty Added To LHS

Several of the new faculty members who have joined the staff this year include:

Mr. Carney, a graduate of Dartmouth College, Hanover, N.H., earned his master's degree in Spanish at the University of Cincinnati and has done additional graduate work at the University of Illinois. He has been on the faculty of Illinois State University since 1965. Previously he served as chairman of foreign languages for the Finneytown high school, Ohio.

Mr. Congdon is a 1963 graduate of Syracuse University and earned his bachelor degree in theological studies at Wesley Theological Seminary in 1960. He served as a Methodist minister in Maryland for three years. While working towards his master's degree at Purdue University, awarded in January 1970, he was a graduate instructor. He has been teaching full time at Purdue this past semester.

Arthur Gray, who will teach chemistry, is presently completing work on his Ph.D. at Ohio University. He was awarded his bachelor's degree by Montclair State College in 1965.

Dr. Matz, a native of Pennsylvania, earned his B.S. at Ithaca College in 1938, his M.S. at the University of Pennsylvania in 1948, and his doctorate in sociology at Ohio State University in 1957. He has been chairman of the Sociology Department at Albright College in Reading, Pa., since 1958.

A new addition to the math department at Lock Haven State is Mrs. Constance Semanek.

At present she is replacing Joseph Thomas who has taken a leave of absence to further his education.

She received her Bachelor and Master degrees at the State University of Iowa.

In addition, she has done work beyond her Masters at Penn State. Mrs. Semanek taught at Mankato State College, Mankato, Minnesota.

Presently, she instructs Math I for math majors and Introduction to math for elementary majors.

Miss Darlene K. Thomas, a new member of the social science department, is teaching anthropology.

A native of Colorado, she is a graduate of the University of Colorado and holds a B.A. in a distributed major. With this major, there is no one major field of study. In 1966, Miss Thomas received a M.S. in social science from the University of Colorado.

After completing work on her masters, Miss Thomas worked as an assistant instructor for 2½ years and as an instructor of anthropology for one semester in Colorado.

Prior to coming to LHS, Miss Thomas spent seven months in the Canadian Arctic studying the cultural changes of the Eskimos and the effect of a governmental presence on these changes.

Richard Dillman, the new head of the Catalogue Department at the Stevenson Library, is a graduate of Indiana State University, Duquesne University, and the University of Pittsburgh, where he received his M.H.S.

He has taught in public schools and since his graduation from the University of Pittsburgh he has worked as Librarian at the branch campus of Pennsylvania State University at DuBois. Since 1968 he has worked as catalogue Librarian at Slippery Rock, Pa.

Miss Mays comes to Lock Haven from Paterson State College in Wayne, N.J. She was previously a faculty member at the University of Vermont, Burlington. A 1959 graduate of the University of

New Hampshire, she earned her master's degree at Boston University in 1962.

Dr. Margaret Mercer was graduated from Renovo High School in 1925 and earned her bachelor's, master's, and doctor's degrees at Pennsylvania State University. From 1946 to 1947 she was on the faculty of Lock Haven State. She was then appointed Chief Psychologist of the Veterans Hospital in Coatesville, Pa. From 1952 to 1957 she served as Director of Training in Clinical Psychology at St. Elizabeths Hospital, Washington, D.C. She returns to Lock Haven after thirteen years as Director of the Program for Research in Clinical Psychology at the National Center for Mental Health Services, Washington, D.C.

Michael Peplow has been on the English Department faculty at the University of Wisconsin since 1967. He is a 1962 graduate of Arizona State University and earned both his M.A., in 1964, and his Ph.D., in 1966, at Texas Christian University.

WAKE UP LOCK HAVEN STATE!

You as students and future taxpayers should be interested in knowing that unless you do something NOW, the tuition will again be raised next semester.

Another fact you may be interested in knowing is that Pennsylvania State University with the enrollment of 35,000 undergraduates receives one and a half times as much money as all 14 state colleges combined, which have an enrollment of 57,635. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has put the average tuition or fee at \$329 in the northeastern section of the country while LHS's fee now is \$650.

If you want to do something about the increase in tuition join the march to Harrisburg on October 15.

THE PENNSYLVANIA STUDENT Association Student Government is working to gain a lobby in Harrisburg as strong as Penn State's. With a strong lobby it is hoped that the Pennsylvania representatives will take heed to our requests.

The PSASG has been working for two years in conjunction with the Association State College Organization. ASCO is a group from all 14 state colleges composed of faculty and administration.

