'Students torn between doing well and doing good'

Students today have a set of world circumstances and choices that are in many respects the most complex of any generation. To be effective educators, reliable mentors, and helpful advisers, we must better understand who they are. We need to know what the world looks like from their view, especially if we are to provide guidance in answering their concerns and problems.

To help us better understand our students, I asked Dr. Arthur E. Levine to come to Bloomsburg University in January and share with us findings from his research as well as his personal insights. Dr. Levine was voted one of the seven most admired leaders in higher education for creative, insightful thinking in a 1985 readers' poll in Change magazine. Since 1989 he has been a member of the senior faculty of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, chairman of the Institute for Educational Management, and chairman of the Higher Education Graduate Program. His books include: Shaping Higher Education's Future: Demographic Realities and Opportunities; When Dreams and Heroes Died: A Portrait of Today's College Student; and Reform of Undergraduate Education.

I believe the information Dr. Levine shared with us about today's college students will be of interest to you. The following excerpts are from his January 27, 1992 presentation to the faculty and staff. — Harry Ausprich

We did a survey of 70,000 undergraduates in the 1960s, and in 1978 we (surveyed) 28,000 more undergraduates. We asked students a series of questions. Let me tell you what they said when they talked to us in 1978 and 1980.

We asked them, are you optimistic or pessimistic about the future? Will the United States be a better or worse place to live in the next 10 years? The answers ran something like this: Well, I think the United States was probably a better place to live 10 years ago than it is now, but the next few years I expect it to become much worse. The way the numbers broke down, 91 percent were optimistic about their personal futures, and 41 percent were optimistic about our collective future.

When we asked them, who are your heroes, the most frequent answer was no one, followed immediately by entertainers and sports figures. We asked them, what social and political events most influenced you in your generation. The responses in this first study were Watergate, Vietnam and the Civil Rights Movement. When we asked them what impact they had, three out of four students (said) the impact was negative. What it encouraged them to do was withdraw from government participation and civic activities, and caused low confidence in government leaders and politicians. A majority said most people look out for number one, and a plurality said that if people can take advantage of you, they will.

When we asked them, what do you want out of life, what it came down to was this: A big house, not an apartment or condominium; a large lawn, well kept; clothes in the latest styles; and at least one car.

We kept doing this survey (and in 1989) the answers started changing. In 1989 when we asked the question,

are you optimistic or pessimistic about the future . . . the answers changed dramatically. We had 91 percent who said they were optimistic about their personal lives, but 83 percent said they were optimistic about our collective future.

We asked about heroes, do you have any heroes? What changed was that three out of four college students in the last two years have said they have heroes; the heroes aren't national figures. Their heroes are people like their teacher, their next door neighbor, their parents, the person who led the local clean-up campaign. We asked them why (they chose) these people, and the answer they gave was that these are people who are making a difference; they are people who are consequential.

We asked them another question: What social or political event most influenced your generation? A majority of them said the Challenger explosion. When I asked why, they replied that they watched it on television, they expected Christa McAuliffe to lecture in their classrooms, many of them watched a teacher . . . an adult in authority, break down for the first times in their lives.

The majority of freshmen here and around the country were born in 1973. That means they were born after the Kennedy assassination, after the Great Society, after Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy died. They were born after men landed on the moon. They were born after the Watergate break-in. They were two when the U.S. troops left Vietnam. They were six when the hostages were taken in Iran. They were eight when the gas lines ended, and Ronald Reagan was elected president. They were nine when double-digit inflation ended and unemployment fell for the first time. They were 15 when George Bush was elected President. Current (college) freshmen only know two Presidents of the United States: Ronald Reagan and George Bush. They know three wars: Grenada, Panama and Iraq. For them, a long war is six weeks.

There is a real tension in the values current undergraduates hold. Right now among freshmen, three out of four say it is essential or very important to be very well off financially. And almost two-thirds want a career that will make a social contribution. They are really torn. Torn between doing well and doing good. They are asking how to balance the two.

What we are finding among current college students and freshmen is that one out of three has participated in a demonstration in high school, which is a higher proportion than at any point in the 1960s. Two out of three have performed volunteer work before coming to college and will continue to perform it during college.

So what do we make of all this? This is a transitional generation. The volunteerism they are involved in now is more sustained than we have seen among previous generations, and we have data going back to the 1930s. One of the things that happens is concern with social issues, social activism, tends to occur in 30-year cycles. We saw it during the progressive era at the turn of the century. We saw it during the Depression. We saw it during the 1960s, and we are beginning to see it now.

In the next few years, we will see more student engagement with social issues. We will see student politics becoming slightly more liberal. We will see a greater interest in relevance, the kind of relevance that is associated with knowing more about a world that is in transition, and knowing about society and social issues that seem very large. We will see greater concern with international issues. I expect we will see greater concern with campus governance than we have in the last few years.

If I could pick any four values that I think are going to be really important to teach in the next four years, the first one would be hope. In a lot of ways it is going to be one of the major challenges for us in the next few years not to teach hope in a Pollyanna-ish kind of way, but to give students the hope to go on, the hope to allow dreams to come true.

If I could teach students about a second thing, (it would be) altruism or responsibility . . . that they have a responsibility to other people. The third is *understanding*. We have students who are going through culture shock. What is going to be increasingly important is for students to begin to question differences, to appreciate differences, and to understand not only the differences but the commonalities.

The last one I would raise is efficacy . . . that students can make a difference. I think the real challenge in the next few years will be to convince students that they are the future. Tomorrow is going to require leaders and followers who care about our shared agenda together. Tell the student it doesn't matter what he or she is going to be — the butcher, the baker, the candlestick maker, each one can make a difference. Convince the student that making a difference is his or her birthright — not to trade it, not to give it away. Convince them that tomorrow is going to require dedication; it's going to require hope; it's going to require a sense of efficacy. Then tell them, please be the people who make that commitment because no one else can.

Dr. Levine's message was challenging to each of us — to know our students better, to understand their hopes and aspirations; and thereby to be better prepared to participate with them in the teaching/learning process.

Retirement: A time for reflection

Memories, like the corners of my mind. Misty, water-color memories of the way we were. Scattered pictures of the smiles we left behind. Smiles we gave to one another, for the way we were.

THOSE HAUNTING OPENING LYRICS IN BARBRA Streisand's 1973 hit song, "The Way We Were," tenderly envelope the Bloomsburg campus these days following the retirements of 67 faculty and staff members in December.

Among the retirees are longtime university administrators Jerrold Griffis and Robert Norton and senior faculty member John Scrimgeour. Recently, they took a stroll down memory lane reflecting on "the way we were" at Bloomsburg University.

Scrimgeour, who served 33 years as a faculty member, financial aid officer and psychological counselor, recalled the days when he attended Bloomsburg. "When I was a student back in the early 1950s, I remember being served meals in the dining room every evening," he said. "The men had to wear coats and ties and the women had to wear dresses . . . and if you didn't dress up, you didn't get in."

During the 1950s, the school had an enrollment of approximately 800 students, noted Scrimgeour. "The dining room was located in Old Waller Hall where Lycoming Residence Hall is today," he said, adding "there were two lovely clay tennis courts right outside the dining room."

Norton, who came to Bloomsburg in September 1962, said the dining room regulations were upheld through the late 1960s. "We had to have four men and four women seated at each table," said the former assistant vice president and dean of student life. "In addition, the men had late night privileges, whereas the women had a 10 p.m. curfew."

Griffis, who came to Bloomsburg in August 1971 as vice president of student life, reflected back on Old Waller Hall. He remembered its "Long Porch" which ran alongside Second Street overlooking a large lawn that today is the site of Elwell Residence Hall.

"I remember large numbers of our students sitting in rocking chairs or leaning against the railing of Long Porch," he said. "To me, that was a classic."

IN THE '50s, '60s AND EARLY '70s, BLOOMSBURG WAS a teacher education institution attended by "first generation" college students who lived nearby. "There weren't many cars on campus back then," recalled Norton. "At that time about 70 or 80 percent of our students were from this area."

Norton, who served a three-year stint as the school's varsity basketball coach from 1963 to 1966, said the "attitude and spirit" of Bloomsburg students were different then. "The students came from families that didn't have a lot of money. They didn't have 'wheels' to go out of town, so they stayed on campus and participated in various student activities."

Scrimgeour agreed with this colleague, noting "times have changed" in regard to how students spend their leisure time. "Our students are much more sophisticated these days, and they have a variety of things to do."

Griffis said television sets were located in only a couple student lounge areas on campus. "Students went into the lounges on Sunday nights and watched 'Wyatt Earp' or the 'Ed Sullivan Show,' but otherwise they sat in those lounges . . . somebody might play the piano . . . but mostly they chatted with each other."

All three noted that stricter rules prevailed at Bloomsburg prior to the 1970s. For example, students were required to attend assemblies that were scheduled each week in Carver Hall. "These student assemblies were held twice a week," said Scrimgeour. "Students had to sit in assigned seats and a faculty member would sit upstairs with a little chart of the auditorium and check attendance."

"Dr. Andruss was president at the time," he continued, "and he often would read passages from the Bible at these assemblies. There wasn't a lot of interest . . . I used to see students' eyes rolling many times . . . but you didn't dare defy him."

Scrimgeour recalled a time when a male student, who was sitting in the upper level, fell asleep during one of Dr. Andruss' lectures. "The young man was sound asleep and had his feet up on the railing," he said. "Dr. Andruss looked up and saw this guy sleeping. He told those who were seated nearest the student to wake him . . . and then ordered the young man out of the auditorium."

AS WAS THE CASE AT MANY COLLEGES IN AMERICA, "changes" in rules and regulations began to occur at Bloomsburg

in the late 1960s and early 1970s, mostly caused by widespread opposition to the Vietnam War. "But I suppose we were pretty much a 'back water' type of institution," said Scrimgeour, "because when students at other college campuses were getting militant about human rights issues, our students were upset because there were rules that prohibited 'skateboarding' on campus."

Griffis, who worked at Ohio University before coming to Bloomsburg, said the incidences that occurred at Bloomsburg in the late 1960s and early 1970s were "mild" in comparison with other institutions across the country. "I came from an institution where there was REAL violence . . . rioting, tear gas, National Guardsmen and shootings. We were forced to shut down the university. I saw 'sit-ins' and campus buildings being taken over by outraged groups of students."

"But coming here to Bloomsburg, I experienced a different kind of student demonstration . . . done with the respect for others in mind," he continued. "This school never became as liberal as many of the institutions that were similar to us across the nation. Sure, there were shifts in regulations. Students began receiving more liberties on campus . . . and some of them got into trouble. But there was, and always has been, a certain sense of responsibility that the vast majority of our students have had for this institution."

ASIDE FROM THE PROBLEMS, THE ADVENT OF THE 1970s brought with it a wonderful occurrence at Bloomsburg. The institution started to grow. Between 1969 and 1971, a half dozen buildings sprouted up on campus. "Elwell, Montour, Schuylkill (residence halls) and Andruss Library were among the facilities built during those years," recalled Norton.

Added Scrimgeour, "All these buildings were built one right after another. We experienced a 10 percent increase in students at this time, too . . . and from then on we began to see increases in our enrollment by about 10 percent, year after year alter year."

According to Griffis, "the closest thing that relates to that growth period is happening at Bloomsburg right now," alluding to more than \$16 million of construction and renovation projects currently taking place on campus. "But I don't think the amount of projects that are presently under construction matches that of the late 1960s and early 1970s. About a half dozen buildings were constructed on campus during those three years. Obviously, there was a tremendous amount of change going on back then."

DISCUSSING HOW STUDENTS HAVE CHANGED OVER the years, Scrimgeour said, "I think they're more worldly now due to changes in society. Overall, our students are a delight to be around . . . but I am concerned about their value system."

Said Griffis, "I see a breakdown of values, morals and standards among students nationwide, not just at Bloomsburg. Many of them don't seem to recognize or understand that there is a right and a wrong. I agree that there seems to be a general lack of values."

When asked to recollect what was most significant to them during their years at Bloomsburg, the three men echoed each other's responses: "The people."

Said Scrimgeour, "Bloomsburg, to me, has always been a 'people place.' The university community and townspeople have always been very warm and friendly to me and my family."

Griffis believes there is "something unique" in the way faculty, staff and students relate to each other that makes Bloomsburg special. "There's always been a special sense of community and friendship, not only at the university, but also in the town. I don't know why it's there, but you certainly can feel it's presence."

Norton said a unique "relationship" exists between faculty, administrators and students at Bloomsburg. "There is a strong 'caring' attitude on this campus . . . and that makes Bloomsburg a very special place."

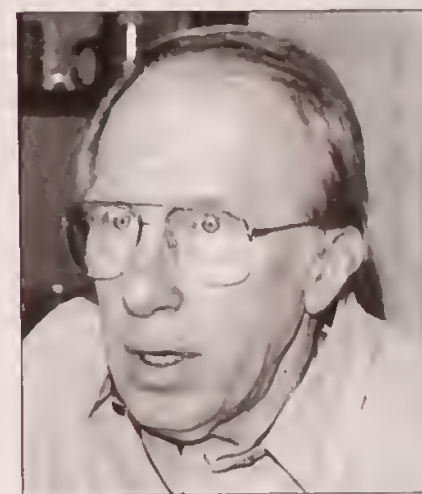
IN THEIR ATTEMPT TO FORECAST THE UNIVERSITY'S future, Norton, Griffis and Scrimgeour had concerns about the general lack of funding that Bloomsburg and other State System of Higher Education institutions receive from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. "This university, and others like us in Pennsylvania, need to receive adequate financial support from the state," said Griffis.

"At Bloomsburg, we (university administrators) have been frugal. The administration manages its state allocations well, but the university cannot continue to provide quality programs without receiving proper funding," he concluded.

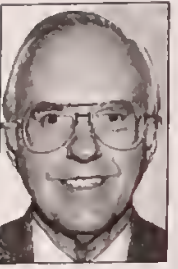

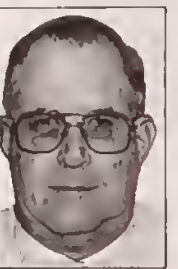

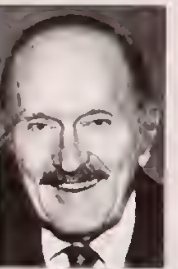

Thirty-four faculty members who together contributed hundreds of years of service to Bloomsburg University retired effective Friday, December 27. Two additional retirements, one effective last May and one in August, were also announced at the same time.

The retirees:

William A. Acierno, associate professor of mass communications, served on the faculty since August 1966. Acierno holds a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Pittsburgh and a master of fine arts degree from the Carnegie Institute of Technology at Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh. He completed 30 years in education.

Charles M. Bayler, associate professor of accounting, served on the faculty since August 1965. Bayler earned a bachelor of science degree from Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove and holds a master of business administration degree from Bucknell University in Lewisburg. 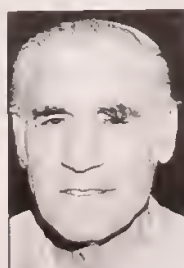
Law provides incentive for early retirement

The unusually large number of retirements at mid-year was no coincidence. They were prompted by the so-called Mellow law, named for its sponsor, state Senator Robert Mellow, D-Scranton. The law offered state employees 55 and older with at least 10 years of service an additional 10 percent service credit for their pensions. For example, a faculty member with 30 years of service got credit for 33 years.

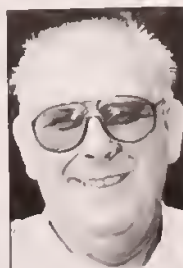
The record number of retirements sent BU officials scrambling to fill the vacancies, but they managed to staff all classes by the time the spring semester began the week of January 13.

"Our deans and departments have done an absolutely miraculous job," said Betty Allamong, provost and vice president for academic affairs. "They started working very early to replace the positions when we heard there might be a Mellow law."

Throughout the State System, 492 employees took advantage of the Mellow law, including 295 faculty.

Grassroots group to seek greater funding

Bloomsburg University alumni are being targeted to join a new grassroots organization called **Friends of the 14** to help focus public attention on the urgent needs of Pennsylvania's state-owned universities.

The goal of the **Friends of the 14** is to enroll more than 250,000 students, parents, faculty, employees and alumni, who together will work to convince state legislators to increase funding to meet the operating and capital needs of the universities of the State System of Higher Education. Members of the grassroots organization will not be asked to contribute or help raise money.

Among the urgent needs singled out at Bloomsburg:

- * A critical shortage of library space.
- * Renovation of the 50-year-old Centennial Gymnasium.
- * A new wing for the Hartline Science Center.
- * Renovations to the Ben Franklin Building and Navy Hall.
- * A shortage of computers and modern lab equipment.

"The **Friends of the 14** provides a focal point for action on these needs," said James H. Tinsman, president of the Association of State College and University Faculties (APSCUF), which organized the campaign. "Unfortunately, many people outside the university family aren't aware of the magnitude of the needs at Bloomsburg and on other campuses. By helping to make people aware, we're hoping to create the impetus to take care of these needs."

Tinsman invited the 7,484 students at Bloomsburg and the more than 28,000 alumni living in Pennsylvania to join the **Friends of the 14** as a matter of self interest.

Tinsman said the well-being of the next generation and the

health of the state's economy are bound to the fate of the state-owned universities.

"Each person affiliated with the university should consider the benefits he or she has enjoyed because of that relationship," Tinsman added. "We want to make sure the same opportunities exist for those who come after us."

At present, one out of every five high school graduates in Pennsylvania goes on to one of the 14 universities in the State System. Families of modest means have traditionally depended on them as an affordable avenue to education, and, increasingly, so have non-traditional students, such as single mothers, older persons and career-changers.

But Pennsylvania now finds itself with State System tuitions that are among the highest in the nation and State System funding that, on a per-student basis, is among the lowest.

The chronic underfunding by the state has resulted in a huge repair and renovation backlog that by the day becomes more expensive to catch up with, a crushing need for new facilities and more space of all kinds, and an increasing need for more faculty to keep up with the number of students.

Meanwhile, tuition went up by 54 percent from 1983 to 1990. Room and board went up 55 percent, and fees went up 82 percent. In 1991, tuition went up another 15 percent.

In 1990, the Education Committee of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives reported that unless the crisis of unmet needs at the 14 state-owned universities were addressed, the schools inevitably would become "physically shabby in appearance, excessively costly because of the lack of timely investment, non-competitive for outstanding faculty, and unable to serve tens of thousands of qualified Pennsylvanians who look to the state-owned system for access to affordable quality higher education."

So far, the **Friends of the 14** has enlisted support from a wide variety of sources, including individual university presidents — BU's Dr. Harry Ausprich among them — and officials of the State System of Higher Education.

"On behalf of the Board of Governors and the entire State System of Higher Education, I wish to compliment our fine faculty on their efforts to raise awareness about the needs of the 14 state-owned universities," said James H. McCormick, chancellor of the State System of Higher Education. "To fulfill our mandated mission of providing high-quality education at an affordable cost, Pennsylvanians must acknowledge and support our essential needs. This grassroots campaign will assist in developing that support."

Tinsman said the importance of the state-owned universities was underscored by the findings of a 1990 study by the Pennsylvania Economy League. The study concluded that Pennsylvania's economy enjoys a "return" of \$1.71 on every dollar spent on higher education.

More than 75 percent of the graduates of the state-owned universities stay in Pennsylvania and contribute to its economy, Tinsman pointed out. The schools bring in millions of dollars from out-of-state students, they act as a resource for businesses and communities, and, in terms of payrolls, higher education is the

seventh largest "industry" in Pennsylvania.

"Given the substantial economic, personal and societal returns documented from investments in higher education," the Economy League concluded, "inadequate government support would prove to be quite costly in the long run. This is the worst kind of false economy."

Said Tinsman, "Our legislators must hear the message, that they must act for our long-term good. We are facing a very great challenge, but we are confident that the response of students, alumni, Pennsylvanians in general, and, ultimately, legislators will be positive."

Budget request would stabilize tuition

The Board of Governors for the State System of Higher Education, including Bloomsburg University, approved a 1992-1993 state appropriation request which holds Pennsylvania resident tuition rates stable. The board approved the request at its quarterly meeting in October.

To meet mandatory and inflationary cost increases, the board approved a 1992-1993 instructional appropriation request of \$407,605,448. The request is an increase of \$36,645,448, or 9.88 percent, over the 1991-1992 state appropriation of \$370,960,000.

If the requested level of state support is received, Pennsylvania resident student tuition would remain stable at \$2,628 for the 1992-1993 academic year.

Additionally, the board's request requires State System universities to re-examine their anticipated expenditure levels for the next academic year.

"Maintaining tuition at its current level remains a primary concern," said F. Eugene Dixon Jr., board chair. "Full funding of this request would allow the State System to stop the trend of yearly tuition increases."

"Based on practical projections of revenue for the next fiscal year, an appropriation request at this level is more in tune with the fiscal realities of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania," Dixon added.

Mandatory base pay and benefit increases for existing personnel are included in the requested appropriation. Other cost increases for services, utilities, supplies and equipment are calculated by using the Congressional Budget Office inflationary projection of 3.85 percent.

The board also approved several special purpose appropriation requests for deferred maintenance, affirmative action efforts, library enhancement, instructional equipment, the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching, the Rural Education and Community Service Program, and a labor studies institute.

Deferred Maintenance. Over the last seven years, the State System has received \$18.9 million in deferred maintenance funding, matched by \$13.2 million from university budgets. While numerous facilities have been restored to safe and useful condition, a \$63 million backlog of deferred maintenance projects exists. The State System is requesting \$37,931,000 to continue providing for the long-term integrity of its physical plant.

Affirmative Action Efforts. The State System requests \$1.5 million to continue efforts to increase minority enrollment and female participation in higher education. Initiatives funded by the

BU committed to women in higher education

In April 1988, the SSHE Board of Governors established the SSHE commitment to women in higher education by charging each State System university with the development of policies and procedures to implement 15 recommendations developed by the American Council of Education's Commission on Women in Higher Education.

These policies and procedures were part of the central framework of the PA-SSHE Affirmative Action Prospectus. The Prospectus notes that over the next five years (1988-1993) each university will establish priorities and time frames to address those recommendations that most need attention on that campus. In order to facilitate the timely accomplishment of those measures, each university president was to "consider the establishment of a Commission on the Status of Women as an initial priority."

Dr. Harry Ausprich did just that! He made a commitment in Bloomsburg University's 1988-1989 Affirmative Action and Equal Opportunity Plan, (Chapter III: Commitment to Women in Higher Education, October 1988) to appoint a commission as part of the institutional commitment to women in higher education at Bloomsburg University.

He further stated during a November 4, 1988 meeting of the extended president's cabinet that a Commission on the Status of Women would be formed during the Fall 1988 semester, that the commission would report directly to the president, and that the commission would hold its first meeting early in the 1989 spring semester. The commission, which consisted of representatives of students, staff and faculty, convened in February 1989.

The primary responsibilities of the CSW were to address the current status of women on campus using the ACE Commission on Women in Higher Education guidelines and to monitor those strategies committed to by our institutional leadership in our Affirmative Action Prospectus at BU.

The ACE Commission on Women in Higher Education listed 15 major guidelines that institutional leadership should follow:

1. Demonstrate a strong commitment to understanding and addressing the concerns of women students, faculty, staff and administrators.
2. Identify and correct inequities that exist in hiring, promotion, tenure, and salary of women faculty, administrators, and staff.
3. Provide a supportive campus climate for women in the classroom and in the employment settings.
4. Establish and/or reaffirm an institutional commitment to women's studies.
5. Review university policies for their effect on minority women and majority women.
6. Support a university planning process that addresses the question of impact on minority women and majority women.
7. Review, develop and implement effective policies to address the problem of sexual harassment.
8. Prepare an annual status report on women for the total university community.
9. Initiate a campus values inventory to examine value issues that continue to prevent the inclusion of women in certain areas of university life.
10. Develop policies, procedures, and programs that support children and families in the broadest sense.
11. Promote activities that demonstrate the value of diversity to the campus life.
12. Make leadership development and commitment to fostering women's leadership joint priorities.
13. Establish the commitment to a Commission on Women.
14. Appoint a person whose formal responsibilities include advocacy for women on campus.
15. Provide leadership in fostering an environment that encourages the discussion of and attention to sex equity issues.

In addition to these guidelines, Bloomsburg identified 21 strategies which needed to be implemented through its affirmative action commitment to women in higher education. These strategies were to be addressed by the university leadership and university community as a whole during a five-year period (1988-1993).

Since the role of the commission is to monitor the progress and implementation of these strategies, there has been a tremendous amount of work and energy expended by many commission members. In addition to this specific charge, the commission has initiated and implemented many programs and services in its short span of existence. A few of these programs and services include:

- Coordinating Women's History Month programming and activities.

