



And who has served with devotion for the past fourteen years.
















Marcella Burt Williams '23 1904-1959

In Memory of Marcella Burt Williams '23

RS. Marcella Burt Williams, who died of a heart attack on October 6, 1959, was an alumna of the Central State Normal School, Class of 1923, before it became the Lock Haven State Teachers College, in 1927. From 1948 to 1959, when she retired from teaching, Mrs. Williams was on the college faculty, serving her first two years in the social science department. Besides supervising student teachers in the sixth grade of the Akeley School, Mrs. Williams was executive secretary of the Lock Haven Alumni Association from 1948 until September of 1957. She held a bachelor of science degree from Lock Haven State Teachers College, earned in 1932, and a master's degree from Bucknell University. Mrs. Williams did her graduate work at both Columbia and Harvard universities.

In Memory of Carey Ellsworth March


R. Carey E. March, who died on December 25, 1959, was the dean of men and an associate professor of science at Lock Haven. During World War II, Mr. March came to the college to teach a special course in naval aviation. In 1951 he assumed his duties as dean and as a teacher of physical science. A graduate of Allegheny College, Mr. March earned both his bachelor's and his master's degrees from that institution. He had done graduate study at Western Reserve and at the Pennsylvania State University. Because both Mr. March and Mrs. Williams were teachers, their memories will live many, many years—as long as the truths they taught, the new vistas they opened for their students are handed on by those students who, later, as teachers, remembering, teach as they were taught.

First President of Lock Haven State College



Dr. Richard T. Parsons, President Lock Haven State College


N his annual State of the College addresses to the faculty and students, Dr. Richard T. Parsons has always held that his concern is for the best quality of teacher preparation and for the growth of Lock Haven in the quality of its students rather than in the size of its enrollment. To help to assure quality, Dr. Parsons, in 1943, initiated a faculty-student advisory system to guide students in their academic life. He also established the Junior Class Standing system for determining whether sophomores who have completed sixty hours are prepared to qualify as juniors.

To provide for the nine hundred fifty students Dr. Parsons presided over the construction, in 1949, of two new buildings: Ulmer Hall, the science building, and Russell Hall, the women's dormitory. On Alumni Day, on May 21, he will preside at the dedication of the newest building, Smith Hall, which will house two hundred forty men next fall.

If Dr. Parsons were to discuss the yearbook theme "Focus on Lock Haven," he would neither begin nor end with his responsibilities of leadership at Lock Haven State Teachers College for the past eighteen years. Dr. Parsons' memoirs of L. H. S. T. C. go beyond his appointment to the presidency in 1942 and extend back to his position as dean of men, in 1937, teacher of English, in 1935; and to a graduate of L. H. S. T. C., in 1931.

And now to these milestones, Dr. Parsons may add the adoption of a new curriculum and the increase in the size of the faculty, the student enrollment, and the number of campus buildings, as well as the distinction of being the first president of Lock Haven State College, the new title designated for the college by the Pennsylvania Legislature, on January 8, 1960. As the first president of the state college, Dr. Parsons, who has the longest record for service as college president, does not need to begin building a new foundation to fit the college to its new name. He needs only to continue the educational and constructional advances his leadership has fostered for the past eighteen years.













The thirty-five members of the Student Cooperative Council, the governing body of the Lock Haven State College, are representatives of all the organizations on campus. The Council meets with its advisers, Mrs. Hazel Ray Ferguson, social director; Miss A. Kathryn Pontzer, dean of women; Mr. Carey E. March, dean of men; Mr. Stephen Jacobs, director of athletics; and Mr. James E. McGuire, manager of the College Bookstore, twice a month to direct the student activities.

The main item of business is the regulation of the \$20-activity fee paid each semester by the 950 students. With this money the Council is able to finance the entire inter-scholastic athletic program, forty-five organizations, as well as dances, parties, special week ends, and other social functions, Community Concerts, and the College Bookstore and the Eagle Wing, the two money-making projects of S.C.C.

The representatives of the Council labored many long hard hours to balance the 1959-1960 budget, for appropriating the proper amount of money to each organization according to its size, importance, and accomplishments is not an easy job when there are forty-five organizations subsidized by S.C.C. The minutes of each Council meeting are posted in Social Square, and all students are encouraged to attend the meetings of the Student Cooperative Council so that they may better understand how the College is governed.

"Praeco" Issues First Offset Yearbook in History of College

Now for the first time since *Praeco* was published in 1913, this forty-seventh edition of *Praeco* is printed by the offset process, rather than by the letterpress process.

The 1959-1960 *Praeco* represents the work of thirty-two staffers and their adviser Miss Marretta Powell King, who has now sponsored her fifth *Praeco*. Credit for the non-professional photographic coverage goes to three staff photographers; the cover, illustrating the theme "Focus on Lock Haven" was designed by Jeff McCormick '62.

Six Praeco delegates, representing four divisions of the staff, and Miss King traveled in the S.C.C. station wagon to the Associated Collegiate Press Conference in New York City. The delegates, with one half their expenses paid by Praeco, stayed at the New Yorker and attended short courses in literary, sports, photography, and business management. The 1958-1959 Praeco placed first in ACP.

Subsidized by S.C.C., *Praeco* is distributed free to students who have paid one dollar for their photographs.