EACH STATE COLLEGE HAS a student chairman from PSASG to represent the group on a local level. Gary Worthington, chairman at LHS, explained that thus far there are 12 of the 14 colleges participating in the march.

Activities for the day will include such speakers as Donald Kaufman, from the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Charles Keller from the Communication Service Center, several representatives from the colleges' student governments, and hopefully both Milton Shapp and Raymond Broderick, gubernatorial candidates in the fall elections.

THE MAIN GOAL IS to achieve top priority of the commonwealth educational fund.

Worthington listed other objectives as improvement of existing faculty and substantial expansion of them; increase in faculty salaries and fringe benefits, increases in non-institutional salaries and benefits; and to increase the amount of state college scholarships to meet needs and demands of rising costs.

Worthington and his group need help in preparing for and carrying out the trip to Harrisburg.

Transportation committees, parade marshals from the student body and communication committees to make posters, signs and contact the news media are all needed. To effect a successful march to Harrisburg, Worthington needs 100% help from the student body.

Candidate Pledges Help

Sound business practices are needed in Harrisburg to get Pennsylvania back on an even financial keel. This statement was made by Milton Shapp, Democratic gubernatorial candidate in November when he made a whistle-stop campaign speech to an audience of some 500 people in Lock Haven yesterday.

The Democratic candidate continued by saying that the Republican administration has created a "mess" in the nation and in the state, leading the county down what he called the "road to Hooverism." Speaking from the back platform of a passenger car, Shapp said it is time to replace the politicians in Harrisburg with sound business practices. In addition, state services have deteriorated in the last four years, while taxes have gone up one billion dollars.

Shapp attacked Republican policies by saying that although tight money and high interest rates have helped the banks, they have hurt everybody

else. Clinton County now has 15 to 20% unemployment, highest in the nation.

With the Piper Aircraft Company shut-down of seven weeks ago, the 2,000 former employees don't know when they will be back to work, although they do expect to re-open.

By cutting out the waste and inefficiency in government bureaucracies, Shapp has pledged to help Lock Haven.

Huskies Maul Eagles 25-7

Bloomburg State College went Lock Haven State reeling to its second straight defeat Friday evening, 25-7, in a contest which could be described as "Maul the Bald Eagle" and "Kill the Quarterback".

The Huskies did "maul" the Bald Eagle as they constantly used off tackle and end runs, battering the LHS defense behind the bruising running of Bob Warner, Paul Shrimcovsky, and speedster Bob Firestine. Bloom did almost "kill" the quarterback as LHS signal-caller Mike Packer was helped from the field in the third quarter, and remained on the sidelines for the rest of the game.

In LHS Backfield Linebacker John Cox and defensive lineman Ted Schmittel were in the LHS backfield so often, that at times it appeared they would get the snap before Packer did.

LHS received a "big" break on the opening kickoff when Mike Shenkle recovered Paul

Shrimcovsky's fumble on the 32 yard line, but it was the Eagles' only moment of glory until the final 27 seconds of the contest when they hit the scoreboard.

After Shenkle's fumble recovery and LHS's first drive stalled, the Huskies settled down to a bruising rushing attack with the LHS defense bending, but refusing to let Bloom into the endzone.

Warner Leads Attack Warner, a big fullback from the Lehigh Valley-- long noted for the tough players it produces and Firestine constantly hit the line for four, five, and six yard gains.

Each time though, the LHS defense rose to the occasion and halted Bloom's drives, but couldn't keep the Huskies off the scoreboard as Neil Oberholtzer booted 40 and 42 yard field goals, giving BSC a 6-0 advantage at the end of the first half.

Warner set up both field goals, the first with a 53 yard scamper from the Bloom 16 yard

line to the LHS 31 yard line. LHS dug in and Oberholtzer split the uprights from 40 yards with 1:06 remaining in the first quarter.

Oberholtzer added his second field goal with 13:18 left in the half. Warner set it up with a third down, screen pass which covered 23 yards from the Huskie 43 yard line to the LHS 34.

LHS Threat Killed The Eagles threatened late in the quarter, but the Huskies killed the LHS drive on the 10 yard line when Galen Troup intercepted a Packer pass after it was tipped about four times.

The second half began with both squads using aggressive defensive play and exchanging a couple of punts.

