Fund tops \$200,000 mark for 1st time

For the first time in history, the Bloomsburg University Alumni Annual Fund went over the \$200,000 mark.

Of the \$201,739 record-setting total, \$184,924 was contributed by 5,027 alumni. That's 25.5 percent of the 25,541 alumni with known addresses who were solicited, considerably higher than the average for four-year public institutions.

Friends of BU alumni contributed the remaining \$16,815.

Gifts to the University from all sources totalled \$835,621 in 1986, according to Anthony Ianiero, director of development.

The class with the greatest number of donors was the Class of 1978 with 201 contributors. Other classes in the top ten were 1968 with 199, 1980 with 194, 1977 with 188, 1972 with 185, 1981 with 183, 1975 with 179, 1983 with 177, 1979 with 175 and 1976 with 174.

The class with the best participation rate was the Class of 1945 with 50.1 percent. Others in the top ten were 1944 with 49.1 percent, 1943 with 48.8 percent, 1942 with 41.7 percent, 1935 with 38.9 percent, 1939 with 38.3 percent, 1940 with 38.2 percent, 1948 with 38.2 percent, 1936 with 37.7 percent and 1941 with 37.6 percent.

The Class of 1972 contributed the largest total — \$9,356. Others in the top ten were 1969 with \$7,751; 1976 with \$6,538; 1968 with \$6,079, 1980 with \$6,018, 1974 with \$5,810, 1970 with \$5,689, 1981 with \$5,649, 1978 with \$5,288, and 1971 with \$5,175.

Athletes do well in class, too

Educators throughout the country are concerned about the scholastic performance of student athletes, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) recently passed legislation concerning academic requirements for athletes. But Bloomsburg University has proven over the years that its student athletes can compete both on the field and in the classroom.

According to a university study completed this past fall, 62.7 percent of Bloomsburg's athletes graduate, a rate far above the national average for all students, which falls between 30 and 40 percent. BU athletes maintained a 2.81 grade point average, just below the 3.05 g.p.a. of their classmates. Bloomsburg's graduation rate for all students is 68.3 percent.

Among the athletes in the study who failed to graduate, only 9.2 percent were dismissed for academic reasons while another 8.5 percent transferred. The

Message from the President

Sesquicentennial plans underway;
Mission to reflect heritage, future

It is always a pleasure to send a message to Bloomsburg University alumni about campus activities; it is the one special way to reach each of you. We appreciate your continuing interest in your alma mater, and I hope that by telling you about several major events for which we are preparing you will feel a part of the activities.

First, congratulations and thank you to all the alumni who helped make the 1986 Annual Fund Drive the most successful ever. More than twenty-five percent of those alumni contacted contributed over \$185,000. This number of contributions is considerably more than the national average for four-year public institutions. We are thrilled with your response.

By now many of you are aware that the Alumni's Annual Fund Drive was combined in January with the other fundraising efforts of the Development Office. We believe this change will benefit Bloomsburg University by improving the coordination of these activities. With your caring about Bloomsburg University, we know 1987 can be another benchmark year.

In 1989 Bloomsburg University will have its 150th anniversary. Very shortly, I will be announcing the membership of the Sesquicentennial committee. Many constituencies, including alumni, will be represented. Throughout the year, and in addition to a special celebration, we plan campus-wide coordination of as many activities as possible. We are eager to keep you apprised of these events.

Coinciding with the sesquicentennial in 1989 is the institution's ten-year accreditation review by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The eight-member steering committee has been named and will begin its task this spring. We anticipate this process of self-study and preparation for the visit will proceed smoothly since the university has in the last ten years established a comprehensive data base that will be available to the committee. All aspects of the university, including its relationship to its alumni, will be considered.

Also of importance to the Middle States self-evaluation is the university's current consideration of a new university mission statement. This statement will reflect the strong heritage of Bloomsburg University and will poise the institution for the 1990s. The development of an outcomes assessment plan for our graduates and the strategic planning effort in which the institution has been engaged this past year also relate directly to preparation for the Middle States review. The unifying of these initiatives is most important to the advancement of Bloomsburg University.

Governance at Bloomsburg University has been under study the past eighteen months, and action on a new governance structure is anticipated later this spring. I expect the new governance model will promote the long institutional history of participation, communication and collegiality.

Many of you who live in the region or in central Pennsylvania probably were able to enjoy one or more of the fine performances given this year as part of the Celebrity Artist Series. The support of this series by our many friends, alumni, students and employees has been heartwarming. Later this spring we will announce the 1987-1988 series which also promises to bring exciting talent and varied productions to campus.

I am planning to attend several alumni chapter meetings this spring and look forward to greeting some of you in your home towns. Others of you I hope are planning to attend Alumni Day on June 6, 1987. We are always happy to see you and welcome you to campus any time.

Students get 'behind scenes' experience in local government, TV production

BU TV televises Town meeting

While much of Northeastern Pennsylvania was tuned in to "Jeopardy" or "PM Magazine," the residents of the Bloomsburg area had the rare opportunity to observe their town government in action — via television.

In a joint effort between the Bloomsburg Town Council and Bloomsburg University's Television Services Department, live coverage of the council's February 9 session was broadcast on Service Electric Cable TV Channel 13.

Tom Joseph, director of BU TV Services, used past experiences as the foundation for the Bloomsburg broadcast. Joseph says he had lived in Pittsburgh and viewed many of that city's council meetings via television. "And so I thought," he says, "Well, why not here? It's a small town, and most people know the council members. There's quite a number of homes with cable television, and it just seemed to be a logical thing."

Joseph presented the idea to Town secretary Gerald Depo. "It turns out Depo had thought about this, was familiar with it and was very anxious to do it," says Joseph.

The technical work and production was handled by the combined forces of TV Services and faculty members and students enrolled in the Department of Mass Communications.

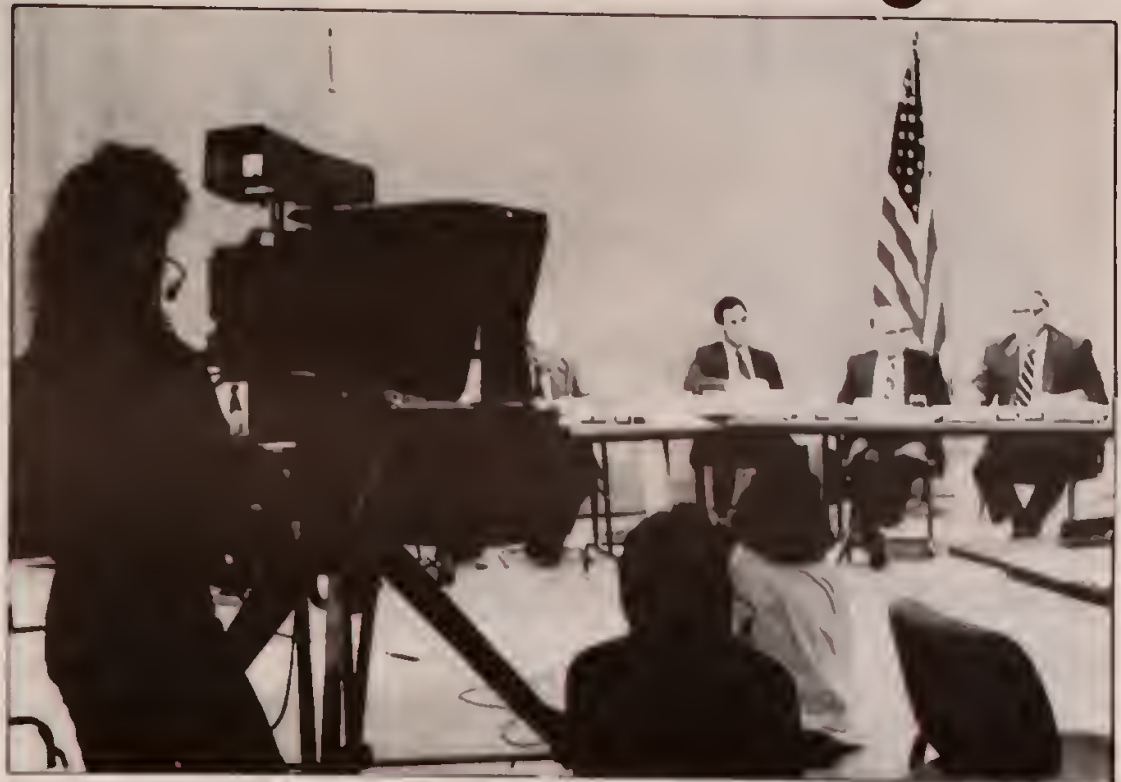
Thirty students staffed the studio during the town council broadcast, serving as everything from production assistant to director. "It was a really good experience for us to see what's really going on in Bloomsburg," says Tina Wolf, a senior who operated cameras during the broadcast.

Patrick Loftus, a junior who was a floor manager, adds, "We got solid practical experience on all the equipment. We also got to see how the council works."

The council members seemed equally pleased with the results of the evening. Councilman Stephen Beck, a BU math professor, noted, "Considering that BU had a bunch of amateurs here, we all did very well. The staff was very professional and cooperative."

studio to construct and air a 30-minute local news program.

Not only is the program good experience for the students, but it also presents useful and interesting information to the community in a professional manner. Professor William Acerno, executive producer of "Bloom News," believes town residents may view BU students in a different light after watching any one of the student-staffed productions.

"They're doing programs that are 'real world' television programs; they're not just class projects. This is hands-on, front line experience," says Joseph. "It's a very competitive job market in television, and any piece of experience is a real advantage."

Telethons are yet another vehicle available for the students. The American Cancer Society's telethon was broadcast live from two locations in November, and

students also staffed the Easter Seals telethon scheduled in March.

"We've really just scratched the surface," says Joseph, who believes 1987 "will bring a better mix of community, academic, and University activity related programming."

He said the department is studying the feasibility of offering academic courses by cable transmissions. He also noted that "programs which bring University functions to the public are a strong possibility." They could include sporting events such as football, basketball and wrestling competition.

Television Services are also doing something for alumni; they are making video tapes of commencement exercises which are made available to graduates and their families through the Alumni Association.

New magazine debuts

Area residents and the university community can read how the Town of Bloomsburg's top official moved away from his hometown and returned to make good, and how a nearby police chief returned to active duty after being forced into disability retirement.

These stories, along with other articles and features, are found in a new community magazine, *Spectrum*, published by Walter Brasch's journalism seminar in the fall semester. *Spectrum* will be published each semester at a newsstand price of one dollar.

Brasch says this is a first-time effort of this nature by the university and was not undertaken to compete with any area publications. "Our main objective is to give journalism students valuable experience.

"They are learning about design and typography, editorial decision-making, advanced feature writing, administration, business, circulation and advertising."

Students are graded on their production work, their writing, and a take-home exam which is a series of case problems in ethics.

Financing for the magazine comes almost entirely from advertising and circulation revenues, according to Brasch. "I believe students must realize that in a capitalist society, even the best ideas and writing must have a strong financial base. We don't seek subsidies but are working closely with area businesses for

advertising.

"We have enough different assignments to keep everyone in the course busy," Brasch says. "All typesetting is done on campus using a computer and laserprinter, plus a Compugraphic MCS system for special heads. All design and paste-up is also done by students.

"Although the actual printing is done by a local printer, students do the folding, gathering, stitching and trimming."

Brasch, who is editor-in-chief, describes the seminar as a high-stress, extensive lab experience, but says the students are having a lot of fun in the venture.

"We have important roles for everyone, so we give titles to everyone," he says. "We're an equal opportunity employer," he adds with a smile.

"We put in very long days on the project, but the students seem to be challenged and thoroughly enjoy it," he observes.

This semester the class intends to double the magazine's 32 pages and its circulation.

Although the council followed the same basic structure it uses during its usual meetings, there were subtle differences. Perhaps, some observers noted, the meeting was a bit more serious; there were occasional nervous glances toward the camera, along with the increased appearance of suitcoats and ties.

Even Bloomsburg Mayor Dan Bauman felt pangs of nervousness. "At first, when all the lights come on, it gives you a kind of funny feeling," said Bauman, "but I think the whole council got right into it, and it didn't bother us too much."

The future of televised council meetings depends on how the initial broadcast was received by the public. However, Bauman felt it might be harder for some people to attend the meetings if the meetings were moved to the campus on a regular basis.

The Bloomsburg Town Council broadcast joins several other already-established programs which follow a community service program.

"One of the things we try to do with the Television Services Department, since it has the transmitter cable," says Joseph, "is to try to do things that have some kind of community tie-in because what we do goes directly into the home."

"Bloom News," the local news program broadcast Friday evenings on Channel 13, is a prime example of programming directed to the community. However, "Bloom News" differs from the council broadcast because it actually is a class. Instead of just learning from a book, students apply the theories through hands-on experience. Students select the story ideas, go on location to report and film the story, and return to the

The Pennsylvania State Board of Nursing recently voted to retain full approval of the BU bachelor of science degree program in nursing.

The latest approval followed a three-day survey visit by State Board representatives who verified the university's compliance with State Board rules and regulations for baccalaureate nursing programs.

The visit resulted in commendations for 16 changes and improvements made in the program since the previous evaluation in 1982, according to Dorette Welk, nursing department chair.

Total spring enrollment for 1987 is 6,609, up from 6,330 students in 1986 and 6,193 in 1985. The total FTE (full-time equivalent) is 5,917 students.

M. Christine Alichnie, associate professor in the department of nursing, has completed requirements for a Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania.

The University received a \$10,000 bequest from Anna Miller Freyermuth, Class of 1923. A resident of Easton, Mrs. Freyermuth died October 4, 1986.

Melissa Piper Nelson, a Penn State graduate and Benton area native, has been named director of publications at BU. It is a new position in the Office of University Relations.