The 152-page yearbook, with photographs of all faculty members, group pictures of forty-four organizations, and individual pictures of upperclassmen is edited in 106 High Hall and will be unveiled at the Student Publications Banquet at the Dutch Inn on May 12. The *Crucible*, the *Compass*, the *College Times*, join with *Praeco* each year to celebrate the achievements of their final deadlines.

The annual issue of the *Crucible*, a collection of poems, short stories, and essays written by Lock Haven students, will be published again at the close of the spring semester.








Speakers at the last meeting of the year were Mr. Wolf and Dr. Paul Bernstein, professor of social science.

Under supervision of Dr. A. D. Patterson and Dr. Harry Moore, a chapter of the Student Pennsylvania State Education Association has been reorganized at Lock Haven. The original Homer H. Gage chapter was established in 1944, but dissolved several years later. Several members from the Professional Orientation classes, taught by Dr. Patterson and Dr. Russell, and several freshmen have been inducted as charter members.

At the Charter Assembly on November 5, Dr. Lucy Valero, assistant executive secretary of the P.S.E.A., presented the charter to Clarence Aikey. Mr. Glenwood Crist, president of the Central Convention District, added his congratulations to the telegrams and letters read by Dr. Patterson.

A. C. E. Explores the Needs of Children

"Why is the A.C.E. holding a rummage sale?"

"Haven't you heard? They're also selling candy. That's how they finance their annual trips to visit schools, their speakers, and their annual banquets for their Seniors."

"Aren't they subsidized by Student Cooperative Council?"

"No, not one cent. The 250 members pay dues to supplement their fund-raising campaigns."

An interview with their adviser, Dr. Mary Alice Smith, unearthed this information as well as the goals of the local chapter of the Association for Childhood Education: to promote desirable conditions, programs, and practices in the schools—nursery through elemen-



One of the largest organizations on campus is the Student Christian Association, whose sixty men and women meet twice a month.



ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE

The Assembly Committee, consisting of three faculty members and eight students, have emphasized high quality programs in assembly even though they were limited this year by a budget cut from \$2,300 to \$1,550. Dr. A. D. Patterson, faculty chairman of the Committee, states that this reduction necessitated less dependence on commercial programs and increased participation by faculty members and campus organizations. 





radiating to a silver star on the dance floor, and music by the Kents of Mansfield promised that "Silver Bells" to be the dance of the year.



Alumni returning for Homecoming always receive a warm welcome from the Varsity Club. Its eighty-one members annually sponsor a cider pour after the Homecoming game. The members also play an important part in helping to promote the athletic program of the college. Varsity Club members also receive a lifetime pass to all athletic events on campus. At present a man who earns one "L" receives a jacket when he is a senior, and a man who has earned two "L's" is entitled to a sweater at the end of his freshman year. A man who has played varsity sports for four years but has never earned his letter, may still receive a maroon and gray jacket as a senior if he pays half the cost.




MEN'S GYMNASTIC TEAM


Synchronized Swim Club Makes Water Splash as Aquafins
















Six Points is Largest Margin in Five Losses



Although the Lock Haven State College wrestling team has scored an outstanding total of 226 points thus far this season to its opponents' 99 points, the Eagle matmen are posting a misleading record of six wins and five losses. With Coach Hub Jack at the helm, the Maroon and Gray have thus far not allowed any team to score over 16 points against them while the Bald Eagles have scored as high as 34 and 32 points over California and Millersville State Colleges respectively.

The most depressing defeat of the season came when the Bald Eagles had their unprecedented eight-year record of 36 successive victories in the State College Conference shattered by Bloomsburg State College, 15-11.

Upon the completion of the regular season schedule at Appalachian, N. C., the Bald Eagles will play host to two college tournaments. The State College Tournament will take place first at which time the Maroon and Gray will attempt to regain the first-place title they lost to Bloomsburg State College last year.

The second post-season event to take place in Thomas Field House will be the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, which determines the nation's best wrestlers at the small college level. Last year, Lock Haven won the third place team title with a total of 41 points. Freshman Gray Simons won the 115-pound championship along with the Most Outstanding Wrestler Award in this tournament. Ralph Clark captured the first-place berth at the 147 pounds weight class. Hank Shaw took second place at 137 pounds while John Kreamer placed third at 157 pounds.





Baffled opponent seems helpless as R. Clark tries for an early fall.



This victory over the Huskies was the last for the Eagles who lost to Howard University, Morgan State College, Md., Lycoming College, and Millersville S.C. successively.






Runner's efforts fruitless as umpire signals completion of doubleplay.

Summer Flood Waters Fail to Daunt 1959 Bald Eagle Track Team

Three wins and two defeats during the 1959 season marked the record of the Lock Haven track team, coached by Mr. Stephen Jacobs and Mr. Lester P. Zimmerman. In the annual Pennsylvania Teachers College Conference Track and Field contest, held at Millersville, the Lock Haven Eagles placed tenth, scoring only seven team points.

All during the fall semester of last year, it was indeed doubtful that the Maroon and Gray would even have a track team since much of the equipment and the track itself were destroyed in late summer floods, which preceded the opening of college. Damage to the track alone was \$6,500. However, through the determination of the coaches and the interest of the track candidates, a fine group of men were molded into an able and persevering track and field team.