Bloom finally hit paydirt with 5:47 left in the quarter when quarterback Mike Devereux skirted his right end, racing 45 yards into the endzone leaving Eagle defenders falling like flies. The PAT was no good and the Huskies held a 12-0 lead.

Game All But Over Two minutes later, the game was all but over when John Davis intercepted a Packer pass on the Huskie 25 yard line and outran everyone 75 yards into the endzone. With the PAT the Huskies were out or reach at 19-0.

LHS had driven 50 yards with Packer finally getting some protection and easily hitting his receivers until Davis' theft.

The Eagles started another drive from their own 20 yard line, but were quickly halted on the Bloom 31 when Cox recovered Packer's fumble, after he and Schmittel almost bent Packer like a pretzel.

Packer Helped From Field Packer was helped from the field and freshman replacement Ed McGill couldn't move the Eagle offense until the final play. Bloom upped its advantage to 25-0 with 1:09 remaining in the game when John Packer plunged over from the one after sub quarterback, Tom Brookshire, engineered a 39 yard drive. Hugh Jones set up the drive with an interception for the Huskies.

LHS finally got on the scoreboard when Jeff McGee recovered a fumble on the Huskie 24 yard line. On the next play McGill hit Skip Haley in the corner of endzone and Dan Quer's PAT set the final score at 25-7.

Injuries Hold Back Team

LHS's injury plagued soccer team lost a tough 3-0 match on Saturday at Frostburg College.

Coach Karl T. Herrmann commented that he hasn't had the same group on the field to play a game yet because of injuries.

On Saturday the team simply could not move the ball. On the whole, performance by the team was flat with the exception of Steve Steffin and Jack Infield.

both men played outstanding games.

The junior varsity team, however, ran Frostburg j-v's off the field with a 9-1 score.

The team played to perfection; hustling and passing beautifully.

Bill Lingle scored three big goals and assisted with two others.

Rick Donmoyer, Bob Weaver, and Ken Hamm had two goals a piece. Donmoyer assisted in two and Weaver with one.

New Coach at Ship

Shippensburg-Rodger E. Goodling, head basketball coach at William Penn High School in Harrisburg since 1964, has been named to the top basketball coaching position at Shippensburg State College, it was announced by College President Gilmore B. Seavers.

Goodling last year guided the Tigers to a District III (PIAA) title. His teams have won the Central Penn League for the past two seasons. Goodling succeeds Keith L. Hess, who had coached the Raiders since 1961.

Dr. Thomas Crist, director of athletics at Shippensburg, said that "We are delighted to have Rodger Goodling as Shippensburg's new basketball coach. His coaching style is just what the doctor ordered."

Goodling will join the Shippensburg staff November 1 as assistant professor of health and physical education.

"Of the many applicants we had for the position, we feel that Rodger is the person most likely to develop a successful basketball program at Shippensburg," Dr. Crist said. "He is taking over a difficult situation. Three of the five starters are not returning from a team which posted a 3-20 record."

Goodling is a graduate (1954) of William Penn High School of York. He attended what was then the York Junior College and, in 1959, received a B.S. degree from Lock Haven State College. In 1963, he received an M.Ed. degree from Temple University.

Rockets Snap Streak

The Lock Haven State cross country team had its 10-meet winning streak snapped on Saturday by defending conference champions, Slippery Rock.

The Rockets scored 27 to the Eagles 31, so close a score that by reversing two places could have made the winner Lock Haven.

Ed Galski of Slippery Rock, the eventual winner set a blistering pace from the very beginning. For two miles he was closely accompanied by the Eagles' Steve Podgajny and Dave Mosebrook and his teammate Randy Deemer. Galski blazed on breaking the old course record by 25 seconds. Podgajny and Mosebrook held second and third while Deemer faltered badly to seventh.

Close behind the Eagle duo was Niba Gordon, who placed fourth giving the race the appearance of an Eagle victory.

The Rockets, however, placed five more men before the Eagles Em Borowski placed 10th, and another two before George Bower completed the Eagle scoring in 13th place.

The overall balance of the Slippery Rock team offset the first three Eagle runners to

give the Rockets a very hard earned victory.

Commenting on the meet, Coach Jim Dolan offered this: "Slippery Rock has a well conditioned, disciplined team. They turned out to be as tough as expected. Our squad, particularly Podgajny, Mosebrook, Gordon, and Bower, are tremendous races. Several freshmen also ran well in their first college experience. With the score as close as it was, I feel we will definitely be contenders for the District and Conference titles."