Nelson will serve as the resource person in the design, writing, editing and printing of the various university publications.

Seven faculty members have been asked by President Ausprich to serve on a steering committee to prepare for the Middle States evaluation of Bloomsburg University in 1989.

Committee members are Barrett Benson (chemistry), Dennis Hinde (mass communications), Scott Miller (library), David Minderhout (philosophy and anthropology), Nancy Onuschak (nursing), John Scrimgeour (counseling), and Robert Yori (accounting).

Two BU faculty members will retire later this year. William V. Ryan, director of library services since August 1973, will retire at the end of the 1986-1987 academic year.

Robert B. Hessert, associate professor of psychology, will retire July 3 after 15 years at BU.

Clark B. (Pat) Patterson of Bloomsburg recently came across an item he saw in a newspaper years ago:

"It seems hard to believe, but curiously enough, it's true — back in the 90s, Harry Butts played 28 straight football games — without taking time out — for the State Normal School of Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania — wearing an artificial leg!"

A BU committee has been named to prepare an institutional policy on AIDS and a set of procedures for dealing with the disease should it occur on campus. One of the principal charges of the committee will be to map out an AIDS education plan for the university community.

The 25-hour dance marathon in late February, sponsored by the BU Kehr Union Program Board, benefitted Camp Dost, a summer camp for children with cancer.

Recent appointments to the faculty and staff include Winona J. Cochran, instructor of psychology; Austin J. Hoffman, assistant professor of marketing and management; Jonnelle M. DePetro, instructor of philosophy and anthropology; Eric Van, admissions counselor; William A. Koch, resident advisor in student life; Thomas Aletto, instructor of philosophy and anthropology; J. Stephen Buckley, assistant professor of marketing; Stephen R. Couch, assistant professor of sociology and social welfare; Thomas G. Miller, instructor of philosophy and anthropology; Robert Reeves, assistant professor of marketing and management; and Linda Slocum, instructor of languages and cultures.

BU's 23rd annual reading conference will be held April 23 and 24 at the Sheraton Danville Inn.

The Bloomsburg University Foundation, Inc., recently approved funding for three academic proposals totaling more than \$9,000.

They included \$3,000 to the Center for Instructional Systems Development, \$3,000 for faculty development workshops, and \$3,141 for the purchase of a microscope and an incubator for use in laboratory work.

President Ausprich has implemented an interim governance structure following an early December vote by the BU faculty that defeated a proposed governance plan prepared by a committee appointed last year.

A committee to prepare a permanent governance structure proposal has been convened by the co-chairs of Meet and Discuss. The committee has been charged with presenting a proposal for vote by the end of the spring semester.

President Ausprich and six other presidents of institutions of higher education from across the country spoke on the role of state colleges and universities in the economic development of their regions at a meeting of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities held in Phoenix, Arizona.

They emphasized that the universities can play a significant role in the economic development of their regions through close interaction with the business community and government as well as activities the institutions can undertake themselves.

Six faculty from the College of Arts and Sciences were elected to serve on the search and screen committee for dean of the college.

Serving on the committee are Riley Smith (English), Karl Beamer (art), James Pomfret (math/computer science), James Cole (biology/allied health sciences), Sue Jackson (sociology/social welfare) and David Minderhout (philosophy/anthropology).

When a giant snowstorm closed the University for a day and a half in January, it was only the second time in at least half a century.

"It was closed one day in the 1950s, I recall, the only day for a storm in the 29 years I was there," said John Hoch, retired administrator and faculty member. He said the late Harvey Andrus, the former college president who came to Bloomsburg in 1931, never mentioned any other closing because of weather conditions.

A very successful Christmas luncheon was held by the Philadelphia Chapter on December 13 at John Wanamaker's in that city. Representing the university were President Ausprich, Tony Ianiero (director of development), Doug Hippenstiel '68 (director of alumni affairs), Brian Trusty and Wendi Hamer (Husky Ambassadors). Mary Anne Klemkosky '59, president of the Alumni Association, and her husband, Ron, also attended the luncheon.

Catherine Richie, a receptionist in the Kehr Union for 16 years before retiring in 1985, died on February 22.

Survivors include her husband, Neil M.; two sons, Neil and Joe; and two grandchildren.

The BU passing combination of quarterback Jay DeDea and tight end Kevin Grande were named to the 1986 Associated Press Little All-American Team.

Maynard P. Mordan, a former teacher at the Bloomsburg State Normal School, died recently in Bloomsburg.

"Football News" magazine has selected BU nose guard Wes Cook to its 1986 All-American honorable mention unit. In his four years with the team he had 222 tackles, 120 of them unassisted. He was also responsible for 20 quarterback sacks.

BU appears often in the final 1986 NCAA Division II football statistics. The Huskies, who finished the season 7-2-1 under first-year head coach Pete Adrian, had three individuals receive recognition, while the team was included among the nation's passing leaders.

The balance in the offense was evidenced in that runningback Tom Martin was one of Division II's top rushers, while quarterback Jay DeDea was listed near the top in total offense.

Martin averaged 91.8 yards per game, rushing 183 times for 918 yards in the Huskies' 10 contests. The junior was the team's leading scorer as well with eight touchdowns. DeDea ran a school-record 439 offensive plays, gaining 2,189 yards, an average of 218.9 per game. The duo was credited for a combined 3,187 yards, which includes 80 yards in receptions for Martin. DeDea's passing yardage, along with Martin's yards on the ground, accounted for all but 251 of Bloomsburg's offensive yards in 1986.

Kicker Chris Mingrone was the other Bloomsburg performer among the national leaders as he averaged 1.0 field goals per game. He connected on 10 or 20 attempts, the longest of the season was 41 yards.

As a team, the Huskies were one of the best passing teams in the nation, gaining 235.3 yards per game in the air.

Signals from satellite map weather

There's no one in the room at 4 a.m., but the printer noisily begins spewing out maps showing wind direction, cloud cover, and other weather conditions. Joe Pifer, associate professor of geography and earth science, arrives on campus to analyze the maps long before many faculty and staff members have left home for their day's work. By 7:30 a.m., he has the day's forecast recorded and ready to play over the phone to anyone in the Bloomsburg community on BU's 24-hour weather service.

The map printer is part of the newly purchased Micro Earth Station, a satellite receiving station in Hartline Science Center. The National Weather Service sends signals to a satellite 22,000 miles up in space. The satellite then sends out signals that are picked up by receiving dishes like the one on the roof of Hartline.

THE SATELLITE DISH AND PRINTER, purchased by the Department of Geography and Earth Science, were established in early December 1986 by Alden Electronics, a Massachusetts electronics firm. Although the satellite hook-up cost was nearly \$5,700 to purchase and install, it is much more cost-effective than the previous system of collecting map information, according to Pifer. Previously, maps were obtained via an expensive 24-hour phone line to Allentown that cost more than \$2,000 a year. Pifer says the satellite is by far a more efficient system.

Pifer, with the help of students, has been operating the weather station and 24-hour weather service for the past six years. Tucked into a small room in Hartline Science Center, the station is equipped with the map printer as well as instruments and monitors connected to weather equipment on Hartline's roof.

Pifer analyzes National Weather Service maps and regionalizes that information for the area. He then checks with the National Weather Service at Avoca Airport, where he has spent considerable research time during two summer sabbaticals, to make sure that his prediction is on base. Combining the maps and local conditions such as temperature, wind speed and pressure, he has found that his daily forecasts are correct more than 90 percent of the time. Long-range forecasts tend to be a bit less accurate but are still in the 80 percent range.

THE WEATHER SERVICE OPERATED only one incoming phone line for weather inquiries until the School of Extended Programs financed an expansion. Today, the weather service, still supported by Extended Programs, has a five-line capacity. There are currently three phone lines in operation to handle the 250 average calls per day. Pifer says he has seen as many as 700 calls come in when a major storm is due.

Pifer often receives calls from travellers or people who need special reports about specific locations. Because weather data are kept on record dating back to 1970, Pifer can fulfill requests for past weather reports needed for insurance or legal purposes.

By calling one of the three numbers — 389-2200, 389-2300 or 389-2400 — anyone in the Bloomsburg vicinity, from farmers to faculty, can hear updated, pre-recorded forecasts from the BU 24-hour weather service. The message runs five days a week, and a weekend summary plays Friday through Sunday.

Alumni invited to join theatre trip to London

Alumni are invited to participate in a London theatre trip in May which is being planned by Dr. Susan Rusinko of the BU English Department. The group leaves Bloomsburg by bus on May 15, flies from Newark on Virgin Airlines, and returns to Bloomsburg on May 23.

HOTEL: Royal National Hotel on Russell Square in the Bloomsbury section of London, near the British Museum (now called British Library) and within walking distance of shopping and theatre areas.

MEALS: Continental breakfast. One or two teas or lunches in a London home, with actors, directors, writers and other members of the theatre profession.

CREDIT OPTION: Students with any major can earn three credits which involve (1) individual consultations with Dr. Rusinko before the trip regarding paper topics and reading assignments; (2) a term paper of 10-12 pages on a topic of the student's choice after consultation. The topic may be related to a student's major, whether it be literature, finance, psychology, history, sociology or others. Papers are due by June 12, 1987.

COST: \$1,090 (plus tuition of \$210 paid separately by credit students) or \$1,090 plus \$25 attendance fee paid separately by non-credit participants.

BU's appeal remains strong

In this day of rising education costs and a declining number of high school graduates, Bloomsburg University receives four-and-one-half applications for each freshman opening for the ensuing school year and reaches student capacity by mid-March or early April.

Bloomsburg has been in this unique position since about 1978, according to Tom L. Cooper, dean of enrollment management. "It was at that time we decided, due to the size of our physical plant and projected faculty numbers, that we should limit our full-time undergraduate enrollment to around 5,000 students and our overall enrollment to around 6,400," Cooper said.

Bloomsburg gets about 4,800 to 5,000 applications for approximately 1,100 freshman openings. "This year, we did let the bars down a little and took about 80 more freshmen than we have normally been taking. Our close-off date for accepting applications for the 1986-1987 school year was March 15," Cooper said.

Several primary reasons point to why Bloomsburg has an excellent application response, according to Cooper. Academic programs are carefully selected and have resulted in a high placement rate of graduates. In the early 1970s, Bloomsburg's enrollment was composed of approximately 70 percent teacher education students. Since then, to keep abreast of changing employment trends, the university has increased its offerings in liberal arts and business areas along with the professional fields. Particular emphasis has been placed on the move into the technological age. As a result, since 1980, Bloomsburg has placed over 80 percent of its graduates in job-related fields.

Another factor for BU's high number of freshman applications is the reasonable cost of a four-year college education due to substantial public support. Being one of 14 state-owned universities in the State System of Higher Education, approximately 40 percent of the university budget is supplied by the Commonwealth and the balance by student fees, grants and others. It costs approximately \$4,000 a year for a student living on

campus at Bloomsburg, which is a little less than half of the average yearly cost at most private schools.

A well-administered financial aid program at the state and federal levels has permitted around 75 percent of the student body to participate in grant, loan or work study assistance, according to Thomas Lyons, BU financial aid director. What effect the Higher Education Amendment of 1986 will have on this percentage cannot be determined at this time, he said.

Bloomsburg enjoys a better-than-average retention of students. Cooper attributes this to a number of factors. Students are involved in scheduling a variety of events such as concerts, plays, contests, stage performers, bazaars and craft shows.

Cooper thinks the comprehensive summer orientation sessions for incoming students are crucial in helping them get the greatest possible benefit from their college education.

The Career Development Center offers career counseling and planning services to all BU undergraduates, graduate and continuing education students, and alumni. The Center for Counseling and Human Development assists students in developing human growth potential and in adjusting to campus services through individual, group and workshop formats.

The Center for Academic Development exists to equalize educational opportunity for students regardless of their economic background or status. Tutorial services are also available to all students.

Another attraction at Bloomsburg for students and their parents is its campus. Dr. Robert Parrish, vice president for administration, points out that a large percentage of the buildings on both the lower and upper campuses have been built since the mid-1960s and are tailored to student needs. Buildings are well maintained, and an on-going beautification plan has resulted in a well-kept campus, he added.

Bloomsburg is accessible to commuting students from nearby rural communities and to students using interstate highways to come from greater distances.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
ALUMNI ASSOCIATION
BLOOMSBURG STATE COLLEGE
BLOOMSBURG UNIVERSITY
Amended April 25, 1981
and June 6, 1987

ARTICLE I

Name, Location and Object

Section 1. This corporation shall be known as the ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF BLOOMSBURG STATE COLLEGE UNIVERSITY, INC.

Section 2. *The business of the Association shall be conducted at Bloomsburg State College, Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, where all its meetings shall be held.*

Section 3. It is the object of the Association to promote the cause of education by fostering and maintaining among its members a spirit of cooperation with the Administration, Faculty, Staff and Students of BSC BU.

ARTICLE II

Government and Officers

Section 1. Elective Officers. The elective officers of this Association shall be a president, a vice president, a secretary and a treasurer, each of whom shall be elected for a period of one year by majority vote of those in attendance at the annual reorganization meeting of the Board as provided in this Constitution and By-Laws.

In order to provide fiscal continuity, the tenure of the treasurer will not be restricted. The treasurer will serve *ex-officio* and will not be counted as one of the voting members of the Board.

