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CAS produces productive meeting

The CAS, Commonwealth Association of Students, meeting at Millersville State College Friday and Saturday was believed to be one of the most productive ever by CAS representatives.

The meeting covered areas from student loans, a state university system to the organization budget.

House Bill 1751, which widens the range of students who could receive PHEA loans to those with net incomes of \$20,000, was unanimously endorsed by the CAS with the recommendation that funds be increased.

As it stands, the bill provides \$2,000,000 for the loans of \$1500. The CAS feels that with the large amt. of students on the state college campus that fit into the \$20,000 category more funds should be provided for loans. CAS will send representatives to an open meeting to be held in Harrisburg on Wednesday for discussion of this bill.

14 State Colleges or 1 State University

"The Pennsylvania Commonwealth University Act of 1974" was distributed to a representative of each state college and a discussion was held on the plan.

In short, the act organizes a university system for the 14 state colleges rather than the present college system.

Several fallacies in the plan were mentioned by members. These included the regulation of activity fees by the Board of Regents and the Institutional Presidents and

the omission of the mention of a student member on the Board of Regents, which would be comparable to the present SCUD Board.

The question was raised as to whether the University Plan is really as radical a change as it is supposed or merely a change of titles within the system. More discussion will be held on the Pennsylvania Commonwealth University Act of 1974 after representatives of the CAS have a chance to examine it more closely.

Budget

A large portion of the meeting was spent with the discussion of the CAS Interim Operating Budget and the membership drive plans presented by Doug Dows, Executive Secretary of the CAS.

The Interim Budget, serving the period of Feb. 15, 1974 to July 12, 1974 is based on \$10,000 and can be adjusted to either more or less money. The budget was

approved.

Two sources of funds were discussed, membership fees and "gifts" from individuals.

The membership fee will be three dollars for charter membership and a dollar for regular membership.

Dows reported that an offer was made by Secretary Pittenger to give the CAS names of persons who would be interested in providing the CAS with NO STRINGS ATTACHED.

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Two girls abducted then found—man charged

Kidnapping charges have been filed against Roger A. Millspaugh, of East Freedom, in connection with the abduction of two Lock Haven girls last Thursday evening.

The girls, Janian Caprio, 13 and Kim Ruhl, 14, were returned to their parents Friday after being found along a road near Renova, nearly 30 miles from their homes.

The search for the two girls began Thursday evening when Caprio called city police to report that her daughter and Miss Ruhl were missing. Mrs. Caprio said Mrs. Pat Sanders, wife of City Police Lt. Joseph Sanders and aunt of Miss Ruhl, saw the girls get into a dirty green car at the corner of East Bald Eagle and Washington Streets, a half block from Miss Ruhl's home. Mrs. Sanders followed the car into Castenia, where she lost it in traffic.

Mrs. Sanders told officials she didn't know if the girls were forced into the car. However, a state policeman said he doubted the girls would enter a strange car

without being forced in some way. Mrs. Sanders reported that the license plate on the car was too dirty to read.

Later, a garbage truck driver helped a man answering Millspaugh's description pull his car out of a ditch. The truck driver said the man, who seemed to be agitated, came from a nearby wooded area. The man drove away after the car was pulled from the ditch.

Police got an initial description of the car and driver when a man called to report that a driver had been so busy looking at school children, he ran into a stop sign. The description matched that of the car pulled from the ditch.

The Abducted

The girls were spotted Friday along Route 144 near Renova by a trucker, who flagged down a state policeman. The officer took the girls to the Lock Haven city hall, where they were questioned by authorities.

They were then taken to

Lock Haven Hospital where they were examined. A hospital administrator said Saturday he had been advised by the district attorney's office, not to divulge the name of the doctors who examined the girls. Therefore, there was no report late Saturday on the condition of the girls.

...And The Abductor

Millspaugh, 26, is being held in the Clinton County jail in Lock Haven in lieu of \$100,000 bond. He was arrested at his home Friday afternoon by state police from Hollidaysburg and returned to officials in Lock Haven. Millspaugh was paroled on November 21, 1973 from Rockview State Prison, where he had served two years for rape and assault.

