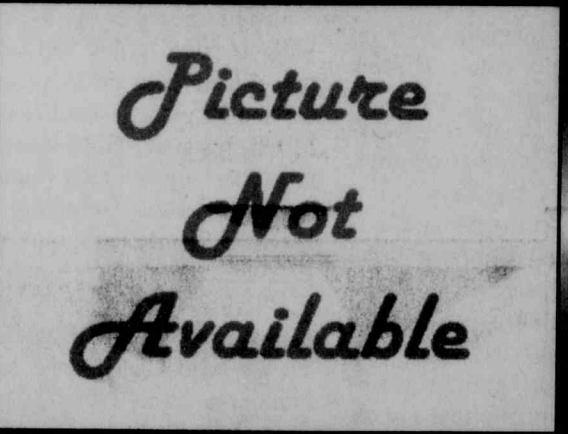

Former Poet Laureate shares adoration for poetry and art

Former U.S. Poet Laureate, Dr. Robert Pinsky, spoke about the importance of art in people's everyday lives as well as stressing the idea that art is not just a component of life, but a central aspect of it as part of the annual Founder's Day Convocation this

past Wednesday in Thomas Fieldhouse.

"Art is essential. It is not here to enhance our lives, but to go one further, and be at the core of our lives. It is better to learn an instrument than to learn grammar because music and art is the center of intelligence," stated Pinsky.

Pinsky's poetic nature showed during his speech many

times as he spoke about not only poetry, but about the effects that art has had on the development of the human mind.

"Generally, it (people) is not an impressive animal. It has not only thrived, however, this animal has dominated. The one thing that sets this animal apart from every other animal is its ability to appreciate art. We might actually die from our cleverness," said Pinsky.

His adoration for poetry is evident, not only in his speech, but also what he accomplished during his time as Poet Laureate. The Library of Congress appointed him to that position starting in 1997 until 2001. The Poet Laureate seeks to raise the national consciousness to a greater appreciation of the reading and writing of poetry.

The Favorite Poem Project was the main focus of Pinsky's term in which people from all over the United States, young and old, gathered and shared their favorite poems.

The convocation celebrated Lock Haven's 135th year as a university and was also a way to acknowledge outstanding professors, award community members and professors and to wel-

come the current freshmen to the school.

Awards winners include Dr. Philip Huber, M.F.A., Outstanding Scholarship Award, Dr. Ralph Harnishfeger, Outstanding Service Award and Maria J. Boileau of Downtown Lock Haven, Inc., President's Award for Campus/Community Service.