Section 2. Alumni Board. The Alumni Board shall consist of *twenty-one* twenty-four members beginning April 26, 1975 June 6, 1987. *Seven members to serve for a period of three years, seven members to serve for a period of two years, seven members to serve for a period of one year.* On that date, ten members shall be elected, with five to serve two-year terms and five to serve one-year terms as determined by drawing lots. Thereafter, *seven* twelve members shall be elected each year to serve a term of *three* two years. A member may be elected for one two additional *three-year* two-year terms. *at the completion of his/her first three-year term. Beginning in 1981 no person may serve more than two full three-year terms in continuity. Beginning in 1987 no person may serve more than six years in succession. After a lapse of one year, said individual may be elected again to the Board in conformance with this Constitution, as heretofore stated. Retiring directors may be elected to honorary life memberships on the Board of Directors if they have served at least five three-year terms or a total of 15 14 years on the Board. Honorary life members of the Board shall not be counted in determining the presence of a quorum, nor shall they have a vote in matters before the Board.*

Section 3. A president may succeed himself/herself at the discretion of the nominating committee and subsequent election at the annual reorganization meeting of the Board. *However, if he/she retires as president, by virtue of his/her office, shall automatically become an ex-officio member of the Alumni Board for a term of one year, such year to be the year following the term of office as president. A president whose regular term on the Board has expired shall automatically become an ex-officio member of the Board for one year.*

Section 4. Any vacancy occurring in any office or in any position as Board members, during the interval between annual meetings, shall be filled by a majority of the remaining members of the Board, for a term to expire at the next annual meeting of the members. Any vacancy which may occur in any position of the Board at the time of any annual meeting shall be filled by a majority vote of the members for the unexpired term of the vacancy involved.

Section 5. The Board may authorize the election of such additional officers as may be deemed necessary. Likewise, the Board may declare any position vacant when the person in that position is absent without reason for three or more consecutive meetings.

Section 6. The President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer shall serve on the Executive Committee. The Alumni Director will serve as an *ex-officio* member. The Executive Committee will meet prior to all Board of Directors meetings to prepare and discuss the agenda.

Section 7. The President and Vice President will serve as *ex-officio* members on all committees as set forth in Article VIII, Section 2.

Section 8. When requested by the university, the President and Alumni Director will jointly appoint a member/members of the Board of Directors to represent the Alumni Association.

ARTICLE III

President

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association and of the Board of Directors and shall perform such other duties as the Association or Board of Directors may assign to him/her. He/she shall sign all written contracts of the Association or designate the Director of Alumni Affairs, in writing, to sign in his/her place. In the President's absence, the Vice President shall assume and perform his/her duties.

ARTICLE IV

Secretary

Section 1. The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the Association and the Board of Directors and shall record the minutes of said meetings. He/she shall

be custodian of the seal of the corporation.

ARTICLE V

Treasurer

Section 1. *The Treasurer shall receive and deposit all fees, dues, contributions and other funds of the corporation and shall keep the same in a bank account or investments in the name of the corporation. He/she shall keep the accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and shall report thereon at each regular meeting of the Board of Directors, or whenever so required. The Treasurer shall be responsible for handling the financial affairs of the corporation. He/she shall prepare financial statements and shall report thereon at each regular meeting of the Board. He/she shall pay all bills when certified for payment by the Director of Alumni Affairs or the President or Vice President or Secretary of the Association. In the Treasurer's absence, the Secretary of the Association is authorized to sign checks. A board member shall be designated by the Board to sign checks and vouchers in the Treasurer's absence. The Association shall secure a bond to cover officers and employees who handle Association funds in the performance of their duties.*

ARTICLE VI

Board of Directors

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall have general charge and sole management and control of all the funds and property of the corporation, and shall carry out its purposes, subject to the By-Laws. *It shall submit at each annual meeting or have published in the Quarterly, affairs of the Association. It shall report on the activities of the Association at each annual meeting or in THE ALUMNI QUARTERLY.*

Section 2. The regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at least four times a year. Special meetings shall be called by the order of the President or upon the written request of any two members of the Board. A majority of the Directors shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Said Board shall have power to frame rules for its own regulation and transaction of business.

Section 4. *The Executive Committee shall be made up of the elected officers, the Director of Alumni Affairs, and any others so designated by the Board.*

ARTICLE VII

Director of Alumni Affairs

Section 1. The Director of Alumni Affairs of the College University shall be responsible for planning and coordinating all the activities of the Association. He/she will organize and implement alumni-related programs on campus, *direct* assist with fund-raising drives, have editorial responsibilities for various publications and serve either as *Chairman* chairperson or as a member of campus alumni affairs committees.

He/she shall be responsible directly to the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the BSC Bloomsburg University Alumni Association on matters solely of Association nature. He/she shall coordinate all alumni activities and report to the *BSC Vice President for Administration* Bloomsburg University Vice President for Institutional Advancement.

He/she shall confer with administrators, faculty, students, alumni and the general public to secure support for alumni projects and activities. He/she shall work with organizations at both local, state, and national levels to maintain and upgrade the quality of the total alumni program.

ARTICLE VIII

Committees

Section 1. The President shall appoint, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, such committees from the membership of the Association as he/she may see fit to create for assistance in the performance of his/her duties. The President may delegate to such duly constituted committees the authority to collect, receive, and disburse funds, make necessary expenditures, and to manage the particular activity of the Association delegated to them.

Section 2. *The following standing committees shall be appointed by the Board, viz;*

A. *A Quarterly Publications Committee, whose duty it shall be to stimulate membership by the publication of the Alumni Quarterly and other news bulletins.*

B. *A Property Committee, whose duty it shall be to furnish and maintain Alumni and Trophy Room, and to have custody of and properly care for and preserve all trophies, works of art, furniture, goods, and chattels whatsoever belonging to the corporation.*

C. *Student Loans and Grants Committee, whose duty it shall be to collect, receive, and disburse all contributions, make and collect loans and supervise investments and generally to manage said activity.*

D. *A Budget Committee whose duty it shall be to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.*

The Chairman of each said standing committee shall be elected by the Board of Directors from its own membership and shall consist of such additional members of the Association as shall be appointed by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the Chairman. Each of the said committees shall make an annual report to the Board, and when required shall transfer any part or all of the special funds in its hands to the Treasurer of the Association.

The Chairman of each of said standing committees shall act as treasurer of the funds received and disbursed in connection with the functions of his/her committee, shall keep accurate accounts thereof, and file an annual report of the

same with the Board of Directors two weeks before the annual election; said accounts to be audited by the Board. Said Board at any time may require full reports from said standing committees and shall at all times be at liberty to control and direct the activities of said committee and the use and expenditure of the funds in their hands.

Section 2. The following standing committees shall be appointed jointly by the President and Alumni Director. All Board members will serve on at least three committees.

A. Budget-Finance Committee. This committee will prepare and recommend the annual budget for the Alumni Association and offer recommendations on other financial matters.

B. Student Loans and Grants Committee. This committee will recommend changes in loan policies and procedures as needed; monitor the needs of students and the amount of money available for loans; recommend the amount of money available each year for loans; and recommend additions and deletions in the scholarship program, including amounts of grants and names for new or existing scholarships.

C. Property Committee. This committee will advise and make recommendations regarding the operation of the Alumni House and Alumni Room in Carver Hall as well as recommending action on disposal or acquisition of furniture, equipment, and property.

D. Fund-Raising Committee. This committee will advise and make recommendations on matters pertaining to fund raising projects.

E. Awards and Recognition Committee. This committee will seek, review, and recommend nominations for various awards such as the Distinguished Service Awards and Young Alumni of the Year awards; serve in an advisory and recommending capacity in recognizing individuals as they reach a certain lifetime giving plateau; and assist in planning for recognition of individuals as the need arises.

F. Alumni Weekend/Homecoming Committee. This committee will assist in making plans for Alumni Weekend (e.g. selection of date, programs, and special features; accommodations; pricing the weekend package and per-day costs, and other special features) and Homecoming Weekend (e.g. reception after football game; selecting location for dinner; menu selection; program; and other special features).

G. Alumni Chapters/Student Relations. This committee will assist in developing policies and principles for the alumni Chapter program; assist in developing the schedule of Chapter meetings each year; advise the Alumni Director concerning programs for Chapter meetings; act as liaison with the Husky Ambassadors and the Student Alumni Association; and to review and recommend programs to involve students in Alumni Association activities.

ARTICLE IX

Membership

Section 1. Membership in the corporation shall be limited to those persons who shall contribute to the corporation for its general purposes as aforesaid, and who shall belong to any of the following classifications:

A. Graduates of the Bloomsburg Literary Institute, of the Bloomsburg State Normal School, of the State Teachers College at Bloomsburg, Pa., and/or of the Bloomsburg State College and/or Bloomsburg University.

B. Former students who were duly enrolled and in regular attendance at any of the said schools for a period of one full school year.

C. All members of the faculties of said schools, past, and present.

D. All members of the Board of Trustees of the College during their tenure of office.

E. Student Alumni membership open to students presently enrolled at BSC.

F. Associate members, i.e., the supportive staff of the College (campus help and staff).

C. All other individuals or groups as recommended and approved by the Alumni Board of Directors for non-voting associate membership.

Section 2. Membership and the right to vote at any meeting of the corporation shall be automatically suspended upon failure to contribute to the support of the Association.

Section 3. A suspended member may be reinstated into full membership upon receipt of a contribution to the corporation.

ARTICLE X

Meetings and Elections

Section 1. There shall be an annual meeting of the corporation on such day of each year as may be designated by the College authorities and the Board of Directors of this Association, as Alumni Day. At such meeting, seven members of the Board of Directors shall be elected. A Nominating Committee, appointed by the President, shall offer a slate of candidates. Nominations may also be made by any member of the corporation at the time of the said meeting. Elections shall be by a viva voce vote of the duly qualified members of the corporation, unless a written ballot is requested by at least five members.

Section 2. The order of business at the annual meetings shall be that generally adopted and followed by corporations similar to this one.

Section 3. Special meetings of the corporation may be called by the President upon the request of the Board of Directors, or upon the written request of any seven members of the Board, or 50 members of the Association. Such request, as well as the notice of any special meeting, shall state the purpose for which the meeting is called, and no subject not so stated shall be considered at such special meeting. Ten days notice of such meetings shall be given to each member by written communication mailed to his or her last named address, or by publication in the quarterly bulletin of the corporation.

ARTICLE XI

Seal

Section 1. The common or corporate seal of the corporation shall be round, inscribed with the name Alumni Association of the Bloomsburg State College University arranged in the form of a circle on the outer edge, and the words Incorporated 1933 arranged across the inside of the circle.

ARTICLE XII

Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at any meeting of the corporation, annual or special, by vote of two-thirds of the members present. At least two months written notice of the proposed amendments shall be given by mail to all members of the Association for whom an address is known, or by publication in THE ALUMNI QUARTERLY. All proposed amendments shall be submitted in writing to the Secretary, accompanied by a request for their adoption by at least ten members.

ARTICLE XIII

Dissolution

Section 1. Dissolution shall mean the ending or termination of the Association as an active organization which shall come about for any reason including legal action, voluntary action on the part of the membership, or for any reason which shall involve surrender or forfeiture of the Charter, but which shall not be limited to these reasons.

Section 2. Upon dissolution of this Association, for any reason, all monies and funds, including obligations then owing to said Association on account of unpaid student loans, all trust funds however held and including the principal and income then due on said funds or to become due thereafter, all bank deposits and accounts and all monies in the hands of or under the control of any officers of the Association, shall, as soon as legally possible, be turned over to and become the property of Bloomsburg State College University, Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, or its successors, and which shall be held by said organization separate and apart from the general College University Funds, monies received from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, or collected from the students thereof. All such funds and monies turned over to the Bloomsburg State College University shall then be administered by the proper officials of said College University and used by them for educational purposes and which purpose shall include, but not be limited to, student loans, scholarships and memorials. In the event that the said Bloomsburg State College University or its successors shall have been dissolved by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or be unwilling or unable to accept them, all properties of this Association shall be turned over to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for similar purposes.

Proposed changes will be voted upon at annual meeting on Alumni Day,
June 6, 1987, in the Scranton Commons, Bloomsburg University.

Athletes do well in classroom, too!

remaining 19.6 percent who didn't graduate left school for personal, financial or other reasons.

The study shows Bloomsburg's female athletes compiled a 3.13 g.p.a., compared with 3.10 for all women during the same time period, while the males averaged 2.62 g.p.a., somewhat below the 2.91 of all men.

"Those results don't surprise me," said Joe DeMelfi, an admissions counselor and the liaison between the university's admissions office and the department of athletics. "We only admit people we feel are capable of succeeding in higher education. We look at athletes as we would any other student. We don't consider them (for admission) if we don't feel they can do the job here."

To be able to "do the job" at Bloomsburg, a student, whether an athlete or not, must graduate in the top half of his or her high school class and attain approximately an 850 Scholastic Aptitude Test score to be even considered for admission, according to James Christy, director of admissions.

"We also look at the academic courses taken in high school," Christy added. "A student must complete at least 16 (credit hours), in some cases 18 credits, in basic courses such as English, math and the sciences."

According to Proposition 64 passed by the NCAA Division II member institutions and conferences at the organization's annual convention in January and set to go into effect in August 1988, students wishing to participate in athletics at the Division II level must first attain at least a 700 SAT score and carry a 2.0 g.p.a. in 11 core curriculum courses in high school. The policy was already in effect at the NCAA's Division I institutions, due to Proposition 48, which was passed two years ago. Those standards are well below those

considered for admission at Bloomsburg.

"Our standards have always been higher than those required by the NCAA," said John S. Mulka, dean of student development, "and we will always try to recruit student athletes with higher-than-minimal academic records. The fact of the matter is, we couldn't get a student athlete into this institution with those standards (established by Proposition 64)."

At the NCAA's recent convention, voting on Proposition 64 among Division II schools was 93-70 in favor, despite strong opposition from about 30 black colleges. Bloomsburg was one of only two of the 14-member Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (SSHE) schools who comprise the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) to vote in favor of Proposition 64.