- Chaired Sexual Harassment and Consensual Relationship Policy Taskforce (Policy adopted October, 1991).

- Providing internship supervision and mentoring to Leadership Institute women on an annual basis.

- Conducting surveys on climate concerns.

- Preparing status report on expansion of our existing childcare services.

- Preparing a proposal for a Women's Issues and Studies Center for leadership planning and implementation.

- Co-sponsoring an annual two-county Women's Conference.

- Establishing a newsletter to focus on women's issues and activities at Bloomsburg.

- Providing leadership and mentoring through service on the commission to women, students, staff, and faculty who want and need leadership development experiences.

- Establishing a taskforce to establish a women's studies minor and to enhance gender equality within existing curriculum.

- Preparing a handbook on sexist and discriminatory language.

- Establishing a foundation fund for the advancement of women in terms of scholarly growth, leadership development and quality of life advancement and opportunities through special learning opportunities.

The CSW is very young, but it is beginning to establish recognition and credibility as a strong advisory and action group to the president and his cabinet. Although the commission operates without budget, facilities, and designated personnel, its presence and work are being experienced by many. The burden placed on the commission due to insufficient budget, facilities and

personnel is felt deeply by its members. Even so, they continue to look to the future, to a future where women of all races and nationalities can share, contribute and benefit fully in the opportunities offered at Bloomsburg and in the world community.

As a member of the CSW and as chairperson for the last 18 months, I have had the opportunity and privilege to help advance the status of women toward a more equitable position at BU; to help expand opportunities for educational and personal growth for women; to foster a sense of empowerment among women which will move them forward in their own life and work choices.

I believe the establishment of this commission at BU is a visible beginning of the university's commitment to advance and enhance women's opportunities and contributions. During my 23 years on the faculty at BU, I have experienced much change. Yet at times I still feel extremely impatient and overwhelmed, but I know that systematic change can only come with time and persistent, relentless effort and commitment.

I firmly believe the commission is beginning to establish a new and brighter legacy for women at Bloomsburg University. It is my hope that the establishment of the BU-CSW Foundation fund will insure that legacy. I know it will enable the commission to continue to move forward with more expediency and more direction.

As one of our student interns said, "Leadership from women is an underestimated commodity in today's world. I think women need more opportunities like this to reach their potential."

I know that to be so, and I hope members of the university community and alumni community will continue to support our commission's efforts through their foundation contributions.

A 1962 graduate of business education, Lanzone serves as director of the human resources-corporate staff for Air Products and Chemicals of Allentown, where he has been employed for more than 24 years.

Lanzone has been an active member of the BU Foundation Board since 1986, and serves as the board's vice chair. He believes that funding from the private sector, including alumni, is essential because "it provides a substantial opportunity for scholarship funding, cultural activities, and academic resources that lay a broader basis for our students' education."

"I value education very highly," Lanzone said. "It is a key component in any young person's maturity and advancement, it is the essence and foundation for an individual's development."

Lanzone has served as chairman of the personnel management group of the Allentown-Lehigh County Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the board of directors of the Allentown YMCA. He has also been active in the Lehigh Valley Cystic Fibrosis organization, Lehigh Valley United Way efforts, and has

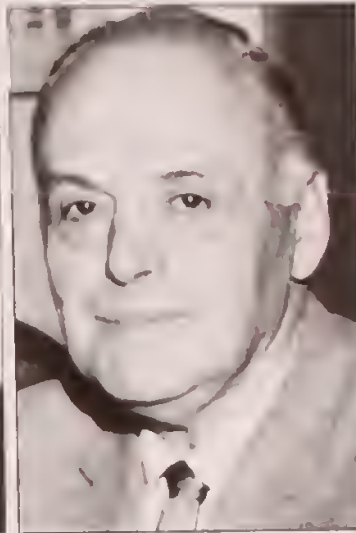

College of Professional Studies Alumni Share Expertise

PRACTICING teachers and nurses who are BU alumni continue their important roles as in-the-field advisors to the teacher education and nursing programs. Their guidance is viewed by Dean Howard Macauley, College of Professional Studies, as a "highly valuable contribution to the preparation of professionals. Practicing teachers and nurses are on the cutting edge of their disciplines. They are in key positions to suggest curricular modifications and techniques," he said.

Many student teachers are assigned to cooperative teachers who are BU alumni. This shared educational experience at Bloomsburg offers a common base upon which to build strong communications and a special professional relationship.

A strong network between Bloomsburg teacher-education alumni and university faculty helps keep communication flowing in both directions. One of Macauley's objectives is to enlarge this network by identifying more Bloomsburg teacher-alumni. Sometimes connections are renewed through a spouse or colleague who is not a Bloomsburg alumni, but who alerts an alumnus to Bloomsburg's interests.

Presently, there are several ways alumni contribute to Bloomsburg University. For example, a cooperative relationship between Bloomsburg and Thomas Millin School in Philadelphia is a link

whereby Millin teachers and university faculty work together to explore educational concerns, to identify, and to test possible solutions.

Alumni also serve on the college's Teacher-Education Council. Each year teacher-education graduates are surveyed and asked to respond to questions about their formal preparation to meet state required competencies. When the survey results are known, the Teacher-Education Council reviews the outcome and makes recommendations for possible curriculum modifications.

Through the Trustee-in-Residence program, one former trustee, a Bloomsburg graduate, who is a public school superintendent, spent several days on campus meeting with classes, department chairpersons, and others. According to Macauley, "this kind of experience allows Bloomsburg University students and faculty to profit from a

teacher/administrator's expertise and for the guest to gain a clearer understanding of today's teacher-preparation program."

An exciting new venture was the College of Professional Studies' participation in the Business Education Partnership Conference, Nov.

22, 1991. As new relationships develop between business and public schools, Bloomsburg faculty are serving as consultants by providing insight and expertise.

Teacher-education programs and in-service training programs are a vital component in assuring that these new cooperative ventures between schools and business show positive results. As business identifies new skills and competencies important to the success of high school graduates, teachers must be prepared to meet these new demands. These new relationships will help Bloomsburg teachers know the kinds of expectations being placed on their future high school graduates.

Bloomsburg University nursing graduates who work throughout the state are part of an informal network that exists within the nursing department. "These alumni serve a key role in the evaluation process of the nursing curriculum," Macauley said. "By responding to surveys six months, one year, and three years following graduation, they provide

information about the relationships between their formal education and their work experiences. Modifications to the curriculum are, in part, based on the data from these surveys."

Nursing alumni occasionally are invited to speak at pinning ceremonies or at Student Nurse Association meetings. Alumni who are members of the Bloomsburg chapter of the National Honor Society in Nursing also have opportunity to participate in the selection and induction of new student members into the organization. Society members, including alumni, help plan and attend the Honor Society Research Day, held annually with other regional colleges. Sometimes BU alumni are invited guest speakers at the conference.

"Professional Studies faculty and I are very grateful for the time and expertise our alumni give to our educational program," Macauley noted. "Their contributions are invaluable."

Professional Studies alumni and alumni from other disciplines who would like to help the university in these or other ways simply need to express their desire. NEW MEMORIALS NAMED

CHARLOTTE M. HESS MEMORIAL FUND

CATHERINE OPLINGER RENNINGER SCHOLARSHIP

A memorial scholarship in the English department was created in 1991 for Catherine Oplinger Renninger '41 by her husband, Clark R. Renninger '41. A \$1,000 scholarship will be awarded annually. Criteria for this award are 1) sophomore or junior status, 2) pursuit of a degree in secondary education with a major in English, 3) 3.0 grade point average in the English major, and 4) demonstration of financial need. English department faculty will make the selection during the spring semester for awarding the following fall.

Mrs. Renninger, originally from Nanticoke, Pa., graduated with a degree in business education. She and Clark lived many years in the Washington, D.C., area where she taught school. In the late 1970s they moved to Lancaster, Pa., where she was active in the Philanthropic Education Organization and in church activities.

Parents' Fund Phonothon Nets \$64,000 in Pledges

THE Parents' Fund phonothon, held in October, 1991, raised nearly \$64,000 in pledges from parents of current undergraduate students, according to Susan Helwig of the university's development office.

"Our goal was to raise \$75,000 this year," said Helwig, associate director of development. "Prior to the phonothon, we had received \$22,000 in gifts from parents of our undergraduate students."

Despite a struggling economy, coupled with the loftier fund-raising goal this year, the university's fifth annual Parents' Fund cam-

paign drive was very successful, said Helwig.

"The rate of refusals we received from parents was a bit higher this year than in previous years, but the economy was largely responsible. A number of the parents we spoke with indicated they were having some financial difficulties at home."

Helwig admitted that many university officials had their doubts as to whether the phonothon could raise the large sum of money this year. "Because we raise our goals each year ... from \$21,000 in 1987 to a rather ambitious sum of \$75,000 this year ... it was tight," she noted.

Bloomsburg's development office hires undergraduate students who attempt approximately 80 calls between the hours of 6 and 9 p.m.,

Sunday through Thursday, during the five-week phonothon which began in October.

"We employed about 50 students who made nearly 10,000 phone calls," said Helwig. "They were able to contact about 5,000, or 80 percent, of the parents of our undergraduate students. About 35 percent of the parents they reached made pledges."

Helwig had praise for all the students who worked phoning parents. "Our student callers represented the university well," she said. "They are trained by our staff and do a wonderful job giving information about the university and about the campaign."

Proceeds from the phonothon were earmarked primarily for the

university's \$3.5 million *The Trust for Generations* campaign which ended in mid-November. This campaign was created in 1989 to provide funding for a larger book collection in Andross Library, scholarship opportunities for deserving students, and purchasing computers and other specialized academic equipment.

"The Parents' Fund contributions are also applied to the University Fund which supports educational programs, projects and building plans that demand immediate attention on our campus," she noted.

Helwig said the development office plans to continue the fall Parents' Fund phonothon in future years.

IBM Gift Valued at \$95,000 Establishes Classroom Technology Center

NELSON Swarts '63, who works at IBM in Franklin Lakes, N.J., and Alex Kozloski '69, who is located at IBM in Wayne, Pa., were instrumental in helping Bloomsburg University officials obtain the special designation as a Classroom Technology Center.

In addition to Swarts and Kozloski, 40 other Bloomsburg alumni who work for IBM Corporation were able to see their combined 1991 donation of more than \$5,000 expand into a gift valued at \$95,000. This gift is composed of computers and educational software for use by Bloomsburg University teacher-education majors, faculty, and practicing teachers in central Pennsylvania. Installation of the Classroom Technology Center is expected during the spring semester, 1992.

"Swarts and Kozloski were central in helping to realize this educational opportunity for BU students," said President Harry Ausprich. "Their efforts, along with gifts from other BU alumni at IBM, mushroomed into this exceptional program. We are very grateful to them," Ausprich added.

This unique opportunity was the result of several factors. The first step required that BU alumni working for IBM donate a combined minimum gift of \$5,000. The initial \$5,000 gift was then subject to a special five-to-one equipment match by IBM. This increased the total to \$30,000. Kozloski was later able to obtain computer software valued at \$65,000. The equipment and software are being made available through a loan agreement with IBM, renewable annually. The software will be upgraded yearly by IBM at its Atlanta, Ga., facility.

"This fantastic agreement will let BU students experience a new connection between their coursework assignments and the actual classroom encounter," said Henry Dobson, assistant professor of curriculum and foundations. "Students will be knowledgeable about the various software programs used in school districts before they enter the classroom."

The software includes subject matter for grades K through 12 in the sciences, mathematics, reading, language arts, and social science. Examples of software titles include Punctuation, Leaf Structure, Surface Water, Listen to Learn, Algebra, Modern Genetics, Reading for Meaning, Atomic Models, and Chemicals of Life.

The software uses voice synthesis and includes components on classroom management for each topic. Through individualized instruction, students will master the material at their own pace and be tested periodically throughout. Teachers can also modify the software packages to suit their own lesson plans. Many faculty and teachers who are presently non-computer users will discover how technology can improve their own work and that of their students.

Beginning teachers are being increasingly judged, in part, by their use and understanding of technology. Therefore, it is clear that students who are taught on state-of-the-art equipment and who have computer savvy will have an edge when seeking a teaching position.

The Center's activities will also offer inservice training for public and parochial teachers as well as occasional workshops conducted by IBM representatives. As both practicing and student teachers gain competence with these computer applications, their employability in various educational settings is expected to increase.

"This is a great opportunity to expose our students to IBM equipment and software in addition to the existing educational computing lab equipment. When students leave the professional scene, this familiarity with a 'mixed environment,' will enable them to work more effectively with their students," said Howard Macauley, dean of the college of professional studies. "This kind of opportunity for faculty helps to keep them on the cutting edge of

microcomputer technology," he added.

The Classroom Technology Center will be housed in the Curriculum Materials Center and will be composed of a four-work-station laboratory. It is hoped that the file server (a computer to run the software), initially installed for the laboratory, will eventually be networked to all offices of education faculty. Later it should be possible to extend the network to the College of Business student-computer laboratories and faculty offices in Sutliff Hall. Per-

sons off-campus who want to access the technology will be able to do so via telephone modems.

Paul Quick, director of the Curriculum Materials Center, said, "This is an extremely important resource for Bloomsburg University, especially in times of austere budgets. Kozloski and Swarts were very helpful to us by giving demonstrations and answering questions."

Presently, Bloomsburg University, in partnership with the Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit (CSIU), serves as the regional cur-

riculum materials center for public school teachers. The CSIU is eager for its teachers to evaluate the software packages for classroom use. Once recommended, various software can then be purchased by individual school districts.

According to Robert Abbott, director of academic computing, general specifications for the computer hardware include 2MB memory, color display monitor, 45MB fixed disk, Microsoft Word for Windows, METZ file, Grammatik, and Formula Editor.

Understanding more about educational technology

Technology, in a broad sense, is not a new phenomenon to education. Elementary forms, by today's standards, have existed for thousands of years.

Prehistoric people taught their children how to choose animals and vegetation for food by drawing figures in the sand and by using gestures and grunts. As spoken language developed, accumulated knowledge was transmitted through stories and drama. The development of written language and paper permitted greater dissemination of information. The printing press invention opened education to many beyond the wealthy. Electrical transmissions this century in the form of

radio and television and now the computer have further revolutionized the educational process.

When considering the educational process, T.W. Frick writes that *for education to occur there must be a teacher who guides, a student who intends to learn, content to be learned, and a context or setting in which the guidance and learning occur. Education also occurs in an environment consisting of the surrounding community and its culture (Restructuring Education Through Technology, Fastback 326, Phi Delta Kappa, p. 14).*

The following scene, familiar to all BU alumni, is typical of the student-teacher relationship in thousands of classrooms.

Ms. Smith, a high school biology teacher, uses a model skeleton to

show the different bones in the human body. As she explains the scientific names, her 27 students are either watching and listening, taking notes, or looking at textbook illustrations of a skeleton.

Only a handful of more recent graduates will be familiar with the next example — use of today's technology to restructure education. The following kinds of activities depict a far different classroom situation.

Ms. Smith meets with John, one of the 72 students in the class. She reviews the instructional modules he has successfully mastered in the past three weeks. Since he has mastered the prerequisites, John asks to study human anatomy during the next three weeks. Ms. Smith electronically copies a list of instructional modules on human anatomy to a computer disk and explains the order in which he should

study the modules. Meanwhile, 24 of the 72 students are working in the science lab on a variety of subjects they selected to examine. Several other students are working together in an instructional module on the human body that simulates types of care rendered in the emergency room of a hospital. The remaining students are learning about ecology by working in the community on a service project to restore a wetlands preserve (Frick, pp. 7-8).

The contrast between these two examples and the implications for the learning process are clear. Learning is enhanced by doing. And, computer technology can help bridge the gap that often exists between the empirical learning of many subjects and its practical application.

Fears that machines will replace teachers are unfounded. Contrary

to occasional popular misunderstanding, computers cannot of themselves express ideas, evaluate or appreciate the visual and applied arts, or demonstrate qualitative and inventive thinking. Teachers and others are vital to these aspects of cognitive learning. Yet, the teachers and students, whom themselves possess the knowledge and understand the signs and symbols of the computer, have access to a powerful tool to enhance their ability to teach and learn.

The Trust for Generations Surpasses \$3.5 Million Goal

The Library Fund nets \$1.118, The Scholarship Fund, \$1.446, and The Academic Excellence Fund, \$1.225

THE Trust for Generations campaign, the first-ever multi-million dollar capital fund-raiser, conducted over the 1989-1991 two-year period, ended in November, 1991 on a high note. With an original goal of \$3.5 million, more than \$3.7 million was contributed and pledged by 6,850 individual and group donors, both from within and beyond the campus community.

Beginning with gifts and pledges from the corporate/business community, \$209,000 was received during the campaign's early months. This set a tone of accomplishment and record for the university as it began approaching other donor constituencies. The response from local foundations and other charitable organizations was an equally impressive \$650,000.

The wholehearted commitment of alumni to Bloomsburg University was shown with gifts, pledges and planned gifts totalling almost \$1.2 million. In addition to these gifts, alumni continued to support the Annual Fund drive. The alumni's strong record of success with the Annual Fund, coupled

with the intensified and highly successful efforts of *The Trust* campaign, demonstrate their commitment to ensure excellence in education at Bloomsburg.

Those who know Bloomsburg best — the faculty, administration, and support staff — supported the campaign by participating in the "Faculty and Staff for Excellence" program. Through their efforts more than \$37,000 was raised to support and strengthen existing scholarships and to create new ones.

Parents of current undergraduate students contributed more than \$200,000 through The Parents' Fund campaign. The majority of these gifts purchased new holdings for the university's library collection; other gifts supported the advancement of university objectives.

Bloomsburg University often serves as a focal point for the quality of life for the people of the surrounding area — a place to find learning, culture, recreation, community services, and research assistance. Friends of the university renewed their trust and confidence in the University with gifts totalling nearly \$259,000.

Donors to *The Trust* chose a wide range of giving programs. Several individual donors named Bloomsburg as the beneficiary of their estates or created charitable remainder trusts which eventually will transfer assets to the university.

A \$1 million endowment for *The Library Fund* will provide a perpetual yearly income of approximately \$80,000 in additional funding to the Andrus Library. This

will allow Andrus Library to upgrade its holdings to the level needed to serve over 7,000 students and 350 faculty members. *The Library Fund* supplements monies already allocated through the state budget.

No other component of *The Trust for Generations* campaign stands to affect the future of the University or touch as many lives as the campaign initiative to build the scholarship endowment. By adding \$1,000,000 to *The Scholarship Fund*, the university will be better able to attract qualified students to the university from a variety of economic, social, and philosophical backgrounds. The successful completion of *The Trust for Generations* campaign was a major achievement in making that commitment a reality.

The *Academic Excellence Fund* will enable the university to purchase specialized academic equipment for students and faculty, beyond that supported by existing resources. University budgets alone lack the ability to address the needs of today's students. *The Academic Excellence Fund* will allow the university to maintain state-of-the-art equipment so that students are prepared to work with the technologies they will find in the work place — computers and specialized scientific equipment.

Program provides 'added value' for disadvantaged students

Providing "added value" to the lives of disadvantaged college students, according to Bloomsburg's Jesse Bryan, is "the best aspect of the university's developmental education program."

Bryan, director of Act 101/Educational Opportunity Program and chairperson of developmental education at BU for the past 18 years, reflected on the impact developmental education has made in the lives of many past and present university students during a recent interview.

"I'm proud of what we have done," admits Bryan. "When Act 101 started in 1973, we only had 11 students in the program... and today there are close to 500 students attending Bloomsburg who came in through the developmental education department."

In 1971, the state legislature approved funding to supplement the efforts of public colleges and universities and help them provide higher education opportunities to economically and educationally disadvantaged students living in Pennsylvania. In ratifying this concept and making it a state law, the Act 101 program was born.

"In the early '70s, only a few minorities were attending Pennsylvania's state-supported higher education institutions, so the legislature created Act 101," Bryan recalls. "The focus changed in 1975, whereby the term 'minorities' was changed to 'disadvantaged students' which offered eligibility to all students who qualified."

According to Bryan, a "disadvantaged student" is an individual who has the potential and ability to have an outstanding college career "but is restricted from attaining educational goals" due to societal factors. "These students mostly lack some basic skills in reading, writing and mathematics, but they have the ability to do college level work," he says.

Bloomsburg implemented Act 101 in 1973. To be eligible, individuals must be state residents and both educationally and economically disadvantaged, says Bryan.

Bryan's office also administers the Educational Opportunity Program which started at the university in 1969. "At Bloomsburg, EOP is a priority item in President Ausprich's annual budget," says Bryan, noting that eligibility requirements are somewhat different than Act 101. "EOP students can reside anywhere in the United States... or they can be from a foreign country. They must also be either educationally or economically disadvantaged."

Although the university's developmental education department endeavors to provide disadvantaged students with assistance, Bryan contends that Act 101 and EOP students do not receive special financial treatment. "All students who enroll at Bloomsburg through the developmental education program must apply for

financial aid every year."

Approximately 112 students begin their collegiate careers at Bloomsburg each summer through the developmental education program. These students are tested for academic deficiencies and are required to attend developmental classes during the summer.

"When they come to us, we test them to find out what their deficits are," says Bryan. "The test results will indicate whether they will be enrolled in a basic level, first level or second level course as freshmen."

"I have yet to find a way to educate a person if he or she doesn't attend class," he adds. "We offer developmental classes in the summer, but if they miss three class sessions, they are dropped from the program. Those who are found capable of studying at the collegiate level will be entered in biology, speech, English composition and Spanish classes."

Bryan indicates that orientation, counseling and academic advisement are key components of the program.

"The eight developmental instructors — Jim Mullen and Virgie Bryan, reading; Harold Ackerman, Carol Venuto and Janice Walters, writing; and John Wardigo, Christine Kinney and Patricia Gianotti, math — work with each student to bring out the best in their abilities," he says.

"Advisement is handled by assistant director Irv Wright during

their first year... but after they declare a major, a faculty member from a specific department will then serve as the student's advisor."

Students will continue as part of the developmental education program throughout their entire undergraduate career, says Bryan. "But that's not negative... it's only to continually provide them with assistance, such as helping them to register for classes."

Bryan says support from other academic offices has helped to make the developmental education program work at Bloomsburg. "We've always had a great deal of support from academic affairs... and our students' success ratio is now better than it used to be."

Admitting that other institutions graduate more students from their developmental programs, Bryan notes that many of those schools often admit "a much safer" kind of student.

"At Bloomsburg, we admit a number of 'high risk' students... and many of them would not be admitted under traditional requirements," he says.

"In those early years of the program, we used to graduate a nominal number of students," Bryan says, noting that the program's graduation rate has been rising in recent years.

"Today, nearly 50 percent of the students who started college through the developmental education program have gone on to graduate," he adds. — Kevin B. Engler

Oral history captures life at 'Normal School'

The following article was prepared by Roger W. Fromm, university archivist and special collections librarian, based on verbatim notes taken by Dr. Nancy Gill, associate professor of English, during a conversation with Mrs. Hutchison in 1984.

The death of **Josephine Duy Hutchison**, Class of 1915, on November 15, 1990, reminds us of the life-long association (perhaps friendship would be a better word) she had with Bloomsburg University. She attended this institution's model school for kindergarten through sixth grade, then was a college preparatory student here and finished up her education as a regular student in the Bloomsburg State Normal School.

The 1915 yearbook (called *The Onward*) said of her in part, "slim and graceful as a 'Duy' blade of grass and commonly known to her classmates as Joe, is the willow maiden . . . In her dancing, she excels all. Foxtrots and Barn Yard struts are not beyond her. She knows all the trots, and has even been introduced to the Virgil trot, danced in Room L at 9:45."

In 1984, at the age of 88, Mrs. Hutchison agreed to relate her reminiscences for the University Archives. What follows are verbatim excerpts from them:

Oh, it was beautiful. It really was. There was a great deal of ground, a beautiful grove with a stream and a fountain, and a little tiny footbridge. I don't know whether you ever heard of the **Ben Greet Players**. They did Shakespeare, and they did it in the grove, which was delightful. I remember *Midsummer Night's Dream* was there. Of course there were just **Carver**, **Noetling** and **Waller**, that's all there were. Then **Science Hall**. That went up in my day. But that's all, so you see how much ground there was.

There was a little footbridge. Yes, I think they had ducks. Seems to me there was a swan. I'm not sure of that. That was a lovely grove out there. There was a little fountain. There were a lot of oak trees. That pagoda was a gift of the **Class of 1916**, my husband's class. We gave the infirmary. I believe a gardener lived there, with a little hothouse.