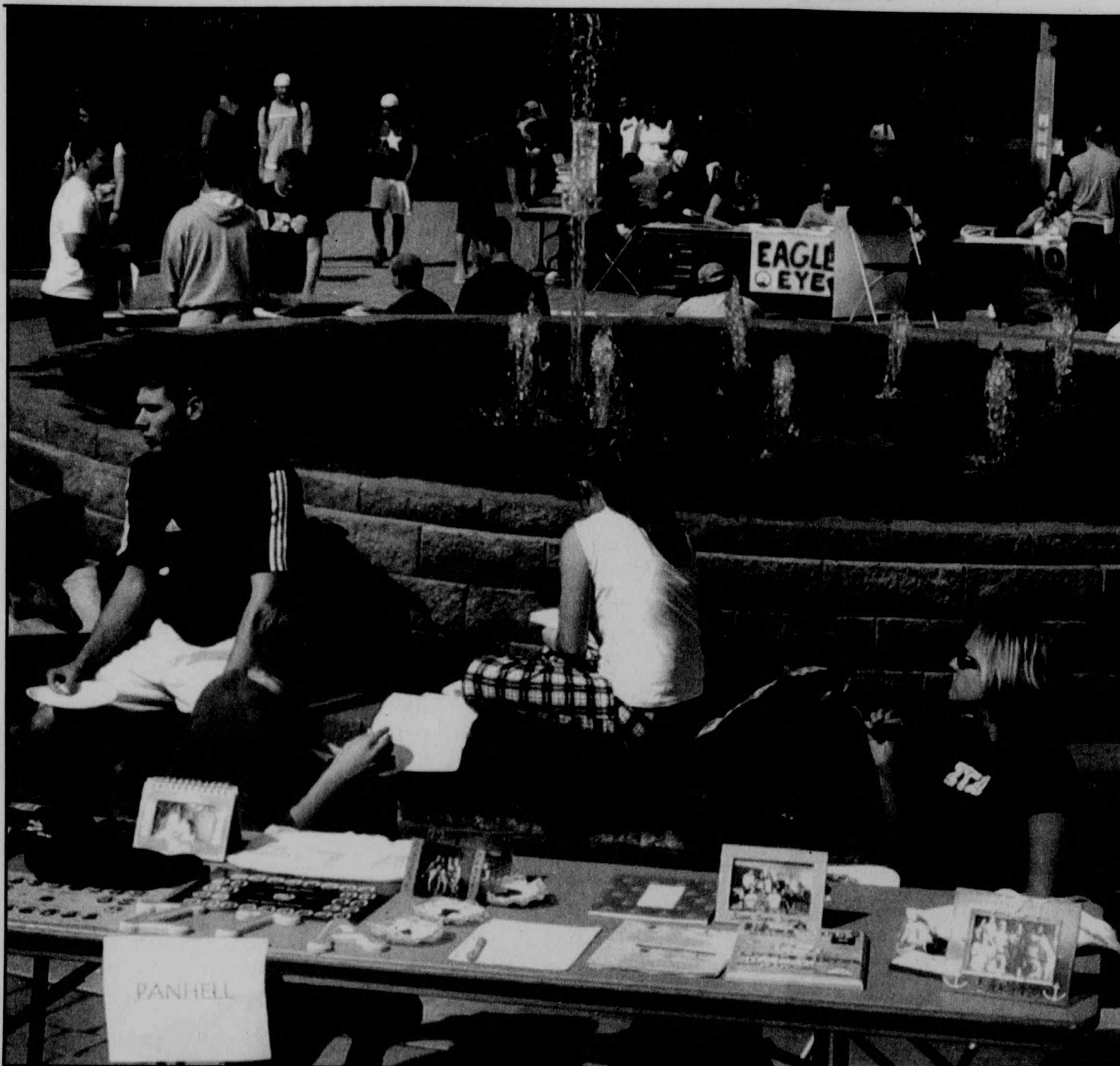

Prize offered for naming the new Bentley food truck

Bentley dining services is holding a contest for students offering an award of \$50 in flex if they submit a catchy and cool name for a new Bentley food truck. Though the deadline for the contest may be extended, there is a buzz around campus as to what exactly this food truck is about.

The mobile eatery will be placed down by Campus Village and is intended for people who are walking to campus or have parked there and walking up.

The anticipated menu for

this mobile food service includes, but is not limited to, breakfast sandwiches, cheese steaks, wraps, fries, other snacks, and bottled beverages.

This service will be provided to make eating more convenient for students that don't have time to go to Bentley, sit down, and eat.

A company operating out of Denver, Colorado is custom-building the truck, so no one is exactly certain when the truck will be delivered and open for business, but Food Service Director at Bentley Gayle Hanson is optimistic, saying "We are in constant communication with them and sure it will

happen soon."

Hanson says that the service will probably run Mondays through Fridays, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. There is also a possibility that it would remain open during the cold, winter breaks so people can still enjoy Bentley cuisine and hot drinks even when the facility on campus has closed for the holiday.

Students will be able to use their flex accounts and cash. At this time, it doesn't seem that meals will be accepted at the location. Some clubs have asked that the truck drive to other locations around Lock Haven for their events, like a catering service, but that option is not a pos-

sibility at this time because of necessity of the Internet, according to Hanson.

"Due to technology limitations, it is necessary for the truck to be able to connect to an LHU server in order for flex to be used," she said.