According to Mulka, the creation of minimal participation standards for athletes at the Division II level will help Bloomsburg athletically. "This will cause some schools that currently have some superior athletes with lower-than-average academic abilities to suffer. If the student cannot participate because of bad grades, that will help us in the long run because some of those athletes may be competing against us now, while all of our athletes already meet those requirements."

Mulka attributes the success of Bloomsburg athletes in the classroom to the lack of special treatment they receive as athletes and to coaches who understand the need for academic success.

"We don't treat our athletes any differently than any other students. We place them in our normal residence halls, not in any specially designed athletic housing, and we try to integrate them into the academic community as quickly as possible, as we do with all of our students," he said.

"We are committed to doing everything within our power to insure that these students receive their education. It is foremost in our minds and most important in our efforts to help our student/athletes achieve their goals," he added. "Also, we don't want our athletes singled out as not being able to do college work."

Christy said, "Coaches here look at retention as well as athletic ability. They don't try to 'sell' us (the

admissions office) a mediocre student because they know that that type of student is not likely to be accepted by us. They are also concerned about an athlete's success academically because they want a player for four years, not just for one."

Chris Moyer, a recent graduate, is just one example of a four-year performer at BU who also enjoyed outstanding success academically. Following the 1986 softball season, Moyer, then a senior pitcher, along with the Huskies' sophomore catcher Cindy Freeland, were selected to the CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-American second team by the College Sports Information Directors of America after achieving high levels of success in the classroom and on the diamond.

According to Jim Hollister, BU sports information director, his office sends out numerous Academic All-American nominations each year.

"The fact that we are able to nominate a high number of our student athletes for various academic awards each year is an obvious indication that they are, indeed, succeeding both academically and athletically," Hollister said.

The competitive nature of Bloomsburg's applicant pool (about 5,500 yearly applications for 1090 spots in the freshman class) is another reason athletes with questionable academic records are not granted admission.

"With that competitive nature, I can't, in good conscience, admit someone who doesn't measure up to our standards just because they're an athlete. I just won't do for an athlete what I wouldn't do for any other student," DeMelfi stated.

Mulka added: "We just don't say that we admit athletes with high academic abilities. This study shows that, in fact, we do it. Our student athletes are academically qualified and are doing just as well as our total population."

Bloomsburg's athletes have shown that accomplishments both on and off the field can indeed go hand in hand. Over the past several years, the school's 18 varsity athletic teams have been among the winningest programs in the PSAC. The most recently completed campaign saw Bloomsburg athletics capture more than 60 percent of the events in which its teams participated.

New lecture series underway

Bloomsburg University initiated a new Provost's Lecture Series this semester which features presentations by six speakers whose topics range from astronomy to education to civil rights.

This inaugural series brings to the university individuals with national perspectives on a variety of topics of interest to students, faculty, staff members and area residents, according to Dr. Daniel Pantaleo, interim provost and academic vice president.

"The series is a combined effort on the part of several campus groups," he said. "Whether one is interested in current issues in higher education, foreign relations, the arts, science or history, at least one topic or speaker should be stimulating."

The series began February 3 with B. Gentry Lee, NASA engineer and co-producer of Carl Sagan's "Cosmos" series, talking about "Man and the Cosmos."

Sharon I. Sopher, TV journalist and film producer, discussed "Witness to Apartheid" on February 11.

New York Times correspondent Harrison Salisbury, an expert of the Soviet Union, China and Southeast Asia, discussed "U.S.-Soviet Relations" on March 4.

The next speaker, distinguished historian and civil rights leader Mary Berry, will speak on "Liberty and Justice for All?" on March 26.

Metropolitan Opera soprano Roberta Peters, in conjunction with her concert on April 8, will conduct master classes and workshops.

The last speaker in the series will be Harold Delaney, educator and expert on national issues affecting higher education, who will present "Preparing for a Republic of Learners" on April 23.

President Ausprich has been travelling throughout the state visiting members of the Council of Trustees in their home areas. 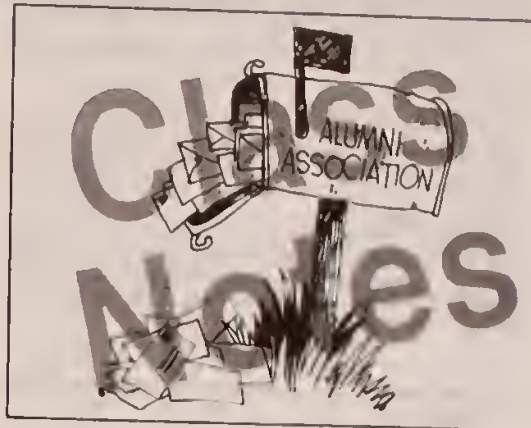

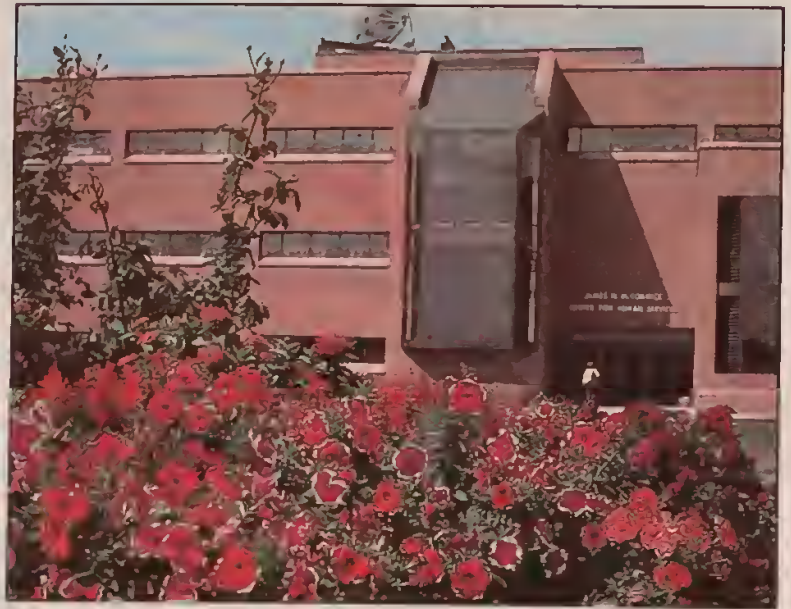

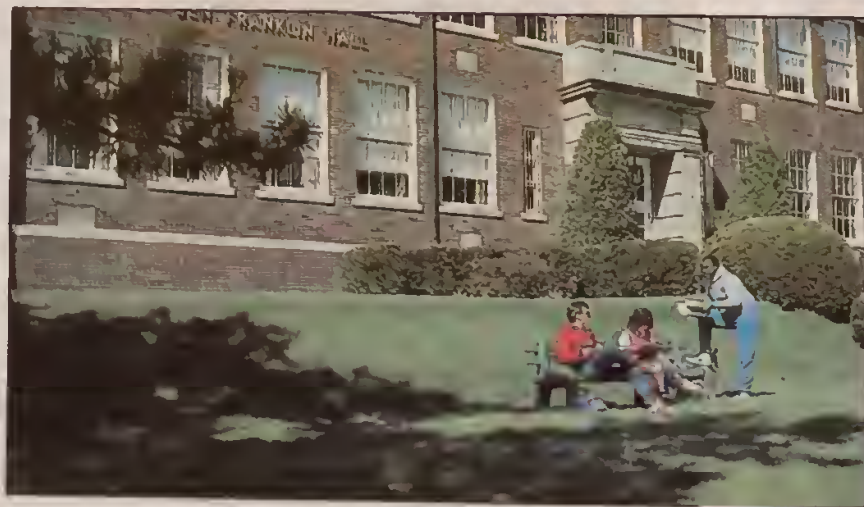

When John Sabol was a student at Mahanoy Area High School, one of his teachers told him he wouldn't amount to much.

Boy, did he fool her!

In the 20 years since he left school, Sabol has been an archaeologist-anthropologist, a guard at the Russian Embassy, an army sergeant, military technician, border guard, policeman, reporter, fighter and Viking.

A Viking?

Actually, Sabol is a professional archaeologist-anthropologist. His other jobs were on a Paramount movie set in Mexico, where he worked as an extra and has had small speaking roles.

While employed as a professor in the Mexican national education system in 1983, Sabol heard auditions were being held for extras for the film "Dune" at Churubusco Azteca, one of the world's largest movie studios.

On a lark, he went to the set, auditioned, and was told he would hear from the movie company if they were interested in his services.

Sabol said he thought that was the beginning and end of his movie career, but about three weeks later he was called and offered the role.

In "Dune," which stars Jose Ferrar, Max Von Sydow and the rock singer Sting, Sabol has five different parts.

"My face was only seen in one. In the other four roles I wore masks," Sabol said. He also worked on special effects where he was one of 10 people pulling different parts of a monster.

Because there was plenty of action on the film, some of the voices were not as clear as they should have been, and Sabol's voice was dubbed in. His voice was also used for the Mexican actors who had small speaking parts.

Sabol's one speaking part and about 30 other scenes

ended up on the editing room floor when the five-hour film was cut down to a two and a half hour show, but the acting bug had bitten him.

Since then, he has had speaking roles in many American and Mexican films and has been featured on television commercials.

Although Sabol said he enjoyed working on all films, he especially liked working with Sylvester Stallone on "Rambo II."

"A lot of people are confused about Stallone and perceive him to be different from what he actually is," Sabol said. "He has a lot of savvy about the job he wants done."

Sabol said when some of the big name actors are involved in filming, they keep to themselves and do not mingle with others on the set.

Stallone was not like that. Sabol said Stallone would laugh, joke, talk and readily pose for pictures when he wasn't filming, but when the cameras began to roll he could immediately get serious.

While filming "The Falcon and the Snowman" with Timothy Hutton and Sean Penn, Sabol had his own trailer. Some days he got a 6 a.m. call and had to wait around until late afternoon when he was called.

In "Conan the Barbarian II" with Arnold Schwarzenegger and Grace Jones, Sabol was a soldier guarding Jones in the desert while she was attempting to escape.

"The scene we were filming is three minutes, but it took us three days to film it," Sabol said. He said Jones used a wooden club, and "she played it for real," injuring several people. Sabol said he was hit on the head a few times but was luckier than one of the other extras who received a severe eye injury.

In another film, "Benny and Beauford," Sabol portrays a reporter who interviews Joe Frazier.

Sabol said often the movie titles are changed when they are released, and he doesn't get a chance to see the film.

"You don't know the whole story, and they kind of keep you in isolation while you are filming," he said. Some of the first scenes that are worked on are from the end of the film, so it is difficult to get a handle on just what the story involves, he said.

Such was the case in "On the Wings of Eagles," the five-hour NBC mini-series, in which Sabol played a guard at the American Embassy. He said he was amazed when he saw the finished product.

Sabol describes himself as being shy and introverted and said if there ever was an unlikely actor it is he.

"The best actors in the world are shy," said Sabol. "Most actors are Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde, and their personalities change when they are before a camera — they get more aggressive."

Sabol said he could do a lot more acting if he was willing to give up his duties as a professor of archaeology-anthropology at a Mexican university.

He said he has about six months to go until he will be in Mexico five years, and then he will receive residency papers. With the residency papers, he will be an American citizen with the same rights as Mexican citizens and will be free to come and go as he pleases and will no longer have to report to the government.

When working on "Rambo II," he took three weeks off from school while other professors handled his duties. In his administrative position, Sabol is in charge of 35 teachers and is the first American to head the department.

RUSSELL HORN '75 was featured in an article in the Sunday Pocono Record, Stroudsburg, written by Fred Seitz:

Russell Horn is a Tannersville native who's spent much of his near 10-year career as a physician's assistant not far from home — but he's explored a few out-of-the-way avenues along the way, and has a few more planned.

Horn, who calls those explorations "opportunities," recently returned to this area after a 10-month stay in Newport, R.I.

"I had an opportunity to get some administrative experience," he says, "and to help coordinate and set up an occupational health service at Newport Hospital."

After having christened the project, Horn set out to do some sailing. That was another reason he'd chosen Newport: "I always wanted to live near the sea at some point."

But the sailing wasn't meant to be. "People were nice enough there," he recalls, laughing. "Someone was always saying, 'Well, let's get together. Come on out on my boat.' And I'd say, 'Sure, okay.' But for some reason, we never did it."

It doesn't take long in conversation with Horn to realize that he's uncomfortable with banter like that, about promises others don't intend to keep.

"I would say that I'm an aggressive person in certain respects. I mean that, when I believe in something, I'm a real go-getter. Newport was really an example of that. The reason I went up there was to get a good viable strong program off the ground. And I got to do that."

Horn grew up in Tannersville and graduated from Pocono Mountain High School. He went from there to Bloomsburg University, where he majored in biology. He wasn't sure at the time where a biology degree would lead him; but he'd known for many years that it wouldn't likely be into a medical school.

"I was the son of a doctor," he says. "I used to see the kind of hours he had to work, and how little time he had for himself."

His father, Dr. Edward T. Horn, retired to Florida not long ago, having practiced for many years in Pocono Summit, and in Pocono Hospital's Emergency Outpatient Department.

And although Horn didn't quite follow in his father's footsteps, father and son wound up working alongside one another for several years in the hospital's emergency department — and doing many of the same things.

That was several years after Horn had completed the physician's assistant program at Hahnemann College. And it was a comfortable enough arrangement.

"Actually, it was great. The schedule was great, and the work was great. In an emergency room, there's always a variety, always something new."

Before that, Horn had spent his first two years as a new P.A. graduate doing anything and everything in a medical clinic in center-city Philadelphia.

And, between the time he left the emergency department at Pocono Hospital for Newport, Horn had worked in a family practice in York for two years and on Pocono Hospital's psychiatric service for three years.

Part of that job entailed some of the more interesting experiences he's had, before and since.

"One day a week I worked in the state penitentiary in Dallas, Pa. My job was to evaluate them and their medications, and find out if they were stable.