While we were in the Model School, we had a little garden, both vegetables and flowers we had to plant and then take care of. Every room had a garden. They were about where **Elwell Hall** is now, opposite Noetling, really. We had strawberries one year. I started in kindergarten, 1902. We walked. I lived down, you know where the Presbyterian Church is? These two friends of mine, we all lived within a block, maybe two blocks, of each other. At first we had only one session of kindergarten. The rest of the time we always walked home for lunch and back, all those years. After we finished grade school, our classes were 7:50 in the morning and 1:15 in the afternoon, so we had about 45 minutes to get home for lunch and back.

In gym we had all kinds of marching. I remember going around there and dividing into fours and twos and ending up in some kind of pattern. I suppose we did that for the exhibition.

We had the exhibition once a year. Each grade did something. Each grade had a program with the wands and dumbbells. The first, second and third probably did some little dance. I remember the little Scottish dance we did. We had little pleated plaid skirts our mothers made.

(Winter activities) We used to coast down Lightstreet Road. Chestnut used to go out to Lightstreet Road. We'd start there in a bobsled and go all the way down to Iron Street when we were about high school age. We ice skated over at the Wide Waters, just beyond Rupert. There's a canal there. You could skate a long distance — almost from Rupert to the Catawissa Bridge. It was a nice, long space.

There must have been advantages in going to the Model School, or I wouldn't have been there. I think it was the type of professors that were up here. (She gets out a letter from a **Mrs. Richardson** and quotes it: "The impression given in the Model School of Normal has lasted through my lifetime, and I am a firm believer in exposing children, the younger the better, to great literature, art and music in meaningful ways . . . The daily meetings in chapel set the tone for the day and the school itself. We revered our teachers, and education itself was most important." Mrs. Hutchison felt this way, too.) At the end of chapel when it was Christmas or

Easter, when we were going on a vacation, we always sang, "Till We Meet Again," and we always sang a hymn.

I guess you know when it was a Normal School we stayed here through the high school years. After sixth grade, we had four years with the professors, which was a great advantage. After the 1920s, they had to go downtown to the high school. We had the advantage of sitting under those teachers who were instructing would-be teachers. **Dennis**, he taught Greek. I took Greek with him. I had two years. It wasn't called high school. We simply went on. It was just a transition from the Model School

Another thing we had down there — we had manual training, a manual training course. I could show you a little table I made. Made little Mission Furniture. It was very severe — just perfectly straight and square, four legs. It hadn't any charm. We made all kinds of things. We always made something to take home for our parents.

Now **Dickerson** was a little severe. She was Latin. We had four years of Latin with her. You had to know your Latin to get through that course. She was pretty serious about it. Of course, that's what made her a good teacher. We had to read Latin, of course. The first year was sort of elementary, then we had to read Caesar, Cicero and Virgil. Two of those years were in my college preparatory. (In high school, we had Latin, English, zoology and chemistry — all the things you would have in high school.) College prep was a little more Latin, a little more Greek, a little German, and English of course, history.

There was a good teacher — **Brill**, medieval-modern, English, and American history. The most interesting was medieval-modern. He just looked like a Roman. All he needed was a toga, really. I don't think anyone could have done any better. He was one of my favorites. He paced up and down the room. He did. He just walked most of the time. He just made history real to us. I can hardly explain it, other than that it was a delightful course.

Did anybody tell you we had daily chapel? At the end of every morning service, **Dr. Waller** got out his little "Don't Book." There were always a couple of items on good manners and things

like that — what to do and what not to do.

Mrs. John Bakeless (John Bakeless was the son of O. H. Bakeless) was one of my friends who started with me. She married O. H.'s son. She says when **Danny Hartline** began this course (botany, zoology) as a young man, he obtained the U. S. Geological Survey of Columbia County, and on this basis he planned the student trips he took us on. We started out at 6:00 in the morning when we were having field trips. When he got this survey, he started out looking for places to take students. He did this on bicycle all over the county. It was called the G7 survey. I just read that the other day. I got out this letter from her again.

We listened to birds and watched things grow, and he just talked about nature. We walked on most of those, but they were nice. We came back in time for 7:50 class. There was a place called **Low's Bottom** out on the Millville Road, not far out. It was a marshy area, where there were a lot of marsh birds, weeds, and flowers and that sort of stuff. He also had a telescope down on the corner of Fourth and Spruce, and we'd go down there at night, especially if there was some meteor that was about to go in orbit, and look at the stars. He was great. They were all good, every one of them.

He was a very gentle sort of person. At first it was a bit difficult, because he would chloroform little animals, cats and things, and we had to watch. It was hard at first.

Wilbur — he was a nice person. I had geometry with him. He was a short man, heavy. His beard was down as far as his belt. He had a long, long beard that tapered, and it wound up around about the belt buckle. It was grey when I knew it. He liked to chew tobacco, so sometimes it was colored a little bit (she laughs, and says perhaps she shouldn't say that). He was just . . . I'll tell you a story about us. I apparently had my finger in the book where I wanted to find an answer, and apparently he saw that, because he walked up beside me and very quietly leaned over my shoulder and said, "Miss Duy, you could think better if you'd take that finger out from between the pages of your book."

I can just remember a nice, friendly feeling with all these professors that I had. Some stand out better than others. I suppose there were some we got mad about.

Mary Goud (chemistry). Her class started at 7:50. She'd make us sit out on the steps until the Berwick students got in on the trolley. Did anybody tell you about these people on the creek that came on the B & S (Bloomsburg and Sullivan) Railroad? They had to walk up to the college. You know where the station is, Sixth and Market.

Mrs. Ellen Schoonover. She was sort of a housemother to most of the Puerto Ricans or Cubans who came here. They came up to get an education. This woman befriended them. She felt sorry for them because they were foreign to the people here. **Osuna**, he was a special boy to her. He lived with the Welshes when **Dr. Welsh** was president. Mrs. Osuna still lives down in Arlington, Virginia, just across the street from a dear friend of mine who went to the Model School with me (Kit). Mr. Osuna wanted to be buried up in Orangeville. Mrs. Schoonover was a dear little old lady, only about four feet, a little tiny thing, a good friend of my grandmother. She taught English.

(Art) Professors had lovely art pictures, collections of things in their rooms. **Bakeless** was the man who brought the stained glass windows. You know why he had them put at the top of the stairs just next to his room (in Noetling)? To quiet the students. He thought that would be a good influence.

We had gymnasium three times a week. We wore bloomers and midi blouses and a tie; we only had black ones, or navy blue. Long stockings, too, with a garter. We had dumbbells and wands, long poles we did fencing with.

Daddy Grotz — he was on night duty when girls and boys both lived in Waller. There was a locked door there, and he would deliver notes from one to the other. That was when girls had to be chaperoned to go downtown. And boys could not dance with the

Speaker urges greater awareness of alcohol damage

Most Americans know that a drug problem exists in the United States, but according to addictions expert Jean Kilbourne, few people realize that alcohol causes the most damage.

Last year, some 6,000 Americans died from using illegal drugs such as crack, PCP, heroin and cocaine in comparison to nearly 100,000 people who died in alcohol-related incidents in the United States," reported the internationally acclaimed author on media, addictions and sex roles.

After noting "the war on drugs does not include alcohol," Kilbourne said she does not advocate a ban on alcohol or its advertising. However, she emphasized, the public has a right to the straight facts on alcohol and alcoholism and needs to become more savvy on the way it is subtly and blatantly manipulated by the alcohol industry.

Kilbourne says alcohol is heavily advertised in America and the ads are designed to recruit new users, increase consumption and assist in brand choice. She notes, however, that the liquor industry denies the first two objectives.

Speaking on the topic, "Under the Influence: The Pushing of Alcohol Via Advertising," to an audience of nearly 300 people in Mitrani Hall, Kilbourne said one out of 10 Americans is a victim of alcoholism and that one in every three drinkers admits to some indication of a drinking problem.

"The first thing to understand about alcohol in America is that it's BIG business," says Kilbourne, noting that the U.S. alcohol industry shows revenues of more than \$90 billion a year and it spends over \$2 billion each year on advertising.

"The annual advertising budget for Budweiser is \$165 million . . . and that's more than the entire annual federal budget for research on alcoholism and alcohol abuse."

According to Kilbourne, the primary form of alcohol education in our society consists of information on alcohol disseminated by the alcohol industry itself.

"The industry has access to the statistics on violence, personal injury, illness and death resulting from alcohol, but these are never presented to the public," she says. "The truth would adversely affect sales, much as the truth regarding nicotine has hurt the tobacco industry."

Strong economy result of education

Nations in the Far West, such as Japan, South Korea and Taiwan, have solid educational systems intact and are rapidly developing strong economies that boast virtually no unemployment, says a Bloomsburg administrator who lived most of his life in that region of the world.

"When you look at the world's successful economic nations, you'll find excellent educational systems in that country," said Hsien-Tung Liu, who came to the university in August as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

"A strong economy is basically the result of excellent education . . . and those nations that have a faltering economy have very weak educational systems," Liu told a McCormick Forum audience.

Liu, who was born and reared in mainland China, spoke during International Month on "Dynamic U.S.-Asian Relations." He noted, "One of the problems in America is that manufacturers in this country rarely design products for the international market. The rest of the world uses the metric system . . . so products that are made in America cannot be used by people in other countries."

Using Japan as his primary model, Liu criticized the American government for spending "literally billions of dollars" to boost the Japanese economy since the end of World War II. "The United States has provided defense to Japan for all these years," he said. "The constitution of Japan that exists today is the same one imposed by General Douglas MacArthur, which implemented a system of democratic government that consisted of checks and balances as well as demilitarization."

But he said the economic situation in Japan today is not the same as it was 40 or 50 years ago. "Everyone in Japan is employed, and the workers are loyal to their companies," said Liu. "There is very little job switching among Japanese workers . . . and the management style is different."

Liu said many Americans believe this "jobless system" is the reason why Japanese manufacturers are ahead of their U.S. counterparts in production.

"I assure you, this is not the reason," he stated emphatically. "The key to Japan's jobless system and its booming economy . . . is its excellent educational system. The Japanese use human resources better than we do, therefore, productivity is enhanced.

This is what gives them an edge."

Other Far East nations have similarities to Japan and are also developing strong economies. "South Korea, Taiwan and other countries in that part of the world are comparable with Japan because they have a market economy which means they are 'export oriented,' a stable form of government, and relatively weak labor unions," said Liu.

"There is very little job switching among Japanese workers . . . and the management style is different."

During the Ronald Reagan-Walter Mondale presidential campaign, Liu recalled the latter candidate as saying, "Reagan will bring the country down to Hong Kong wages."

Although wages in Hong Kong and other Far East nations have historically been lower when compared to similar jobs in the United States, the trend is changing. "In Hong Kong today, certain job categories pay much more than similar positions in America," he noted.

Liu, who lived in Hong Kong and Taiwan before coming to America in 1960, said U.S. manufacturing industries must examine present production methods in an effort "to produce better products" in this country. "Because we have a serious national debt, it's obvious our money has not been spent wisely," he said. "This is an indication of clear-cut mismanagement."

In closing, Liu emphasized the need to develop a strong educational system as "the most important thing to do" in the United States.

"Education is a long-term investment . . . and a long-term commitment," he concluded. — Kevin B. Engler

Education must be 'best in world'

For the "American dream" to come true for future generations of Americans, secondary education in this country must become "the best in the world," according to Pennsylvania business leader Elmer Gates.

"We (Americans) need to understand that we are in global competition," Gates told his audience at the Business and Education Partnerships Conference hosted by the university.

"Our secondary education must be the best in the world. We need a 'fire in the belly' commitment from business, education, parents and students to be the best, because that's what it's going to take to make the American dream a reality for future generations."

Gates, vice chairman of the Fuller Company of Bethlehem, introduced LEHIGH VALLEY 2000 — the Lehigh Valley's business and education partnership program — created as a result of the serious concerns Lehigh Valley businesses have regarding the lack of skilled, motivated entry level workers.

Gates said several companies operating in the Lehigh Valley region do business with foreign countries.

"These businesses have first-hand knowledge of the quality and commitment of America's global competitors . . . and share

concerns about the shortage of skilled workers in their communities."

In recent months, businesses in the Lehigh Valley worked on developing a coalition of educators, area businesses, school boards, parents, students and social service agencies who work together to monitor structural and systemic reform in the region's educational system. An 18-month analysis and planning phase has been completed and implementation is now in progress.

"Leadership is essential in an undertaking of this magnitude," said Gates. "LEHIGH VALLEY 2000 is fortunate to have Ed Donley (CEO of Air Products and Chemicals, Inc., of Allentown) as its chairman. His dynamic leadership and commitment to his community and the youth of Lehigh Valley are key to the success of the project."

The idea behind LEHIGH VALLEY 2000 is to examine the mission of secondary education.

"Across Pennsylvania, of 100 students entering the ninth grade, 25 will drop out prior to graduation," said Gates. "Of the 75 who graduate from high school, 38 will become full-time college

freshmen, and 37 will go into the work force full or part-time."

Gates questioned the mission of secondary education in America. "Is it to prepare young people with the academic, occupational, survival and relationship skills to operate effectively as responsible, contributing employees? Or is it to focus on just over one-third of the students who go on to higher education?"

He said the small percentage of American students progressing through the ranks of secondary and post-secondary education could possibly be justified if their academic achievements were encouraging.

"However, students in the United States taking comparable tests with students in other countries rank 10th . . . and 12th in the important areas, such as science and math," said Gates.

"In addition, our secondary school students are deficient in second language skills, geography, and international study experiences while in high school. So, in addition to not delivering educational programs to meet the needs of the majority of students, we also are not equipping our students to operate successfully and competitively in the global environment," he added.

In the LEHIGH VALLEY 2000 program, business and educational leaders have come together as a team to contribute their unique expertise and perspective to this problem-solving process.

Task areas to be studied include: learning and teaching environ-

But the alcohol industry is selling much more than a product, contends Kilbourne. "Alcohol advertising is designed not only to make us drink, but to develop in us certain attitudes about drinking," she asserts. "Alcohol is portrayed as a magic potion which can make our dreams come true, bring us absolute joy and make us successful, rich, athletic, sexy and desirable. The alcohol industry isn't merely selling liquor, it's selling fantasies.

"Men, for example, are told that alcohol will make them great lovers, however, the truth is the opposite," she says.

"Alcohol abuse almost inevitably leads to sexual dysfunction in both sexes . . . and alcohol is linked to sexually transmitted diseases such as AIDS because it weakens the immune system and affects judgment. It's hard to remember to practice safe sex when your thinking is clouded."

Kilbourne doesn't believe that alcohol advertising causes alcoholism, but "it does create a climate of denial in which very risky attitudes about alcohol are presented as perfectly normal and acceptable," she says. — Patricia Kerwin

ment, "at risk" youth, curriculum, education for employment, basic education and higher education cooperation. Each task force is co-chaired by a business leader and an educator.

"Each task force is charged with identifying the challenges in each of their areas and making recommendations for action programs which would address each of the problem areas," said Gates. "The task forces also identify those changes which would need to be made at the local school district level versus the state level, and those improvements which would require cooperation between business and education."

Gates said the seven task forces have developed 205 recommendations, 18 of which were adopted to pursue initially.

"One recommendation at the state level suggests adopting a common set of criteria for 'at risk' youth during each stage of a child's development including pre-school, elementary, middle, junior and high schools," he noted. "A common definition of a dropout can be adopted at the state level which compares the enrollment of students in ninth grade with those graduating four years later."

At the school level, a proposal calling for teacher involvement in the planning of in-service programs will assist teachers in addressing the "real needs" of their students and help to make those programs more successful.

"The impact of LEHIGH VALLEY 2000 goes far beyond those 200 to 250 individuals who are now involved in implementing these recommendations," concluded Gates.

"We've started a long journey together, and while we are proud of our progress, we are convinced that our best days lie ahead of us," he added. — Patricia Kerwin

girls. That changed before we finished.

We had dancing classes downtown. The girls had to be chaperoned to go downtown. We had chaperons, yes — anything we did. We used to go camping, the girls, but we always had a chaperon. We went to Arbutus Park, up the creek. The B & S used to go right beside the creek. You go out the Millville Road, turn before the bridge over the creek, before the Arbutus Park area, the road before that. There is a chain across the road that went down to Arbutus Park.

(May Day — Mrs. Hutchison was May Queen in 1915) I remember the first part of it, before we started, after the election. Maude Fiske came to me and said, "I'm trying to arrange this May Day business, and I'd like to have the Model School participate in this, so when you're crowned up there and sitting on the throne, I'd like all the Model School children to come to you with something, some gift that they had gotten for you. Would you object if some little girl would bring a snake from Hartline's class?" She said it would be defanged, or whatever they do to them, and I said, "I don't think I'd like that too much." Well, my parents disliked it more than I did, so it never happened. I said, "What did you want me to do with it?" She said, "They could just hand it to you, and you could put it around your neck." I didn't like that at all, so that didn't come, but they did bring flowers and birds and vegetables, and I don't know what all.

The May Queen's throne was over in the grove. Everyone sat around on the ground, and it was over after the children brought their gifts. Maude Fiske, I can see her now. I think they just stood around in the grove. I don't remember any chairs or anything. Mother made my dress. It was a pale green crepe sort of thing, more like a cotton crepe. It was like a Greek dress, with long sleeves laced with ribbon. It did cross in the front, that's exactly what it did. And I had little green shoes, like a little moccasin, maybe.

special purpose appropriation include special summer programs, urban school partnerships, and Board of Governors Scholarships.

Instructional Equipment. The universities in the State System of Higher Education are among Pennsylvania's premier teaching institutions and must acquire instructional equipment to better teach students. The increasing application of technology in all academic fields requires funding of \$5 million for modernizing instructional equipment.

Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching. The State System is requesting \$1 million for the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching to continue to serve as a catalyst for the improvement of teaching and learning in rural and urban parts of the state, creative problem-solving, professional development, and applied research in the science and art of teaching.

Library Enhancement. The State System universities maintain 24 academic libraries throughout the Commonwealth, serving students, faculty, and the general public. These facilities are regional centers for the collection and dissemination of information for academic research, cultural awareness, and economic development. A \$1.5 million appropriation is requested to continue library automation projects at each university, and to acquire new materials.

Rural Education and Community Service Program. Pennsylvania has the nation's largest rural population, and rural Pennsylvanians have a low college participation rate. The State System requests \$735,000 to continue targeted efforts to increase the college participation rate of rural youth and to initiate a State System Center for Rural Education, Research, and Service at Mansfield University.

Labor Studies Institutes. A special appropriation of \$565,000 would enable the State System to establish a System-wide labor education program to assist supervisors and labor leaders in improving labor relations skills needed in the modern workplace. The initiative also would conduct research and develop training programs on subjects like hazardous materials, health care costs, and unemployment compensation; and conduct labor training throughout Pennsylvania. The program would be conducted as a System consortium administered by the Center for the Study of Labor Relations at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, with a "satellite" office in Harrisburg.

'Hard times are not distributed evenly'

"Economic violence" exists in America because such circumstances as unemployment and income tax inequities disenfranchise people from the economy, according to economist and syndicated King's Features columnist Julianne Malveaux.

"Disaffection has set in," Malveaux said. "People feel they cannot participate in the economy, so they participate in crime."

According to the first guest speaker of Bloomsburg's fall Provost Lecture Series, the poorest 20 percent of the population pays 13 percent of its income in taxes, whereas the richest one percent pays income tax of only seven percent.

In July, overall unemployment was a 6.9 percent, however, the rate among blacks was 13 percent and 10 percent among Hispanics. Clearly, she says, the hard times are not distributed evenly.

Speaking on "Diversity in the Marketplace: The Realities," Malveaux cited facts on the changing labor market and its trends for the future.

"Ninety percent of us make our living by working," said Malveaux, who believes there must be equity and equal possibilities in labor markets. "We won't achieve that, however, as long as we believe that some people are better than others or produce more than others."

The inequity as reflected in the statistics is alarming, she said.

In 1979, 25 percent of Americans earned less than \$12,000 per year. By 1990, that figure had grown to 31.7 percent. And yet, the richest five percent of the population owns 46 percent of everything. "The poor have never been more poor, and the wealth has never been more concentrated," she said.

Certain demographic trends, which will have a far reaching impact on the labor market well into the next century, are shifting upward, said Malveaux.

"The median age of the population is growing and will continue to grow. In 1900, only four percent of the population was over age 65, but by the year 2030, 25 percent will be over 65. People have taken for granted the aging of America, but we haven't thought much about how it will affect the way we live. The dependency ratio is growing. How will this impact the group 18 to 64 years of age, which will be supporting those under 18 and others 65 and over?"

America's ethnic populations are on the rise. By the year 2030, 35 to 40 percent of America will be black or brown, she said.

"The fastest growing segment of the labor market is women. As of 1985-1986, white males are no longer the majority of the labor market, and yet, we have an infrastructure of the past to handle very different populations of the present and future. This makes for an exciting time, but a confusing, frightening time."

There is movement upward in other trends, Malveaux said. "National indebtedness is rising. The largest single item in the federal budget is interest on the federal debt, and we now spend

more than \$350 billion annually on this interest, more than we spend on defense."

Reagan and Bush introduced the word trillion in terms of debt, said Malveaux. "In 1980, Reagan said that he would cut the national debt. It grew four times in his eight years in office."

During that time, the government transferred funds from social service spending to defense spending. The notion was that the market, not the public sector, should be providing for people.

Consequently, there was sentiment to cut government social service programs, Malveaux. "The economic buzz words of the Reagan/Bush economy became privatization, deregulation, risk taking and competition. The market was left to do its own thing."

She was quick to point out, however, "If you think of capitalism as a wolf and the government as the dentist, then the dentist can do one of two things: either sharpen the wolf's teeth to hurt people, or dull those teeth to help people. Capitalism in and of itself may not be bad, but left unchecked it can be damaging and destructive."

What are some of the consequences of capitalism left unchecked under Reagan and Bush?

Deregulation of financial services led to the savings and loan crisis which will cost more than one trillion dollars, or \$5,200 per American family. "We turned our heads and let the wolf run through the money system," said Malveaux, who predicts that the next crisis will involve the insurance industry.

Student self-esteem must be first priority

Business leaders must play a greater role in making the U.S. educational system competitive with other industrialized countries, said Ed Donley, chairman, executive committee, Air Products and Chemicals, Inc.

During the Business and Education Partnerships Conference hosted by the university, Donley reported the United States spends more on education per student but produces a less-skilled graduate than industrialized countries.

To solve the problem, we must "set standards of what is realistic to achieve and test periodically to make sure it's happening."

Following his talk, computer and information systems professor Frank Davis expressed doubt that "the problems of education could be solved by treating education like business, such as setting expectations, testing for those expectations and allowing the 'market forces' to dictate procedures."

While "specifying desired outcomes in English or history may very well be a step in the right direction," there is "a fundamental

difference between productivity in business and productivity, as measured by student learning, in the classroom. The use of the business model assumes that the materials with which the business works are the same as students."

But, Davis said, "materials don't think, don't get hungry, don't recognize whether they are hot or cold, don't have emotions and feelings, don't come to the work place (school) with unseen baggage. Materials generally act according to the rules, laws, and principles of physics and chemistry."

Students do not behave in ways that even remotely resemble material, noted Davis. "They come to school with predispositions, with prejudices, with feelings of low self-esteem, feelings which will not allow the educational process — no matter how sophisticated — to work. What does the teacher then do with the student. Scold them, tell them they're lazy, they don't fit. The result is more low self-esteem; and the downward spiral, which usually begins at home, is repeated."

Davis said a fundamental revolution is needed in the education system. Studies have proven that "teachers' preconceived notions and expectations have a profound effect on student performance. I would propose that the first three to five years of school be devoted almost exclusively to development of self-worth and self-

esteem within each and every student."

The students must "never hear a negative word concerning their performance, worth, beauty, deservedness, or anything else which may cause them to question their value," said Davis. "They must be aware of their value by the fact that they exist, and that no further justification is necessary."

He added, "Only a school experience which sets self-esteem as the first priority has any chance of success, because it will release the creative individual within each of us, that individual who truly wants to learn and to be of service to others."

"If people were comfortable with themselves, with others, and with their worth, and the worth of others no matter how different; if people could see how they can make a difference in the world, and in their own lives; if people could see others, no matter how different, as fundamentally the same, we would have a country free of drugs, alcohol and other compulsive and addictive behaviors; a country free of criminal behavior that permeates society; a country free of abuse problems; a country with something of value to export, namely our educational system and our (new) way of life." — Joan Lentzner

'Rape affects the good names of all men'

Joseph Weinberg, who has given more than 500 rape prevention workshops and lectures across the country, told a Bloomsburg audience in Mitrani Hall that "traditional male masculinity could be a set up" for rape.