There are currently experiments with wireless servers so that flex accounts can be used in the future and the vehicle can move further than Campus Village and Evergreen Commons.

If someone desires catering for their party or event, he or she can still contact the company through the website campus-dish.com.

Students take part in National Day of Prayer and Remembrance

The LHU community gathered together last Friday to remember the victims of Hurricane Katrina in a "Service of Remembrance" held in front of Price Auditorium last Friday.

The event, sponsored by the university's Campus Ministries, coincided with the declaration made by President Bush that Sept. 16 be a National Day of Prayer and Remembrance.

Dr. Linda Koch opened the ceremony with words reminding those present that four years ago a service was held in the same place to remember the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks. Dr. Koch called on the students and staff of LHU to once again reach out through the different faith communities present.

"While our community has been spared the destruction and devastation of the Gulf Coast states, it is our responsibility to

share our wealth and concern for humankind" Dr. Koch said.

Members of the various faiths in the Campus Ministries spoke to the students gathered at Price and prayed for peace and restoration in areas affected by the storm. Many also stressed the need to remember our fellow Americans and reach out with compassion and hospitality.

Jeff Schaffer of the Newman Community, a Catholic organization on campus, said the tragedy reminded us that we are "one human family." He then handed out blue wristbands with the phrase printed on them.

Lock Haven University's Gospel Choir sang the hymn "Amazing Grace" and a song chosen especially for the service titled "I Need You".

Students were invited to take the microphone and share their thoughts. One student reflected the somber mood of the service when he said he didn't have many thoughts, he just "wanted to pray."

The Ministry is run by John Staje Jr. who is just beginning his second year at LHU after serving 30 years as a police officer. In the past, PCM has also taken part in numerous community activities including an Adopt-a-Family program last year during the winter holidays.

Magical Performance in Price

Magician Nate Staniforth wowed students with his illusions in Price Auditorium on Friday, Sept. 16.

The young man came off as an amateur, often cracking jokes at his own expense and speaking in a calm and sometimes soft tone.

"Everyone in the audience is going to pretend this is really entertaining," said the magician before one segment. His magic tricks led some audience members to scream and gasp, regardless.

The Iowa native started the show out small, doing a popular illusion sometimes done by other magicians on television. He swallowed a length of thread and then swallowed five sewing needles. Some people gasped while others were simply grossed out as he proceeded to pull the thread out, strung through the needles.

A favorite trick of many in the audience, including student

Jill Swinesburg, was one involving a dollar bill and fire. Throughout the trick, Staniforth kept telling the student who had sacrificed his hard earned dollar bill that there is a "slight chance that you aren't getting this back." He then had an audience member write on the bill then another audience member was told to rip a corner off, before he placed it in an envelope and set it ablaze. In the end, the dollar was incredibly unharmed, save the missing corner and the signature on it.

"I've never seen anything like that live before" says Swinesburg.

Staniforth studied under two underground magicians in Las Vegas, which is where he learned much of his unconventional art. According to his website, www.natestaniforth.com, "The mystery and entertainment in Nate's magic comes not from magic words, bad jokes, or smoke machines but from the simple fact that in his performances, miraculous things happen."

His magic has earned him

spots on MTV for a "Summer in the Keys" program a couple of years ago. He's also toured the country, appearing in such places as Los Angeles, Minneapolis, and Kansas City.

In the middle of his show, audience members viewed a video of tricks and illusions he did around the LHU campus with different students. Even though this portion of the performance was not live, the audience was still amazed and in awe.

His most famous trick, called the River Escape, was the last trick on the video. He chains his wrists and ankles and then dives into a freezing cold river, only to emerge a short time later freed.

Staniforth is also the singer for a rock band. He wrote the soundtrack for his DVD in stores now titled Spellbinder. During an escape from a straightjacket, he played his own composition, "Duet."

He finished his performance with words of wisdom: "I hope you enjoyed everything, but I don't really care."

