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Stumpo, Spacht assume new positions

There have been two recent changes in the S.C.C. Executive Committee officers. Steve Stumpo will be taking Ron Palmer's place as Second Vice President and Curt Spacht will be filling Dave Drabot's position as parliamentarian.

According to an S.C.C. press release, Palmer resigned because he felt he couldn't give the position the amount of time it required.

The constitutional procedure of appointing new officers to the Executive Committee is as follows: "Any vacancy occurring in the category of officers, except President, shall be filled by appointment by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee and Senate by Majority."

Both candidates have received Executive Committee approval, but the Senate will not meet for the first

time this year until after elections on Thursday, September 12.

Steve Stumpo is a junior majoring in Health, Physical Education and Recreation from Woodbury, N.J. He has served as a KDR representative to the Inter Fraternity Council and this past summer as Chairman of the Summer Interim Committee by appointment of Rich DeBernardo, S.C.C. President, who is also an active member of the KDR fraternity.

Curt Spacht is a senior from Huntington, Pa. majoring in Computer Science. Spacht fills the position of Parliamentarian left open by the graduation of Dave Drabot. Last year, he held a Senator's position and served on the Senate Appropriations Committee. Spacht is also the treasurer of the Alpha Phi Omega service fraternity.

Bower resigns as LHS student trustee

George Bower, former Lock Haven State student and student trustee, has resigned his position on the Board of Trustees of LHSC. A student to fill the vacancy is presently being sought by Secretary of Education John Pittenger.

Last semester there was a great deal of controversy concerning Bower's trusteeship. According to Section 2008.1 as amended by Act 306 (Dec. 6, 1972): "All boards shall contain a member who is a full-time undergraduate student enrolled for at least twelve sem-

ester hours, other than a student in his freshman year." Although this amendment was passed after Bower's appointment he did not resign after graduation in August 1973. Instead he decided to stay on the board, thus preventing another student appointee to fill his position.

The solution agreed upon was that Bower would stay on as student trustee until November 1, 1974. Upon that date he would resign his position, creating a vacancy which would be filled by another student.

As of August, Bower resigned his position. Secretary

of Education Pittenger, informed the S.C.C. of the vacancy on the board and asked that names of at least three but no more than five candidates be submitted for the position. The following criteria will be used to screen the candidates: 1. Candidates should have demonstrated concern for the welfare of both students and the college as a whole. 2. Candidates should understand the responsibilities of a trustee and the obligation to strengthen the long range health and vitality of the college. 3. Candidates should be residents of Pennsylvania,

4. Candidates should be able and willing to serve at least one year prior to graduation.

Sophomores are preferred for this position because of the time factor involved. After the names have been submitted and the people interviewed by Pittenger, the Governor will select a student to be approved by the State Senate. This may take half a year, thus causing a shortened term for upper classmen. All recommendations for the position are welcome and will be considered by the S.C.C.

The State Of The Reflecting Pool

For most of the characters of the drama, and the public in general, the one act play "Watergate" is over. But both the cast and the audience are still wondering about that often invoked phrase, "Executive Privilege". Still although not clearly defined by the script or the courts of the land, all segments of government at all levels are holding a large scale examination of conscience. Everyone is concerned that job performance might be misinterpreted as abuse of power.

Even here in Utopia a reflection on past practices might be in order. Although cited as "the shining star of student government," some of the actions of the present Executive Committee deserve some afterthought. I'm not sure whether covering a six thousand dollar loss on a concert sponsored by an ad hoc committee, budgeting a radio station that doesn't exist, or desecrating a cemetery can be considered as acts permitted by "Executive Privilege". But these types of actions do smack of abuse of power along with blatant disregard for the rights of the living and dead alike.

But the responsibility for these seemingly irresponsible acts does not rest with the executive alone. In this system of "representative government" the student senate shares the credit for what has happened in the past. A senator should run for office for more of a reason than having this activity listed on a job application or resume from the student placement office. And once elected, members of the senate should per-



form their elected office with sincerity and regard for their constituents. The senate body should act as more than a pabulum to nurture the ego of the "baby excess power". It should act as a counterbalance to such acts and also feel free to initiate needed change or reform on behalf of the student body it represents. The operation of student government should be a two way tunnel rather than a laundry chute used by the executive committee for cleaning their soiled garments by means of senate action.

The much needed winds of change are blowing from Washington to all humble places where people gather to perform the tasks of governing. To let this healthy breath of fresh air not affect our corporate venture in democracy would be foolhardy. To deny our reflecting pool of high ideals this breeze of cooling concern would be a catastrophe. All we could possibly be left with is a stagnant puddle of fetid desires caused by lust for power. This would be a far cry from the sparkling waters of selfless service envisioned by previous idealistic students involved in our government. The best of all governments is that which teaches us to govern ourselves.....

Not just another fish story

Canada proves superior with fishing rod

Canada swept all trophies in the Intercollegiate University Sport Fishing Seminar and Competition which concluded on Wednesday, August 28th.

The University of Western Ontario won the University Cup on the virtue of their 321-lbs. of fish caught during the three-day tournament off Western Nova Scotia.

The team also won the Bluenose Trophy as one of the team members caught the largest fish in the match.

Bill Byrick, a native of London, Ontario, landed a 30.5 lb. cod, to win that honour.

When the final day's results were totalled, the six Canadian universities competing against six American university teams, barely edged their rival for the coveted Nova Scotia International Trophy.

Canada emerged with 989 points compared to 946 for the Americans.

Twelve teams competed in the match which saw the stu-

dent anglers going after ground fish, striped bass and bluefin tuna.

The match, sponsored by the Nova Scotia government, consisted of three days of actual fishing in its many facets.

In each of the three days four boats were fishing off Cape St. Mary for bluefin tuna.

Unfortunately, none of the team members landed any of the giant bluefins although two were boated during that time.

The competition took place off Wedgeport, Cape St. Mary and the Annapolis River, Nova Scotia.

Teams competing from Canada were: The University of Toronto, University of Western Ontario, University of New Brunswick, St. Mary's University, Dalhousie and St. Francis Xavier.

The U.S. contingent was made up of teams from Harvard, Yale, Lock Haven State, Princeton, Dartmouth, and U. of Massachusetts.



Lock Haven State College entered a team last week in the Annual International University Game Invitational Fish Competition. The event was held August 26, 27, and 28 in the Yarmouth area near Saint Mary's University at Halifax, Nova Scotia.
