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### Vandalism rampant in Smith Hall

Smith Hall is doing well in it's effort to keep Lock Haven State Law Enforcement busy.

Several cases of vandalism were reported to have occured in Smith Hall last weekend. A water pipe was broken, which resulted in minor

flooding. A bathroom door on third floor Smith was smashed beyond repair. And the most serious example of vandalism was displayed when two fire extinguishers were expended on third floor Smith, leaving the entire floor defensless in case there was a fire.

On October 9, 1976, a LHS student was attacked while she was walking on Fairview Street near the silk mill. The girl reportedly heard footsteps behind her and noticed them getting closer. The assailant then grabbed the girl, but quickly fled on foot when she iscreamed. The case is still being investigated.

A Smith Hall resident recieved eye injuries at a

fraternity party on October 7. The student returned to campus after the party and asked security to take him to the hospital. His eye was treated and he was made to return to the hospital for further care.

Two purses were reported stolen from rooms in Gross Hall. One was later found with the money removed from it. Cards were found that had been in the other purse, but the purse itself has not been recovered. This case too, is still under investigation.

Three people were apprehended by security outside of North Hall for smoking pot on October 3. The college police turned the offenders over to Student Life for further action.

Lastly, a minor was cited by security for possession of beer. The beer was supplied to him by a person over twenty-one. This case will probably not result in an arrest, however, Law Enforcement warns stu-

dents over twenty-one that supplying minors with alcoholic beverages is a misdemeanor according to the Pennsylvania State Liquor Laws.

What's worse is that weekend at home solves nothing. Often the weekend tripper returns to school unwillingly, missing the security of home.

Obviously something is wrong here. If it were only freshmen that are going home time after time after time the implications would not be as serious. For very often, the transition from high school student to college student is a gradual one, one that takes time. It's not uncommon for a college freshman to go home

several times during the first few months of school. After almost all of them still have strong ties there. It is uncommon however, for a sophomore or junior to continue going home regularly since they have had plenty of time to adjust to college life and make new ties here. Why is it happening? Be assured it is happening. Take a look at the digh Hall parking lot some Thirsday and then look again Saturday morning. More than half the cars will be gone. Only a minute percentage of those cars are owned by freshman. That means that upperclassmen are definitely going home and with great frequency. Why? The standard answer to the question "why do you go home on the weekends?" is "because there's nothing to do up here except go to frat parties." This may be true yet the real reason seems deeper and more complicated than that.

## UK hockey squad beats Haven team

The Great Britain and Ireland Under 23 Touring Team (GBITT) made it four in a row over U.S. teams and ten in a row on tour, as they defeated the Haven's varsity Eaglettes, 5-1, in an exhibition contest on McCollum Field on Tuesday afternoon.

Preceding the contest, Dr. Charles Eberle introduced President Hamblin to the spectators. President Hamblin proceeded to personally greet the team members at the 50 yard line. Following the greetings, Dr. Eberle introduced the squads and coached to approximately 800 onlookers. In the minutes to follow there was the traditional exchange of kilt pins and well wishes. The game got underway following the bands' rendition of the National Anthem.

The Lock Haven attack managed to keep the ball in the opponents' half in the opening minutes of the game. At nine minutes, the Eaglettes failed to score on two penalty corner situations.

The GBITT's found the Lock Haven defense to be unvielding in first half of play. Goalie Pam Whittaker and full back Deb Nunes prevented any successful shots on goal.

At 23:30 left wing Colleen Hacker caught the GBITT goalie on the wrong side of the cage, as she pushed in the first and only goal of the half.

A rejuvenated GBITT squad took their positions for second half play. In less than four minutes, J. Swinnerton slammed the ball past goalie Whittaker. The GBITT attack tantalized the Haven defense, as their momentun gained. At 19:30 left wing Valerie Shannon scored from the middle of the circle. Joan Mackie scored the next two goals for the GBITT'S. The final GBITT goal came at 29:30.

Whittaker played an exceptional game saving 30 of 38 shots on goal, with 30 of those shots coming in second period play.

Today at 3 pm the Eaglettes will host Cortland State University on Lawrence Field.

Saturday morning at 10:30 am the Eaglettes will face the ever powerful Alumni squad as part of the Homecoming Weekend activities.