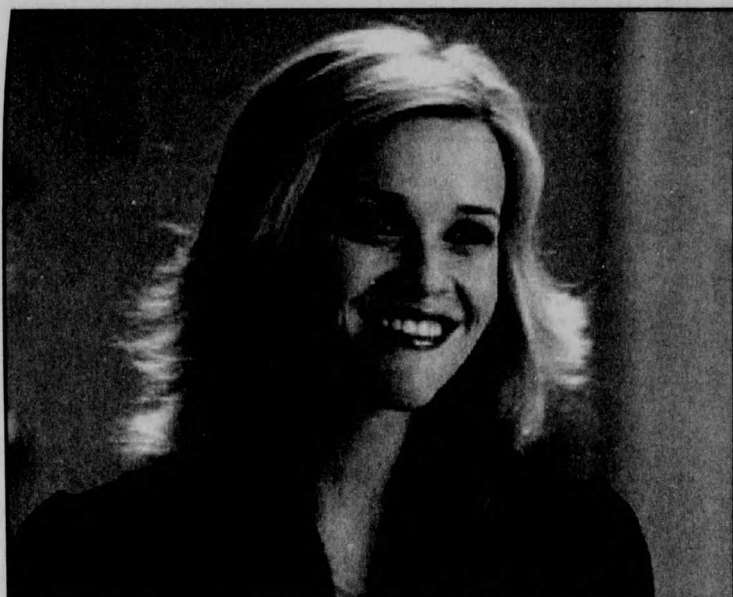

Retractions you probably didn't see

I'm not at all surprised by any of the following corrections, so I thought I'd pass them on:

Last Sunday, the Times-Picayune reported the Mayor Nagin had purchased a home in Dallas, suggesting that he didn't see any future in New Orleans. Today the paper issued a retraction: he didn't buy a house, he rented a condo for his wife and children, then returned to work in New Orleans.

Previously, many news sources reported that the Mayor hadn't even stayed in the city during the hurricane and its aftermath, making reference to the fact that his office had been "relocated outside of the city." Later, these reports were corrected--his physical office had been set up in a safe place, but the mayor remained in the city.

The Washington Post on September 4th, reported that Governor Blanco still had not declared a state of emergency. Later they retracted this statement (attributed to an unnamed Bush administration official): "A Sept. 4 article on the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina incorrectly said that Louisiana Gov. Kathleen Babineaux Blanco (D) had not declared a state of emergency. She declared an emergency on Aug. 26." That's the Friday BEFORE the storm. She requested federal assistance on the 27th--two days BEFORE the storm. Incidentally, the same Post article details the reasons why the Bush administration tried to force the state into signing over all authority to them: "Quite frankly, if they'd been able to pull off taking it away from the locals, they then could have blamed everything

on the locals," said the source, who does not have the authority to speak publicly."

And finally, from my friends at the Louisiana SPCA, an answer to questions based on a CNN report that they were bypassing animals in order to rescue only pets on their "list" of animals whose rescue had been requested by owners:

"Animals on the rescue list at times do have priority, although, these are far from the only ones being rescued and housed at the temporary shelter. The people who have called in making a specific request to rescue their pet will be prepared to come and get their animal. This will free up much needed space and resources to save more. Due to the circumstances, many of the pets locked in homes have a very limited supply of food and water. They also have owners willing to remove them as soon as possible. All the animals need to be saved. We are doing what is necessary to save as many as possible."

Monday, September 19, 2005
Piety Street Chemical Spill

A large chunk of my neighborhood has suddenly been blocked off with signs warning of a chemical spill. I recently saw a picture of my street. It looks unchanged, except for the barbed wire blockade, and the fact that I can't return there.

One of the strangest things about this whole experience is not knowing. It's been three weeks since I left. What do I know now? Not much.

From what I can tell, the flood waters stopped at my street. Two blocks on the other side of me, along the river, the warehouses burned down. So my immediate neighborhood may be okay, including my own

house, but everything around it is gone. My landlord finally called me, to report that he is okay and tell crazy stories about trying to hold the neighborhood together--escorting women so they wouldn't be raped, etc--until the National Guard forced him out. Another friend told me that he had friends in the Marigny who managed to get back to check on their things and found that everything--everything--was gone. The house hadn't flooded at all, but someone had helped themselves to the furniture, appliances, clothes, and art.

