





OU asked me to tell you about the beginings of the Alma Mater. Here is the story as it comes to me:

For years the College had been without an Alma Mater. "Thy Ivy Song" had served on occasions when an Alma Mater was called for, but someone was always asking, "Why don't we have an Alma Mater?" Dr. Parsons and Dr. Warters—Dr. Warters was Director of Personnel at the time—began suggesting that Student Council take the matter into consideration, and on several occasions Student Council offered a cash prize to any student who would produce an acceptable Alma Mater. However, no Alma Mater was ever forthcoming.


In the spring of 1949, Dr. Parsons—in desperation, I suppose—asked the music department and me to collaborate on an Alma Mater: Mr. Routch was to write the music and I was to write the words. We had the whole summer for the enterprise; and with that much time, the undertaking did not seem a too formidable one. In late May I left for a trip that was to take me to Texas, Mexico, and the West Coast, confident that when I came back in late August, the music department would have the music ready and I could go to work on the words. I had no idea of what the words would be, but from time to time during the summer I would think of details which, it seemed to me, should be a part of the finished product.

Shortly after I returned in that late August, Mr. Routch called me to see how the words were coming along. I told him that they had not been coming along at all, that I had planned to set words to his music—if he was going to be the one to write the music; as it seemed he was. He assured me that the words must come first.

So I set to work. I still had little or no idea what the words were to be. I do remember sitting on the top of a pyramid in Mexico one leisurely July afternoon and thinking that the Susquehanna River, because the College is on its banks and because it runs through much of the territory from which our students come, should be mentioned, and I rather hoped to use the words "shimmer" and "sun" with the word "Susquehanna" for alliterative effect if Mr. Routch's music should be pliable enough to permit the use of the words. Now that the words were to come first, I started with the line "There the crystal Susquehanna shimmers in the sun." I had decided on two stanzas, preferably rather short ones, and a chorus—for I had the feeling that the occasions on which an Alma Mater is sung are usually serious and dignified occasions and occasions when long and leisurely singing is not appropriate.

The first stanza, I felt, should deal with pleasant physical characteristics of our campus —maples, stars, shadows, morning light, mountain views. As I listed some of those pleasant physical characteristics, I noticed that alliteration seemed to be wanting to give flow to the lines: "mountains," "maple," "murmur,"




Where the ivied tower measures

The chorus, it seemed to me, should be a kind of pledge of allegiance growing out of love and gratifude. To make the chorus tie







DR. RICHARD T. PARSONS President, State Teachers College Lock Haven, Pennsylvania

To the Class of 1956:

It has often been stated that change is the only permanent thing in the world. Change for the common good is the objective of educational institutions, for as time passes, new ideas and different world conditions require modern objectives based on prevailing modes of living. The education of teachers has always been the main objective of our college.

The original buildings of the college were situated high on the hill above the present tennis courts. Now the only remaining physical evidence of those structures is the two old reservoirs—one of brick and one of concrete. The earliest alumni, too, have passed on.

New buildings were constructed on the site of the present campus about the turn of the century, but they have served their usefulness and are now being demolished. A few years ago the Clock Tower Building was razed; then the former men's residence hall where now stands Russell Hall; soon High Hall will be no more. Within the next several years five new buildings will likely be erected.

When alumni return and no longer find familiar landmarks, they generally regret that changes have taken place, for within those older buildings they associate the pleasures of their carefree student days.


One aspect of our Alma Mater which has not changed has been its primary purpose, to educate those who desire to teach. Physical structures change from time to time, but this objective, to make the world a better place in which to live through the service of teaching, has so far been the most permanent aspect of our college.

Buildings may be useful for only a short time, as they are certain to deteriorate, but the achievements of education and their resulting good are the only certainties transmitted from generation to generation. This heritage has been the purpose of our Alma Mater in this changing world.

As individuals we have supplied leadership to every organization on campus. We have had outstanding members on every team.




We are truly grateful to Mr. John F. Koons, our adviser, for his help and much-needed advice, which have enabled us to solve many problems during the past three years.







EAGLE NEST

The Eagle Nest, college newspaper revived in 1954 under the editorship of Charles Yocum, was issued in January 1956, for the first time as a commercially printed monthly, edited by Virginia Steiger.