"Rhett Butler, Charles Bronson and the 'Marlboro Man' are all powerful images which evoke the rugged hero... a guy who never expresses vulnerable feelings," the educational consultant from Madison, Wisconsin, said. "He will take charge... and accomplish things by force."

During his Safety Awareness Month presentation titled "Men Stopping Rape," Weinberg said this masculine image is a model learned by males at an early age.

"I used to wonder why I was taught to believe that rape was only a woman's issue and that it didn't affect me," he said. "And when I look at romance and consider what (young) men are taught, I certainly can see how rape has become normal."

But men "can be victims of rape themselves, or the 'significant other' of a female rape victim," contends Weinberg. "More universally, though, rape... affects the good names of all men," he said. "No woman can tell who's a nice guy, a safe guy. There

is no psychological test to pick out who is 'rape prone.' So, in self defense, women distrust all men."

Weinberg said rape is "fueled" by stereotypes depicted in print ads and TV commercials. "Ads involving men are usually straightforward, but women are portrayed as wild animals or something to be used. In the '70s, a billboard announcing the release of a Rolling Stones album portrayed a hattered and bound woman. The caption read, 'The Rolling Stones leave me black and blue... and I like it.' Only after much public protest was the 'and I like it' dropped from the billboard ad."

Weinberg said men can take several steps to stop rape. "Men need to share feelings, such as vulnerability, with other men," he said. "There must be more open, honest communication, not only between men and women, but also between men and men."

Secondly, when attracted to a woman, Weinberg believes a man

should communicate his feelings better by telling her exactly what his desires are and then finding out her feelings for him.

"In this way, the 'gray areas' are avoided," he said, adding it's the only way a woman's consent can be confirmed. "When it comes to having sex, consent is verbal. So it's critical for both persons to talk about it... and then to talk about birth control."

Weinberg contends, however, that rape won't stop until men can speak freely about the issue with other men, begin taking responsibility for their actions, and stop blaming women for making them lose control.

"In a victim-blaming culture, we say 'she should have known her limit,' we don't say 'he should have known his limit.'"

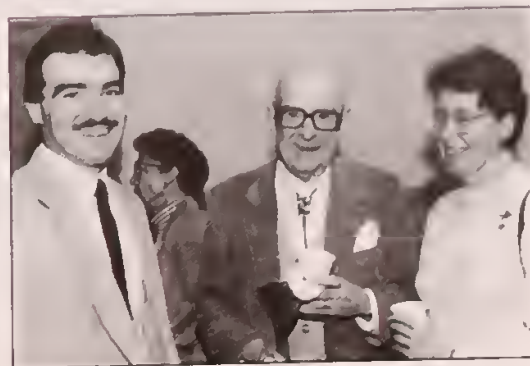
"We are coming to a time... when we have to start listening to the victim... and that means we have to change some of our notions about what rape is," he said. — Patricia Kerwin

Marketing and Management departments split

A recommendation to separate the marketing and management programs at BU was confirmed at the quarterly session of the Council of Trustees on November 20.

Betty D. Allamong, provost and vice president for academic affairs, reported the separation of the marketing and management department has been anticipated since 1981.

"At that time, former provost Larry Jones told the marketing faculty they should wait until the department became larger," she said.

The marketing department has grown to 300 majors and employs six full-time faculty members, while the management program has 409 majors and 11 full-time faculty. "Certainly, the marketing department has attained its goal... and I think it's very important that they gain recognition as a separate, distinct department," she noted.

A separate marketing department will better serve students in advising, program development and placement. Benefits include recruiting and retaining qualified faculty and students; enhancing public image, credibility and visibility in corporate recruitment and placement of students; increasing administrative effectiveness; and creating additional opportunities for development activities, she said.

Separating the two departments does not require additional facilities, said Allamong, noting that faculty and students in the management program will also enjoy the benefits of a separate identity.

Joe Bressi '66 was featured in an article in the August 30 edition of *The News-Item*, Shamokin. Excerpts follow:

Joe Bressi, local realtor, presented a \$450 check to the fund-raising campaign of Go Northumberland. Bressi, whose donations to the group total nearly \$2,000 this year, has pledged a

percentage of Bressi & Martin Associates' real estate sales.

His active participation in economic development efforts are not surprising. The well-known teacher, home remodeler, real estate agent, former township commissioner and member of the board of directors of the newly-formed Lower Anthracite Community Hospital Corp. (not to mention a husband and father of four), Bressi has filled many roles, most of them devoted to improving the status quo.

"I guess I can't pass up an opportunity to change things for the better," Bressi said. "From the time I graduated from high school, my philosophy has always been to think positive and better things will follow."

Although he had to juggle part-time jobs to meet expenses, Bressi worked to earn a bachelor's degree in secondary education and a master's in elementary education at Bloomsburg University. Bressi said teaching appealed to him because it gave him the opportunity to help youngsters improve their minds and lives. He became discouraged after teaching 20 years in the Shamokin area by the number of students who left the area after graduation.

"We lost so much talent. Our young people left to pursue careers in other cities or states because there were few jobs and very little industry to hold them here. Community leaders recognized the problem, but we didn't know how to change the situation.

"Now, through Go Northumberland, we are trying to mobilize support for economic development efforts to increase job opportunities in the county," Bressi said.

He began to buy and renovate homes during summer school breaks and learned many construction techniques while remodeling older homes.

Bressi studied for his realtor's license. He completed the courses and asked Shamokin Realtor Jack Martin to sponsor him for the real estate exam. Bressi, in return, agreed to sell properties for Martin part-time. When Martin decided to semi-retire, Bressi bought the business and gave up teaching.

Bressi has helped the business grow from 20 listings to more than 125 in just over five years. He also has an office in Mount Carmel, established in 1986, and currently is renovating a third office in Elysburg.

From improving buildings to improving neighborhoods was a short leap. As a Coal Township commissioner, Bressi was instrumental in establishing an urban renewal program to eliminate vacant and dilapidated buildings.

"As my community involvement grew, so did my desire to prevent our young people from leaving the county," Bressi said. "We needed them to keep the area vital and economically healthy and to keep them, we needed more jobs. That's why we got involved in Go Northumberland..."

Another way Bressi hopes to stimulate Northumberland County's economy is by attracting older people

back to the area. To this end, he is involved in marketing a condominium community in Elysburg targeted to retirees and empty nesters who want to enjoy modern, convenient and carefree living.

"People and jobs are the keys to economic health," Bressi said. "If we want to make Northumberland County an even better place to live, we must create more jobs for young people and attract older people back to boost the economy."

Graduate programs earn ASHA accreditation

The university's master's degree programs in speech language pathology and audiology has been accredited by the Educational Standards Board of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, according to President Harry Ausprich.

The five-year accreditation became effective in October and runs through September 1996.

"This is the first time our programs have received accreditation from ASHA's educational standards board," said G. Donald Miller, assistant chairperson and professor of communication disorders and special education.

Miller said the university's Speech, Hearing and Language Clinic has been accredited by ASHA for more than a decade. "Another wing of ASHA, the Professional Services Board, has accredited our clinic for the last 13 or 14 years."

But to receive academic curriculum accreditation from ASHA, institutions are required to operate a four-year undergraduate degree program in liberal arts and general education with "just a smattering of normal communication disorders," said Miller. "Education and training in speech language pathology and audiology should really be done at the graduate level . . . and this requires two additional years of study."

For many years, Bloomsburg operated a five-year program and educated its students through courses and practicum during their undergraduate career. However, this arrangement failed to meet ASHA's accreditation requirements.

"Our students earned a bachelor's degree after four years, but they also had some of their practicum and coursework completed," explained Miller. "Those who graduated from the four-year program took an additional year in either speech language pathology or audiology . . . and were eligible to graduate with a master's degree. Our five-year graduates were also meeting certification requirements."

Miller said the university tried to get ASHA's approval on its five-year curriculum a few years ago, but that attempt failed. According to ASHA, "we were placing too much emphasis on training at the undergraduate level . . . and our student-faculty ratio, about 20-to-one in our five-year program, did not meet their six-to-one regulation for a two-year graduate level program," he said.

About four years ago, ASHA mandated a policy that would only recognize practitioners who graduated from accredited programs. This prompted the university to comply with ASHA's accreditation requirements. "We spent the last three or four years formulating a plan that would meet ASHA's standards," said Miller.

By gaining ASHA accreditation, Bloomsburg now ranks as one of eight accredited graduate training programs in speech language pathology, and one of four in audiology, in the state.

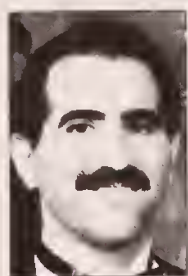

Bloomsburg University's official enrollment during the fall semester was 7,720, an increase of 256 students. The total undergraduate enrollment of 7,042 included 712 non-degree students. Graduate students totaled 678, an increase of 22 students.

Total full-time equivalency was 6,704, including 6,394 undergraduates. Undergraduate FTE is calculated by dividing the total number of undergraduate credit hours scheduled for the semester by 15 — the average number of credit hours for a full-time undergraduate student per academic term.

Graduate FTE rose to 309, an increase of 12 students over last year. This figure is calculated by dividing the total number of graduate credit hours scheduled for the semester by 12 — the average number of credit hours for a full-time graduate student per academic term.

Field Hockey team captures PSAC title

Coach Jan Hutchinson's field hockey squad captured its second consecutive Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference and sixth overall title to cap a fine regular-season that saw the club lose just one time.

Hutchinson achieved the remarkable feat of being named national coach of the year in field hockey (Division III) and softball (Division II) in the same year.

The young team, that at times during the season had at least five freshmen starters in the lineup, went on to win an NCAA regional event and reach the national semifinals for the 10th time in the last 11 years. The Huskies moved on to the national championship game where, for the second year in a row, they dropped a one-goal decision to Trenton State. The 1-0 loss to the Lions closed another outstanding season with an overall record of 22-2.

Four players, who were very instrumental in the team's success, seniors Gisela Smith, Trudy Horst, Beth Bowman and junior Denise Miller, earned All-American honors with Smith, Horst and Miller gaining berths on the first team, while Bowman was selected to the third team.

Smith was named winner of the Broderick Award as the nation's top player for the second season in a row and headed a defense that gave up just eight goals in 24 games. Smith added seven goals and five assists at the offensive end.

Miller was the leader offensively for the squad setting a school record with 31 goals during the season. She has now scored 62 goals in her three years with the Huskies which is a BU scoring mark. Horst and Bowman were solid contributors to the Huskies' defense and each added two goals.

A scholarship fund named in honor of long-time BU men's swimming and diving coach Eli McLaughlin has grown since the last update. The fund now has a \$15,019.86 balance. His teams finished among the top three squads in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Championships on 14 occasions, and he coached 15 conference champions in 27 events. He was voted PSAC "Coach of the Year" in 1979.

After a sluggish start, the Huskies' football team turned its fortunes around and closed the season on a very positive note by winning its last four games to close at 5-5. The Huskies finished 4-2 and in second place in the PSAC East.

Key victories over Mansfield, Millersville and West Chester helped the team to its strong finish and were highlighted by some outstanding individual efforts.

The most notable performance of the season came at Mansfield when senior Jerry Marks carried the ball a PSAC and BU record of 59 times for another school record of 300 yards and three scores. It was one of three-straight games Marks rushed for more than 120 yards. In the season finale, quarterback Alan Eck completed 27 of 37 passes for 317 yards and three TDs.

SSHE approves graduate program in adult fitness

Career opportunities in exercise science and adult fitness are anticipated to increase throughout the current decade and into the next century, according to William Sproule, professor and assistant chairperson of BU's health, physical education and athletics department.

"The job market will expand to fitness, geriatric, and medical centers, as well as hospitals and other health care organizations that offer rehabilitation programs," says Sproule.

At its October meeting, the State System of Higher Education's board of governors approved a proposal from Sproule and colleague Linda LeMura, assistant professor of health, physical education and athletics, to implement a master of science graduate degree program in exercise science and adult fitness at the university starting this semester.

The program, initially introduced by the two professors at the university's council of trustees' July meeting, will "concentrate on improving the quality of life for elderly people."

According to LeMura, national studies reveal that greater numbers of elderly people will need programs that respond specifically to their health and medical problems. Noting there has been a change in demographics in this country, she says a gradual increase in the average age of Americans has resulted in larger numbers of elderly people.

Sproule says students who graduate from the program will be able to help improve the quality of life, assessment, physical performance and rehabilitation for all adults. "A concerted emphasis must be placed on whole health... for adults and older people," he said.

In addition, the program will allow Bloomsburg to strengthen its mission as a public service resource center and enable the institution to further develop health science programs and enhance relationships with local and regional health care centers.

"A major focus of this program will be to address the needs of those people who have been victimized with the nation's number one killer... heart disease," LeMura said.

Women's soccer team posts winning record in second season

The women's soccer team, in only its second season as a varsity squad, posted a 9-7-1 mark against a tough schedule that included many of the region's top teams. State System enrollment nearly 100,000

Headcount enrollments at the 14 State System of Higher Education universities grew by less than one percent over the previous year, according to the fall 1991 enrollment statistics.

Overall, the headcount enrollments at the state-owned universities totaled 99,850, an increase of 768 students, or eight-tenths of a percent, over the fall 1990 total of 99,082.

State System Chancellor James H. McCormick attributed the slight increase in enrollments to the state-owned universities' efforts in implementing a recommendation contained in the State System's planning document, "Priorities for Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education During the 1990s."

Adopted by the Board of Governors in October 1990, priorities recommended that, "Unless the capital and operating resources required for growth are provided, State System enrollment should be stabilized for at least the next five years in order to maintain educational quality."

"The State System universities have reached their real limits of funding, physical capacity, and staffing to enroll significant numbers of additional students," Chancellor McCormick said. "The Board of Governors and the university presidents have addressed this situation by working together in adopting and implementing an enrollment management policy designed to align resources with enrollments to better serve the needs of Pennsylvania."

Since the creation of the State System in July 1983, headcount enrollments have grown by 20,568, an annual average increase of 2,285. Over the last nine years, State System enrollment has risen 26 percent.

For fall 1991, the number of full-time students rose by 1,619 to 78,051, a 2.1 percent increase. Part-time student enrollments decreased, falling 851 students or a 4.0 percent decrease.

"During times of economic uncertainty, full-time enrollments tend to increase," said Dr. Kerry L. Moyer, State System director of research and information technologies. "This occurs because more students seek a college education so that they are able to compete in a tight job market. Also, students who previously worked and attended part-time now may find themselves unemployed and choose to continue their education full-time."

Non-traditional students, those age 25 and older, also increased at State System universities this year. Currently, one of every five students in the State System is over 25. For the 1991 fall semester, 22,093 non-traditional students are enrolled, an increase of 948, or 4.5 percent, over 1990. Non-traditional students account for 22.1 percent of all state-owned university students.

"We have found that non-traditional students choose to re-start or continue their education because of a significant change in the lives, such as a change in careers, a loss of a job, or after raising

a family," Dr. Mnyer said. "Also, some older students attend classes for self-development, professional development, or as a way to better use their leisure time."

Undergraduate enrollments at State System universities held stable, growing only 559 students, or six-tenths of a percent, to 88,398. Graduate enrollments rose by 209, or 1.9 percent, to 11,452. The enrollment figures for male students increased 635, or 1.6 percent, to 41,258. Female student enrollment rose by only 133, or two-tenths of a percent, to 58,592.

With more than 10,500 employees, the State System is the 18th largest employer in the state. The State System's physical plant includes 719 buildings located on over 4,000 acres of land.

Ausprich

President wants to accomplish much more before his term ends in 1994

Bloomsburg President Harry Ausprich plans to maintain a full agenda during the final two years of his contract.

Although he and his family have agreed he will not seek an extension when his contract expires in June 1994, Ausprich is not about to let the next two years just slip away. There's too much work he's determined to finish.

"By announcing my personal plans at this time, I believe the university will have the advantage of seeking and selecting its next president before the conclusion of my term so that an interim appointment is not necessary," Ausprich explains.

In the meantime, Ausprich will continue to fulfill all his presidential duties. "There's still much I want to see accomplished before I move on to life's next adventure," he says. Continued enhancement of the university's commitment to promote and attain cultural diversity heads his priority list.

"This is an important value for any university, but it has also always been a part of my personal value system," Ausprich said.

The president explains that exposure to diversity helps prepare students for the "real world" they face after graduation. He takes pride in a number of milestones the university has achieved in this area. Among these are development of noteworthy programs highlighting black, Hispanic and Native American Indian issues and concerns; curriculum modifications to foster inclusivity and recruitment efforts to assemble a multicultural student body.

"We are all part of a diverse culture," Ausprich says, "and our

students need opportunities to better understand issues and opportunities this presents. We will only grow and prosper as a university if we keep diversity before us as a priority agenda item."

One of many champions of the immediate need for a new library, Ausprich plans to lend "aggressive support" to help raise the necessary funds. The State System of Higher Education has recently instituted a new policy requiring member universities to raise 25 percent of their capital funding. In the case of the proposed new library, this amounts to about \$2.5 million needed from the private sector.

Since his appointment in July 1985, Ausprich has been personally involved in development and over \$17 million has been raised. "I was one of the first presidents in the State System to be actively involved in raising funds. I was hired to help devise strategies to raise funds from the private sector," he recalls.

Ausprich has high praise for Anthony Ianiero, assistant vice president of development, and other members of the development staff. "Together we make an effective team," he says.

Ausprich says he finds deep satisfaction in seeing funds he and others have raised transformed into scholarships for bright and deserving students; enhancement of Mitrani Hall, Gross Auditorium and other physical facilities; support for athletic programs and the renowned Celebrity Artist Series.

Allamong

Provost leaves 'maturing university' after five years of service

Betty Allamong helped build a legacy of expanded academic excellence at Bloomsburg University. Allamong, who served as provost and vice president for academic affairs for the past five years, retired from the university at the end of June.

Allamong's tenure as provost is the longest in recent history. Looking back, she finds many achievements gratifying, but clearly faculty and student scholarship holds the deepest personal satisfaction.

"Over the years, a series of events has fostered more scholarship in support of our basic mission — teaching," she recalls. "Excellence in teaching is directly related to the faculty's enthusiasm and ability to share information with colleagues at other universities, to keep abreast of the latest developments in their fields and to attend conferences and workshops to expand their knowledge base."

During her Bloomsburg term, Allamong witnessed a steady increase in the quality of the applicants for faculty promotions, sabbaticals and tenure, all "indications of a maturing university evolving from its roots as a teachers' college."

Allamong is quick to credit other administrators, faculty and staff for working together to achieve academic gains. But those strides were not achieved without periods of frustration. Even though she worked her way up from assistant professor and associate professor to full professor at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., she says it was sometimes hard to overcome the "we-they" attitude.

"Surmounting faculty perception of the provost as a manager

rather than as an academic leader was a constant challenge," she explains.

"Sometimes it's difficult for faculty to convince administration their problem is real. I truly tried to listen to their needs and reinforce their concerns," she says. A former biology teacher, one of her first acts as provost was to institute appropriate storage for chemicals used in classroom laboratories. It was the first of countless times Allamong listened and then made sure something was done.

When she arrived on campus in July 1987, Allamong found a serious and immediate need for basic scientific equipment. "We lacked the fundamental resources we had back at Ball State in 1972." In search of additional funding resources, she helped create the student enhancement fee. This \$25-per-semester assessment for full-time students raised \$1,020,000 over the last three years and was used to update laboratory equipment.

"We still have a long way to go, but we've also come a long way," Allamong says.

Looking to the future, Allamong sees construction of a new library as the most important priority facing Bloomsburg. "The need to upgrade library facilities is crucial to Bloomsburg's future survival," she says.

Allamong is also eager to see completion of an ongoing project

Matteson appointed interim provost; sees role of 'garnering resources'

Carol J. Matteson, dean of the College of Business, was appointed interim provost and vice president for academic affairs by President Harry Ausprich, effective July 1.

Matteson will fill the position held by Betty D. Allamong, who retired June 30, until a permanent replacement is appointed.

"I am pleased to have this opportunity to work as Bloomsburg's interim provost and vice president for academic affairs," said Matteson. "The university has a strong faculty, quality students and devoted support staff... and as we move into the coming year, I look forward to working with everyone on campus because we're all part of the educational enterprise."

With more than 15 years of classroom experience, Matteson has an intimate understanding of the teaching process.

"My experiences range from the traditional classroom environment to the technologically advanced classroom," said Matteson, who has worked 22 years in education. "In the academic setting, the role of management is to facilitate the learning process by garnering resources... to support faculty in their teaching and research activities, and allow enriched educational experiences for students."

According to Matteson, collegial working relationships are becoming more important as colleges and universities face increasingly difficult decisions regarding the use of resources and planning for the future. "The provost must be able to articulate the academic goals of the university with the help, input and collective agreement of the various representative bodies in academic affairs."

Before coming to Bloomsburg in 1989, Matteson worked two years as an associate professor of business administration at the University of Maine at Augusta. During that time, she also served as a graduate faculty member in the MBA curriculum at the University of Southern Maine and the MPA program at the University of Maine.

From 1974 to 1987, Matteson performed administrative and faculty duties at Slippery Rock University. She served as director of the university's Evening College and Continuing Education program, and was an assistant to the president. She was also a faculty member in Slippery Rock's management/marketing and physical education departments.

Earlier in her career, Matteson was a public school teacher for four years at Sparta Merged Schools in Spartansburg and Titusville High School. She also served as a lecturer in the teacher education program at Sturt College of Advanced Education in Adelaide, South Australia.

In 1991, Matteson was named an "emerging woman leader in higher education" by the American Council of Education's Office of Women in Education. She was also chosen as a "distinguished educator" by the Pennsylvania Council of Alumni Associations last year.

Matteson holds a doctoral degree from the Katz Graduate School of Business at the University of Pittsburgh, a master of science degree from the University of Oregon and a bachelor of science degree from Slippery Rock University.

FOR MORE THAN 150 YEARS, our mission at Bloomsburg University has been to provide a quality education to our students. Keeping the university centered on our mission, given changing economic and social climates, requires a focused vision and a clear set of priorities, priorities that address such important issues as the place of teaching and research within the university, access and enrollment, maintenance and expansion of physical facilities, curricular and co-curricular offerings, and the role of the university as it relates to the larger context of society. In this 1991 *President's Report*, I will comment on how Bloomsburg University is responding to today's urgent and pressing concerns within the framework of our historical mission, strategic directions and university priorities.

"JUST AS ALL COLLEGE teachers are and will continue to be learners through their scholarly activity and the act of teaching itself, so all college students are and will continue to be teachers in the broadest sense of the term, as well as learners, throughout their lives. Regardless of their college majors and career choices, our students will teach—teach their own children and those of friends and relatives, teach professional colleagues and employees under their supervision and teach peers in organizations in which they are active."

(Priorities for Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education during the 1990s).

We know what the general outcome of higher education is intended to be. But exactly what our students should learn has been the subject of debate for centuries. Today, that debate centers around issues relating to race—and, increasingly, gender; humanities core courses that reflect the theme of "cultural legacies;" "special first-year courses and senior-year offerings aimed at capping students' academic work;" stronger general education requirements in mathematics and science; and teaching "as part of broader plans to improve undergraduate education."

We at Bloomsburg University have considered a number of these undergraduate curricular trends in an effort to improve teaching and learning. In fact, one of the responsibilities of the Bloomsburg University Curriculum Committee is the reconsideration of curricular concerns. This fall the committee initiated an examination of the current status of diversity in the curriculum, and a subcommittee, headed by Carol Matteson, dean of the College of Business, is expected to make recommendations for curriculum transformation.

In addition, the Curriculum Committee has sponsored a number of programs centered on improving teaching, including a seminar on "Encouraging Writing Outside the English Department." And, designs for a special first-year course, which will serve as a centerpiece for the university's Freshman Year Experience program, have been presented and discussed.

The provost, deans and faculty have worked together to produce a number of special sessions offered through The Teaching and Learning Enhancement (TALE) Committee. Two such sessions this year were "Teaching and Learning in a Multi-Cultural Environment" and "Empowering Disabled Individuals in a University Environment."

Bloomsburg University's year-old urban initiatives program with the Harrisburg School District has provided some marvelous teaching/learning opportunities for students and faculty from both institutions. A

number of Bloomsburg students have participated in field trips to the Harrisburg schools, and several are student teaching in the district. Members of our Urban Education Association conducted a clothing drive on campus and delivered the clothing collected to Harrisburg for distribution to those in need. And, three Harrisburg elementary principals participated in our "Business Education Partnerships Conference" this fall.