And yet, every day brings a new, contradictory report, like this one describing a four block area that my house borders:

"A friend of mine went to the Bywater yesterday, he is a doctor and managed to get past the road block. He told me when he got to Clouet Street, there was barbwire across the streets of Chartres, Royal, Dauphine and Burgundy, and the area was closed two blocks down to Piety. On the barbed wire was a sign that read, "Closed to Public, Chemical Spill Keep Out!"

Of course he went in anyway and checked on our house. He didn't see any sign of a spill anywhere, I'm thinking this could be from the fire at the wharf.

After a couple of days of feeling much better, I'm starting

to feel worse.

A note to the Neville Brothers
Dear Aaron and Cyril,

I saw you on the news today declaring that you will never return to New Orleans, "except to play music." I am curious. How will your abandoning the city make up for the fact that the city was abandoned by those who might have helped? Will those who return be better off without you? Do you think that withdrawing your support will bring more attention to the problems the city may face? And what should be made of the exception to the rule: you're willingness to return for an evening, in exchange for money.

I'm hoping there's been a misunderstanding. Perhaps, like many of us, you are simply in shock. Maybe you can't imagine returning. Maybe, when you say "to play music" you mean that the music will remain and draw you back, not that you, too, will forget the City that Care Forgot.

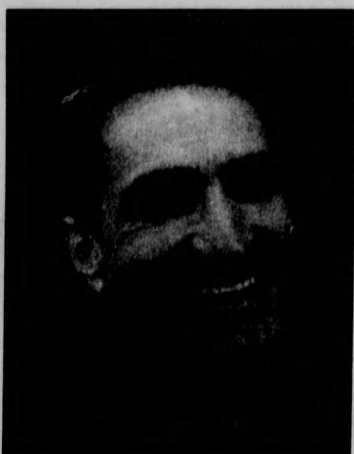

Focus on freedom of information

The selection of Judge John G. Roberts Jr. for a seat on the U.S. Supreme Court shines a light on one of the Bush administration's most deliberate and indefensible attacks on accountability in government.

In response to President Nixon's ceaseless efforts to hide White House audiotapes and other records from the public, in 1978 Congress passed the Presidential Records Act. That law unambiguously provides that the records of retired presidents are the property of the American people. Under its terms, retired presidents retain limited authority to block the release of certain materials for a period of 12 years after the end of their administrations. After the 12 years, retired presidents lose this privilege.

