## Dr. Parsons YOU HAVE HURT US DEEPLY

Referring to Friday afternoon's 'bitch-in' LHS President Richard T. Parsons has made the following statements in the Lock Haven Express (statements which he verified yesterday afternoon as being accurate):

"(It was) a small group trying to disrupt things for the sake of disruption."

"They (the student participants) are ruining the climate at Lock Haven State. They have no program. They're just trying to follow the students at Berkeley and at Columbia. They think this is the thing to do these days."

"I really don't expect any destruction of property or breaking of the law. These kids are too smart for that. But I want to emphasize that we have set up means to deal with offenders, if there is any trouble. We can call the state police and get an injunction immediately. Then, there could be arrests."

He further told *Eagle Eye* yesterday:

"I mean what I say. I've treated all these kids with quietness and kindness. I'm fed up. They're very immature mistakes and in five years from now, they'll learn and regret these mistakes. The majority of our students are fine people. The college is fed up with the tactics used by a few, and I hope it returns to normal."

This, LHS students, is the same person who last week stood in the student publications office in the union and told members of the newspaper staff that he thought the 'bitch-in' was a good idea; that as long as there was no violence or disorder (and he assured us there would not be) students were perfectly within their legal rights as United States citizens.

Now we find that we were just trying to disrupt things for the sake of disruption! We find that we are ruining the climate of Lock Haven State--as if we were polluting the air with a foul odor.

This, LHS students, is the same person who stood before the board of directors of the Student Cooperative Council and craftily implied that Walt McCallum and his former administration had violated the SCC constitution, and that the new president, Mike McLaughlin, is "not all bad yet."

This, LHS students, is the same person who has accused us of interpreting the SCC constitution to suit ourselves--who then proceeds to interpret to suit himself, just as he has seen fit to interpret the faculty constitution to suit himself.

This, LHS students, is the same person who claims (through statements made to an *Express* reporter) that the only legitimate 'bitch' was student representation on the board of trustees--as if the unsanitary, unhealthy, and obnoxious conditions of the cafeteria were none of our business; as if losing the SCC government were none of our business; as if having our grades cut for missing classes were none of our business; as if the many other bitches were none of our business.

Students of Lock Haven State: Dr. Parsons, through his actions and statements in the past few days, has proven himself to be opposed to students, no matter what he may say; he has proven himself to be against student-initiated change, no matter what he may say; he has proven himself to be critical of us 'kids' when we present an orderly, legal, and proper "bitch-in," no matter what he may say.

Students of Lock Haven State: Dr. Parsons has proven himself to be a hypocrite of the highest order. Make no mistake, Dr. Parsons--this is not an innuendo from that "horrible newspaper... (which) doesn't adhere to any principals of ethical journalism" (Parsons' statements to the *Express*)--This is a forthright statement.

Students of Lock Haven State: Dr. Parsons has proven to us that he has no respect for us--as students or as human beings. We are like ping-pong balls to be bounced back and forth at his whims.

One question students: In proving this, has he also shown that he is no longer deserving of student respect? If so, he has hurt us deeply.

He told us what they did wrong -- a lot of petty points that a lot of people don't give a damn about. And again last night, he was tired. Granted, yesterday was convocation and he had a lot of things to do. I don't mean that as a detrimental remark. He's the president of our college and no matter how you feel about him, you've got to respect the man. But, why doesn't he give us a fair chance. If he wants to tell us his side, why won't he let us tell our side? He doesn't want to hear our questions; he doesn't want to answer our questions. That's all we ask for." — Jim Himes.

ON UNITY:..."I'd just like to say that we ought to all pull together and help them as much as we can. Mike McLaughlin's a good leader now. Mike's going to be standing up for what we want and what we need. I think if we all pull together as one, we'll bring it about. This is the best thing that has happened on this campus; it's the only showing of how we stand....I think if we all unite, it will be the best thing that ever

happened on this campus and will last for many years."

"Everyone's out here today, and everyone's clapping and screaming and yelling. But how many of you will be even thinking about this tomorrow? You'll be just as contented as your commuter students who come here during the week and leave on weekends and go back home and have a good time. And they come back and go to classes and then leave again. No one becomes involved here, that's what happened to the government. They tried, but what can seven people do for 2,100 students? — Marsha Frealing.

"We have a lot of problems on this campus, but the problem we have now is that we just lost one hell of a good government. This is the only government that ever stood up to the administration.... This government fought -- they fought for you. You people let them down; the board of directors were always against them.... Mike McLaughlin's a capable man, but without the rest of those people, it's going to be one hell of a cold winter." — Dave Nevel.

# Eagles Nip Huskies in 28-25 Thriller

The Lock Haven State Bald Eagles opened their 1969 football season Saturday night with a thrilling 28-25 win over Bloomsburg State College Huskies before a crowd of 5,000 fans at the Spring Street Stadium.

