SCC Supports Open Dorms

At last evening's SCC meeting, a unanimous vote of approval was given to support the movement for 24 hr. weekend open dorms in the women's residence halls. The motion was made by Jackie Kircher, member of the executive council. The result of the SCC's voting members approval gives the concerned women residents official student government support.

New Test Dates Announced

College seniors preparing to teach school may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of the four different test dates announced by Educational Testing Service, a nonprofit, educational organization which prepares and administers this testing program. New dates for the testing of prospective teachers are: November 13, 1971, and January 29, April 8, and July 15, 1972. The tests will be given at nearly 500 locations throughout the United States.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are used by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and by several states for certification or licensing of teachers. Some colleges also require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examinations. The school system and state departments of education which use the examination results are listed in an NTE leaflet entitled *Score Users* which may be obtained by writing to ETS.

On each full day of testing prospective teachers may take the Common Examinations which measure their professional preparation and general educational background and a Teaching Area Examination which measures their mastery of the subject they expect to teach.

Prospective teachers should contact the school systems in which they seek employment, or LHS placement office, for specific advice on which examinations to take and on which dates they should be taken.

The *Bulletin of Information for Candidates* contains a list of test centers, and information about the examinations, as well as a Registration Form. Copies may be obtained from the college placement office in Bentley Hall, or directly from National Teacher Examinations, Box 911, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.

The representatives will be discussing the political, social, and economic prospects for their countries and Africa in general. Each of the participants will present an analysis of prospects for his country as a point of discussion. The panelists will join in a general discussion to include audience participation.

The International Education Committee of LHS has extended invitations to the Board of Presidents of the State Colleges. Representatives of the Pennsylvania State College International Education Consortium, as well as students and the public, in hope of furthering interests in international education and understanding.

Dean Smalley Makes IFC Stronger

In an effort to increase fraternity participation and involvement in campus activities and allow them to enhance their social programs, Interfraternity Council advisor James K. Smalley, has "loosened the reins" on the organization. By doing so the Dean has strengthened the Council by transferring the responsibility of governing the fraternities from the Dean of Men's office to the Council itself. IFC President Tom Zimmerman and his executive committee feel that this is an important step in establishing an effective interfraternity system.

Not losing any time in exercising its new freedom, the Council has acted on two pressing issues. First and probably most important, the Council passed a motion allowing fraternities to have seven day a week, twenty four hour a day open house. These are just general guidelines, leaving the specifics up to the individual fraternity. Secondly, a committee was appointed to investigate the possibility of converting our present pledge system to an open pledge program. Under this system any qualified student could pledge anytime, the only stipulation being that he pass the academic requirements.

The Snack Bar will be open Saturday, October 23, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

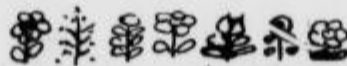
Halloween Party Planned by YM-YWCA

Maryland Quartet Presents Well-balanced Program

Monday night in Price Auditorium the Maryland Quartet gave a very good performance of a well-balanced program.

The quartet, which matured artistically as a whole subsequent to the addition of Sally Trembly, violinist, played the following works: Mozart: Piano Quartet #1 in G minor, K. 478

Palmer: Piano Quartet (1947)
 Brahms: Piano Quartet #3 in C minor, Op. 60.

These works come from three periods in music: classical, contemporary, and romantic. All are outstanding examples of works for an instrumental combination for which far too little was written: piano, violin, viola, and cello.

The Mozart opened the program. This quartet is a less delicate piece than most Mozart works, and it was played creditably, minus a few drawbacks. The most outstanding of these was some bowing difficulty of violinist Joel Berman. Although his intonation was next to flawless, occasionally a scratchy note would emerge, damaging the interpretation slightly.

The Piano Quartet by Robert Palmer, when carefully examined in pieces, is not particularly difficult. However, putting it together

Workshop To Be Held In Athletics

The philosophy, guidelines, and priorities of high school athletic programs for boys and girls will be the topic of the first annual Central Pennsylvania Physical Education and Athletics Workshop to be held on Thursday, October 28, at Lock Haven State's Sieg Conference Center, Lamar.

The main address will be given by Dr. Matthew Maetozo, dean of the school of health, physical education, and recreation at LHS.

Dr. Robert A. McNamara, principal of Quaker Valley Senior High School, Leetsdale, will speak from the school district administrator's point of view. Mrs. Sally Vargo, professor of physical education and sports at Lycoming College, Williamsport, will offer the woman's viewpoint. Donald Keener, a former teacher at Loyalsock Township High School and now an assistant professor of health, physical education, and recreation at LHS, will offer the man's viewpoint. The viewpoint of the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association will be presented by Theodore R. Wagner, executive director of the P.I.A.A.

