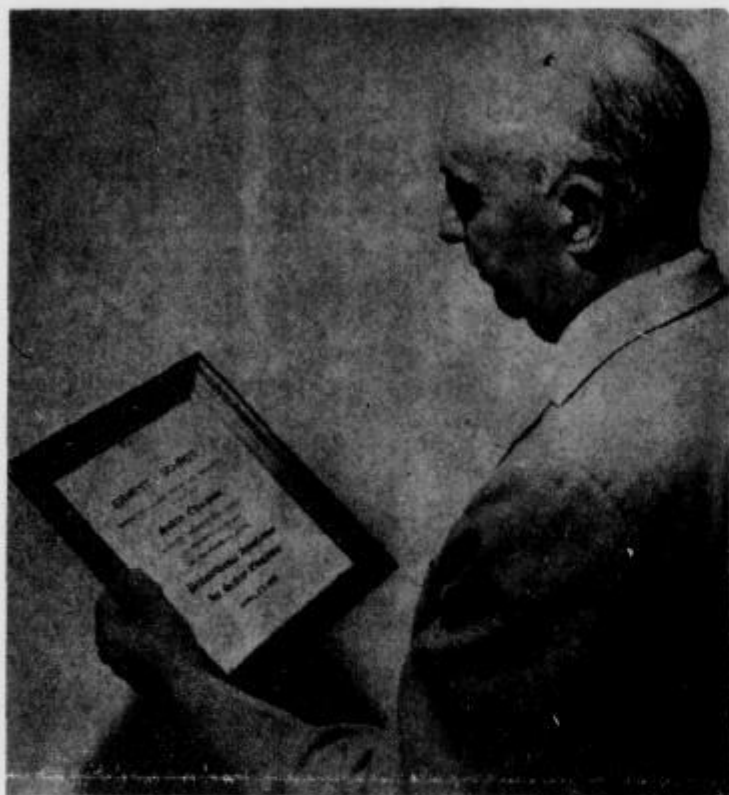

Schrot Honored as Pioneer In Driver Rehabilitation

The pioneer efforts of Ernest I. Schrot, in advocating the rehabilitation of problem drivers, through educational clinics, were recognized Friday, April 23 through the presentation of a plaque hailing his proposals made ten years ago and now receiving widespread application over the state. The award from the Pennsylvania Association for Safety Education, was presented at the annual banquet at State College.

Mr. Schrot, who advocated special classes for drivers whose records show tendencies toward accidents and traffic law violations, is head of the safety education and visual education activities at the Lock Haven State College. Three students of Mr. Schrot's classes at the local college appeared on a student panel April 23.

They were James Bologna, Kenneth Bottorf, of Lock Haven, and Richard Haag, Williamsport.

A similar panel of High School students, manned by boys and girls from Bellefonte, Penns Valley, Bald Eagle and State College High Schools, also was heard.

The safety meeting included a course in hunter safety, given Thursday, an address by Dr. Robert L. Marshall of the National Commission on Safety Education, an administrator's panel moderated by William Holland, principal of the Lock Haven High School, who substituted for Dr. Wayne C. Hoy, superintendent of the Lock Haven schools, a teachers' panel discussion, for which speakers included Rep. Eugene Fulmer and district attorney John Harris of Centre county, and reports on recent safety research.

Toastmaster for the banquet when Mr. Schrot was honored, was Jo Hayes, former head of the State College schools and a former member of the State Senate.

ANNUAL SPRING CONCERT; MAY 9

The Lock Haven State College Choir is in rehearsal for their annual spring concert which will be presented in Price Auditorium on Sunday, May 9, at 2 p.m. This year's concert as in past years, will be presented in two parts, the first consisting of music in the classical and serious vein, the second part consisting of lighter, contemporary music. President Parsons Presents The Gold Whistle Awards

Three outstanding seniors majoring in health and physical education at Lock Haven State were named Tuesday as the recipients of the college's Gold Whistle Awards. The seniors who were honored in a special assembly program and who received their awards from President Richard T. Parsons were Ronald Fertile of Greenville, Marie Marcotte of Fairless Hills and Ronald Swierzbin of Dudley, Massachusetts.

The recipients were cited by Dr. Elizabeth Zimmerli, Director of Health and Physical Education at the college in recognition of many qualities which lead to professional excellence. In presenting the awards winners to Dr. Parsons, Dr. Zimmerli said, "Each has been distinguished by a true philosophy of service to others. Between them they have given countless hours of volunteer service to others and this for no more reason than to help where help was needed. Each has shown dynamic leadership qualities coupled with self-

responsibility, imagination and good judgment, with kindness and thoughtfulness of others and with personal integrity. They are loyal to their college, to their associates and to their profession and they have been an inspiration to their classmates."