"But I'll never forget the first time I went up alone. Here you're walking into a maximum security prison, thinking that you're going to be well protected. But you're walking through this courtyard, and the inmates just come up and walk alongside you — they're murderers, rapists . . .

"I had a leather briefcase at the time, and they started commenting on it, telling me how much money they could get for it on the street."

Horn inferred that if he had been on the street, he would no longer have had the briefcase.

Before long, he got a real feel for other aspects of prison life: "It's a culture within a culture. You get a real feel for what those guys are going through. I knew one guy who'd been in for 40 years, and was due to get out. He was petrified. Prison was all he knew. And he already knew he was going to fail."

The sum effect of Horn's own experiences have been to make him a good listener, something he says he hadn't always been.

These days Horn works with Medical Associates of Monroe County, in another setting with varied opportunities. And in the meantime, he's looking at doctoral programs in clinical psychology, with an eye toward working his way through one.

When he's completed that (as you can expect him to), Horn plans to stay close to home, listening and exploring — and probably doing more sailing than he got to do in Newport.

Teacher honored by Jaycees

Sharon F. Gettel '78 of Rehrersburg has been honored as "Outstanding Young Educator" by the Pennsylvania Jaycees. She was one of 31 teachers nominated by local Jaycees throughout the state.

"This award is special," Gettel said, "because President Reagan named this the year of the teacher in memory of Sharon Christa McAuliffe, who died in the explosion of the shuttle Challenger.

"I'm very excited as a teacher to receive this award. Education is a very important part of this country and its future. It's important to touch and mold the future leaders of the country."

Gettel has been teaching third grade pupils at Jonestown Elementary School in Northern Lebanon School District for nine years. She also is coordinator of intramural sports for fourth, fifth and sixth grade students in the district; coach of junior high school field hockey; and chairwoman of the district health committee.

Although the teaching profession has been criticized in recent years for low pay, Gettel sees other rewards.

"There are many benefits you can't put a dollar sign on. You see the twinkle in their eye when they get the multiplication table or read a whole paragraph without

making a mistake; then it's worth it."

She says she was destined to be a teacher. When she was in first grade, she would come home from school and teach her brother what she learned that day.

"One of my favorite Christmas presents as a child was a blackboard," Gettel recalls. "I would teach my brother or some of my cousins."

Gettel earned a master's degree at Millersville University and completed an administrative internship for principal's certification at Temple University. She expects to receive her principal's certification in May.

"I aspire to be a principal," she says. "It would take me out of the classroom, but it would make me able to touch more children than I would as a teacher."

In high school, Gettel was a Sunday school teacher. As a playground instructor in college, she taught arts and crafts, sports, and conducted a children's version of the Olympics.

At the beginning of each school year, Gettel spends lunchtime with each student in the class in order to get to know them better.

She says she also spends a great deal of time teaching her students about nutrition, sometimes making breakfast for the children or vegetable soup for lunch.

"My students are very important to me," Gettel says. "I'm always concerned about their welcome."

BU gets grant for co-op ed

Bloomsburg University recently received a Title VIII Co-operative Education grant for more than \$68,000 from the U.S. Department of Education. In addition to that amount, the university received a supplemental Title IV grant of \$16,402.

The grants will allow BU to develop its cooperative education program further, according to Peggy Bailey, director of grants.

With the competition for level-entry positions in today's job market so intense, colleges and universities are finding they must provide more than just a good education. Employers increasingly want to see that students have not only done well in their classes, but that they have already gained some real experience. A co-operative education program can do this, according to Ruben Britt, director of BU's co-operative program.

Co-op education is similar to the internship idea, although there are differences. Britt points out that while most internships are unpaid, all co-op interns are paid and students receive class credits.

Competency tests scheduled

BU is one of the sites for the state's first teacher competency tests to be given in June. Beginning June 1, the tests are required of all persons applying for Pennsylvania teaching certificates.

Applicants will take four tests over a two-day period. The tests include general knowledge of social studies, science, literature and fine arts; basic skills of reading, writing and mathematics; professional knowledge of teaching methods and professional practices; and knowledge of the subject area the applicant intends to teach.

There are 37 subject areas in which a teacher can be certified. The tests will be standardized tests, similar to college entrance exams, with one essay question.

Each test will last two hours, and two tests will be given each day. Applicants must pass all four tests to be certified.

The tests are part of an educational reform package adopted in 1984 by the state Board of Education. Current teachers need not take the tests because the state law says the requirements in effect when a teacher is certified are the only ones that may be applied during the teacher's career.

At BU, 263 students received bachelor's degrees in education and 104 received master's degrees in education between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1986.

Panels study grad outcomes

The University Planning Commission and the BU Curriculum Committee heard presentations on outcomes assessment needs and possible future directions during November and December meetings.

Dan Pantaleo, interim provost and vice president for academic affairs, describes outcomes assessment as one way to determine what kind of value is added to a student's life as a result of a college education. While both the Middle States Association and the State System of Higher Education now require a plan for measurement of outcomes, the university has the opportunity to structure its assessment plans to benefit its students and academic programs, he said.

The initial focus of assessment efforts at Bloomsburg will be on the general education program. Such an activity can assist in future efforts to fine tune the general education program, Pantaleo said. He said a faculty committee will look at external testing instruments to find the best one for BU to evaluate the value added to its graduates as a result of the general education component.

The value added in a student's major is already partly assessed via the program reviews which are conducted every five years, he said.

President Ausprich lauds mission statement

In my last message to the alumni I mentioned briefly that the university was developing a new mission statement. Our Council of Trustees at its June meeting reviewed the mission statement and recommended its transmittal to the Board of Governors of the State System of Higher Education for consideration and approval.

The new mission statement reflects Bloomsburg University's strong heritage and poises the institution for the 1990s. The writing of the statement involved the commitment and contributions of many persons and was the result of nearly two years of intensive work.

The work began in 1985, when Dr. Robert Shirley, a well-known expert in the academic strategic planning process, was invited to campus to evaluate our planning process and to present a workshop on strategic planning. His visit with the faculty and administration initiated the new strategic planning process for Bloomsburg University.

The establishment of a Strategic Issues Group provided the leadership to implement the model Dr. Shirley proposed. The Strategic Issues Group, a committee of the university's Planning Commission, was charged with developing for university review a revised mission statement, university goals, subgoals, and suggested implementation strategies for the next five- to ten-year period.

Three task forces — on institutional strengths and weaknesses, environmental scanning assessment, and future directions — were formed to conduct specific studies and to provide final reports. As a part of the work of these task forces, the entire university community participated in the Educational Testing Services Institutional Goals Inventory, and representatives of all university constituencies were selected to respond to a survey of institutional strengths and weaknesses. Economic, demographic, and other data from national, state and regional offices were analyzed to attain a

sense of the ongoing and future trends that will affect the directions of the university's planning efforts.

The task forces returned their reports to the Strategic Issues Group in the fall of 1986, having performed their analyses of the collected data and formulated their recommendations. The group then met with representatives of the task forces and, from analyses of the reports and those meetings, prepared a statement of university goals and suggested implementation strategies for the next five- to ten-year planning cycle. A new university mission statement also was drafted and reviewed by the entire university during the spring 1987 semester. The Strategic Issues Group then incorporated the results of these reviews for presentation to the Planning Commission, which then forwarded them to the president for submission to the Council of Trustees and the State System of Higher Education Board of Governors.

This fall a new group will be formed to develop a five-year strategic action plan based on the new mission statement, the eight major goals, and the accompanying subgoals for achieving our mission.

As part of our mission, the emphasis on a strong liberal arts preparation at Bloomsburg University helps students develop characteristics of mental resourcefulness and responsible self-expression and abilities to think critically, clarify values, and demonstrate problem-solving skills. The university is characterized by openness in communication and involvement in decision making by students, faculty, staff and administration. In this atmosphere students and employees can expect mutual respect, personal and professional enrichment, and accomplishment of common goals.

We have been gratified with the outcome of the work done by the Strategic Issues Group and for the comments and suggestions made by many groups and individuals. We are now eagerly anticipating working with the new planning group and look forward to developing a unique plan for Bloomsburg University.

Trustees pleased by performance

Bloomsburg University's Council of Trustees has formally endorsed the performance of university President Harry Ausprich.

"The trustees of Bloomsburg University have completed a formal review of presidential leadership and have found the office of the president in excellent condition," said John Dorin, chairman of the council. "The trustees heartily endorse President Harry Ausprich's performance and have unanimously recommended an extension of his contract until June 30, 1990."

Act 188 (1982) requires that trustees of universities in the State System of Higher Education conduct an annual review of presidential leadership. This year's review process was guided by a trustee committee consisting of Elbern H. Alkire Jr., of Emmaus, who chaired the committee; Ramona H. Alley of Berwick, John Dorin of Montoursville, and Stanley G. Rakowsky of Clearfield.

"The review committee was impressed by the ground swell of support for President Ausprich from all constituencies," Alkire noted. "In addition, we were pleased with the constructive and collegial approach taken toward the review by the leadership of the constituencies. Their participation and support during the review was most helpful to the trustees, and their input was given full consideration. It is clear that they are interested in helping the president serve the university with increasing effectiveness."

The trustee review committee was assisted by Alice Chandler, president of the State University of New York at New Paltz, who served as a consultant, and by the leadership of six constituencies within the university community.

Constituency representatives included Robert E. Krum, president of the Bloomsburg chapter of AFSCME; Howard K. Macauley and Stewart L. Nagel, co-chairs of the Ad Hoc University Governance Committee; Timothy T. Keffer, president of the university's Community Government Association; Jane S. Gittler, vice chairperson of the Bloomsburg University Foundation; James R. Lauffer, president of the Bloomsburg chapter of APSCUF; J. Calvin Walker, member of the APSCUF executive committee, and Mary Anne Klemkosky, president of the Bloomsburg University Alumni Association.

A detailed formal review is conducted every three years, beginning in the second year of a president's tenure. In the intervening two years, an informal review is conducted by the trustees. The results of these reviews are shared with the president and with the chancellor of the State System of Higher Education. Specific details of the review are not made public, because the process is considered to be a personnel matter and is therefore private, Dorin said.

Alumni council honors legislators

The Pennsylvania Council of Alumni Associations (PCAA) honored 24 state legislators and two Pennsylvania congressmen, all alumni of State System universities, at its second annual Legislative Recognition Dinner held April 27 in Camp Hill.

"Creating the State System of Higher Education took leadership and vision on the part of educators not accustomed to the political process," said Sen. F. Joseph Loeper (R-Drexel Hill), the keynote speaker. Loeper was the prime sponsor of Act 188 of 1982, the legislation which created the state system. He holds a bachelor of science degree from West Chester and a master's degree from Temple University.

Loeper reviewed for guests the evolution of the System, its successes and challenges. "The transition from state-owned colleges to the State System has been smooth and productive. Many of the problems we face we would have faced no matter what the governing structure. But with the cohesiveness of approach, we

can argue that the dimensions of the problems are less than what might have been, and the capacity to respond to them is greater."

Also addressing the group were PCAA President J. Paul McMillen (Mansfield) and State System Chancellor James H. McCormick.

"Graduates of Pennsylvania's publicly-owned universities are spread throughout the nation," said McMillen. "They are corporate executives, scientists, lawmakers and more. Representing the 360,000 graduates of the System, PCAA takes great pride in the contributions made by all of them."

Congressional honorees were U.S. Rep. Robert S. Walker of Lancaster (Millersville), and Rep. W. Curtis Weldon of Upper Darby (West Chester).

Fargo of Grove City (Indiana), Sen. Ralph W. Hess of Spring Grove (Millersville), Sen. H. Craig Lewis of Feasterville (Millersville), Rep. Connie G. Maine of Titusville (Indiana), Rep. Joseph C. Biologist named provost, vice president

Betty D. Allamong, formerly acting dean of the College of Sciences and Humanities at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., assumed the post of provost and vice president for academic affairs at BU on July 1.

Dr. Allamong fills a position left vacant when Larry Jones left Bloomsburg last summer for a position at Morehead State College in Kentucky. Daniel C. Pantaleo served in the position on an interim basis for the 1986-1987 academic year.

"I am pleased to announce the appointment of such a fine academic leader for this second-highest position at the university," said President Harry Ausprich. "Dr. Allamong brings the experience and wisdom she has gained in her positions in administration, teaching and research, and we welcome her to the community."

Dr. Allamong holds a Ph.D. in cellular and molecular biology from West Virginia University in Morgantown. She also earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in biology education at West Virginia. She attended the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University in 1984 and had an administrative internship in the Office of the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Ball State in 1981.

Prior to serving as acting dean at Ball State, Dr.

Allamong was associate dean in the College of Sciences and Humanities for five years. She has held the rank of professor of biology at Ball State since 1981.

She went to Ball State in 1972 as an assistant professor of biology and was promoted to associate professor in 1976. Before going to Ball State, she served as an instructor of biology at West Virginia University from 1967 to 1972 and as a biology instructor in the Morgantown High School from 1961 to 1967.

Dr. Allamong has published numerous articles and several books on topics in biology education and molecular biology. She has held office and served as chairperson in a number of professional

organizations, including the Science in Education Committee of the Indiana Corporation for Science and Technology; the state board of the American Council on Education National Identification Program; the Ball State chapter of Sigma Xi, a national research honorary; the Indiana College Biology Teachers Association; and the Cell Biology Division of the Indiana Academy of Science. She has chaired several National Science Foundation review panels and serves each year as a textbook reviewer for numerous publishers in the areas of cell biology, plant physiology and general biology.

Her memberships include the National Association for Women Deans, Administrators and Counselors; the American Association for the Advancement of Science; Sigma Xi, the Scientific Research Society; the American Society of Plant Physiologists; the Indiana Academy of Science; and several education honorary societies.