The workshop will be opened by William Johnston, principal of Clearfield Area High School and chairman of the Central Pennsylvania Association of Secondary School Principals, sponsors of the workshop in cooperation with the Educational Development Center of LHS.

The afternoon session will consist of small group discussions among the participants. Each group will formulate recommendations on the philosophy, guidelines, priorities, and future of boys and girls secondary school athletic programs based on the morning's address and panel discussion.

presented the greatest problems. Mr. Berman, who is leader of the group, did a very good job in getting this work to gel. While this is not an outstanding example of contemporary music, the sound of the entire quartet was very good indeed. At the very least, they made a difficult work seem almost like child's play.

The Brahms was definitely Brahms and definitely romantic. This work came out rather well also. However, Mr. Berman threw himself into the music too much (he almost blew the music off the stand at one point), and this hurt the general effect. However, he and his three colleagues played the composition well enough to really make the surprise ending a surprise.

As far as the other instrumentalists were concerned, Sally Trembly, the violinist, in addition to maturing the group as a whole, plays very well and probably the strong-point of the ensemble. William Skidmore was the young cellist of the quartet and did a good job also. Pianist Evelyn Garvey accompanied the other people very well in addition to giving an excellent performance of the Mozart, which for the pianist is a very difficult work.

Students to Study Woman's Place In West. Lit.

LHS students will have a chance to discover the true nature of women next semester. A liberal arts seminar, "Women in Literature (by Men)", instructed by Dr. William Reich, will test the thesis that the character of women has been distorted in the predominately male literature of our Western Culture.

Students will view the image of women from the portrait of Chaucer's "Wife of Bath" to Kate Millet's *Sexual Politics* and D.H. Lawrence's *Women in Love*.

Female libbers on campus have expressed doubts as to whether a male professor can instruct such a course without revealing his male chauvinism. Dr. Reich does not find this attitude alarming since the course will encourage the students to formulate their own opinions through selected readings.

The IEC Hosts Coffee Hour

The International Education Committee hosted a community-college coffee hour Wednesday, October 20 in Bentley Hall.

According to Dr. Michael Peplow, coordinator of the group the purpose of the meeting was to explore mutual interest in the international educational exchanges with representatives from Lock Haven service and professional organizations.

When asked what he wished to promote by this function, Dr. Peplow replied, "I know there is considerable interest in Lock Haven in international affairs. Lock Haven State is just becoming very interested in the subject: witness the Nottingham Exchange Program. Hopefully, representatives from community and college can work together to develop new programs. These should be community oriented as well as college oriented." Dr. Peplow also hopes the community will become involved in a Thanksgiving and a Christmas host-family program with the Nottingham students.

The International Education Committee is a small nuclear group which is now nearly a year old at LHS. Dr. Peplow feels this might be the basis for a future Community-College Foreign Exchange Committee.

Returning again after a week off to take in the World Series, and after cleaning the mud off slug at us during our absence, we're back to "tell it like it is."

Rumors (even heard from the phys. ed. department) have been floating around Lock Haven State that the Bald Eagles grid team could well take the Western Division of the Pennsylvania Conference.

Impossible? Yes, maybe two, three, four or five years ago, but LHS finds itself in the position with a crack at the division title and then a birth in the conference championship game.

Logical? Nothing appears to be logical anymore with the "new" edition of football at LHS. So confusing have the Bald Eagles gridders been that after picking LHS as the underdog in their first three encounters, pick Dunkel, college football's famous prognosticator, was so confused he failed to list LHS in their showdown with Clarion two week ago.

Now the Bald Eagles find themselves with a 4-1 season record and assured of their winning season in six seasons. Not only that but they were rated 7th in the East last week in balloting for the Lambert Bowl. In previous years the only poll the Bald Eagles could have made was the "Bottom Ten" among small colleges in the East.

Now all that lies between LHS and their dream season is the Big IF game Saturday with powerful Edinboro for the annual Homecoming clash.

The IF comes into play since, if the Bald Eagles defeat the Highlanders and then Slippery Rock in their only remaining conference contests, LHS would represent the Western Division in the conference title game. The reason being since Edinboro and LHS would have identical 4-1 records in the division and the Highlanders were in a championship game last, the spot in the title encounter would automatically go to the Bald Eagles.

Edinboro does pose a big IF for the Eagles since they have not lost in their last 16 regular season games. In addition they're on top of the Lambert Bowl balloting and in the past two weeks have knocked off their biggest contenders in Indiana University of Pa. and Clarion State last weekend, 24-17, a team which defeated LHS, 17-7.