This year, the Greater Harrisburg Foundation has provided a \$5,000 gift toward the partnership. In addition, the program has received \$15,000 from the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching and another \$15,000 from the State System of Higher Education Social Equity Office. With the funds from the Social Equity Office, the university plans to offer a three-week program, PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in Developing Excellence), in the summer of 1992 for 90 students from Scott-Rowland Middle School in Harrisburg. Under the supervision of the director of the Bloomsburg-Harrisburg Partnership Project, Mary Harris, assistant professor of curriculum and foundations, 30 seventh, 30 eighth and 30 ninth-grade students will spend a week each at Bloomsburg attending classes and staying in residence halls.

The development and accreditation of academic programs is an important part of the teaching/learning framework. On the programmatic level, Bloomsburg University received approval from the Board of Governors to offer a new program, a Master of Science Degree in exercise science and adult fitness. The College of Business' marketing and management department was split, creating two separate departments, an activity undertaken to better serve students in advising, program development and placement. The master's degree programs in speech language pathology and audiology received accreditation from the Educational Standards Board of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. By gaining accreditation, Bloomsburg University now ranks as one of eight accredited graduate training programs in speech language pathology and one of four in audiology in the state. The Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools reaffirmed Bloomsburg University's accreditation after accepting a progress report from the institute in April. And, Bloomsburg's School of Education has had its accreditation reaffirmed by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Within the context of the national higher education agenda, a growing number of scholars are writing papers, "urging colleges and universities to restore attention to the venerable but tattered concept of character." These scholars, states George Keller in his article last fall on "Student Conduct: The Next Priority," in *Planning for Higher Education*, argue that "the behavior, self-discipline, aspirations, work habits and attitudes that students bring to the classrooms are at least as important as the curriculums of schools and colleges."

Bloomsburg University has long recognized the importance of values education for our students and was one of the first State System schools to require a values component in its general education core.

Over the past few years, a values education segment has been incorporated in orientation programs for new students, the Student Leadership Training Program and the residence advisers' training programs. In fact, values education was a topic of discussion at the November Bloomsburg University Curriculum Committee Open Forum.

One aspect of character development that has received increasing attention at Bloomsburg University is volunteerism. This year the Student Volunteer Services program was selected as Pennsylvania's "hub campus" for a nationwide outreach and coalition building effort geared toward increasing the number of college students involved in community service activities. The program, titled, "Into the Streets," was launched Nov. 1. More than 400 faculty, staff and students participated in the program, providing 1,600 hours of service to the community. "Into the Streets" is just one of dozens of programs which receive volunteer support. Others include Habitat for Humanity, Amnesty International, the Columbia County Agency on Aging and innovative dropout prevention programs in three local school districts.

Values education has been supported through a wide variety of university programming. The Center for Counseling and Human Development sponsored an open forum about violence on campus and a mock rape trial. Residence life sponsored workshops by Joseph Weinberg, president of Men Stopping Rape, and promoted Alcohol Awareness Week and Safety Awareness Month during which subjects such as alcohol abuse, AIDS, automobile safety and rape prevention were explored.

Our university is becoming increasingly more diverse. Consequently, a more penetrating knowledge and deeper understanding of cultural and societal issues and opportunities are becoming increasingly important to our mission as a university. By way of acknowledging our diversity and heightening our awareness of human relations issues, we celebrated Black History Month, Women's History Month, Latino Heritage Month and International Festival Month, complete with a full range of curricular and co-curricular activities.

The university was further sensitized to deaf awareness through performances by "Image," Bloomsburg University's sign language performance group. And a new joint venture of the Bloomsburg Players and the Black Cultural Society culminated in the production of the play, "Day of Absence," which speculates on the impact the sudden disappearance of all African-Americans would have on society.

Musical performances and theatrical presentations support another important aspect of the teaching/learning dimension, as the following quote by William J. Rewak in "The Pillars of Durham," published last October in *America*, illustrates: "... beauty is investigated and sought by a college as much as truth is, for a truly aesthetic experience touches the deepest part of ourselves, helps us to know ourselves and, as Aristotle explained, helps us define and order—not sentimentalize or repress—our emotions. That is why, on any campus worth its tuition, there are art exhibits, the production of plays, music recitals, poetry conferences and short story contests. A college encourages the ingestion of the beautiful."

Our "ingestion of the beautiful" this year has included presentations by pathologist Kurt Benirschke, violinist James Buswell, Cambodian Holocaust survivor Dith Pran, author and illustrator of children's books Maurice Sendak, poet Nikki Giovanni and economist Julianne Malveaux, all part of the Provost's Lecture Series. Other exciting components have included faculty and student recitals, art displays, the campus theater productions of "Reckless" and "Day of Absence" and Celebrity Artist Series events which have brought to our campus such performers as the Boys Choir of Harlem, the New York City Opera National Company, the Chestnut Brass, the Philadelphia Orchestra and Ramsey Lewis and Billy Taylor.

Through an on-going examination and reassessment of our curricular offerings, through our expanding values education program and through our "ingestion of the beautiful," we are nurturing a stronger, more vibrant teaching/learning environment for all the members of our university community — students, faculty and staff.

MORE THAN EVER, HAVING A

college degree is becoming increasingly important to getting a job or advancing a career, yet, for many Americans, the opportunities for obtaining that degree at a public university are diminishing. One of the barriers to pursuing a college degree today is the rising cost of higher education in many states. Echoing this reality are the results of a recent survey conducted by the Gallup Organization for the Council for Advancement and Support of Education. According to the survey, 73 percent of the respondents — an increase of 15 percent over those surveyed five years ago — reported it was very important to get a college degree. While 74 percent said they could not afford to send their child to college unless they received loans or grants.

As a consequence of constraints imposed by limited state allocations, capped enrollments at many institutions, including Bloomsburg, have created another barrier to higher education. In many respects, Bloomsburg University reflects what is being played out at the national level. Literally thousands of students are knock-

ing at our door, but our resources are such that only one in seven can be admitted. Since 1981, the number of applications received for admission to the freshman class has grown by 55.6 percent, while the number of enrolled freshmen has increased by only 1.2 percent. Student interest in attending Bloomsburg, as measured by the number of admission applications received, has increased to an all-time high, yet state allocations lag far behind the level needed to support the admission of proportionately higher numbers of students. The pressure to admit a larger number of students is quite strong, but doing so without additional resources would dangerously weaken the quality of the academic experience. Students at Bloomsburg, as well as other public universities across the nation, are expressing deep concerns about budget cuts, overcrowded classes and escalating tuition.

This spring, the Commonwealth cut state appropriations throughout the entire Pennsylvania state education community. Bloomsburg University sustained a budget cut of approximately \$1.3 million. The effects of this reduction in funding impacted all of us — students, faculty and staff. Some academic departments did not have sufficient funds to supply classroom material such as handouts and software. Staff positions which became vacant in the university were not filled. These measures, along with many others, enabled the university to maintain a balanced budget without reducing the faculty complement, but the cost of doing so was greatly felt.

Last year the university adopted a position to manage enrollments in "light of changing demographics, fiscal resources and other opportunities and constraints." Because of insufficient classroom and laboratory space, a library that is already stretched beyond capacity and funding levels that barely reach far enough to service our current student population, Bloomsburg University has assumed a "no-growth" posture for the next several years. This enrollment limit comes at a time when the university has committed itself to producing a more diversified student body reflecting a broader representation from Commonwealth counties and a more diverse international, ethnic and racial student population. Also during this same time, the university has reconfirmed its historical mission to provide access to students with a range of academic abilities while maintaining a student body of overall high academic quality. It is clear that for the university, finding ways to accomplish these goals will be difficult. However, the real hardship will be borne by many high school students and their parents. For them, the situation means fewer choices and opportunities, higher college costs and increasing disappointment in the progressively elusive American dream.

THOMAS CARLYLE SAID, "THE true university of these days is a Collection of

Books," and so it remains today — a library is central to our ability to fulfill our teaching, research and service missions. In 1988, Bloomsburg University's request for a new library — our most critical need today — was approved by the House and Senate and Governor Casey. We are currently awaiting release of funds for the project and are hopeful we will meet with success in 1992.

The present building was constructed at a time when the enrollment of the university stood at 3,370 students. Since then we have grown by 129 percent. Student demand far exceeds the current seating capacity of 389 persons, and students often must sit on the floor to utilize library resources or to study.

Space constraints have also dramatically impacted the library collection. Periodicals and books have been dispatched to off-campus storage areas causing delays in access for users. Needed print materials such as books and government documents cannot be purchased because of space limitations. As a space-saving substitute for printed materials, microforms are purchased, but there are inadequate locations for microform readers.

The difficulty of not being able to adequately accommodate library users has been felt by all of our patrons. Many students report they often seek out other college and university libraries for research purposes because they find Bloomsburg's library to be too congested and because they also find shelved materials to be too limited for their research purposes. Some faculty avoid making library assignments because of students' inability to easily access required materials. It is ironic that the recent computerization of the card catalogue has allowed patrons from remote areas to inquire about library holdings, yet space constraints have made the actual use of library material an involved, difficult process.

Meanwhile, we have taken steps to enhance the library collection. In 1989, the university began a \$3.5 million development campaign to provide funding for a larger book collection, to increase scholarship opportunities for deserving students and to provide additional funding to purchase computers and other specialized academic equipment. *The Trust for Generations* campaign was completed this fall, with pledges, planned and in-kind gifts totaling \$3.78 million. This year alone, parents of current undergraduate students contributed \$75,000 to the university, 25 percent of university employees gave support through the Faculty and Staff for Excellence campaign, 25 percent of alumni donated \$400,000 to their alma mater, and students gave \$50,000 through the Community Government Association, this being their fourth installment on a \$250,000 gift designated for the library collection. During 1991, the Bloomsburg University Foundation raised more than \$1.2 million in support of priority projects and established endowments, and the Foundation's portfolio is fast approach-

ing the \$4 million level. The infusion of these resources into the academic program, including the library, has provided a margin of excellence.

UNLIKE MANY COLLEGES

across the country who have had to lay off employees because of rising costs and dwindling resources, Bloomsburg has not had to consider the retrenchment of faculty and staff this year. However, we have lost a larger than usual number of faculty and staff due to a special early retirement provision made available through the Mellow Bill. These individuals, numbering more than 50 in 1991, collectively represent hundreds of years of experience in higher education. Their expertise and their collegiality will be sorely missed.

The accomplishments of the faculty and staff are many. This year, they have had more than 60 articles or papers accepted for publication; more than 100 have presented papers, workshops or lectures at conferences; and more than two dozen have been elected as new officers of professional organizations. Books published by the faculty this year include Dennis O. Gehris' *Advanced Business Applications Study Guide*, Walter M. Brasch's *With Just Cause: Unionization of the American Journalist*, and Glenn Sadler's *Teaching Children's Literature: Issues, Pedagogy, Resources, The Selected Letters of George MacDonald and The Wise Woman or the Lost Princess*.

Recognition of our faculty has come in many forms. To name a few, Linda LeMura, health, physical education and athletics professor, was invited to test a new portable training mask for the Italian Olympic Committee. Harry Strne's "Mad Hatter Tournament" was ranked 27th in "The World's Largest Tournaments" category in the 1991 *Inter Collegiate Speech Tournament Result Book*. The communication studies professor serves as director of Forensic Society. Women's softball coach Jan Hutchinson was selected NCAA Division II "Coach of the Year." *The New York Times* covered the exciting discovery of living bacteria present in the intestine of an 11,000-year-old, four-ton mastodon. This discovery was made by anthropology professor Dee Ann Wymer and a team of other scientists. And, assistant wrestling coach Larry "Zeke" Jones captured a gold medal in the World Cup Wrestling competition to help the United States win the team title for the fourth time.

In addition, our faculty has been successful in attracting more than \$1.2 million in grant activity to the university. To mention just a few examples, six minority faculty members were awarded grants from the State System of Higher Education's Fund for the 1991-92 academic year totalling \$12,594, and one professor received a \$4,500 Minority Faculty Development Fellowship through a special State System grant. The System Planning Commission awarded a \$30,000 grant for Bloomsburg's

project entitled "Advancing Teaching and Learning Through Technology." Reza Noubary, professor of mathematics and computer science, received a \$60,000 research grant from the National Science Foundation to produce an instrument that can record seismic activity from earthquakes and underground explosions. A grant totaling \$101,332 from the Helen Fuld Health Trust has been awarded to the nursing department to purchase computers for an instructional laboratory. The U. S. Department of Education awarded Bloomsburg's cooperative education program a grant of \$100,000 to fund an interactive video demonstration project designed to enhance the marketing of the program's benefits to college students.

Without a doubt, it is because of the dedicated hard work and resourcefulness of our faculty and staff that we enjoy a beautiful campus and an excellent reputation. And, even more importantly, it is because of them that Bloomsburg University has grown to be known as a caring, friendly and thoughtful community.

FINANCES FOR FUNDING NEW construction and the renovation of existing campus buildings originate in distinct funding processes; money from one area cannot be used for another purpose.

Requests for new academic buildings are initiated through a State System Capital Budget Request. Accepted projects are put forward through capital bills presented to the House and Senate, and final endorsement comes through the Governor's signature on a capital bill. The last phase of this process involves the release of funds from the state. The cost of projects approved exceeds budgeted funding levels, so a backlog of projects develops, and the release of funds for a project, such as our new library, may take several years.

The State System regularly submits requests for capital funds to sustain the maintenance and repair of existing facilities. This year, four roofing projects, totaling nearly \$425,000, were completed through a special deferred maintenance allocation from the state. State funding in the amount of \$1.6 million supported the addition of ramps, curb cuts, elevators and power doors at various locations throughout the campus, thus improving access for physically impaired individuals.

"Over the last seven years, the State System has received \$18.9 million in deferred maintenance funding, matched by \$13.2 million from university budgets. While numerous facilities have been restored, a \$63 million backlog exists." (*Windows on the State System of Higher Education*, November 1991).

In order to finance critical needs, universities, including Bloomsburg, have drawn sums from their instructional budgets to finance urgent needs. For example, Bloomsburg University recently expended \$2.4 million from its

own operating budget to renovate science laboratories and faculty offices in the Hartline Science Center. While this project upgraded building systems such as the plumbing, electrical, fire alarm, heating and ventilation, it did not create any new space. Therefore, additional science laboratories and classrooms remain on our priority list of facility needs.

One of the priorities for Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education is to begin utilizing university capital fund-raising campaigns to supplement state support of building needs, "while continuing to recognize and promote the Commonwealth's primary responsibility to maintain ... state-owned facilities through annual capital appropriations." For example, this year Bloomsburg alumnus Kenneth S. Gross provided the "lead gift" of \$100,000 to renovate the 800-seat auditorium in Carver Hall.

Under the State System, each university has assumed responsibility for maintenance and repair of auxiliary facilities (residence halls, food service and student unions) through student fees. This year, a \$1.3 million renovation and expansion project at Scranton Commons was initiated to increase the dining area for a growing student, faculty and staff population, and students voted to designate part of their student activities fees to fund two substantial projects. Kehr Union is being renovated and expanded at a cost of \$8.7 million, and plans for a new \$6.6 million recreation facility have been approved. These two facilities will provide much-needed space to sustain a host of important co-curricular activities.

Altogether this year, the university sustained \$14.4 million in construction activity, funded by student fees, with another \$6.6 million of activity in the design phase. While we welcome this activity, several pressing needs remain. Our deferred maintenance of academic buildings continues to mount. Additional classroom, laboratory and office space is needed. And most critical of all is the need for a new library facility. These requests must be met to adequately service our current number of students, faculty and staff.

INCREASINGLY, INSTITUTIONS of higher education are encountering pressure to play a more active role in the economic development of the nation's cities, states and regions. The new economic infrastructure is depending on the knowledge-based resources of our universities to compete in a rapidly changing, technologically advanced global economy.

Bloomsburg University has carefully considered its role in the economic development of our area and has committed itself to actively engage in regional development activities. As noted in the *Strategic Direction Statements for Bloomsburg University for 1990-1999*, "The research and service expertise of the university

community will be extended to business and industry, local government, social service agencies and other organizations and individuals in the region."

Integrating technology into the classroom and workplace to enhance learning and solve operational problems has rapidly become an important part of an instructor's repertoire of skills. Bloomsburg University's Institute for Interactive Technologies has received so much praise and respect from academicians nationwide, it has begun marketing its services to educators and business/industry leaders across the country.

A Professional Development Forum, sponsored by the College of Business last spring, focused on current issues in business and industry. Eighteen separate sessions attracted more than 1,000 participants to the conference.

As a member of the "Forum for the Future," a group of area businesses and institutions, Bloomsburg University co-sponsored a regional conference, "Shaping the Future in Central Pennsylvania," last summer. Through the discussion of five issue categories — environmental concerns, economic opportunity, education, societal change and government — participants began the process of determining where our region wants to commit its resources and focus its preparation for the future. One spin-off of the conference was our fall "Business and Education Partnership Conference." More than 100 business leaders and education officials participated in sessions on the development of business/education partnerships.

To better assist the university in enhancing our public service activities in the region, the university sought and was awarded a technical assistance grant from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU). Bloomsburg was one of eight AASCU member institutions to receive this special grant. Through this project we aim to better define what we can do to assist economic and community development in the region.

The first phase of the regional development planning process was initiated at a fall meeting of 33 campus and regional leaders. Among other items, we discussed higher education's roles in economic and community development, economic development challenges facing the region and assets of the region and university. The planning process, a seven-month venture, is scheduled to be completed in 1992. Michael Vavrek, dean of the School of Extended Programs and one of the key facilitators of this project, summarized our expectations for this initiative, "After the project is finished, we hope there will be greater use of university resources by the people who live in our region."

AS NOTED EARLIER IN THIS report, institutions across the country are beginning to reassess and realign their resources and programs. At Bloomsburg University, we

have been thoughtfully engaged in a strategic planning process that has involved assessing our institutional strengths and weaknesses, scanning the environment, thinking about the future directions of the institution, articulating our mission and goals and establishing strategic directions for the 1990s. The most recent step in the university's strategic planning process has been our work in determining the university's program/service mix.

This year, a 19-member task force has been at work gathering data in an effort to assess the programs and services offered at the university. In November, the task force presented its findings and recommended that the library, information technology, space and equipment and improvement of morale be established as funding priorities at the university. These and other recommendations in the report have been addressed or are in the process of being addressed. At this time, one area remains unresolved, and that is securing the necessary funding to build our new library. However, I am more confident than ever that funding for library design and construction will be released in the near future.

In closing this *1991 President's Report*, I would like the university community to know that I believe the primary conclusions of the Program/Service Mix Task Force Report accurately reflect the condition of the university. The university is, indeed, "blessed with having a great many hard working, dedicated people committed to providing a superior educational experience for Bloomsburg University students." The university programs and services "are generally well-conceived and executed." And, I agree with the final conclusion of the report that "no program or service on campus has an excess of resources; each could use more support, not to improve its offerings or services, but simply to maintain its current status without a loss of morale."

Finally, I would like to express my thanks to the faculty and staff for their support in this most important initiative.

to provide interested faculty with office computers and a network to support them. Another of her dreams for Bloomsburg is creation of "smart classrooms" where faculty would be able to access audio, video and data base information without leaving the room. Acquisition of state-of-the-art equipment for the sciences also remains one of her highest priorities.

Academic excellence is directly related to research involvement, but space limitations currently inhibit research at Bloomsburg. "We desperately need the facilities to support faculty and student research components," Allamong says. "Research is a crucial component of continued faculty development."

Allamong also longs for a Bloomsburg campus that hosts complete cultural diversity and provides housing for international students.

Continued growth at Bloomsburg, she points out, will require expanded resources. "We need greater recognition by state lawmakers and the governor of the unparalleled contribution our state universities make to the future of this Commonwealth," she says. "Our faculty and staff are excellent, but they can't mature to their fullest potential and capability without more funding from the state and the private sector."

Much of the private sector funding has come from alumni and Allamong observes, "we should constantly be thanking our alumni for their generosity. They have truly helped make many of our dreams reality."

Allamong has returned to her hometown of Morgantown, W. Va., with her husband, Joseph. She plans to keep a light schedule until the arrival of her first grandchild in October.

Allamong came to Bloomsburg from Ball State University, where she served six years as associate and acting dean of the College of Sciences and Humanities. She also taught biology at Ball State from 1972-1987.

In addition, she taught biology at West Virginia University in Morgantown from 1967 to 1972 and at Morgantown High School from 1961 to 1967.

She holds a bachelor of science degree in biology, a master of arts degree in biology, and a doctoral degree in cellular and molecular biology from West Virginia University. — Susan Schantz

"Much of what we have been able to do we owe directly to our alumni. There is no way to exaggerate the significance of the alumni contributions," Ausprich says. "Their continued support is absolutely essential to this university's future. Our fiscal challenges have never been greater and the future looks even more bleak."

Without additional sources of revenue, Ausprich warns Bloomsburg and other State System universities will be unable to function effectively. "The state gives us the nuts and bolts. But we want to constantly do a better job. We want our students to have the best possible education," he says.

To that end, he feels Bloomsburg must become more entrepreneurial, more aggressive and more creative in development. "We need the resources to purchase badly needed academic equipment to support faculty professional development projects."

Another priority in the coming months is a smooth transition once an acting provost is named. "I'm extremely proud of the superior reputation of our academic programs, our scholarship and the quality of our graduates," Ausprich says. "I am committed to continue this tradition."

Bloomsburg's close relationship with its students is also a source of presidential pride. "Our student life program is a real attribute," he says. Other notable student services include the expected opening this fall of the expanded Kehr Union Building. Construction for a new student recreational center will begin sometime during fall 1993.

Through the Provost Lecture Series, students have access to experts in a variety of fields. "Our students truly have the opportunity to expand their horizons to their highest potential," he says.

Perhaps nothing has brought President Ausprich as much personal satisfaction as the ongoing Celebrity Artist Series program he was instrumental in developing. "We truly bring the best of the best to this campus. It is our obligation to give our students excellent experiences in all academic disciplines. The series exposes students to superior quality in the arts," he says. "This is the first time many of them have seen a ballet or an opera."

Ausprich recalls fondly actor Hal Holbrook's visit to campus in 1986. In addition to his formal program, "Mark Twain Tonight," Holbrook conducted makeup demonstrations and held informal talks with students. Metropolitan Opera premiere star Roberta Peters gave a master class during her stay on campus in 1987. In 1991, members of the Philadelphia Orchestra also gave master classes.

As he looks to Bloomsburg's future, Ausprich feels the university will expand its regional impact and program support in areas of education, business and industry, government and public service. "Progress in economic development is directly related to the manner in which the public and private institutions, organizations and agencies relate to each other," he says. "The business and the education community must be active partners."

Describing Bloomsburg as a rich resource for the region, Ausprich points out that many faculty members serve as consultants to area businesses offering such services as custom-designed software. "Support for computer-based interactive video instructional programs in education and business aids companies developing their own high-technology instructional materials."

This fall, Bloomsburg will publish a sourcebook of over 70 public services provided by the university.

"There is much to be done to prepare Bloomsburg for the challenges of the 21st Century. Working together over the next two years, we can help ensure the future, not only for our students, but for the region," Ausprich concludes. — Susan Schantz

Chuck Daly '52, coach of the Detroit Pistons for nine seasons, was named new coach of the New Jersey Nets on May 27. The following newspaper article was written by **Heister Bittenbender Jr.** for the *Press-Enterprise*, Bloomsburg, on the day after he announced he would step down as coach of the Detroit Pistons:

When **Chuck Daly** was inducted into the Bloomsburg University Hall of

Fame nine years ago, he said firings are part of the game and that coaches are well paid just to be fired.

That same year, **Daly** was hired by the Detroit Pistons. Yesterday he stepped down from one of the most successful coaching stints in NBA history.

Of course, **Daly** will be busy in the coming months as he takes the U.S. basketball team to the Olympic Games at Barcelona, Spain.

Nine years is a long time in one place in the professional ranks. **Daly** had lasted only 41 games with the Cleveland Cavaliers in 1981-1982.

Some say there was friction between **Daly** and Detroit general manager **Jack McCloskey** the past couple years, but it was probably time for him to leave anyway.

Daly indicated as much at his press conference Monday, and that's what two of his good friends from his college days at Bloomsburg said they believe.

That's the view of **C. Stuart Edwards**, a former BU administrator who knew **Daly** from his junior high basketball playing days in Kane. **Edwards** helped recruit him to Bloomsburg and introduced him at the induction banquet here in 1983.

"Nine years is an eternity in that position," **Edwards** said last night. He said he last heard from **Daly** on New Year's Eve.

"There was nothing unordinary. I had been ill. He called to see if I was OK and wished me a happy new year."