Ronald F. Fertile, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Fertile, 22 Silvan Way, Greenville, graduated from Greenville Senior High School in 1961 where he won the American Legion Award for leadership and scholarship. He has been a member of the varsity football team for three years and the college Gymnastic team for four years. He was parliamentarian for the Student Co-operative Council and was president of the Tau Kappa Epsilon chapter at Lock Haven.

Miss Marcotte, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Marcotte, 529 Parkway Drive, Fairless Hills, graduated from Pennsbury High School in 1961. She has been an excellent scholar and has engaged in a wide range of extra-curricular activities dur-

ing her college years. She has been a member of the varsity field hockey team, the gymnastic exhibition team and was president and secretary of the Aquafins, a highly trained group of formation swimmers for which group she was selected to swim the solo numbers during the last two years.

Mr. Swiersbin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Swiersbin, 4 Oak Street, Dudley, Massachusetts, graduated from Bartlett High School in 1960 where he participated in three varsity sports, was a member of the student council and a class president. At Lock Haven he won four varsity letters in football and served as co-captain last season. He has played three years of varsity baseball, was treasurer of his fraternity, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and president of the Varsity Club. During the past year he was one of the student organizers of the new Physical Education Professional Club, at the college. Mr. Swiersbin is also president of the Senior Class.

Five Instructors Appointed to Faculty

The appointment of five new members on the faculty of Lock Haven State College, effective next fall, has been announced by Dr. Richard T. Parsons, president, Lock Haven State College.

Allan J. McIntyre of Philadelphia will become associate professor of German, a new modern language course to be offered for the first time this fall at the college. Professor McIntyre is a native of Pittsfield, Massachusetts. He received his Bachelor of Arts at Williams College in 1949 and his Master of Arts degree from Columbia University. From 1953 to 1963 he was employed in Kobe, Japan as an import-export agent and since 1963 has been a teaching fellow at the University of Pennsylvania. Mr. McIntyre is married and has two children.

Harry I. Miller of Morgantown, West Virginia will be assistant professor of political science. A native of Morgantown, he graduated from West Virginia University in 1949 and received his Master of Arts degree in 1962 from the University of Virginia. He has taken

additional graduate studies at West Virginia University and at the USAF Command and Staff School. Professor Miller served as an instructor at the University of Omaha from 1962 to 1963 and was an academic instructor in the United States Air Force from 1949-1963. Since 1963 he has been a graduate teaching assistant at West Virginia University at Morgantown, Virginia. Professor Miller is married, and no children.

Mrs. Margaret E. Nielsen of Syracuse, New York, has been appointed assistant professor of English. Mrs. Nielsen graduated from the New York State University College in Albany in 1960 and will receive her Master of Arts degree from Syracuse this year. Mrs. Nielsen was employed from 1955 to 1957 as a secretary in the New York State Department of Public Works at Albany and was a teacher of English in 1960-1961 at the Schuylerville Central School, Schuylerville, New York. For the past four years, while working on her master's degree, she has been a part-time instructor

at Syracuse University. Mrs. Nielsen is married with no children.

William S. Rhodes of Williamsburg, Pa., has been appointed Associate Professor and Field Supervisor of Education. Mr. Rhodes, a native of Ganister, Pa., earned degrees from Dickinson College and Pennsylvania State University. He was a guidance counselor and principal in the Williamsburg High School from 1949 to 1963, and for the past two years has been supervisor of the Graduate Assistant Center at Penn State. Mr. Rhodes is married and has one child.

Mr. Robert C. Scherer of Jersey Shore has been appointed Associate Professor of Biology. Mr. Scherer is a native of Jersey Shore and holds degrees from Haverford College and Pennsylvania State University. He has been a teacher in the Jersey Shore Junior-Senior High School from 1958 to 1960. For the past four years he has been working on his graduate program at Penn State. Mr. Scherer is married with three children.

Coach Dave Beaver's state college track team scored their fifth consecutive victory Saturday as they trampled Indiana State College 92-50. This decisive win puts Lock Haven in contention for the state conference title. Coach Beaver's thinclads won all of the track events except the 100-yard dash and they placed well in the field events for the convincing victory. Co-captain Joe Pascale of Bristol, Pa., again paced Lock Haven with wins in the 120 high hurdles, 330-yard intermediate hurdles and ran anchor in the 440-yard and the mile relay. Also taking firsts for the Bald Eagles were Bill English in the mile in 4:33 minutes; Jack Jones in the 880-yard run in 2 minutes, 8 seconds; Dan Parke in the 220-yard dash in 22:9 seconds and Dave Doran in the two mile run in 10:13:2 minutes. Bob Wright won the shot-put with a heave of 42' 9"; Terry Shuman heaved the discus 126' 9" and Gary Seibert won the javelin throw with a heave of 199' 6".

Lock Haven State's trackmen faced Mansfield at Mansfield on Wednesday, May 5 at 3 p.m. Lock Haven trackmen are pointing to an undefeated season. If they achieve this goal they must be rated the favorites at the State College Conference at Millersville on May 15.