A hearing for Millspaugh has been set for Feb. 25 in District Magistrate Court No. 1 Lock Haven. A state police spokesman said he expected charges to be filed from the Lock Haven barracks early this week.

Eagle wrestlers easily defeat Waynesburg, 38-5

The LHS Bald Eagles handed Waynesburg their second defeat of the season Friday night, in a surprisingly easy fashion, 38-5.

The Waynesburg crew of Coach Clayton Ketterling first couldn't get moving in Thomas Fieldhouse, tallying their only points of the night on a win at 190, and draw at heavyweight.

The Eagles jumped off to a quick 6-0 lead as freshman Dave Shreck pinned Jim Miranda at 3:02 of the 118 pound class. Shreck leading 9-1 at the time of the fall, turned Miranda over with a half nelson scoring the Eagles initial points of the night.

At 126 Tim McCamley registered the Eagle's second consecutive fall of the evening pinning Waynesburg's Tom Walter at 1:31 of the first period. Ahead 3-1, McCamley pancaked Walters and again a half nelson was used in putting a Waynesburg opponent on his back.

Leading 12-0 the Eagles gave freshman Mike Barzona his first taste of varsity action. Barzona responded by defeating Rich Cronley 11-5. Tied 2-2 in the second period, Barzona executed a beautiful fireman's carry for a two point takedown and went on to dominate his tiring opponent for the win.

Eagles Remains Tough

George Way, the fourth consecutive Eagle freshman to take to the mats for the Eagles, defeated Paul Hoover 12-3. The Eagle 145 pounder led 5-3 after two periods, but an escape two point takedown, and a two point near fall led the match for the Bald Eagle. This made the score 18-0, LHS.

At 159 Dave Crowell continued the Eagle onslaught, pinning John Zalenchak three minutes into the bout. The Eagle junior, resembling a combination of Gary Ventimiglia, Larry Rippey, and Wade Schalles, led 9-2 before cradling his opponent for six.

Eagles Ice Match

At 158, Don Eichenlaub made it 27-0, LHS, by defeating a game but outclassed John Mitsch 9-1. The Eagle junior pummeled the Waynesburg grappler, piling up 6:48 on the riding time clock, compared to just nine seconds for Mitsch. An escape, takedown, and penalty point in the third period secured the match for "Eich" who had led 4-1 after two periods. The win tied the match for the Eagles, giving them a 9-6 record for the season.

Eagle Senior Don Adams wrestling the last dual meet of his career in an Eagle uniform, went out in style with a victory at 167. Al Minella, his opponent, held the Eagle scoreless for one period. After that it was all Adams. The Co-Captain of the Eagles escaped three seconds into the second period to go ahead 1-0, then picked up a takedown ten seconds later for a 3-0 lead. Minella escaped, narrowing the score to 3-1, entering the third stanza. A pair of escapes for the Waynesburg grappler were countered by an Adams takedown. A riding time point gave the Eagle a 6-3 win and a 10-4-1 dual meet record for the year.

Al Frick continued his impressive wrestling, registering a fall at 5:28 over Robin Rembold of Waynesburg. The Eagle 177 pounder was all over Rembold in the first two periods, building an 8-2 lead. With Rembold on top at the beginning of the third period, the Eagle freshman reversed in seven seconds. He pinned the Waynesburg wrestler with just 28 seconds gone in the bout.

With the score 30-0, LHS, the Eagles sent Art Baker against Nevan Gochnour, 12-1 on the season. Gochnour looked unimpressive at 190 barely defeating Baker, 3-1. Gochnour led 2-1 after two periods, and with Baker on top, escaped in just 21 seconds for a 3-1 lead.

That's the way it ended as Waynesburg ruined any Eagles chance for their second consecutive shutout.

At heavyweight, in what proved to be a dull and mediocre encounter, Big Jim Schuster drew with Dennis Marcott, 1-1. Marcott led 1-0 on an escape entering the third period, but Schuster escaped in one second of the period to salvage a draw.

Final score LHS - 38 Waynesburg - 5.