The new provost has received a number of awards and honors in her career. She was named Woman of Achievement for Education for 1981 by Women in Communication, Inc.; she was elected to the rank of

Students recognize outstanding faculty

The Arts and Sciences Student Council has announced five recipients of Outstanding Faculty Awards for 1987. The recipients, who were selected by students for uncommon contributions to the university in teaching excellence, scholarly growth and service to the academic community, were Carol Burns, art; Ariane Foureman, languages and cultures; Michael McCully, English; Harry C. Strine III, communication studies; and George A. Turner, history.

In commenting on the selections, John S. Baird Jr., dean of arts and sciences, said, "This year's group of faculty represents an interesting mixture of young scholars and esteemed tenured professors. The liberal arts are an important component to all student curriculums, and these teachers exemplify the brand of excellence to which our university aspires."

During the 1986-87 academic year, Burns has served as a sabbatical replacement instructor in the art department. In teaching five different segments of art instruction, she has been especially enthusiastic about teaching a new course in media in which various aspects of non-traditional approaches to art making have been explored. She coordinated the 1986 fall graduate critique and, in conjunction with this event, presented a slide lecture on her work. In December, 1986 and January, 1987 she had a one-person show at the Hibberd-McGrath Gallery in Breckenridge, Colorado. She helped organize and present a special lunchtime lecture on a local folk artist, and she proposed and secured a special initiative grant from the College of Arts and Sciences to coordinate a collaborative performance art workshop with the theater department. She also served on a committee to promote and develop ideas for the Children's Museum, a traveling museum co-sponsored by the university.

A former chairperson of the department of languages and cultures, Foureman has been at BU for more than 17 years. Her department chairperson, Jorge Topete, noted that she is responsible for innovative courses in French, the establishment of minors in French and Spanish and for significant work in advising students to participate in exchange/internship programs at foreign universities. She has advised the French Club for nearly 14 years and has established business internships in France. In addition to involvement with professional conferences and the National Endowment for the Humanities, Foureman has administered the national French contest for area high school students, organized workshops for students and faculty and worked on the collaborative MBA agreement with the College of Business.

McCully, an assistant professor of English at BU since 1984, has worked to espouse the benefits of both reading and writing in the undergraduate general education curriculum. He has developed an honors course in the humanities and taught "The Artist in Literature" as a special course. While proposing upper division English writing courses, he has included computers in classroom instruction for composition I and II classes. An adviser to "Bloom Magazine," McCully has been published in the Critical Survey publications of both English drama and American popular literature. He has conducted a survey of BU faculty to determine writing assignments

and has written a grant proposal to develop a series of workshops in order to revise the writing requirements at BU.

In his more than 17 years at BU, Strine, an associate professor in communication studies, has been dedicated to the development in everyday skills and encouragement for an appreciation of communication abilities. He has developed courses, including the history of film, and is regarded by his students as a quality teacher, according to Baird. Active at the national level in speech conventions and workshops last year, he was instrumental in bringing the National Forensic Association's 16th annual championship tournament to BU and the state of Pennsylvania for the first time. A chairperson elect of the Forensic Interest Council, he was recently presented with the Collegiate Forensic Association's third annual "Coach of the Year" award. Under his guidance as director of BU's Forensic Society, his students have won numerous individual and team

awards including a recent international first at Montreal and an eleventh place national finish in Wisconsin.

A 22-year veteran on the BU faculty, Turner has served as chairperson of the history department from 1983 to 1987. He was selected to teach courses specifically designed for the University Scholars Program of which he is a member of the advisory committee. He has served as director of the university's Elderhostel Program since 1981 and has been active in numerous student oriented and university-wide committees. Turner developed a new history course titled "Contemporary Issues in United States History", which enables students to see the value of history in dealing with present-day problems. He has published several articles in conjunction with the early coal mining tragedy, Lattimer Massacre, that occurred near Hazleton in 1897. He plans to publish an article and a small book on his current research project, which deals with dissent and opposition to the Civil War in Columbia County.

Alumni fellow in residence

Charles Scarantino left Bloomsburg State College in 1964 with a bachelor's degree in biology. Today, with Ph.D. and M.D. degrees, he is professor and chairman of the Department of Radiation Oncology at East Carolina University.

In April Dr. Scarantino returned to Bloomsburg University to share some of his career experiences with students and faculty. His visit as the third Alumni Fellow in Residence was sponsored by the BU Alumni Association.

A native of Kingston, Dr. Scarantino earned a master's degree in biology and a Ph.D. in cell physiology at St. Johns University in Jamaica, N.Y. He received his M.D. degree from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Winston-Salem, N.C., in 1973.

Prior to assuming his current position, he was an assistant professor of oncology at the University of Rochester Cancer Center (1977-1979), associate professor of radiation oncology at the University of South Alabama (1979-1981) and associate professor of radiation oncology at the Bowman Gray School of Medicine (1981-1985).

Extensive research has been the basis of numerous articles, speeches and other scientific presentations by Dr. Scarantino. His research interests include study of the optimal timing of the administration of radiation and chemotherapy to minimize normal tissue toxicity; predictive non-invasive methods for individualization of cytotoxic therapy in the cancer patient; and clinical application and development of single high dose irradiation (half-body) in combination with chemotherapy in treatment of human tumors.

Dr. Scarantino was certified by the American Board of Radiologists in 1978. He is active in numerous professional organizations at the local, state and national levels.

He is married to the former Mary Colarusso '66. They reside in Greenville, N.C., with their two children, Nadine Joy and Charles Ross.

Nineteen freshman students have been selected for the University Scholars Program at BU, according to Dr. William Baillie, director of the program. Of approximately 160 students eligible for acceptance, 42 applied and 19 were selected.

Eligibility was based upon high school achievement, SAT scores of 1100 or more, and a ranking in the top 20 percent of their graduating class. Once eligible, students were selected on the bases of their application and essay. Personal characteristics and involvement in co-curricular activities were also important in the selection process.

The University Scholars Program, which was initiated in the fall semester of 1986, constitutes the first two years of the students' tenure at the University. The intent of the Scholars Program is to enable academically promising students to reach beyond the limits of a traditional college education and become exposed to challenging learning opportunities commensurate with their abilities. The program seeks to bring students together with other scholarly students who want to make the most of their educational experience at Bloomsburg University.

Although University Scholars have many special programs and services at their disposal, they are also

fully integrated into the mainstream of the campus community so that they may enjoy the same dimensions of University life that other students experience: residence hall living, a wide array of socio-cultural activities, campus leadership opportunities and other co-curricular programs. In short, the Scholars Program offers students a unique blend of collegiate experiences to enrich their lives, broaden their intellectual horizons, and nurture their personal development.

The program is supported financially by the Bloomsburg University Foundation, which has awarded a total of \$10,000 in scholarships to these freshmen scholars without need-based restrictions. The scholarships are applied to the students' tuition in accord with guidelines set forth by the University Scholarship Committee.

Faculty notes

Dr. Bruce E. Adams, professor emeritus, died August 2 at age 70. He taught geography at Bloomsburg for 25 years before retiring in 1980. He had served as chairman of the department and as president of the faculty association.

He graduated from Lock Haven High School, Lock Haven State Teachers College and Penn State. A veteran of World War II, he served in the U.S. Air Force.

Surviving are his wife, the former Gina Montarfi, to whom he was married 42 years; and a son, Bruce E. Adams Jr.

John S. Baird Jr. has been named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences after serving as interim dean for nine months.

In making the announcement, President Harry Ausprich said, "Dr. Baird has displayed excellent academic and administrative skills while serving as interim dean. Although the search committee interviewed a number of outstanding candidates, we are fortunate to have a person of John's capabilities named to the position. Knowing his colleagues and the workings of the university so well will be very advantageous."

Baird, a native of Warwick, N.Y., joined the psychology department of the university in 1971 as an assistant professor. He was promoted to associate professor in 1974 and to full professorship in 1979. He served as department chairperson from 1977 to 1980.

A 1966 psychology graduate of the University of Virginia, Baird received both a master's degree and a doctorate from North Carolina State University in 1969 and 1971, respectively. He is a licensed psychologist for the State of Pennsylvania and a permanent certified psychologist for the New York Education Department.

Since 1978, he has been a consulting psychologist with Pennsylvania Power and Light Co. and in 1980 was a visiting research associate at the Institute of Behavior Science, University of Colorado. He also has done consulting and evaluation for Bechtel Power Corp., Lewisburg Federal Penitentiary and Bloomsburg Family Mental Health Clinic. He taught courses in psychology at North Carolina University prior to coming to BU.

He was selected as an outstanding teacher for 1985-1986 by the College of Arts and Sciences Student Council. He is the author of numerous papers and publications pertaining to his field.

Baird and his wife, Marsha, are the parents of three sons. They reside at Sundale Terrace, Bloomsburg R.D. 5.

The appointments of Nancy Onuschak as interim associate vice president for academic affairs and James Cole as interim assistant dean of the College of Arts and Sciences were recently announced by Betty Allamong, provost and vice president for academic affairs. National searches for both positions will be conducted during the academic year.

Onuschak holds a diploma from Wyoming Valley Hospital School of Nursing and degrees from Wilkes College (B.S., M.S.), Penn State (M.N.S.) and Temple University (Ed.D.).

In her new position, Onuschak is responsible to Allamong and is expected to emphasize an appreciation for the interrelationship of all aspects of the academic

community. Using her interpersonal skills, she will manage and coordinate assigned responsibilities, which include the supervision of the dean of enrollment, director of television/radio programs, director of the Center of Instructional Systems Development, and the recently formed Center for Academic Computing.

Cole received his degrees from Western Michigan University (B.A., M.A.) and Illinois State University (Ph.D.).

He will be called upon to participate in administrative activities, advise the academic dean, and act as his representative when requested. He also will provide student academic services, function as liaison for the dean's office, provide assistance in faculty evaluation and development, and assist in recruitment and affirmative action hiring procedures.

"Both of the appointees have held important administrative positions and have served on numerous university-wide committees, and they are active in community organizations," Allamong said. "We are looking forward to their contributions and assistance during the academic year."

Kalyan Ghosh, vice provost and associate vice president for academic affairs since 1982, assumed a new position as vice president for academic affairs at Worcester (Mass.) State College on August 1.

Howard Macauley, dean of the College of Professional Studies at BU, was among 27 deans of professional studies and school superintendents who visited China in July.

The participants earlier attended a workshop at Western Kentucky University, where delegates from three Chinese provinces outlined their needs for faculty exchange and curriculum innovation.

As a result of that meeting, a federally funded Fulbright-Hays Grant was written for the deans and superintendents to visit China.

As part of the visit, groups of the deans made presentations to administrators and faculty of schools in the three provinces regarding curriculum designs and innovations. They also obtained first-hand information about the needs of the provinces.

Macauley will continue to be involved in curriculum development and faculty exchange with schools he visited.

James E. Parsons, assistant professor and director of the medical technology program in the Department of Biological and Allied Health Sciences, is serving as acting executive assistant to the president until December 31, 1987.

Dr. Parsons replaces Susan Hicks, who has been granted a six-month leave of absence to complete graduate studies for a doctorate in higher education at New York University. Both Parsons and Hicks have been at Bloomsburg since 1982.

Parsons, a native of Lima, Ohio, earned his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. degrees in the Department of Microbiology at Ohio State University. He previously held positions at the University of Akron, Northeastern Ohio University's College of Medicine, Akron General Medical Center, Ohio State, University of Nebraska and the state of Nebraska.

Dr. John Dittrich, dean of the College of Business, and Charles Chapman, chairman of the department of marketing and management, were in China in August to teach a two-week management training course. Arrangements to teach the course were made when Dittrich traveled to China earlier this year.

Dittrich said the faculty exchanges could provide Chinese and American faculty with opportunities to teach and do research in one another's countries.

Chinese scholars eventually may come to Bloomsburg to lecture and do research. "I think it would be good for the area to open up contacts that way — to put a few windows in our region," he said.

Hans K. Gunther, 60, a professor of history at Bloomsburg since 1965, died August 31 at his home.

Gunther was born in Germany and grew up in Pomerania, a province of Prussia on the Baltic Sea. His father sent him out of the country when Germany was about to plunge into World War II. He made his way to the United States just before Japan attacked Pearl Harbor in 1941.

He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in history from Washington University in St. Louis in 1946 and 1947 respectively. He taught German at the University of Missouri from 1947 until 1951. In 1954 he earned his doctorate from Stanford University.

After teaching one year at Deep Springs, a college in Southern California, he became a contract lecturer at the University of Maryland's Overseas Program, which offers college courses to armed services overseas. He taught in 38 Army, Navy and Air Force bases.

He accepted an associate professorship at Bloomsburg in 1965. In 1969 he was promoted to full professor. His 12th and 13th major articles in the general fields of history and politics were recently accepted for publication in Germany.

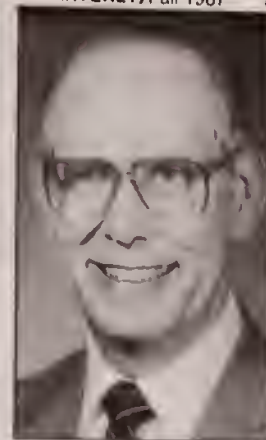

Gilbert R. Selders, professor in the curriculum and foundations department, retired at the end of the 1987 summer sessions in August. He has devoted 37 years to the education profession, including 31 years at Bloomsburg.

Stephen Bresett, professor of health, physical education and athletics, retired at the end of the 1986-1987 academic year. His career in education spanned 31 years, including 18 years at Bloomsburg.

Bresett was the 1987 recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award at Springfield College in Massachusetts. The award is presented annually to an outstanding graduate in recognition of professional excellence and exceptional service to the community.