LHS Stomps Mansfield State

Three streaks were kept alive Wednesday, as the Lock Haven State cross country team stomped Mansfield 16 to 43. The Eagles won its fourth straight, upping its record to 4-1. Senior co-captain Steve Podgajny kept two personal streaks alive by winning his fifth dual meet in a row, while breaking a course record for the fifth straight time.

The Mansfield course, 5.8 miles long, was a continuous up and down affair, with no level parts to speak of. Podgajny's winning time of 30:23 broke the old course record by over four minutes, and helped the next five finishers to also be under the old record. Podgajny assumed the lead at the beginning and led a chain of runners through fields, over hills, and along tree lines.

Toward the end, the chain was broken as Podgajny led by a tremendous margin over Steve Harnish and George Bower, who in turn were far ahead of the rest of the pack.

Reed Humphrey placed fourth and Mike Gaige placed sixth, missing an Eagle sweep by only eleven seconds. Carl Klingaman placed eighth to give LHS six of the first

But the Flying Scots remember well the storybook finish two years ago at an LHS Homecoming, when with the Eagles down, 26-7 at halftime, LHS came alive in the second half and trimmed the Scots, 41-33 in probably the most exciting game at LHS in many years. It was the Scots' last regular season loss.

The author of that exciting venture is now in his third year at the helm of the Bald Eagles and his chapter this season could well be entitled "The Impossible Dream."

If ballots were cast today for conference coach of the year, Magician Bob Weller, head grid coach at LHS would walk away with an unanimous decision. But before he walks away with that coveted prize, he has to add his subplot of clipping the Highlanders and then knocking off West Chester in the conference title game concluding the year's most exciting story.

Weller isn't the only coach in the conference who thinks his young Eagles can shoot down the Flying Scots. Two weeks ago Clarion coach Al Jacks indicated that with the explosive offense employed by LHS, the Bald Eagles would have a good chance at knocking off the Scots.

Weller, earlier in the week said his Eagles have a good shot at the upset, "Because of our throwing type of offense." He added LHS will "have to go for the long score and throw on them (Edinboro) because their defense does a nice job in keying the run. They also have a good group of linebackers who key the run well."

But the LHS offense is not the main worry heading into probably his biggest game in his short term as LHS grid mentor. Weller said, "We LHS coaching staff feel the key to the game will be if our defense plays like it has the past two weeks. We have to keep them from controlling the game."

Edinboro has relied on the power running of Al Raines, who demolished LHS two years ago, and their other running back Mengines. But last week when Clarion put up a stiff defense against the Highlanders vaulted rushing attack, Edinboro road the arm of all-conference quarterback Jim Sanford to victory.

But Weller has two heroes of his own in All-American candidate Mike Packer, the highly touted quarterback who combines with receiver Tomm Allen on those picture play "bombs".

Look for maybe another rerun of the exciting Homecoming thriller of two years ago. Magician Weller just might wave his short coaching career here at LHS.

Packer, Allen Rank High Nationally

Two Lock Haven State football players, quarterback Mike Packer and split end Tommy Allen, continue to rank high in National Football Statistics.

Including statistics from the Clarion State game, Packer held onto the No. 3 spot in the nation (NAIA) in passing with a 223.8 per-game yardage average. In total offense the Lock Haven native was ranked 10th. In the NCAA College-Division day Packer is 10th in passing with a 15.3 completions average and 12th in total offense.

Allen is ranked 7th in pass-receiving in the NCAA and 12th in the NAIA with a per-game yardage average of 96.7.

In passing offensive LHS moved up in both organizations. An average of 225.7 yards per game in the NAIA rates the No. 7 position. In the NCAA the Eagles pass offensive is ranked 9th in the nation.

LHS will probably move up in all nationally-ranked statistics this week following the fine passing performance at Shippensburg State.

3 LHS Players Get All-East Recognition

For the first time Lock Haven State has three players on the ECAC All-East All Star Weekly Football Squad. It also marks the fifth straight week that Bald Eagle gridders have received All-East recognition.

Selected for the First Team was LHS' senior linebacker Barre Yeager. Yeager had returned to LHS last year after two-and-a-half years of service in Vietnam.

The 5-10, 170 pound linebacker was all over the field last Saturday as LHS defeated Shippensburg State, 16-8. Yeager was in on 18 tackles and the week before he had made 19 against Clarion.

Receiving Honorable Mention All-East honors were split end Tommy Allen, and sophomore defensive end Mel Abel.

Allen, a junior, caught seven passes from quarterback Mike Packer for 161 yards and this included one beautiful 69-yard touchdown play.

Abel, 6-3, 215 pounder, broke through the Shippensburg offensive line five times during the game to dump the quarterback for losses.