Edwards said it was his guess that **Daly** would stay in basketball in some capacity.

"From what I see on TV, he and the GM didn't always see eye to eye, but he never indicated that to me. Of course he's not getting any younger, and for the next couple of months he will be concentrating on getting ready for the Olympics."

Dave Linkhorst of Mahanoy City, who played basketball with **Daly** at Bloomsburg, said, "The pressure required to coach in the NBA can't go on and on."

He said he doubted **Daly** would leave basketball and said he would probably be coaching elsewhere or doing television work. **Daly** was a commentator with Prism and Channel 17 for Philadelphia 76ers games before taking the Detroit job.

"Basketball is his sole life," said **Linkhorst**, a former high school basketball coach. "I understand the fans in Philly are hot after him, having him as general manager or coach or both. There are a lot of options for him. He's had a great career, and it's not over."

At his induction banquet, **Daly** said his goal when leaving college was to become a basketball coach and make \$10,000 a year. At the time he credited Cleveland Cavaliers' owner **Ted Stepien** for giving him that chance.

As a Huskie player, **Daly** scored 213 points, a 13.5 points per game average, in the 1950-1951 season. He averaged 12.7 points per game the following season when the team went 12-4 under Coach **Harold Shelly**.

He started his coaching career at

Punxsutawney High School and then was a varsity assistant at Duke before taking his first college head coaching job at Boston College. He was an assistant for Billy Cunningham of the 76ers before taking the job at Cleveland.

As a collegiate coach, his record was 151-62, or .709. His NBA regular season record was 476-330, or .611. The Pistons won the NBA championship in 1988-1989 and 1989-1990.

Recollections

(We received the following letter from Wayne Von Stetten '50 of Willow Street, Pa.)

In the recent issue of **BLOOMSBURG** I read with pleasure several accounts of fond memories from the pens of alumni, most of which were from an era that saw the college as a much smaller,

more intimate school and community. I recall that post-war period when I was a returning WWII veteran, arriving on a campus of only 650 students, eager to resume my degree

pursuits and to get on with my life, following a four-year interruption. I was one of a number of returning veterans who came to BSTC during that period as a married man, and I recall that fully one-third of my football teammates at that time brought their wives with them. We all lived in off-campus apartments scattered throughout the town.

I think I remember most of all the many acts of kindness which were extended to us by our instructors, the townspeople, and the college administration. They all seemed to understand that our transition from the military to college life would require patience. Faculty members such as Mr. Sam Wilson, Mr. Ed DeVoe, Dr. Nell Maupin, Dr. Kimber Kuster, Miss Thayer, Mr. Robert Redman, Mr. John Hoch, Dr. J. Almus Russell, Mr. Fenstemaker — there were so many of them — all seemed to know best just how to help us with our adjustment. They were the right faculty at the right time. Acts of kindness were prevalent.

There is one incident which I will never forget and which demonstrates how I remember those good people and my good fortune to have been at a place such as Bloomsburg at that period.

This happening occurred during the first semester of a summer session in that very hot June of 1948. My wife (Margaret) and I were studying for my final examination for a course entitled Ethics — a required course at that time and taught by Miss Harriet Moore. Many students from those four decades ago will recall that Miss Moore also taught Music Appreciation — another required course. Students fondly referred to Miss Moore as "The Smiling E." for she possessed the most gracious countenance when handing out grades, even when some of them were failing ones.

I referred to the two of us studying since I was working late hours at the Rea & Derick Store in Bloomsburg and frequently found it very helpful to have my good wife assist me in reviewing notes after I arrived home

from work. I should relate that my wife was very pregnant with our first child and on this warm night was long overdue. After we finished the review for the exam, which was scheduled for the next morning, my wife calmly announced that she was sure it was time to head for the hospital. A 3:30 a.m. knock on the downstairs door of our landlady, Mrs. Shutts, brought immediate action on her part since she had been standing by for at least two weeks — eager and ready to drive us to Bloomsburg Hospital, regardless of the hour.

Naturally, I accompanied my wife to the hospital and after seeing her off to the delivery room, went to the waiting lounge and promptly fell asleep on the sofa there. It was well after 11 a.m. when Dr. Harry Hoffman came to the lounge to inform me that we had a eight and a half pound son and that all was well with Margaret.

After the initial excitement of the news wore off, I suddenly remembered that I had missed the Ethics final examination; I would have to get word to Miss Moore somehow and try to arrange for a make-up exam if possible. She not only understood fully (I still believe Miss Moore was almost as excited about our son as I was!), but immediately made arrangements for me to come by her house the next morning to take the missed examination.

I arrived early the next day and found a desk already set for me in her living room — blue book, sharpened pencils, scratch pad, and — believe it or not — a glass of cold milk along side a handsome plate filled with homemade cookies. Oh yes, there was also pleasant music in the background. You see, Miss Moore was also the musical director at the Presbyterian Church in town, and I'm sure she thought that appropriate, soothing music would enable me to think more clearly.

The examination was a success, and I received an "A" for the course, although I will always believe that perhaps the circumstances of our son's birth might have had something to do with Miss Moore's final evaluation.

In the years since that memorable happening I have often wondered if such an event could happen today when we all seem to be caught up in the frenzy of today's living, seemingly unconcerned about the needs and feelings of others. I have my doubts, for I truly believe it was the *right time*, the *right place*, and the *right people* — a time which quite possibly has passed us by, sadly.

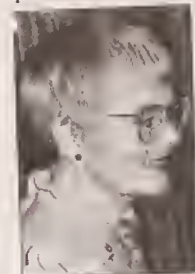

Marlin G. Kester Sr. has a primary pet peeve: coin-gobbling gadgets like vending machines, parking meters and telephones that require what he calls "pinch," or the fine-finger dexterity needed to hold a quarter firmly between two fingers to deposit it.

"Marty" Kester doesn't have that dexterity, that quintessential pinch. His fingers do straighten, but not at will. His hands appear slightly curled, arthritic, and his forearms, like his calves, lack muscle.

As he maneuvers his telephone receiver from hand to hand to ear — an artistic maneuver, but punching the small number buttons is difficult, he says — the 46-year-old embodies the spirit of the office he has headed as district administrator since January.

The mission of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, he says, is to help people with disabilities in just about any way possible to find, maintain or return to work.

It worked for him: The former client has been working in OVR offices for 25 years.

Kester was nine when he was diagnosed with Charcot-Marie-Tooth disorder, a degenerative neurological condition that causes patients to slowly lose normal use of their feet, legs, hands and arms. About 125,000 have the inherited disorder, which weakens their muscles as the nerves degenerate.

During his early teen-age years, he spent summers in surgery at Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, Philadelphia. He had muscle and tendon transplants, ankle fusion — anything that would help him maintain balance or strengthen his muscles.

While in high school in Danville, he

was contacted by a counselor for the Wilkes-Barre district office of OVR, who explained the office's services to him.

"It's not just a matter of throwing money at the problem," says Kester of OVR. "That oftentimes, I think, is the simplistic view — they need a leg brace or a wheelchair. That may be the case, but how do you get from where you are to where you want to be? You may need training; you may need attendant care."

In Kester's case, he needed a college degree, which the office also helps clients achieve.

"I knew then that I was never going to make a living with my physical prowess, and I needed to do it with my mind," he says. "The OVR agency examined my potential, looked at my grades, did a test battery. They thought I was good material for college, and I did, too, and basically sponsored me through four years of college at Bloomsburg."

Through OVR's assistance, Kester received a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1967. Then, through a counselor's suggestion, he applied for a counseling job with the Harrisburg district office.

That started a career that led him to become a counselor's supervisor for three years, a specialist in the Harrisburg central office, then a specialist supervisor for the same, overseeing six vocational rehabilitation specialists.

In January, he started as district administrator in Reading, which covers Berks and Schuylkill counties.

"I get a great deal of satisfaction out of my work," Kester says. "I believe in it. I've been through it. I know what it's like to work with the bureaucracy at both ends."

He adds with a laugh, "I'm one of them."

Janel Shaffer-Yoder, vocational rehabilitation specialist and administrative assistant in Kester, says: "He has a lot of insight into what he's doing with our people, and he doesn't lose focus of that. It helps him to deliver services in a more accurate, professional and personal manner."

Kester says, "Because of what I've been through, I can truly say to somebody: 'I know what it's like to wear a brace. I know what it's like not to be able to do what you used to be able to do.'"

"An able-bodied person can't do that in the same way I can."

National Children's Theater to premiere show on campus

If all goes well, a national children's theater, The Night Kitchen, will premiere the Broadway musical, "Really Rosie," at BU's newly renovated Gross Auditorium in Carver Hall in April 1993. The Night Kitchen was formed by Maurice Sendak and Arthur Yorinks in 1990, the 20th anniversary year of the publication of Sendak's book, *In the Night Kitchen*.

Sendak notes the theater company is devoted entirely to the development of quality performing arts productions for children and adults. "As in our books, which have crossed barriers and overcome conventional thought, we hope The Night Kitchen will contribute significantly to the world of children's theater," Sendak says.

The proposal, submitted by Glenn Sadler of the Department of English, calls for nine performances and a public workshop at Bloomsburg. Sadler said it is possible that some local talent could be cast for the show. Tentative plans also call for an art exhibit of Sendak's operatic work.

Sadler suggested that university students in the children's literature classes could present supervised mini-talks on Sendak's art to students in regional schools.

"Such a grand event would make it possible to bring to the Northeast an artistic event for children and the general public which has never before been attempted," said Sadler.

Sadler estimates that about \$50,000 will be needed to co-produce this event. He reported the university has already made a major contribution, but "we will need to go to the community for additional funding." He said contributions may be sent to the university's Development Office, earmarked for The National Children's Theater.

1991 Gifts to Bloomsburg Exceed \$1.2 Million

Private support of Bloomsburg University in 1991 totaled \$1,281,156. Gifts from alumni, at the highest level ever, accounted for approximately 30 percent of all funds received.

"Our alumni remain the backbone of our fund-raising efforts," said Anthony M. Ianiero, assistant vice president for development. "We are indebted to them," he added.

Nearly one of every four alumni contacted participated in the campaign last year, accounting for more than two-thirds of the 9,423 gifts received. Slightly more than half the alumni contributions, \$211,000, was committed to **The Trust for Generations**, with the remainder to the Annual Fund.

The Husky Club, which supports student athletic scholarships received nearly \$102,000, with an additional \$15,000 contributed as gifts in kind. This total reflects designated gifts from faculty, staff, friends, and parents.

Parents gave \$62,000 to help enhance Andruss Library. Gifts in kind totaled nearly \$100,000. Planned gifts of \$100,000 included wills, trusts, and insurance policies which were transferred to ownership of the BU Foundation.

The Fred Smith Golden Rule Trust Fund provided 88 students with nearly \$200,000 to help meet their educational expenses at Bloomsburg.

The Trust for Generations campaign was formally concluded in 1991, with \$3.8 million received in gifts, pledges, and planned gifts. The original goal, set in 1989, was \$3.5 million.

In addition to the **Trust**, which supports the library, scholarships and academic excellence, more than \$500,000 of the 1991 total was earmarked for various educational projects and activities, while \$117,000 was received through Husky Club activities for athletic scholarships and projects.

The \$5,000 grant from The Greater Harrisburg Foundation, received through Ms. Diane Sanquist, President, was composed of monies from several sources: the Richard and Alice Angino and Family Fund, the Susquehanna Group Home Fund, and from the general funds of the Foundation.

we are seeing schools where the minority is the majority. If our students are to be successful in these areas — and that's where the jobs are today — they need to learn to work with diverse cultures."

Harris has worked closely with Mr. H. Major Poteat, assistant superintendent of the Harrisburg City Schools and Ms. Yvonne Hollins, principal of the Scott-Rowland Middle School, for the past two years to bring the program to this stage.

The Urban Initiatives Program was initiated with the Harrisburg City Schools in the fall of 1990, in response to a recommendation from Bloomsburg University's Council of Trustees and with the full support of the State System of Higher Education and the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

Two components presently comprise the program — Urban Field Experiences and the Bloomsburg/Harrisburg PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in Developing Excellence) Program.

Urban Field Experiences

Urban Field Experiences, conducted in conjunction with a course on urban education, include one-day and one-week field experiences for future teachers in an urban environment. These contacts, far more enriching than classroom discussions on campus, help students become more familiar with the customs, values, and language of children from diverse cultures. By uti-

lizing teaching concepts and strategies known to be effective in working with children of different cultures, the teaching process is enhanced. BU students work as aids with teacher-mentors in the classroom and are expected to teach at least part of one day. Special evening programs introduce students to school-district support personnel and community support services.

PRIDE Program

The PRIDE Program is an early intervention program fashioned to offset patterns of failure that often develop during the early teens. The Program will serve as a model to demonstrate how a coalition of educators, students, and the private sector can provide the necessary academic support, motivation and so-

cial atmosphere to produce more successful college-bound students. In addition to removing psychological barriers that often make college seem unachievable to disadvantaged and minority youth, the attention these students will receive will improve their self-esteem and give them a new status in the family and community.

Designed for middle-school students, the Program will promote cultural diversity on the BU campus, reduce prejudice, and develop positive intergroup relations through experiences with young people of diverse backgrounds. Students will receive a rich educational experience that includes classroom and outdoor activities, group processes, interpersonal values, and career and life learnings which are designed to improve academic skills, provide motivation to continue through college, and enhance interpersonal values.

Ninety students will participate the first year. BU students will serve as mentors, resident advisors, tutors, and student aids, thus enhancing their effectiveness as future teachers. It is expected that barriers to ethnic differences will be broken and that a reduction of prejudices will occur. Another expectation is that some of the young students will eventually choose to enroll as freshmen at Bloomsburg, and the university students will choose to teach in an urban setting upon their graduation.

Husky Club Auction Raises \$7,500 for Athletic Scholarships

The annual Husky Club Auction Dinner-Dance, held April 24, at Magee's 24 West, raised approximately \$7,500. These funds will benefit the General Athletic Scholarship Fund which supports student athletes at Bloomsburg University.

Those attending enjoyed a buffet dinner and the "silent" bid auction on nearly 100 items donated by

local and regional individuals, friends, businesses and alumni.

Auctioned items included camps, vacations and travel, entertainment, sports and recreation, food and dining, household goods, automobile, clothing, sports memorabilia, and other miscellaneous items.

Dance music for the 130 guests was provided by the band, Autumn. The auction is one of the Husky Club's major fund-raising events.

Plans for New Library Move Closer to Reality

Long recognized by Bloomsburg alumni, students, faculty, and administrators as a university-wide critical need, the construction of a new library to meet the academic demands of today's students and current technological advances is moving closer to reality.

In anticipation of approval, plans are under way to raise \$2.75 million from private sources toward the construction of a new 125,000 sq. ft. facility. The balance of the \$11.4 million has received legislative approval and awaits release of the remaining funds.

Phase I, the **Library Fund**, of the recent **Trust for Generations** campaign, raised \$1 million for an endowment. Income from that fund will continue to be used for various library acquisitions.

This "bricks and mortar" campaign will be a new challenge for the university. Historically, all academic and administrative construction has been provided by the state.

All university constituencies — alumni, faculty, staff, parents, students, friends, business and corporations — will be asked to participate in this special \$2.75 million campaign over four years.

The new library will increase seating to approximately 1,200 and hold more than 400,000 volumes, and will be located on the softball field adjacent to Waller Administration Building.

Alumni Pledge \$150,000 During Annual Phonothon

The 1992, eight-week Spring phonothon to alumni resulted in \$150,000 in pledges for Bloomsburg University's Annual Fund campaign from 4,009 former students.

Assisting with this year's campaign were 47 undergraduate students who attempted 25,829 phone calls to alumni.

Twenty-nine percent of the 13,861 alumni contacted pledged

an average gift of \$37.34, and another 8 percent said they were thinking about participating. Pledges ranged from \$5 to \$1,000.

Some 250 alumni who made contributions said they or their spouses are employed by a company that matches gifts.

Efforts are under way to contact alumni who could not be reached during the phonothon.

Bloomsburg Faculty and Staff Pledge Support to University

The Faculty and Staff for Excellence campaign gained on its record performance of last year. A total of 230 (26 percent) employees pledged to the campaign. Gifts and pledges totaled \$19,719 (a 20 percent increase), with an average gift of \$70. President Ausprich once again set an example with his generous \$2,000 gift.

The focus of the campaign this year was to further excellence at Bloomsburg through scholarships for academically talented students. The funds raised will offer 11-\$250 scholarships to outstanding students

through the BU Family Scholarship program. These students will be selected from four different departments and will represent two university-wide scholarship programs. Faculty and staff also selected to support the University Scholars and the Husky Club scholarship funds.

For the first time this year, the campaign helped raise funds for the Commission on the Status of Women. Gifts amounting to \$2,494 were contributed to support special activities of the Commission.

Other gifts were designated for The Trust for Generations, staff development, and other named scholarship funds.

Susan Hicks, assistant director of development, who coordinated the

campaign, noted that this year's campaign results reflect a strong base of support on which to increase the effectiveness of Faculty and Staff for Excellence over the next few years.

Sixty-one faculty and staff members served as volunteers and distributed information about the campaign to their colleagues and co-workers.

A faculty and staff association will be organized this spring. Membership will be composed of all 1992 contributors. The purpose of the organization is to plan faculty and staff campaigns, select scholarship recipients, and make recommendations for future fund-raising initiatives and disbursement of funds.

Crozer-Chester Medical Center became one of the first medical facilities in the county to hire an on-staff corrective camouflage specialist whose job is to make adjustment to everyday life a little easier for burn patients.

Burn patients often face a tough adjustment when they leave the burn center, where they are accepted by staff and employees. The camouflage makeup helps them to avoid the inquisitive stares they would face.

A survey of burn patients at Crozer over the past three years revealed that 90 percent of those polled were in favor of the use of corrective creams to improve appearance.

Lewis, a paramedical specialist with

degrees in chemistry and biology, began camouflage services earlier this year. She is also certified as an image consultant.

She worked as a chemist at Arco from 1977 to 1987. Later she started personal packaging in her own business and also worked independently as a personal image of consultant with plastic surgeons at Crozer Hospital. She also works with cancer patients.

"Paramedical camouflage meets the individual needs of patients whose appearance has been altered by birth, accidents, surgical procedures or dermatological problems," Lewis said in the medical center's newsletter.

"In the burn center, I custom blend corrective creams to improve the skin discoloration and disfigurement of burn patients," she said. "I also show them the techniques they can use to achieve maximum coverage of burns and scars resulting from plastic and reconstructive surgery."

She said the camouflage cream is formulated to provide complete and long-lasting coverage. It adheres well to any texture of skin. The waterproof creams, which must be removed with a special cleanser, are complemented by a setting powder which allows the wearer to swim and shower.

"It feels and looks like real skin," Lewis said. "We can even teach men to apply it to give the effect of beginnings of a beard."

Husky teams win titles in two sports

The softball team finished third in the country and the men's tennis team won its sixth consecutive Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) championship to highlight another successful springs sports season at Bloomsburg University. The five Bloomsburg spring sports teams combined for a record of 79-35 for an impressive .692 percentage.

Coach Jan Hutchinson's softball team finished with an outstanding 43-5 record (464-101 in 15 seasons) to capture third place at the NCAA Division II Championships in Shawnee, Kansas. The Huskies won their ninth PSAC title in 10 years while also winning the NCAA East Regional Championship.

Bloomsburg was led by three first team All-Americans, Marty Landato (catcher from Malvern), Jean Buskirk (first base from Leighton), and Heather Young (pitcher from New Brighton). Janelle Breneman (shortstop from Stevens) was named to the second team.

Landato capped a tremendous career at Bloomsburg leading the team with 42 hits, eight home runs, 42 runs batted in, and a .465 batting average this season. Buskirk, a junior, topped the Huskies with 50 singles and 12 doubles while batting .420. Young, a senior, was one of the nation's top performers on the mound posting a 19-3 record allowing only 26 runs for an .82 earned run average. She also struck out 148 batters in 146 innings and walked 31. Breneman batted .342 with three home runs and 28 runs batted in.

Other fine efforts for Bloomsburg this season were turned in by sophomore pitcher Kim Maguire (15-0, .026 earned run average) and junior outfielders Lisa Markle (.413) and Denise Miller (.319, 11 stolen bases) and junior second baseman Rachel Kolvek (.310).

The men's tennis team under Coach Burt Reese (24 seasons, 363-152) ended the campaign with a 13-6 record while crowning four singles and two doubles champions at the conference championships in Williamsport. Leading Bloomsburg in the PSAC event were sophomores Scott Thyroff (Pittsford, N.Y.), Jeremy Eby (State Line), Brian Billone (Mt. Sunapee, N.H.), and freshman Dan Adriano (King's Park, N.Y.) in the singles while the combinations of sophomore James Mason (Marlton, N.J.) and senior Mike Petersen (New Zealand), and Eby and sophomore Joe Zapf (Philadelphia) captured titles.

The Huskies' top two players, Petersen and sophomore Kyle Burton (Staten Island, N.Y.), were both defeated one match short of the quarterfinals at the NCAA Division II championships in Edmond, Oklahoma, and thus became the

university's newest All-Americans based on their top 16 finish. The pair, along with Thyroff, represented Bloomsburg in the individual competition as the Huskies narrowly missed their fourth consecutive trip to the national team championships.

The baseball team, under Coach Matt Haney (two seasons, 34-30), finished the season at 16-18 and a 10-10 mark in the PSAC Eastern Division and missed a third straight appearance in the PSAC playoffs. The Huskies were led by three All-PSAC selections including seniors Mike Bruno (Denville, N.J.) and Chad Holdren (Jerseytown), as well as sophomore Jason Vavra (Hatfield). Bruno was named the conference's "Co-Player of the Year" as he collected seven home runs, 33 runs batted in, and a .449 batting average. Bruno also posted a 2-1 record as a pitcher for the squad. Holdren hit a respectable .329 while belting three home runs. Vavra, an outfielder, hit .343 in 31 games for Bloomsburg.

Sophomore Bridget Drake (Ellicott City, Md.) was an All-PSAC performer for the women's lacrosse team under Coach Sharon O'Keefe. Bloomsburg ended the season with a 7-6 record, losing in the first round of the PSAC Championships to Millersville. Bloomsburg was the defending champion and was making its seventh consecutive appearance in the PSAC tournament. The Huskies lose only four players to graduation, returning 19 players for next season.

The men's and women's track and field teams had some fine individual showings at the conference championships this spring. Dan Pszeniczny paced the men's squad with one of its top individual performances in several years finishing second in the 1,500 meter run and third in the 5,000 meter run. He barely missed a conference title as he fell in the shorter race by only .16 of a second. The Huskies placed tenth overall.

The women's team finished ninth overall and were led by Aimee Gerlinski who finished third in the 1,500 meter run and fifth in the 800 meters. Gerlinski also ran in two relays that placed for the Huskies. The 400 meter relay of Gerlinski, Jean Randis, Renee Adams, and Erin MacNeal finished fifth and the 1,600 meter relay of Gerlinski, Randis, Adams and Natalie Alansky placed fifth. — Bruce Rosengrant

Husky mascot dates back to 1930s

For almost 60 years (since 1933) the mascot and symbol of Bloomsburg University has been the famous dog of the North, the Husky. It was in October of that year that students, then of Bloomsburg State Teachers College, voted almost unanimously for the Husky, probably influenced by art professor George Keller, whose dog sled teams of Huskies had local renown.

Keller had characterized the Husky as "the most stubborn fighter of the canine family" and felt as such that "Husky was a name well selected for Bloomsburg athletes."

Oral tradition holds that at halftime during the 1933 Homecoming football game a race was held among Huskies owned by Keller. The winner became the first mascot and was named Roongo after Maroon and Gold, the school colors.

The 1934 *Obiter* noted that Roongo stood "for the ideals of manly* sportsmanship, fair play, and the worthwhile benefits of playing the game squarely," and he offered "a challenge to individuals and teammates to cooperate and work for the common good." (* Attitudes were different in 1934, and the *Obiter* writer obviously had not the experience of seeing the women's softball teams, basketball teams and swimming teams, among others, of recent years do battle exhibiting all the positive traits attributed to the Husky.)

The 1935 *Obiter* added that Roongo's presence "stands as a challenge to BSTC athletes" who "must live up to the standards of determination, cooperation, and fight so peculiar to the Huskies of the far North." It was reported that Roongo would run up and down the sidelines of the football field barking as he went imbuing "our athletic gladiators with a spirit that does not submit to defeat."

Unfortunately, Roongo himself submitted to the ravages of pneumonia in 1936, and a new mascot named Garou succeeded him. For some reason Garou only lasted a year and was followed by Roongo II. Roongo II, one of a litter of three pups born in northern Greenland, had ancestors who traveled with Admiral Robert Peary's expedition to the North Pole.