Christine T. Whitmer, associate professor and chairperson of the Department of Languages and Cultures, retired in May after 24 years of teaching, 21 of them at Bloomsburg.

Dr. Ralph S. Herre, professor emeritus, died June 30 at age 84. A native of West Webster, N.Y., he graduated from Webster Central School in 1918 and earned his bachelor's degree in history from Colgate University in 1925. He attended college on a baseball scholarship and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa National Honor Society.

He earned his master's degree from the State University of New York in 1934 and his Ph.D. degree in history from Penn State University in 1951.

After graduating from Colgate, he was principal of Leavenworth Central School in Wolcott, N.Y., and was also principal of Lockport Senior High School. Before that he was a teacher in Silver Creek, N.Y.

He was a professor of history at Bloomsburg from 1947 to 1972, when he retired. He had also served in administrative roles, including dean of commuter students.

He had been a guest lecturer at the London School of Economics and had been a reader at Bodleian Library at Oxford.

His wife, the former Eleanor L. Mitchell, died on August 20, 1986. Surviving are two children, George, and Mrs. Lowell S. (Virginia) Miller, and three grandchildren.

BU's veteran tennis coach Burt Reese was named 1987 "Coach of the Year" among the NCAA Division II schools by the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association. The award, sponsored by the ITCA and Wilson Sporting Goods, honors those who "have contributed significantly to college tennis through the success of their own program."

Reese completed his 19th season in charge of the Husky men, leading his team to a dual record of 18-8 and a Pennsylvania Conference championship. In addition, he had individual players qualify for the NCAA championships for the eighth time in the past 10 seasons.

The successful dual match record marked the 16th consecutive winning season for the Huskies and included victories over six Division I opponents and all five conference foes BU faced during the campaign. Reese's overall record since taking over the program in the spring of 1969 is 270-120. His winning percentage of .692 ranks him fourth in the nation among active Division II coaches.

By capturing the PC tournament team title, the Huskies notched their sixth conference crown in the past nine years. His teams have not finished lower than second place in the tournament since 1976. Reese's

squad had finalists in all nine of the tourney flights this season and had six individual champions in the singles and doubles. He has now coached 47 conference singles and doubles champions and has been chosen as the PC's "Coach of the Year" on five occasions.

He is currently regional chairman for the East Region of the NCAA's Division II tennis committee and is an active member of the ITCA. In addition to his duties as the school's tennis coach, Reese also serves as an assistant coach for Bloomsburg's highly successful men's basketball program and as an assistant athletic director with his main responsibilities in the areas of scheduling and facilities.

The Taylor, Pa., native earned both his bachelor of science and master's degrees at East Stroudsburg State College where he co-captained the tennis and basketball teams.

J. Daniel Vann, III, executive director of libraries and resources at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, has been appointed director of Andruss Library at Bloomsburg University effective Aug. 1, according to an announcement by BU President Harry Ausprich. Vann replaces William Ryan, who will be on leave of absence for the fall semester prior to his retirement in May, 1988.

"In our national search we were fortunate to be able to attract a person of Dr. Vann's background and abilities to Bloomsburg University," said Kalyan Ghosh, BU vice provost and associate vice president of academic affairs at the time of the search. "His previous accomplishments both in Wisconsin and at the national level, along with effective and innovative leadership, will be a definite asset in the future planning and development of our library resources."

Vann, who holds a doctorate in history from Yale University, has been at Oshkosh since 1981. He previously directed library facilities in the City University and State University of New York.

At Wisconsin-Oshkosh, Vann led successful efforts to complete the libraries' initial automation project and began a new automation thrust that includes an on-line computerized catalog as well as new circulation and acquisition systems. He also headed the request and plan for the renovation and new construction of the Polk Library buildings, which are to begin this fall.

Cost studies of integrated computerized library systems for the UW-System regional campuses developed by Vann led to establishing a UW-System task force that recommended state funding for computer systems in each of the 11 regional university libraries. He also was credited with a number of library accomplishments affecting production, student usage improvements and utilization of highly qualified personnel.

Professionally, he has served on committees of the American Library Association and several Wisconsin library organizations.

Dr. Charles G. Jackson, a veteran member of the BU political science department, has written a text, "Elements of Political Science," which was scheduled for printing in late August or early September.

In the preface to the 350-page volume, he notes: "I've taught the lower level introductory political science course which has the same title as this book at a middle-sized state university for a little more than two decades. It has been somewhat like the writing of the U.S. Constitution, in that the Constitution was a cut-and-paste exercise . . . and the course has been a cut-and-tape job — whatever seemed to be useful was included. It has not only coincided with the march of the baby boomers through the college ranks — those who were born between 1946 and 1962 and who passed through their undergraduate education between 1964 and 1980 or so — but it has also coincided with some important contributions to the discipline. The course, (Continued on Page 38)

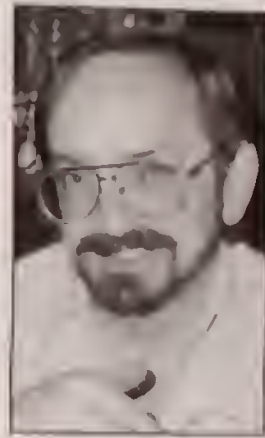

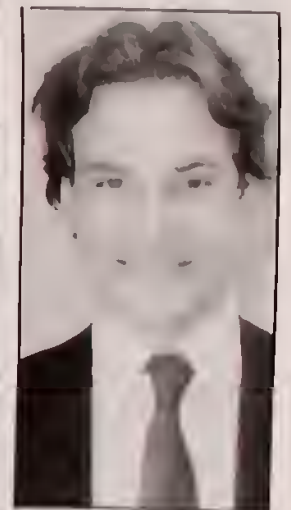

BU given rare diaries

A rare, four-volume set of diaries detailing a Hessian officer's experiences during the American Revolutionary War has been given to Bloomsburg University by the late Joseph P. Tustlin, a Bloomsburg native who attended Bloomsburg State Normal School in 1915 and died in December 1986.

The collection has been valued at \$50,000 by the Philadelphia appraisal firm of W. Graham Aralder III. Handwritten in neat, faded German script, the diaries were kept from 1776 to 1784 by Captain Johann Von Ewald, who commanded a company of light infantry and fought on the side of the British against the American rebellion.

Tustlin, who served in the U.S. Navy during World War I and as chief Air Force historian in Europe during World War II, purchased three of the four original volumes when he was in Austria in 1948. It was ten years later before he was able to obtain a photocopy of the fourth volume from a German prince.

The three original books are bound in calfskin and contain 25 hand-drawn maps worth from \$500 to \$1,000 each, according to Neil Lanigan Jr., who did the appraisal.

Lanigan points out the entire set is noteworthy because Ewald wrote clearly and objectively about the events on the same day or soon after they occurred. The books also represent a chronicle of the entire war, where most chronicles recently available recount only three- to six-month segments of history, the appraisal states.

After painstakingly translating the work, Tustlin spent many years verifying every point of reference in Ewald's writings and maps. His translation, titled "Diary of the American War," was published by the Yale University Press and in 1980 received the American Roundtable Award. Copies of the publication were donated to the Bloomsburg University library when it was first published.

The four volumes were presented to BU President Harry Ausprich this summer by Dr. Francis Radice '49, a friend of the Tustlin family.

In accepting the gift, Ausprich said, "We're privileged and excited to have these unique volumes. The 200-year-old diary with notes and materials will add prestige to our library collection. I'm sure they will be utilized in research projects."

A gift of \$1,000 was also presented to the university by Tustlin's brother, Edward, for the maintenance of these valuable materials.

SUSIE RAYOS MARMON '06 dates the season of her birth as spring because her mother remembered it was lambing time in her Laguna Pueblo village of Parguate. And she dates the year of her birth by the fact that her mother told her she was three years old when the first locomotive came to the pueblo in 1880.

It was 1877, a year after the Battle of Little Big Horn. Rutherford Hayes was president. New Mexico would not become a state for 35 years.

And by the time New Mexico did enter the United States, Marmon had attended college and returned home to become a teacher, marry and start a family.

New Mexico, the All-Indian Pueblo Council and the Laguna Tribal Council honored Marmon during ceremonies at a pueblo council meeting in Laguna the week after she officially celebrated her 110th birthday on April 15.

Gov. Garrey Carruthers declared the day "Susie Rayos Marmon Day in New Mexico," acknowledging her as a "rich source of Indian history and love."

Marmon, who lives in a nursing home in Casa Blanca, a Laguna Pueblo community, did not attend the ceremonies at the pueblo offices.

But all four of her living children, three of her granddaughters, one of her 10 great-grandchildren and other family members attended and served pieces of birthday cake to the 14 pueblo governors and lieutenant governors and other dignitaries at the event.

Marmon, in a wheelchair, later posed for pictures with some of her family at the rest home but did not talk with reporters. Her granddaughters displayed a picture of Marmon and her husband, Walter, on their wedding day, January 2, 1909.

Her daughter, Josephine Goetting, 74, said her mother always told the children to be kind to one another, be congenial with everyone and live a good life.

Marmon's granddaughter, Harriet Marmon, said her grandmother's mother wanted her only daughter to have a good education. As a young girl, Susie Rayos Marmon was sent away, first to Presbyterian Mission, now Menaul School, in Albuquerque, where she was given her English name.

She spent the next seven years at Carlisle Indian School in Pennsylvania. Harriet Marmon said her grandmother used to tell her how lonely she was there.

Susie Rayos Marmon took a three-year teaching course at Bloomsburg and graduated in 1906. She returned to what was then the New Mexico Territory, where she got a teaching job at Isleta Pueblo. She later taught at Laguna.

In her 70s, she helped the pueblo in land-claims cases in Washington, D.C. She served on New Mexico's first Commission on Indian Affairs in the 1960s. In 1971 she was named the outstanding Indian woman in education by the North American Indian Women's Association. At 101, she was still speaking out, advocating the preservation of the Laguna Pueblo language and traditions.

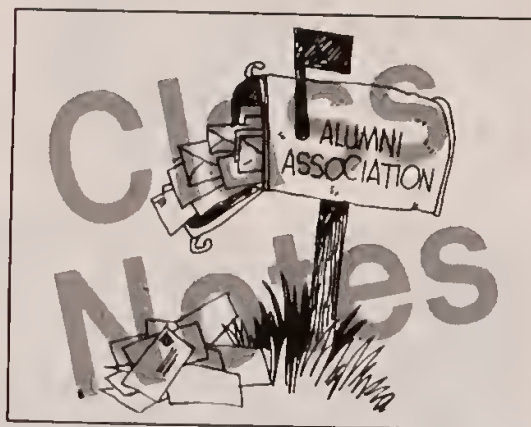

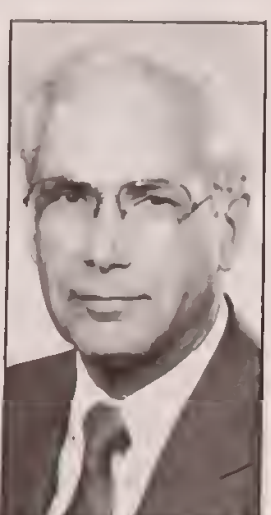

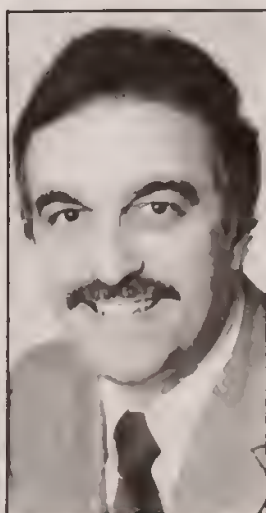

It began 14 years ago.

"First, it was hard to walk. I was constantly falling, and I blamed it on everything else — cracks in the sidewalk, the dog's lease, a slippery something on the ground."

No longer able to ignore the problem, Louise Kline saw a doctor. He diagnosed her illness as multiple sclerosis, a disease of the nervous system that has left her virtually helpless and in a wheelchair.

"There's really nothing you can do about it," she said, seated in the kitchen of her home near Espy.

What she didn't do was quit. But the 50-year-old teacher of seventh graders in Bloomsburg had to give ground in the struggle this year. Those her mind remains sharp, she has lost the use of her hands.

After 28 years as a teacher, she resigned.

"I kept on teaching. I kept on fighting. The disease just won," she said.

Louise has not been alone. Robert, her husband of 23 years, helps her while simultaneously holding down his own job as personnel manager at Milco, Inc. Three times a day, he visited her at Bloomsburg Middle School, wheeling her in and out of the school and setting up her daily plan.

"It's been extremely difficult, but I have so much respect for her. Knowing what it means to her, I would do it all over again, if need be," said Robert, 52.

"I don't understand how he's managed all these years," said Elaine Mueller, a fellow teacher and retiree. "That's a very tough role. You'd better be strong."

Louise said her fellow teachers, too, helped her continue teaching despite the debilitating effects of MS.

"They were just terrific. They saw the battle I had, and they did their part to help. They were good, good friends," Louise said.

Asked why she continued teaching beyond a point where she could have quit and lived on disability benefits, she said, "I love teaching, and I love being around the kids."

Said Robert, "It amazed me, and our family physician. When other people would have given up many,

many years ago, she went to school many, many days in pain."

Louise became a role model, especially to the special education students. They learned, she said, from her determination. "It made them understand their problems weren't the only ones in the world, because their teacher had a problem."

The Klinses have no children of their own.

"I think, from my point of view, she gave something to the students no other teacher could give," said Mueller. Many of the less able students were able to help themselves because of Louise, she said. "She was one of the favorite teachers of all time."

Her students never asked about her illness, and Louise never explained. "They understood. When I was absent, they would ask, 'What's wrong, Mrs. Kline? Were you sick?' It really got me. I thought, 'You've really faked them out,'" Louise said.