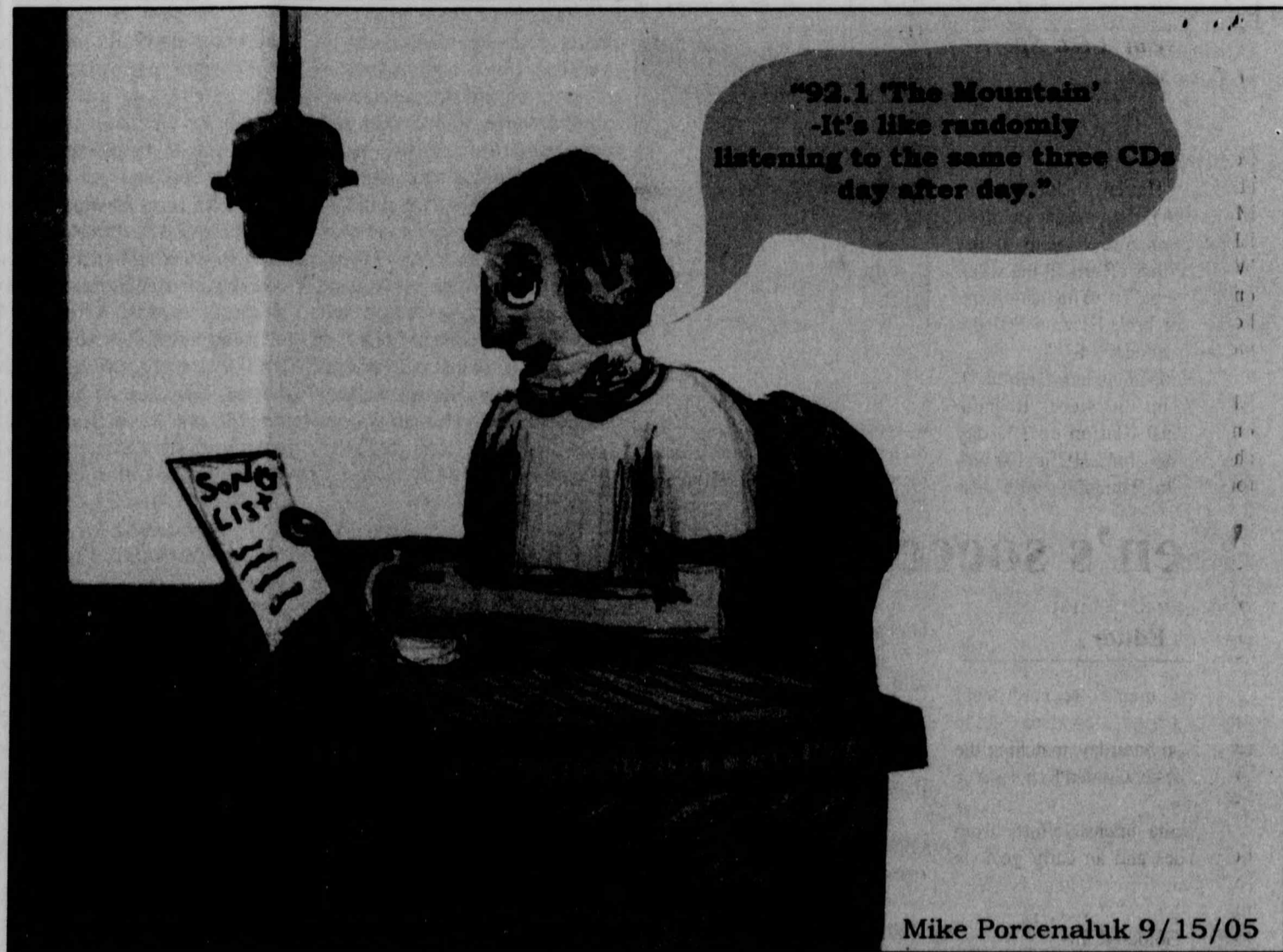
Roberts worked in the Reagan White House from 1983 through 1986. Records from his work in that position now reside at the Reagan Library in Simi

Valley, Calif. In an effort to learn more about the history and qualifications of Roberts, reporters have sought to examine these records. According to one, the Reagan Library "lists hundreds of files prepared by Mr. Roberts on subjects ranging from the Abscam bribery scandal to humanitarian assistance to Nicaragua. About 4,200 pages of the files are available to the public, but the vast majority of his documents, numbering in the tens of thousands or more, are still awaiting processing."

"Awaiting processing?" What's the problem, you might ask. This stuff is 20 years old. The problem is most likely an Executive Order issued by President Bush in November 2001 blocking the intended operation of the law.

The Bush order grants authority to retired presidents, vice presidents and to their representatives to block disclosure of documents after the 12-year

The Weekly Devotional

Luke 15:11-32 is a powerful and well known parable Jesus tells his disciples. Called The Prodigal and His Brother, it isn't very long and the first part of it explains a great deal about human forgiveness.

"Then Jesus said, 'There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father,

'Father give me the share of the property that will belong to me.'

So he divided his property between them. A few days later, the younger son gathered all that he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout the country, and he began to be in need.

So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything.

But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands.'

So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him.

Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your

son.' Ignoring the mockery and laughter, you walk up to your friend and sit down in front of him or her asking for an explanation. The secret is out.