Roongo II himself took part in an expedition to the Rose Bowl game in 1937 as the University of Washington Huskies borrowed him to be their mascot. Alas, the Huskies lost to Pittsburgh, 21-0.

A third Roongo, the fourth Husky mascot, started in service in 1951. For some reason, Roongo III was sold to a private owner at the end of the decade, and the campus went without a mascot until 1969 when a Husky doubled as the mascot for the

BU vs. BU on grid schedule for next two years

For the next two football seasons, BU will open the season at BU, but the Huskies will be on the road.

Not too far down the road, however.

Bloomsburg University and Bucknell University have agreed to a two-year football contract, which will find the Huskies traveling to Lewisburg's 13,100-seat Christy Mathewson Stadium on September 5 to start the 1992 season and on September 4 to begin the 1993 campaign.

The teams are still negotiating to extend the series to 1994 and 1995, with one of those games likely to be played at Bloomsburg on a home-and-away basis.

It has been 69 years since the Huskies and the Bison have met on the varsity gridiron. The two schools played each other nine times from 1896 to 1923, with Bucknell owning a 6-3 lead in victories.

The two teams did scrimmage each other last year, however, and that helped bring them together again.

"After the scrimmage, both coaches and athletic directors got together, and we agreed it was a very competitive scrimmage and we wanted to continue it in the future," said Mary Gardner, Bloomsburg's athletic director.

The arrangement has proximity going for it: In days when money is tight, the schools are only 35 miles apart.

"This is a competitive opportunity for both teams, and we're glad to have worked it out," said Gardner. "It has helped the scheduling for both schools."

Bucknell is a Division I-AA team, while Bloomsburg is Division II. Both are part of the Eastern Colleges Athletic Conference in their divisions.

college and for a social fraternity. Two or three different Huskies living with President James McCormick's family during the 1973-1983 period were the last dogs recognized as "official" college mascots.

However, it was clear by the early 1980s that interest in a live college mascot had subsided considerably from the initial enthusiasm in the 1930s. Now we are content with a student in costume masquerading as a Husky, the Husky statue adjacent to Carver Hall, pictorial representations and the name itself. Nevertheless, the spirit of the Husky lives on and appropriately symbolizes BU athletic teams and Bloomsburg University in general. — Roger W. Fromm, University Archivist

Ralph Jones' love of education earns him degree

(Editor's Note: The following article was written by Susan Brook for the Press-Enterprise, Bloomsburg, May 9, 1992.)

Ralph C. Jones, 75, the most senior Bloomsburg University senior, looks forward to his graduation this afternoon with feelings complicated by a lifetime of racial trailblazing.

He is believed to be the oldest person to graduate from Bloomsburg University in school history. "I was older than any of my professors and any other student," he notes.

But he adds, "It just happens to be a number. Until someone reminds me, I forget to act my age. I've been blessed with good health. I've never been sick one day, never had an ache or pain, and I've not been in the hospital one day."

But he's faced other kinds of adversity. Back in 1936, he was the first male African-American to enroll in the then-segregated Pennsylvania state colleges. It took the intervention of the Pennsylvania Department of Education to wrangle him a spot in the Bloomsburg school at all.

No records were kept about students' ethnic background in those days, according to BU officials, but African-American students were very rare at Bloomsburg until the 1970s.

When Jones entered in 1936, he sought an accounting course, hoping to teach business.

He left after one year. As he notes the milestones of his life on a yellow legal pad, he puts down "unbearable racial harassment" as the reason he broke off his education.

"Please don't ask more," he says. The past still has power to cause pain.

He's tall and slim, his dark beard flecked with gray. He speaks slowly and deliberately, with a distinctive hoarse quality to his voice.

Since 1985, his college studies have been foremost, but he says teaching to learn more about himself and the world has occupied his whole life.

He studied dance, folk dance, religion. He took Dale Carnegie courses.

"I have continued to study all my life. I built up a library all my life. The only thing I do for recreation is read. So I spent my life reading and inquiring. This time, I wanted to make it absolutely, positively academic," he said.

It wasn't to impress anybody or to get a better job or to wipe out the past discrimination that he went back to school.

He just wanted to keep his mind working constructively to avoid dwelling on negative experiences, he said.

He says no one course was the hardest. "I can't distinguish between easy and difficult. I thought an easy course was wasting my time because it was my mind I wanted to

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strengthen. When there was nothing open in sociology, I took an extra anthropology course, political science, public speaking, Spanish, biology," he said.

He grew up in Espy and was the only African-American student in Scott Township High School.

Fleeing a rural community wracked by the Great Depression, Jones hitchhiked to Philadelphia, but found no work. He came back and was apprenticed to a tailor, Nicholas Kappas of Bloomsburg.

Tailoring wasn't work he liked, and it didn't get better with closer acquaintance. But it was a job. Later he took the skill to Philadelphia and worked there until he passed the U.S. Postal Service exam in 1945. He became a carrier and postal clerk and retired in 1972, when he was 55.

He moved back here to the old family home in 1972, the year Hurricane Agnes blew through. "I was renovating my homestead when the flood got me. It took me twice as long, made the work twice as hard, and cost twice as much. Until the flood came along, it was a piece of cake," he shrugs.

The last of his school experiences have been something to savor. BU Student Support Services honored him with a buffet last week as classes ended.

He says he has had no negative experiences as an African-American student in the 1980s and 1990s, but then he didn't often socialize with other students. Academics didn't allow him to participate in a group for non-traditional students, he said.

He wasn't aware of the cross burned on campus in early March until he read about it in news reports, he said.

Counting down the last few courses — research methods in sociology, math thinking, adult health education and development, slimnastics — he believes he will end up with close to a 3.0 average.

Writing papers was the toughest part. "Oh, many nights I was awake," he said. "I'd go to the Bucknell library Saturdays and Sundays when I had it to myself to do research," he said.

He didn't feel out of place in class with 18- to 21-year-olds, he said, in part because of a lifelong interest in roller skating. Few adults liked to skate until recently, he says.

"I was involved with a Pentacostal church, which allows very little pleasure. Roller skating was the only pleasure they allowed us, so I went for it," he grins, showing a rare flash of humor.

He has a few distant relatives. He says his personal life has had its disappointments, but, again, he prefers not to talk about them.

Orphaned at five, he was raised partly by a great-grandmother, Florence Ward, who spoke of being raped by her master and elders who told tales of slavery. At the age of seven, he was sent to Espy, where his

Joining Boughner will be classmate **Don Wise '56**, **William Swisher '59**, **Terry Engleman '61** and **Linda Smith '81**.

Boughner played football, basketball and baseball for the Huskies during his four years at the school and went on to a successful coaching career including a stint as head football coach at Lime Mountain High School.

Wise was instrumental in bringing wrestling back to Bloomsburg after the program was absent from the athletic department for several years. He went on to a successful coaching career and was the trainer for the 1972 U.S. Olympic team.

Swisher was the first basketball player in university history to surpass the 1,000-point plateau. He was a four-year starter for the Huskies and currently ranks 14th on the school's all-time scoring list.

grandfather and step-grandmother, Fred and Martha Carrington, cared for him.

But he would rather look to the future. "I'd like to reacquaint myself with the African-American community. I intend to visit the Caribbean and especially West Africa and to visit all the African-American museums and continue to build my video library of African-American documentaries," he said.

Asked about his view of younger students, Jones says they have to work harder than most outsiders realize.

"Students now are — let me choose my words carefully — are very hyper, tense, and I would say they're courting burnouts. The stress seems to be telling on them."

In his seven years at BU, Jones says he's seen an increasingly tough standard applied. "In the classroom, professors are demanding. The attitude is if you don't shape up, they can ship out."

He made the grade. BU registrar Kenneth Schnure said he believes Jones is the oldest person ever to graduate from the university, but cannot verify that because records back to the 1880s would have to be scanned individually to make sure.

"I would suspect he is the oldest. I've met people in their 60s, but I don't recall anyone in their 70s," Schnure said.

Jones isn't sure how he'll keep his intellectual fire satisfied now that he's finished the course of study. There may be a graduate degree in his future.

"I have always been a dreamer. So no dream is impossible. I say dreams are the stuff life's made of."

"As one of my idols was saying, 'I have a dream.'"

New Library Praised as Long-term Investment

Big investment is boost for BU

The annual homecoming celebration at Bloomsburg University got started a day early this year.

And what a start!

On Thursday morning, long-awaited word arrived from Harrisburg that the state will put up the lion's share of the money for a new BU library.

This was great news, on campus and off.

For students and faculty, it means relief is on the way from overcrowding and storage limitations that have cramped scholarship at BU for years.

For the region, it means the state is making an investment of \$9 million to improve an institution that is a keystone of our local economy.

As has been evident from calls to our 30 Seconds columns, there are some skeptics in the area who scoff at BU's importance as a local economic force. They say the area would be better off without the school.

It almost goes without saying, but we'll say it anyway:

They are dead wrong. And most people in the area know it.

BU's impact — not only on the local economy, but on culture and education in the area — is incalculable. And most of it is good.

The bad behavior of some of its students cannot obscure the school's importance to the quality of life in this region.

There are some schools in the State System of Higher Education that are struggling to maintain enrollment. All of us — even those who don't depend directly on BU or its students for income — can be thankful that's not the case here.

BU is robust, and Gov. Robert Casey's announcement last week shows that the state intends to keep it that way.

The new Higher Education Capital Construction Program is a unique cost-sharing arrangement in which the state will provide 75 percent of the funding for the new building, while the university assumes responsibility to raise the remaining 25 percent locally.

Until now, all bricks-and-

mortar projects at SSHE universities were 100 percent state funded. But with Pennsylvania's budget mired in recession, HECCP offers the schools a chance to stretch limited state dollars and get started now on long-overdue improvements.

Appropriately, the concept has been dubbed "Operation Jumpstart."

BU President Harry Ausprich and his staff are ecstatic and proud, as well they should be. It was their planning and lobbying that kept the library project where it belonged — near the top of Harrisburg's agenda. "We are very excited about the prospect of finally having a library that will meet the academic needs of our students and faculty, as well as those of our neighbors," Ausprich said last week.

"Neighbors" is a key word there. What makes Operation Jumpstart unique is that friends, alumni and neighbors of SSHE schools will be called on to provide that last 25 percent of the project cost.

For BU's library, that means \$2,375,000 will have to be generated locally.

"Raising funds for 'brick and mortar' presents a new challenge," said Jan Girton, chairman of the Bloomsburg University Foundation. That's an understatement.

To raise such a sum, BU will have to tap a considerable reservoir of good will that exists among the many people whose lives have been improved by their association with the school.

"We plan to formally begin our fund-raising campaign in January," Girton said. "I believe our alumni, parents, students, friends and the community will support this very necessary project."

We hope — we believe — that will be the case.

Think of it as a library, but also as a long-term investment in the future of BU and the region.

A Message from President Ausprich

Good news came to Bloomsburg University a few weeks ago. After four years of intensive lobbying, Governor Casey approved a 75:25 percent cost-sharing plan by which we will now be able to begin the construction of a new, larger library. I want to express my heartfelt thanks to you, our alumni and friends, who lobbied with us for this project. The new library is about to become a reality because of our collective positive efforts.

Through the Higher Education Capital Construction Program, which is part of the Governor's "Operation Jumpstart" program, the state will provide 75 percent of the construction cost for the new library, and the university will raise 25 percent from private sources. Although this is an ambitious project, I am confident that we can achieve this goal. I personally look forward to being actively involved in raising the money needed for the project. Bloomsburg University needs a library that reflects the quality and high standards of the rest of the university, and I pledge to do everything I can to help us be successful.

As former Bloomsburg University students, you know the university is a respected academic institution that attracts students with solid academic records and a strong desire to achieve. Our students need and deserve a library that meets the resource and information requirements of the university's academic programs, and I know I can count on you for your support in this endeavor.

Together we can make it happen.

BU Gets Governor's Go-ahead for New Library

President Harry Ausprich has announced plans to move forward with a unique fund-raising campaign to raise \$2.3 million, or 25 percent, toward the construction of a larger library. Bloomsburg will receive the balance of the \$11.5 million project from Commonwealth funds included in the Higher Education Capital Construction Program (HECCP), which is part of "Operation Jumpstart."

Now in its second year, Operation Jumpstart capital construction projects are expected to result in nearly 16,000 jobs throughout Pennsylvania.

Gov. Robert Casey unveiled the HECCP during a press conference on Thursday, Oct. 8, in Harrisburg. He emphasized that he is committed to working with the state's public universities to help them withstand the current recession and build for the future.

The HECCP will release state funds for capital construction projects for the state-owned and state-related universities through a unique cost-sharing program. The Board of Governors of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education and the Bloomsburg University Council of Trustees previously endorsed the HECCP concept of a one-time shared funding plan.

"This unparalleled construction campaign will ensure a solid foundation for the future of higher education in Pennsylvania," said Casey during his news conference. "This program, a partnership between the Commonwealth and its public universities, will finance 66 construction or renovation projects totalling nearly \$468 million — \$313.7 million in state funding and \$153.9 million raised by our state-owned and state-related universities."

The funding of Bloomsburg's

library and projects at other state-owned universities included in the program is based on the cost-sharing concept that the state provides 75 percent of the construction cost and the university raises 25 percent from private sources. Historically, the state has funded all academic and administrative construction at the 14 state-owned universities that make up the State System of Higher Education.

The proposal to construct a new library on Bloomsburg's campus was included in a capital spending plan approved in 1988. Funds for approved capital projects must be

released through the Governor's Office.

Construction of a new library has been the top priority capital project for Bloomsburg

University for many years. Just eight years after the 1966 opening of the Harvey A. Andruss Library, a consultant was commissioned to suggest solutions for the crowded conditions. Although Bloomsburg has the fourth largest full-time equivalent enrollment of the 14 State System universities, it ranks 14th in both the percent of seating space in its library and the net library square footage per student.

"We are very excited about the prospect of finally having a larger library that will meet the academic needs of our students and faculty, as well as those of our neighbors," said Ausprich. "We are very willing to cooperate in this special one-time funding initiative that will help us realize this important goal and, at the same time, help provide a jumpstart for the area economy."

"In these difficult economic times, the HECCP offers a creative solution to a long-standing problem and an added, much needed economic benefit to the region. The university will finally be able to build the library it so desperately needs, and construction of an \$11.5 million building will help fuel the area's economy," said Kevin O'Connor, chairper-

son, of the University's Council of Trustees.

The Bloomsburg University Foundation Chairperson, Jan Girton, acknowledged that raising funds for construction is an ambitious and new undertaking for the university. "We plan to formally begin our fund-

raising campaign in January. I believe our alumni, parents, students, friends, and the community will support this very necessary project."

Representatives from various university constituencies — Council of Trustees, the Foundation, alumni, faculty, staff, parents, and students — as well as from the local community — will be invited to serve on a special advisory committee that will offer guidance in garnering the necessary support from external sources for the new library campaign.

Bloomsburg has previously raised over \$16 million from the private sector. "I am optimistic about our ability to raise the money we need for the library," Ausprich said. "It won't be easy and it won't happen overnight."

Fund raising for the library is nothing new. The university has received \$3.5 million toward the initial three phases of The Trust for Generations campaign under the direction of Anthony Ianiero, currently acting vice president of university advancement. "The first

phase of this campaign included a \$1 million endowment specifically raised to augment university funding for library acquisitions and equipment," he said. The Foundation will begin to disburse interest from these funds to the library this spring.

Ianiero hopes to have pledge commitments for the new library campaign within two years and to be in receipt of all pledge monies within four years.

New Library to Eliminate Overcrowding

Although recommendations regarding the proposed site and design of the new library have not yet been approved by university administration or the Council of Trustees, it is expected the building will be located on the softball field adjacent to Waller Administration Building and the tennis courts.

The proposed 125,000 square foot building will increase seating from 387 reader stations to 1,219 and hold more than 400,000 volumes. The Curriculum Materials Center collections and the University Archives resources will again be housed in the library, along with the return of some 35,000 bound periodicals

and other materials currently in off-campus storage.

"The library is the heart of the campus. It is our academic hub where students come to seek information and to study," said Carol Matteson, interim provost. "Since the Andruss Library was built in 1966, we have increased the number of our faculty and have seen an expansion of scholarly growth and research activities. Faculty are also making assignments that place greater research demands on students."

Despite escalating space problems in recent years, Matteson commends the library staff under the direction of J. Daniel Vann III, dean of library services. "The library faculty have found very creative and innovative ways to meet our students' and faculty's needs."

Now that the funds have been released from the Commonwealth,

the Professional Selections Committee of the Pennsylvania Department of General Services is expected to begin, in December, the process of selecting architects for the various capital projects. Because of the number of projects being released simultaneously, this process might take as long as a year to complete. The subsequent design and bidding process is projected to require an additional year before construction can begin. Robert Parrish, vice president of administration, estimates it will be at least 18 months before ground can be broken for the new library. "An optimistic date for opening the new library is summer, 1996," said Parrish. The new library will be designed to provide adequate stack space, seating and study space, he added.

College of Arts and Sciences Alumni Help Guide Change

Dean Hsien-Tung Liu reports that Bloomsburg University alumni play an important role in various activities of the College of Arts and Sciences' 19 departments. "Alumni contacts with Bloomsburg University are necessarily diverse, but very important for our faculty and students," Liu said. "Our alumni are excellent contacts for keeping us informed about changes in the job market, for placing undergraduate students in internship experiences, and for telling us about new job opportunities."

In addition to the following examples, which are representative of the kinds of departmental contacts maintained with alumni, some alumni return to teach on either a part-time or a full-time basis or to serve as guest speakers.

Economics. According to Woo Bong Lee, chairperson of the Department of Economics, former economics majors, through a periodic survey, tell students about their jobs, the kinds of jobs that are available, and current salary levels. These alumni also offer suggestions to faculty about curricular improvements, such as a need for computer familiarity in today's business world, and more practice in public speaking and writing skills. Some economics-major alumni have been invited to the annual induction ceremony for Omicron Delta Epsilon, the economics honor society, to talk about their work experiences and job satisfaction.

Institute for Interactive Technologies (IIT). Master's degree graduates from the IIT play an important role in the ongoing success of this program. Harold J. Bailey, director of the IIT, reports that some alumni represent their employers on the IIT's corporate advisory council while others speak to classes about managing the multimedia projects they are designing. Alumni have been instrumental in arranging for their employers to donate to the IIT

various computer hardware and software for student use. These alumni also provide a good network for exchanging information about new job opportunities for graduates and about computer-related news before it is commonly known. Occasionally alumni return to campus to demonstrate the multimedia projects they have completed.

Sociology and Social Welfare. Approximately 45 alumni return annually for the Alpha Kappa Delta induction ceremony for the international honor society for students majoring in sociology and social welfare. Leo G. Barrile, chairperson of the sociology and social welfare department, explains that department members hope to involve more alumni in departmental activities. Presently several alumni return to campus on the career day sponsored by the department to talk about their work experiences. Also alumni are asked periodically to respond to program evaluation surveys that help guide curriculum changes. Several alumni who live in the Bloomsburg area serve on the local social welfare advisory board.

Biology and Allied Health. Graduates from the biology and allied health curricula, according to Louis V. Mingrone, chairperson of the biology and allied health department, help students find internship experiences and advise them about future job opportunities. Presently there are nearly two dozen hospital affiliates for the medical technology internship

program. Many students often find jobs at these same hospitals upon graduation. Successful placement of BU graduates in the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine have resulted in these alumni returning to campus to talk with prospective medical school students. As department members receive letters and notes from alumni about their successes, appropriate correspondence is posted for students to share.

Languages and Cultures. According to Brigitte Callay, chairperson, Department of Languages and Cultures, a survey of alumni several years ago uncovered a dramatic shift in the employment patterns that redirected the coursework for today's students. By improving communication with the department's alumni, students are able to learn from them the value of study-abroad programs and the need to develop networking opportunities that are important in making international job connections.

Art. Art department alumni responded to a survey last year as part of the department's five-year evaluation process. Art Department Chairperson Ken Wilson says their comments are helping faculty determine the effectiveness of the art curriculum. In the 1980s, art alumni were invited to display selected works of art in a special alumni exhibition on campus. A similar alumni exhibition will be planned in the next year or two.

Psychology. Many local human-services agencies employ graduates from the psychology program. Many of these alumni serve as supervisors for student practicum placements. Several alumni are invited each semester to return to campus to share their experiences by focusing either on graduate education opportunities or on their careers within the mental health profession. Information gleaned from psychology graduates through a periodic survey is shared with prospective students and their parents when they visit campus. One alumnus who is employed by a national professional psychology organization

has been very helpful by giving guidance on various organizational issues and providing information on available computer software for psychology research.

Arts and Sciences alumni or alumni from other disciplines who would like to help the university in these and other ways simply need to express such a desire. Mertz was born and raised in nearby Northumberland. Following his graduation as a business education major, he was drafted and served as an air operations specialist in the Army Air Corps during World War II.

After the war, Mertz returned home and enrolled at Bucknell University where he earned a master of science in commerce and finance in 1947. Later that year, he accepted a position to teach accounting and business mathematics at Drexel Institute of Tech-

nology in Philadelphia.

In 1948, Mertz was appointed assistant professor of business administration at Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, where he taught accounting, economics, and business communications.

Mertz left teaching in 1951 and accepted a job as a junior accountant on the staff of the U.S. General Accounting Office in Washington, D. C., where he conducted management reviews of various government offices and departments including the Public Housing Administration, Maritime Administration, and Foreign Operations Administration.

He was named chief assistant to the director of the Civil Account-

ing and Auditing Division in 1975 and was responsible for recruiting, hiring, and training new staff.

Many of the staff personnel recruited and trained by Mertz, including more than 50 Bloomsburg graduates, are presently serving in important administrative and auditing positions with the federal government.

For his service, Mertz was awarded the U.S. General Accounting Office's Meritorious Service Award in 1972 by then comptroller general Elmer B. Statts.

Now retired, Mertz spends much of his leisure at his homes in Arlington, Va., and Venice, Fla.

Feasibility Study Unveiled for Student Recreation Center

According to John Trathen, director of student activities, a student recreation center will be constructed at a cost of approximately \$5,300,000. The proposed new center will be used for recreation and intramurals. Funding for the center will come from student fees, and a mortgage will be amortized over a 20-year period.

"Current recreational facilities on campus are not adequate for the number of students enrolled at the university," said Janice Michaud, community government association president. "The construction of the student recreation center will provide students with access to new state-of-the-art equipment. Bloomsburg students, in favor of nonstudents, will be given preferential times for use of the recreational facility," she added.

A student referendum passed last year committed students to a \$60 per semester fee to pay for the center.

When Nelson Fieldhouse opened in 1972, student enroll-

ment was about 5,000, and there were 10 varsity teams. Today there are more than 7,600 graduate and undergraduate students and 18 varsity sports. Physical education classes, practice and compe-

he used primarily for intercollegiate teams' activities. Physical education classes will continue to be held in both Centennial Gymnasium and Nelson during the day. After 6 p.m., Centennial will be

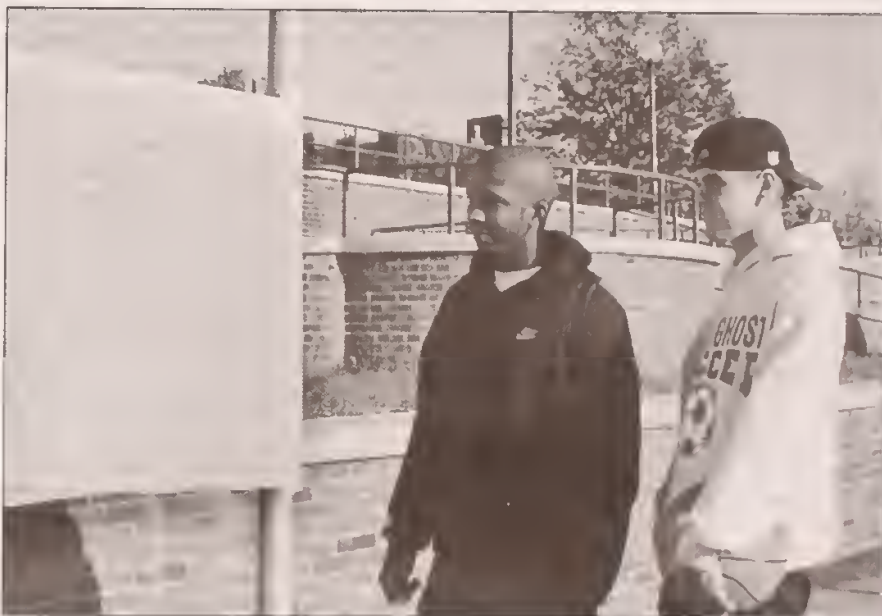
The proposed location for the center is on the former hockey practice field across from the tennis courts. The architectural plan will accommodate the naturally sloping site, and construction materials will take advantage of natural light.