LHS opened the ball game by kicking off to the Huskies, but after a few plays from scrimmage, BSC was forced to punt from its own 45. The Eagles then took over on their own 17 where twelve plays later with the help of a 15 yard penalty and a pass interference call, LHS scored on a 32 yd. pass play from Quarterback Mike Packer to End Sam Vaughn. The PAT was good and LHS led 7-0 with 6:53 remaining in the first quarter. BSC came right back and started a drive from their own 41 to the LHS 28

but on the next play linebacker Ron Beshore recovered a Huskie fumble and the Eagles took over on their own 21. LHS moved the ball to its 42 where Huskie Jerry Lastowski was to recover a LHS fumble on the Eagle 40. This time BSC was not to be denied and in five plays the Huskies scored on a two yard plunge by Bob Warner. The PAT was outside and LHS lead 7-6 at the end of the first quarter. In the opening minutes of the second quarter LHS was forced to give the pigskin up to the BSC men who took over on their own 35. In only three plays Bloomsburg scored on a 76 yd. TD pass play from quarterback Terry Lessman to end Greg Berger. The try for the PAT was no good and the Huskies led by a score of 12-7. But LHS came right

back and in 14 plays scored on a two yd. run by Halfback Bob Shuey. The PAT was good and the Eagles led 14-12. With 8:06 still remaining in the first half, BSC came right back and made it 19-14 on a 32 yd. pass play from Lessman to Bob Warner. As halftime approached it looked as though the Huskies were on their way for another score as they had a first and ten on the LHS 30 but on the next play Freshman Halfback Steve Glass intercepted a BSC pass and ran 70 yards for the score and at halftime the score stood 21-19 in favor of LHS.

The Eagles received the ball as the third quarter opened but three plays later, BSC recovered a fumble on the Eagle 31 yard strip. It took the opponents only eight plays to score and take the lead 25-21. Throughout most of the third quarter LHS had their backs up against their own end zone but as the fourth quarter opened things were to change as a result of a 62 yard pass play from QB Denny Rhule to End Sam Vaughn. On the next play Halfback Tom Marshall went over from the three and the Eagles were out in front for the fourth time in the game 28-25. Bloomsburg looked as though they were starting another drive but the threat was soon to end as linebacker Bill Rhodes picked off a Lessman pass. A few plays later as the game came down to the bitter end the Eagles were to make one more scoring threat as they reached the Huskie

1 foot mark but the BSC defensive line held and the Huskies took over with a little more than two minutes to play. Bloomsburg again started to move the ball up the field but again they would see their drive come to an end as LHS intercepted the ball on the BSC 20. Bloomsburg was to get the ball one more time before the game came to a close but unfortunately for the Huskies they had no more time outs and had to sit by and watch the clock tick off the seconds.

Coach Weller commented after the game that he just could not say enough about the team. "They were just great. Of course we made mistakes as expected but we kept coming back throughout the game. Without the penalties it was our game the whole way."

## Harriers Upset By Rockets

Slippery Rock upset Lock Haven in cross country on Saturday by a score of 26-29, with the low score winning. The defeat was the first for the Bald Eagles in 21 dual meets.

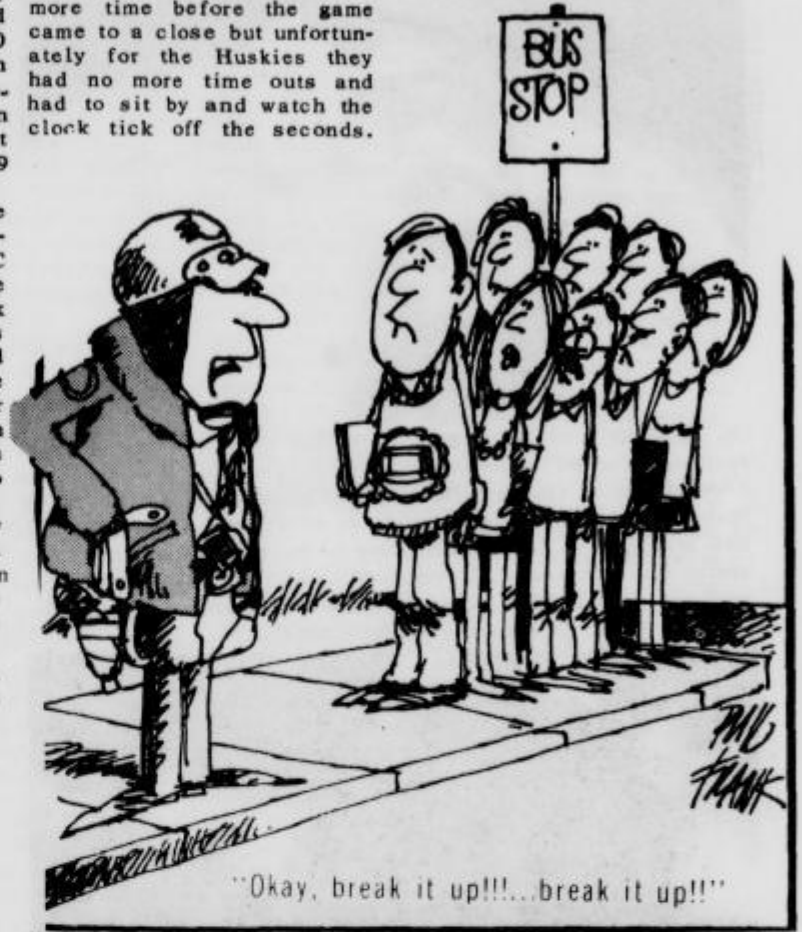
Outstanding performances were turned in by Dave Mosebrook and Steve Podgajny. The pair finished in a tie for first place with a time of 26:34. Their time was only 21 seconds over the course record. Other placings by the Bald Eagle harriers were: Mike Borowski, seventh, Harry Smeltz, ninth, Carl Klingaman, tenth, Steve Harnish, eleventh, Nibs Gordon, twelfth, George Bower, fifteenth.

Slippery Rock captured third, fourth, fifth, sixth, and eighth

The Bald Eagles will have two chances to gain revenge on the Rockets—at the NAIA district meet, and in the State College Conference Championships.

The loss was an unfortunate thing in that the meet was the first for new head coach Jim Dolan, but he was not upset with the results. "I didn't anticipate three of their top five runners would be freshmen. I was very pleased with Mosebrook's and Podgajny's performances. We need to bring our third, fourth, and fifth places closer. We need more work—the injuries are now under control!"