You know your best friend has explaining to do, and at first you think that you should just walk up to him or her and start screaming angry comments. But you don't. You do the very opposite.

As it turns out, the secret was told accidentally to a group of guys who were at the same restaurant as you and your friend, and who wanted to

know more about the secret that they overheard you and your friend talk about. Your friend blurted out the secret in an attempt to make the guys stop bothering him or her.

Your best friend ends the explanation saying "I'm so sorry" over and over expecting some backlash from you. But all that you do is hold up your hand to stop your friend from talking.

"It's okay," you say, "I forgive you." Your friend stares at you for a second and then smiles. The dilemma is over.

This is a reasonable explanation for secret blabbing. But even if it wasn't, wouldn't arguments, fights, and misunderstandings be so much easier to handle if they just ended right away with "I'm sorry" from one person and "I forgive you" from the other?

Saying "I'm sorry" is just the first step in mending something that has gone wrong. We must repent before we can forgive.

Forgiveness can be very hard to do sometimes. If that situation of friendship betrayal has happened to you or someone that you know, one can only guess at how tough forgiving someone can be.

The old saying "forgive and forget" can also be hard. Sometimes so-called friends can do a lot worse than just blabbing a simple secret. Sometimes people can be downright cruel and really stab us in the back sometimes.

Or maybe it's not a friendship situation, but rather a family issue.

Psalm 130 is a wonderful and short psalm that talks about God's forgiveness.

"If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord who could stand? But there is forgiveness with you, so that you may be revered... O Israel, hope in the Lord! For with the Lord there is steadfast love, and with him is great power to redeem. It is he who will redeem Israel from all its iniquities," Psalm 130; 3-4; 7-8.

God will forgive our sins no matter what we do if we ask him to, therefore, we must act the same way in Christ-like love and forgive the sins of others that do us wrong.

The Lord our God loves us so much that he sent his only Son to die for us so that we would have eternal life in Heaven and that our sins would be forgiven. We should always respond to others in the same love that God has for us, which includes forgiving others when they do us wrong.

A Pastor that I once knew told me that she believed the definition of a human being was "a screw up," and she is right. We all mess up sometimes. We all sin, and that is why we should always repent the things that we have done wrong not just to the people that we have done wrong to, but to God as well. While our friends and family might not always forgive us for certain things, God always will no matter what, all we have to do is ask.

was assisted by junior Zach Gibbon.