With the change-over from a weekly multigraphed edition to a four-page newssheet, the staff is no longer harassed by the temperamental antics of "Jezebel," the publications office multigraph machine, which sometimes turned out almost unreadable copy. Unfortunately, Thomas Saiers, 1955 editor, and Lorraine Gitch, first-semester editor, terminated their association with "Jezebel" too soon to appreciate the improvement in publication methods. Perhaps "Jezebel" was partially responsible for Lorraine's decision to withdraw from college to accept a position on a newspaper near her home.

Editor Steiger's staff consists of Robert Ott, sports editor; Janet Filbin and Jane Hubler, typing editors; Gayle Wilson and Margaret Dunlap, circulation editors, and twenty reporters, seven typists, and seven members of the circulation staff.

With Mrs. Willetta Cummings Jack, adviser, these four staff members attended the Columbia Scholastic Press Association conference, at Columbia University, New York City, March 15-17: Virginia Steiger, Mary Fontana, Margaret Mitchell, and Rosemary Person. The staff has held three journalism seminars to study the preparation of copy for the printer. Speaker at the seminars was Mr. John Vairo, editor of the Jersey Shore Herald.

NATURALIST CLUB



This year the Naturalists have helped decorate the campus for Homecoming, solicited for the Heart Fund, and sponsored a World University Service booth at the carnival.



Chief function of the Women's Athletic Association is to promote interest and participation in individual and team sports. WAA's extensive intramural program provides its members the opportunity to take part in ten different sports: badminton, basketball, hall ball, soft ball, volley ball, bowling, table tennis, tennis, hockey, and soccer.







ASSOCIATION FOR CHILDHOOD EDUCATION INTERNATIONAL



Every Lock Haven State Teachers College student automatically becomes a member of the Student Cooperative Council, with his payment of twenty dollars each semester for his student activity card. 







That the performance might be one of high calibre, the cast, the stage crew, under Kenneth Barlow and Peter Brunner, and the light

























Black's cagers roll up 111 tally

After a slow start, Dr. W. Darrell Black's Bald Eagle basketball team caught fire in midseason and defeated the highly touted Indians of State Teachers College, Indiana, 90-81.

Record-breaker of the season was played on the Bald Eagles' home court, where Coach Black's cagers trounced Shippensburg STC 111-84 Two Thomas Field House records were broken in this game. The astronomical score of 111 points soars above all previous Field House high scores. Freshman Neil Kemp scored 33 points, to erase the record of 32 points, previously held by Joe Bizzarro.

This season there was no place like home for Capt. Mike Yelovich's Bald Eagle quintet. Four

of their six wins were on their home court, with Clarion STC, Indiana STC, Shippensburg STC, and Lycoming College the visiting victims.

From 1952-1956 four-year letterman Captain Yelovitch '56 scored 771 points, a feat surpassed by only two other basketeers in Lock Haven STC history. In the four-year period 1948-1952 Robert McDermitt rolled up a record-breaking 922 points and Robert Miller posted 802.

On this year's squad, lettermen were Don Albright, Larry Barnhart, George Corner, George Dintiman, Neil Kemp, Art Martynuska, Garold Terrette, and seniors Captain Yelovich and Richard Meacham.


Once again the Bald Eagle grapplers have become one of the most discussed teams in small college wrestling. Only the powerful University of Pittsburgh Panthers obstructed the Bald Eagles from an undefeated season. Coach Hubert H. Jack's Maroon and Gray men won their 101st victory against twenty-one defeats in fifteen years of intercollegiate wrestling.

In dual meet competition the Bald Eagles boasted an 8 and 1 record, with decisive wins over Edinboro, Indiana, Ithaca, Bloomsburg, East Stroudsburg, and Rochester. Toughest opposition came from Millersville, Waynesburg, and Pitt; only the Panthers beat the tough Clinton County matmen.






FOUR-1 CHAMP McIntyre struggles to escape from Hulings of Pitt.







Coach Corbin will be looking for a very successful team in the future with the return of fifteen lettermen.





Even though the Lock Haven tankmen lost all three meets, the time performance in the distance events was much faster than has been recorded by previous Bald Eagle swimmers.





MEN'S GYMNASIUM EXHIBITION TEAM