"She's a very brave person," said Robert. "She's truly amazing."

Her only regret, Louise said, is that she had to give up teaching. "We decided it was best to give it up. The disease has constantly gotten worse. And it would be better for me, my husband and more fair to the children."

After asking all the obvious questions, I wondered if this woman with so strong a will would find another outlet.

I asked whether she planned anything special for her retirement, a long-awaited trip, perhaps.

She turned her head away for a moment. She looked extremely sad and said, "I don't know how."

TOM LITTLE '62 has written a book, *American Warriors - Goin' For Gold*. The following review by William E. Wiggin, executive director of the Delaware State Bar Association, appeared in the summer 1987 issue of Delaware Lawyer, a publication of the Delaware Bar Foundation:

Thomas L. Little, Esquire, is a talented and complicated man who has brought great energy to a variety of pursuits: he has been a legislator and a lawyer, a teacher and a coach, lifeguard and mystic, Democrat, Republican, and once again Democrat, baptized believer and closet pantheist, Marine drill instructor and anti-war activist. He is also an impressive self-taught water colorist and an accomplished practitioner of judo.

Confronted by this body of achievement, the average reader inclines to flabby regret. "Oh, gee, why didn't I keep up my piano lessons?"

American Warriors, a courageously naked self-examination, records the author's pursuit of wholeness of body and spirit. Little wrote it during two live-day sessions "under self-hypnosis during meditation." The book speaks forcefully if not always clearly, and shows no sign of mischievous editorial interference. As a rule this sort of exercise is more rewarding for the writer than for his audience, but Little gives a lot of good value. While the semi-mystical element commands a sort of baffled respect, the account becomes highly enjoyable when Little unleashes his large, flamboyant cast of characters. (The book is filled with prominent Delaware names, local color, and local dirt.)

There are sharp portraits of both our United States Senators, two former governors, many politicians and prominent lawyers. Also there is a splendid anecdote about that grand old Republican spider, Mr. Clayton Harrison.

Furthermore, I suspect that there is nothing like this book for an inside account of the tensions within the Delaware Republican party during the 1960s and the zestful gutter fighting those tensions provoked. Names are named. No holds are barred. But actions for defamation are unlikely. The treatment of friends and foes is for the most part good natured and balanced.

Readers born before 1950 should be warned of some very rough, even scatological language. (Readers born after 1950 probably couldn't care less.) Apologia Pro Vita Sewer? But the use of such language is for the most part legitimate: Little is recreating the cloacal flavor of male speech when ladies aren't around, and especially the casually copulative argot of Parris Island. It rings true, as do lots of other things, such as his account of growing up in Mt. Airy, Pennsylvania, in a large belligerently affectionate Irish-American family. Since Little has an eye for telling detail, that account is very good indeed.

American Warriors is not exactly hammock reading. I was frequently slowed down by infuriatingly odd punctuation that forced me to retrace my steps in search of the thought intended to be conveyed. I also found the repeated and gratuitous use of quotation marks jarring.

Would tactful editing have helped? Yes and no. It would surely have done something about that grotesque punctuation, but it would probably have weakened the staccato force of a style harnessed to an urgent task of self-appraisal.

One regret: I am sorry the book does not end with a good index, because it is great fun to poke around, reading about the people you know. All in all, this is an impressive account. It might well make a most entertaining film.

Computer use emphasized

As part of its effort to convert its curriculum to the use of microcomputers in all business majors, Bloomsburg University's College of Business has initiated a program that will make AT&T personal computers available to students, faculty, staff, alumni and others in the BU community at prices far below normal retail rates, according to John E. Dittrich, dean of the college.

The AT&T 6300 basic model personal computer with a dual floppy disk system will be available for \$1,099, he said. An enhanced version of the 6300, featuring a 20 megabyte hard disk and a floppy disk drive, is \$1,499, and software and peripherals for the PC also can be purchased at the reduced rates. One can have the system tailored to one's own needs, with options such as a color monitor and a modem, Dittrich said.

This program was made possible through an agreement the College of Business made with AT&T and Computers Plus, a firm in Ardmore, Pa., that will supply the computers. The college also has arranged for financing to qualified buyers through the United Penn Bank.

Dittrich sent letters announcing the opportunity to students enrolled in the Business College and to BU faculty and staff. Others who may participate include all part-time or full-time undergraduate and graduate students, retired university faculty, alumni and members of university advisory boards.

New degree approved

A new bachelor of science degree in health physics was approved for BU at the July meeting of the Board of Governors of the State System of Higher Education.

BU has been working to develop an advanced technology agenda complementary to its science and health sciences program. In 1986, the Board of Governors allocated \$140,000 to the university for technology equipment necessary for the development of a program in the science of radiation protection, known as health physics.

The new degree program is based on the need to address problems caused not only by natural radiation, but by the rapid increase of radiation devices in medicine, energy generation and warfare. Interest from regional industries such as the Pennsylvania Power and Light Company and Geisinger Medical Center has encouraged and assisted program development.

Tuition increases

Tuition for the 14 publicly-owned universities which comprise the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education increased by \$150 (\$75 per academic semester), effective for the 1987 Fall semester. The new tuition schedule was approved by the State System Board of Governors at its July 15 quarterly meeting.

The new basic fee of \$1,830 for all full-time undergraduate and graduate students who are residents of Pennsylvania is a 8.9 percent increase over the previous year's fee of \$1,680. Part-time Pennsylvania students will pay \$76 per undergraduate credit hour and \$102 per graduate credit hour.

Non-resident full-time student tuition will increase \$190, or 6.2 percent, to \$3,266 per academic year for undergraduates, and \$168 or 9 percent, to \$2,040 per academic year for graduate students. Out-of-state, part-time students will pay \$136 per undergraduate and \$113 per graduate credit hour.

"The tuition adopted by the Board of Governors today assists the State System in continuing its mission of providing the citizens of the Commonwealth with a high quality education and at an affordable cost," said Board Chairman F. Eugene Dixon, Jr.

"We appreciate the careful consideration given to our appropriation by the General Assembly and Governor Robert P. Casey," Mr. Dixon continued.

State System Chancellor James H. McCormick added, "We are pleased particularly with the line item funding received for deferred maintenance, the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the McKeever Environmental Learning Center, and minority recruitment and retention needs."

"The increase of tuition assists State System universities in meeting most of their mandatory cost increase for the fiscal year," said Wayne G. Faylor, State System vice chancellor for finance and administration.

Parking changes

Several measures designed to ease parking problems on campus are being implemented this fall, according to Robert Parrish, vice president for administration.

The measures, which were recommended by the university's Traffic and Parking Committee following meetings with officials from the Town of Bloomsburg, include converting the north side of East Second Street along the university to commuter parking. The south side of the street will be designated resident permit parking, with each residence allowed three permits.

The plan also includes converting Swisher Circle (from Lightstreet Road around the perimeter of the tennis courts) to one-way traffic to allow commuter student parking in the other lane. In addition, a small commuter lot is planned for the area between the Centennial Gymnasium lot and Chestnut Street, and the university may rent more space in the Bloomsburg Hospital parking lot.

Two small commuter lots will be converted to faculty/staff lots: the lot near Northumberland Hall, and the lot behind McCormick Center.

and the text, are the result of a catalogue or an inventory of these works — David Easton on systems analysis; William Riker on political power; Buchanan and Tullock on constitutions; Anthony Downs on political parties; and many others, together with some original efforts to fill in the gaps.

"So I've experienced the impact and the effects of both the population and the information explosions on the university, the department, the discipline, the course and the students during the past four or five student generations. The university has tripled in size; the department has remained relatively stable; the discipline has gone in several different directions simultaneously; while the students have endured this and other courses and have gone on to other things. In the late 1980s, it seems to be a time to take stock of where we've been, where we are, and where we appear to be headed.

"Former students of the course may like to read this work in order to discover just what it was that I was talking about, and should be delighted to know that the original rough drafts were written on the backs of old test question sheets, so the course has been recycled many times over as a completely closed system. But the goal is to describe how and explain why political systems work the way they do as clearly as possible. Thus, I feel that I have an obligation to be both incisive and concise — to cut to the heart of the matter, but not fill up space with a lot of padding and filler material. I think that I have a further obligation to suggest how the description and explanation may be applied in all times and all places, and not just limit the application to the United States in the 20th Century, although that will be the initial point of departure in most instances.

In his acknowledgments, he notes: "To the many students, some of whom are mentioned in end notes, I also owe much for their challenges and for the incentive and the motivation they have provided me."

At the time of the award, she was head of the military law branch of the Judge Advocate Division of the U.S. Marine Corps headquarters in Washington, D.C. After earning a master's degree at Bloomsburg in 1969, she attended the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary.

responsible for the undergraduate and graduate academic programs of the university, faculty relations, budget development and control, academic personnel policies and procedures and long-range planning. He also had administrative responsibility for library services.

During the 1984-1985 academic year, Camper served as acting dean of the School of Professional Studies. As dean, his responsibilities encompassed all aspects of academic administration, including scheduling and programming, budget development and control, instructional equipment and supply needs, faculty and staff personnel policies and procedures for faculty and staff.

Two named to Hall of Fame

Robert Herzig '65 and David Linkhorst '53 will become the 12th and 13th members of the BU Athletic Hall of Fame during induction ceremonies at Homecoming on October 24.

They will join an elite group of former athletes and coaches that includes Charles "Chuck" Daly '52, William Foster, William Garson '63, Floyd "Shorty" Hitchcock '74, Russ Houk, Danny Litwhiler '38, Richard Lloyd '62, Robert Redman, Robert Rohm '60, Ron Russo '70 and Robert Tucker '68.

Herzig excelled in the sports of basketball and track and field during his four years on the campus from 1961 to 1965. He established several single game, season and career school records in basketball and still holds the Huskies' standards for season field goal percentage (56.7), season rebounding average (18.4), and career rebounds (1,041). He also ranks sixth on the all-time scoring list with 1,362 points.

He was an All-Pennsylvania Conference selection in his junior and senior seasons and was an All-Eastern Regional choice in 1965.

In track and field, he performed in the high and triple jumps and established a school record in the latter event which has since been surpassed.

Following graduation, he played two seasons in the Eastern Professional Basketball League.

He is currently the president of Mediscript Inc. in Chatsworth, California.

Linkhorst was a four-year starter on the football and basketball teams and also performed for three seasons as a member of the baseball squad. He has the distinction of being one of very few athletes ever to play at Bloomsburg to earn 11 varsity letters.

In football, he was a defensive back for three seasons and played quarterback for the 1952 unit. Linkhorst was a member of the school's undefeated teams in 1948 and 1951 under Coach Robert Redman. His education was interrupted for more than a year when he spent time in the service, and that absence from campus forced him to miss one season as the Huskies' third baseman.

During his time as a student/athlete, Bloomsburg never experienced a losing season in any of the three sports in which he participated.

After leaving the school, he served as a head basketball coach at Mahanoy Township and Mahanoy Area high schools for 14 seasons, compiling a record of 251-79. His teams won nine league championships and had a winning streak of 48 consecutive games.

Linkhorst also performed as a member of the Boston Whirlwinds in 1953 and 1955. The professional team toured the world with the Harlem Globetrotters.

He is currently one of the top amateur golfers in northeastern Pennsylvania and has won numerous titles and at one time held course records at three courses in the area.

Hazing policy reflects concern

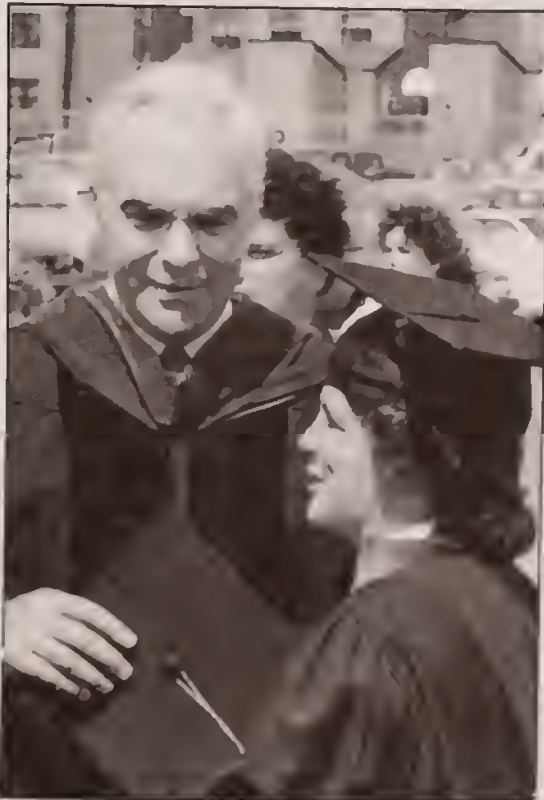
Bloomsburg University has drafted an anti-hazing policy that is in compliance with Act 749 which was passed by the Pennsylvania legislature last April. All institutions in the State System of Higher Education are instituting similar policies.

The following statement was issued by the office the vice president for student activities:

"Hazing is defined as any action or situation created whether on or off the fraternity or sorority premises, on or off campus, to produce mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, harassment, fright, humiliation, or ridicule. Any mental or physical requirement, request, or obligation placed upon any person which could cause pain, disgrace, injury or which is personally degrading or violates any federal, state, local statute or University policy is also considered hazing. Any activity as described in this definition which the initiation or admission into or affiliation with an organization is directly or indirectly conditioned shall be presumed to be a "forced" activity, the willingness of an individual to participate in such activity notwithstanding.

"Today, liability is a concern for everyone. The University is implementing this policy to protect the fraternities and sororities as well as the institution itself. You, as alumni, should share this concern.

"Some pledging activities which have taken place in the past are now clearly illegal. We ask for your support and assistance in educating our students."