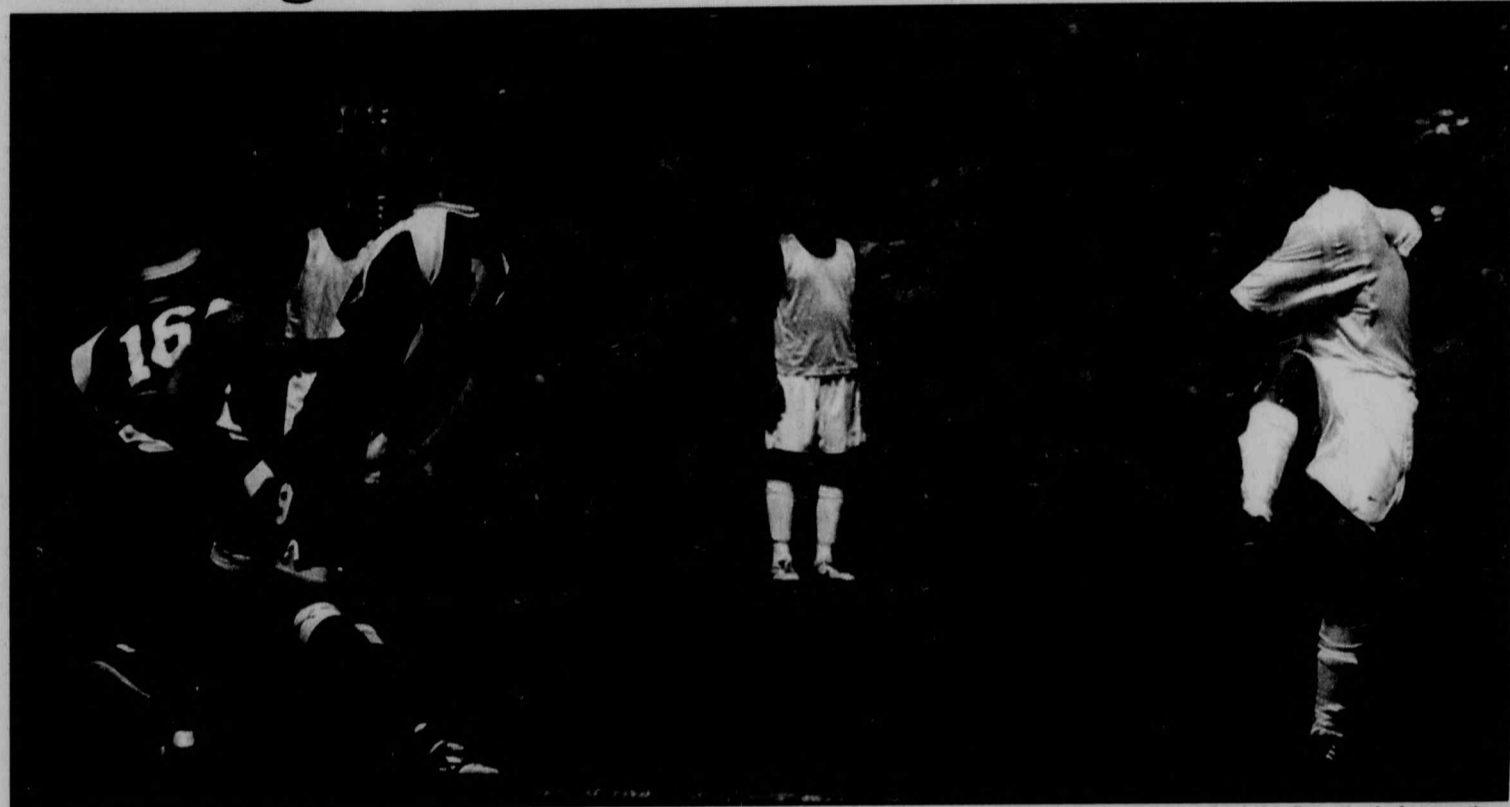
"It felt great scoring the goal," said Huckett. "However, I was aware of the tough game still ahead of us, and the importance of staying focused to try and achieve the three points."

The Cleveland Browns picked up their first victory of the season Sunday as they beat the Green Bay Packers 26-24 in front of a packed house at Lambeau Field. The Browns were led by a balding Trent Dilfer who passed for three touchdowns and 336 yards.

Hopefully this year the fans will turn out again and they can help cheer the team as they run back into the big show as they continue to climb the ladder of success.

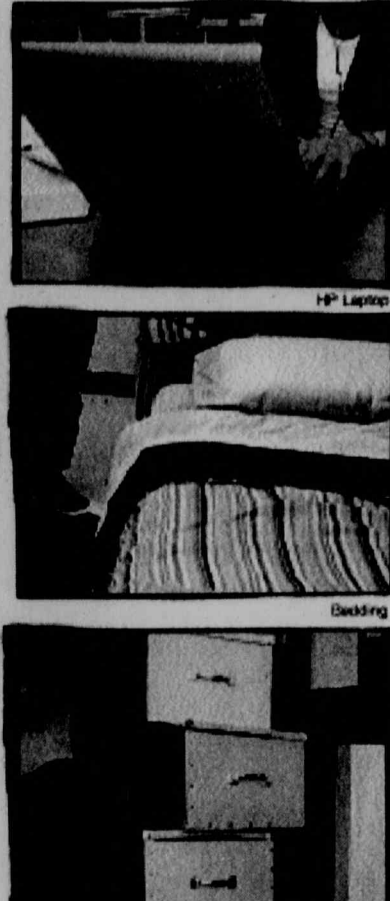