The facility will offer these primary features:

- main arena with a jogging/running track and four intramural-size basketball courts which can be used for tennis or volleyball.
- multi-purpose room for aerobics and dance.
- Nautilus room/exercise room for rowing, jogging, bicycling, Nordic track, and stair masters.
- free-weight room.
- four racquetball courts.

The overall design of approximately 55,000 square feet will conform to existing standards for the disabled and the Pennsylvania Energy Conservation Act.

Cost estimates for the project are being prepared, and bids will be awarded this coming spring. Construction could begin in early summer, 1993, with occupancy for the fall, 1994 semester.

Legislative Black Caucus visits campus to talk with students, staff

Members of the Pennsylvania Legislature's Black Caucus met with about 50 minority students as well as about 30 minority faculty and staff on September 28. The visit was the result of an invitation issued to the legislators several weeks ago by state Rep. Ted Stuban.

Trustee Howard Johnson opened the student session by encouraging a frank discussion of concerns and issues. "Through these exchanges you have the opportunity to set forth a lasting legacy for other minority students who will follow you on this campus," he said.

Telling students they are the "treasure for the future," Johnson reminded them that "sharing reality leads to growth of excellence."

Rep. William Robinson of Allegheny County, who chaired the meetings, challenged students to do something positive to improve Bloomsburg, to use their intellectual capacity to find solutions to issues. "Invest something positive of yourself. Be proud of your university," he said.

After introductory remarks, at the students' request, Robinson closed the session to university trustees, employees and the press.

Throughout the day, Robinson and other black legislators advised those with concerns to put their thoughts in writing and forward them to the university's administration or directly to the caucus.

Prior to departing, the legislators met briefly with university officials. "We welcome their insightful feedback," said President Harry Ausprich.

The legislators encouraged the administration to utilize caucus resources to work with the system to bring about changes. Climate issues, graduation rates, financial concerns, retention and support services for minority students were among the topics discussed in the meeting with administration.

University officials hope the caucus will return soon to meet with members of the University-Town Task Force on Racial Equity.

Artist transforms woodwork into 'marble' as part of Gross Auditorium renovation

Marguerite Bierman has perfected a kind of alchemist's trick, turning ordinary painted surfaces into something you'd swear was marble.

But it takes painstaking skill and plenty of tools: paints, special brushes, a feather and a toothbrush, plus custom-blended paints, thinners and solvents.

Bierman recently finished work on the pillars, stage and balcony panels at the Gross Auditorium in Bloomsburg University's Carver Hall.

The auditorium is undergoing a major face-lift funded by a donation from Kenneth R. Gross, after whom the spacious room has been renamed.

"Currently I'm a part-timer in this position. It's my vacation," Bierman said as she worked on the university auditorium recently. She is also a goldsmith at James Meyer & Co., Williamsport.

The 38-year-old Williamsport artist learned how to re-create 19th century finishes by working as an apprentice to a painter of church interiors. Then she studied art at Kutztown and Mansfield universities, and further perfected her architectural painting skill at historic preservation workshops.

Now, in addition to creating painted illusions that transform spaces and surfaces, she consults on historic renovations, helping people select paint colors that will enhance a space.

At the auditorium she wanted to emphasize the front, the panels and to draw attention to details on the columns in a dignified fashion.

"An element such as marble sort of signifies permanence and our longevity. It's sort of a sanctified space," where people gather to learn, she said.

"Color is a tremendously emotional thing. It does something for you, and you can pick out features of a space to enhance."

Marble-like veining is a multi-step process that starts with a smooth, painted finish. Bierman then dribbles on streaks of oil paint and uses solvents to blur the streaks in a number of ways, then blots the pattern she has created. For a final touch, she takes a toothbrush and applies little drops of solvent.

"See, I'm spritzing the surface. It adds the appearance of fossiliferous openings like the stone itself," she said.

Because she tries for a lively look in the marble, she doesn't paint each section in turn, but skips around," she said.

"This suits my personality a lot because I feel it's spontaneous. Your emotions are up, it's a creation, a birthing. You're controlling it, yet you're ready for accidents," she said.

She is picking out colors from a stained glass ceiling panel to guide the choice of wall and trim colors. Choices that are just being finalized include shades of gray and teal with burgundy accents.

Salzburg summer courses expose students to beauty and culture of Mozart's hometown

"Climb Every Mountain" sang the Mother Superior in "The Sound of Music," one of the most popular movies of all time. In July, eight BU students heard real nuns sing in the Nonnberg Abbey, where Maria Von Trapp was a novice in the movie. They were taking a summer course, "The Art, Architecture and History of Salzburg," taught by Dr. Christopher Armstrong of the sociology-social welfare faculty.

"Each day, we visited a different site," said Armstrong. "One day, it was the Nonnberg, oldest abbey in the world, another day we toured the best preserved medieval fortress in Europe, a different time we had a tour of the house where Mozart was born and heard his instruments played. My students knew more about the history of Salzburg than many native Austrians before we left."

The Summer Salzburg program is run out of Slippery Rock University by Dr. Henry Lenz, and this year's program included faculty from the University of South California and Baldwin-Wallace in Ohio, as well as several other state universities in Pennsylvania. Dr. Armstrong has taught his summer course in 1977, 1981, and 1989 and enjoys exposing students to the glorious surroundings of one of Europe's great cities.

Learning to get around town by bus took time, and Theresa Lesky '93 had an unplanned afternoon tour of the entire city as she navigated her way home from the Old City early the first week.

Daily classes were from eight a.m. to noon, and there were a number of day trips and weekend excursions. This year BU students went to Venice, Italy, for a weekend. Sociology majors Kate King '93 and Eva Mosokowski '94 enjoyed themselves so much they took a six-hour train trip back the following weekend, leaving at 3:30 a.m. and sleeping in the train aisle with a family of Czechoslovakians.

Jessica Ruthrauff '94 and roommate Keri Putera '94 took a train to Munich, Germany, the second weekend to visit Jessica's relatives who wined and dined them and treated them like royalty.

Delores Rizzuto '94 took a solo train ride to Zurich, Switzerland, for a weekend and met a friendly Swiss woman who invited her home for the weekend.

Students lived with local families, and in the three weeks, remarkable comradery developed between the BU students and their host families. Austrians speak German, and none of the students spoke German as a second language. Continental breakfasts of coffee and hard rolls were served by the *haus fraus* each morning before the students left for class. Lunch and dinner were eaten in a local tourist inn.

The course lasted from July 11 to July 31, and nearly every day there were trips to various places in and around Salzburg. There are beautiful lakes in the Salzkammergut region, half an hour outside Salzburg. A day trip took students to various villages in the lake district, and they had dinner in a lakeside hotel in Hallstadt, one of the oldest known communities in the world.

An adventure in the Werfen Ice Caves was one of the highlights for Julie Lane '94 of West Chester. "We took a cable car straight up the mountain face, then walked 1,400 steps into the ice caves, where it was 32 degrees despite sweltering heat outside. It was unbelievable," said Julie.

Carri Jolley of Courtdale enjoyed a cog-railroad ride up a mountain overlooking the picturesque lakeside village of St. Wolfgang on a weekend excursion.

A major program highlight for all was "folk dancing night," when all the students ventured outside the city to a country restaurant to be entertained by an evening of traditional Austrian dancing. This year, the Bloomsburg students were popular with the Austrian dancers, and many learned some new folk dances as partners of the local dancers. The festive costumes and steady flowing of the Austrian beer contributed to a glorious evening.

Dr. Armstrong and his family spent one weekend with Austrian friends in Prague, Czechoslovakia. "This is one of the most beautiful architectural cities in all Europe. There are buildings that date back to the middle ages, for, despite being at the center of Europe, the city was never bombed in any major wars. Sadly, many buildings are in a sad state of disrepair since the Communists allowed many landmarks to deteriorate. The American

dollar still goes a long way, and the three of us had a large dinner in a nice hotel for a total of \$10," said Armstrong.

Many joyous evenings were spent in the Augustiner beer garden, where students met fellow Americans from Philadelphia, as well as other students from Austria, France, Korea and many other countries. The novelty of grabbing a beer mug off a shelf and washing it in a public trough, then having it filled from a wooden beer harrel with brass tap made the Augustiner one of the most popular spots of the BU women.

"I hope to offer the course again in the summer of 1994, and hopefully the dollar will be stronger. It was tough to pay \$2.50 for a Pepsi," said Armstrong.

Program provides technical help and hands-on experience

A new initiative at Bloomsburg University is providing technical assistance in personal computer applications to area businesses and industries while giving math and computer science majors some hands-on job opportunities.

Aided by a one-year grant totaling \$41,500 from the Center for Rural Pennsylvania in Harrisburg, the university's School of Extended Programs and department of mathematics and computer science have established the Bloomsburg University Technical Assistance Center.

According to Stephen Kokoska, director of BUTAC, undergraduate math and computer science majors at Bloomsburg will be placed as interns at small and medium-sized companies in northeastern and central Pennsylvania to help those businesses resolve PC-based problems.

"Bloomsburg has some very talented math and computer science majors who are capable of helping area companies solve their computer problems," says Kokoska, an associate professor of mathematics.

TRAINED ON CAMPUS under the watchful eyes of Kokoska and BUTAC associate directors Jim Pomfret and Paul Hartung, the students will specialize in PC-based applications including Computer Aided Design (CAD), Computer Aided Manufacturing (CAM), Statistical Process Control, Electronic Data Interchange, database management, spreadsheet applications and accounting systems.

"We can place a student with a company to help solve the most common PC-related problems," says Kokoska.

BUTAC has placed 15 student interns with several companies in this region, including Wolf's Market in Danville, The Jmes Wood Co. in Williamsport, Montour Systems Co. in Orangeville, and Shuman's Insurance Agency in Bloomsburg. The concept evolved after several grants were awarded to Pomfret and Hartung from the state's Ben Franklin Partnership program over the past few years.

"Professors Pomfret and Hartung, who are university math professors, have witnessed a need for this kind of technical assistance at a number of small and medium-sized companies in this region," notes Kokoska. "Many companies have expressed interest in receiving student help . . . more than the number of qualified students we have in the program at present."

IN JULY, THE THREE PROFESSORS conducted a weeklong seminar for 20 math and computer science majors who expressed interest in the BUTAC program. "Since local demand is high, we invited some of our majors to campus and gave them an overview of the program," recounts Kokoska, "and we asked them to choose one or two PC-based applications that they might be interested in."

Kokoska says students are required to work independently on their chosen topics and "when we feel a student is qualified to provide assistance to a particular company, we will try to place him or her with that company."

Because the university was fortunate to receive a grant from the Center for Rural Pennsylvania this year, BUTAC students can be paid up to \$6 per hour during their internship.

"The grant provides us with money to pay our students, so no financial support is expected from a company for the internship," says Kokoska, noting other dollars from the grant will be used to purchase additional computer equipment for the math and computer science learning lab in McCormick Human Services Center. "It's possible the grant could be renewed for two additional years," he adds.

KOKOSKA AND HIS COLLEAGUES envision a campus facility that will eventually house BUTAC offices and a conference room. "We would like to have a facility at Bloomsburg where we can meet with business and industry representatives and show them the kinds of assistance our students can provide," he says.

But the three professors know they will need support from the companies who benefit from BUTAC services. "We want this program to become self-perpetuating," says Kokoska, "and we hope companies will make contributions to help us continue the service. We're also trying to secure federal funding to support the program."

For now, area companies can receive the computer help they need while math and computer science majors get "real world" experience that may lead to a permanent full-time position when they graduate.

"If a student does a good job, there's a good chance the company they intern with will offer them employment," says Kokoska.

THE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES to offer a strong undergraduate program with the following faculty members:

Professor Duane Braun (since 1975), Associate Professor Norman Gillmeister (since 1973), Associate Professor Mark Hornberger (since 1970), Professor Brian Johnson (since 1967), Professor and Chairperson Jim Lauffer (since 1966), Professor James Lorelli (since 1967), Associate Professor Joseph Pifer (since 1969), and Associate Professor Dale Springer (since 1985).

The department was very busy during the spring semester searching for and interviewing candidates for four vacant positions. Hired were Assistant Professor Michael Devivo (University of Tennessee), environmental planning; Assistant Professor Sandra Kehoe-Forutan (University of Queensland, Australia), environmental planning; Assistant Professor Karen Trifonoff (University of Kansas), cartography and G.I.S.; and Assistant Professor Larry Tanner (University of Massachusetts), geology. In addition, Mrs. Jade Swartwood has joined the department as secretary.

"**OVER THE LAST THREE YEARS** our undergraduate enrollment has increased from 65 majors to 130 majors, equally divided between geography and geology," said Lauffer. "With an increased environmental awareness within our society, our environmental planning option has been the favored program over the past few years and presently has 60 majors."

Majors in geology and earth science programs number 25 and 35 respectively, with another six in the secondary education program.

"Especially important and extremely rewarding to our planning majors has been the required internship program," said Lauffer. Graduates from the programs are finding diverse employment opportunities. Some examples of recent placements are Environmental Resource Management, Inc., in Exton, Pa.; the St. Johns River Water Management District in Palatka, Fla.; the Monmouth County Planning Board in Bordentown, N.J.; and the Lancaster County Planning Commission.

The most recent report of the Career Development Center (April 1992) shows that 90 percent of the department's 14 graduates have found employment in an area related to their undergraduate majors. Lauffer noted this is ten percent higher than the placement average for other Arts and Sciences and Business graduates, and 20 percent higher than College of Professional Studies graduates.

McCormick honored by state educators

State System of Higher Education Chancellor James H. McCormick is the 1992 recipient of the Adler Friend of Education Award given annually by the Pennsylvania State Education Association. PSEA President Annette Palutis and Ken Umbenhauer, chair of PSEA's Adler Award Committee, presented the award to Dr. McCormick during the House of Delegates meeting in Philadelphia.

Named for Lewis F. Adler, its first recipient, the Adler Award is PSEA's most prestigious recognition of a person who has made significant contributions of statewide impact to public education and/or teachers in Pennsylvania.

"Dr. McCormick, not only this year but for many consecutive years, has had a tremendous impact on our public schools," Ms. Palutis said. "Thousands of current and future public school teachers have and will benefit from the education and training provided by the universities which Dr. McCormick oversees.

"His past associations with Bloomsburg and Shippensburg universities as president and faculty member respectively have given him great insight and sensitivity to the requirements of the modern teacher," Ms. Palutis added.

"I am proud, honored and moved by receipt of this award," McCormick said. "I have learned that Lewis Adler was a man of

reason and great resolve—a strong advocate for the presence and needs of PSEA. Joining his company through the award that bears his name is, therefore, a humbling experience."

"More than 60 percent of Pennsylvania's teachers are alumni of a State System university," McCormick said. "Thus, I have more than a passing interest in the continued support and professional development opportunities available to the teaching force. The State System's voice on behalf of the profession is strong—in our mission, our planning, and our initiatives, such as the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching."

He added, "Teaching is in my roots and in my heart; it is my past and my present. There is no more satisfying opportunity than that given the teacher—'to touch the future,' as Christa McCauliff said. I shall strive to be deserving of this significant award as we all work to advance teachers and the state of education in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania."

McCormick assumed his post as chancellor on July 1, 1984, after serving as interim chancellor from the System's founding date, July 1, 1983.

The chancellor is responsible to the Board of Governors for the overall administration of all facets of the System. Under the chancellor's direction, the university presidents, line officers, and support staff provide

System-wide management in such areas as academic policy, planning, student matters, business affairs, faculty and staff affairs, legislative policy, institutional research, legal affairs, capital planning, equal educational opportunities, and advancement efforts.

Notable among the System's accomplish-

ments and efforts have been the establishment of the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching with urban and rural initiatives; the adoption of *Prospectus*, an equal opportunity outline for the State System's policies and practices; and *Priorities*, the planning instrument which will guide the State System into the 21st century. The chancellor is an ex officio member of each of the 14 university councils of trustees.

A native of Indiana County, Pennsylvania, McCormick knows Pennsylvania education first hand. He began his career as a classroom teacher, then as an assistant superintendent for instruction. In 1965, he began an eight-year tenure with Shippensburg University, where he was an associate professor and professor in the Department of Education and Psychology, an assistant dean of academic affairs, assistant to the president, and vice president for administration. During that period, he also served in the roles of acting dean of academic affairs and acting dean of teacher education. In 1973 he was named president of Bloomsburg University, a position he held for ten years.

A graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, McCormick earned master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Pittsburgh. Further study has been completed at Columbia University, the University of Michigan and the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

The State System of Higher Education comprises 14 universities throughout the Commonwealth. State System universities enroll over 99,800 students, 86 percent of whom are Pennsylvania residents. With more than 11,000 employees, the State System is the 18th largest employer in the state.

He held a football record of 45-21-4 at Trevorton from 1958 to 1966, winning three conference championships. At Line Mountain from 1968 to 1974, his teams posted a 40-16-1 mark, including an undefeated campaign in 1971 before he moved on to assume the athletic director's duties.

Thomas S. Gladsky '62 is author of *Princes, Peasants, and Other Polish Selves: Ethnicity in American Literature*, a case study of the way in which ethnic identities are created and shaped by literature, focusing on the American image of the Pole from the 1830s to the present. Danny Litwhiler gives his Golden Glove and his h

When he played major league baseball, Danny Litwhiler was honored because he didn't give a whole lot away. It is ironic, therefore, that Litwhiler has given Bloomsburg University the very cherished item he received for one of his professional strengths.

In halftime ceremonies of the university's 66th annual Homecoming football game in Robert B. Redman Stadium, the outstanding gentleman handed the Gold Glove he earned from major league baseball for his defensive excellence to his alma mater. Litwhiler made the presentation to President Harry Ausprich and Director of Athletics Mary Gardner.

Litwhiler and his wife Pat were the university's special guests throughout the festive weekend participating in many of the scheduled activities with alumni and friends. Following a Friday evening reception in his honor, Litwhiler served as grand marshal of the annual parade through downtown Bloomsburg. He also attended the afternoon's picnic at the Fenstemaker Alumni House prior to the football game and was recognized that evening at the Alumni Dinner-Dance.

"We have 10 children, and the glove only has five fingers, so there was no fair way to divide it among them," said Litwhiler. "My fond memories of Bloomsburg made the decision easy, and I am proud to be able to give this to a place that has given me so much."

THE MAN, who has been an ambassador for the sport of baseball for more than 50 years, spent 11 seasons in the major leagues with four different teams including the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, Boston Braves, and Cincinnati Reds. His list of accomplishments and accolades is extensive and involves his contributions and participation in the sport at all levels since his graduation from Bloomsburg in 1938.

A trip to the university's upper campus features one of the highest tributes to the man who carried the name of his alma mater proudly throughout his career. The current playing field for the Huskies' baseball team is named in his honor. The field has seen constant change since its creation in 1973 and now stands as one of the finest facilities in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference.

"This is where I got my start. I owe a lot to Bloomsburg, so I told Dr. Ausprich of my idea to give the glove to the university, and he was more than happy to accept."

FOLLOWING THREE SEASONS in the minor league system, Litwhiler made his debut in the big leagues with the Phillies in the 1940 season and didn't take long to make his mark. In 1941, his first full season in the major leagues, he hit .305 and had the distinction of hitting a home run in every stadium in the league. As good as he was at the

plate. Litwhiler excelled even more in the field as the following season he became the first outfielder in major league history to complete an entire season without committing an error. Litwhiler's defensive prowess carried through every inning of all 154 games that season and continued through 33 contests the following year before coming to a halt. His outstanding play was rewarded with his naming to the National League All-Star Team that season and the presentation of his first Gold Glove, the major league's top award for defensive excellence.

He earned another Gold Glove in 1943, but that season marked an even more dramatic change for the standout athlete as he was traded in mid-season from the last-place Phillies to the first-place and eventual league champion St. Louis Cardinals. The first of his two appearances in the World Series ended in disappointment as the Cardinals lost in five games to the New York Yankees. However, the club duplicated its league-winning performance in 1943 and went into a series with the cross-town St. Louis Browns. Litwhiler's solo home run in the eighth inning of the fifth game helped his squad to a 2-0 victory which snapped a 2-2 tie in the series and helped lift the Cardinals to the World Championship.

FOLLOWING MILITARY SERVICE, he returned to baseball as a player with the Boston Braves and closed his playing career with the Cincinnati Reds. During his time with the Reds, Litwhiler began a new stage of his career as, in addition to his playing, he was a member of the coaching staff. That experience led to him serving as a manager in the minor league system for the next three seasons.

He went back to college in 1954, but not as a student. Litwhiler took over as head baseball coach at Florida State University and, along with his duties as physical education instructor, spent the next nine years molding the Seminoles into a power. His teams performed in the regional playoffs seven times, made three appearances in the College World Series, and had a record of 189-81.

He moved on to Michigan State University and spent the next 19 years as a teacher and head coach for the Spartans. His teams won two Big Ten championships and posted a record of 488-388 before he went back to professional baseball. He spent five seasons as a consultant and minor league traveling coach for the Cincinnati organization.

ALWAYS INTERESTED in all phases of his sport, Litwhiler was a contributing writer to a variety of baseball publications and has had a hand in writing five books. He has also been nationally recognized for his inventions and innovations. It was while at Michigan State that Litwhiler developed the "Jugs Speed Gun," the device currently used at all levels of baseball to clock the speed of pitches delivered from the mound. He also is responsible for many other items including "Diamond Grit," an agent used to dry wet playing surfaces and a unique bat used to teach the art of bunting.

Litwhiler is a member of six halls of fame, including being one of the charter members of the Bloomsburg University Athletic Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Pat, live in New Port Richey, Florida.

Adrian's contract as football coach won't be renewed

Bloomsburg University has announced that head football coach Pete Adrian's contract will not be renewed following the conclusion of the current season. The announcement was made October 6 by Mary Gardner, the university's director of athletics.

"Our reason for making the announcement at this time is that Coach Adrian wanted to know his status," said Gardner. "We normally evaluate our programs at the conclusion of seasons, looking at things such as budgetary matters, coaching staffs and academic performance as well as success in competition. Even though this is not our normal course of action, we felt the need to give him a response, and any other answer would not be fair to him or the players."

Adrian is in his seventh season in charge of the program with an overall record of 35-33-1. His 1992 team has an 0-5 record with ___ games left to play.

"We have full confidence in Pete Adrian as a person," said Gardner. He has always had the best interest of the student-athletes in the forefront, and we are confident that he will continue to do so for the remainder of the season."

Adrian's teams have posted records of 7-2-1, 8-3, 7-4, 4-7, 4-7, and 5-5 prior to this year. This season, the Huskies have dropped decisions to Bucknell (41-24), Shippensburg (20-14), Lock Haven (38-33), East Stroudsburg (42-17), Millersville (48-12).

"Given the resources we have provided and continued to enhance over the past several years, we are not confident in the direction of the program," said Gardner. "One aspect certainly is that the on-the-field successes have not met our expectations."

Adrian said he wasn't upset by the administration's action.

"A lot of guys get fired. It's my first time in 24 years, but it's no big deal," he said. "I'll be coaching somewhere in the fall. My phone has been ringing off the hook already... all my friends from all over the country have been calling. That's a nice feeling."

Prior to coming to BU in 1986, he was a defensive line coach at Idaho State from 1972-1975 before becoming an assistant at Rhode Island.

Dance marathon benefits special camp for special children

The dance marathon came back to the BU campus this fall — for the benefit of Camp Victory, a camp under construction for children with chronic illnesses.

Alumni of the late 1970s and early 1980s will remember a series of annual dance marathons which raised money for a variety of local charities. A few years ago, the BU marathons were discontinued when interest waned. But now, with renewed national interest in marathons, including the very successful "Thon" at Penn State, local students hope for similar success.

The Victory Dance Marathon was held on Friday, October 23, and concluded on Saturday, October 24. It will be jointly sponsored by the National Panhellenic Council, Inter-Fraternity Council and the Program Board.

Proceeds will help with the continued construction of Camp Victory, planning for which was originated by the Nicholas Wolff Foundation in April 1987. Nicholas Wolff, son of Lois and Dennis Wolff of Millville, was born in 1985 with a serious liver disease. Two surgical procedures could not adequately correct the problem. When he was 18 months old, Nicholas received a liver transplant. For the rest of his life, he will require constant monitoring, medication, and treatments.

As the Wolffs watched their son, they felt deprived forever of a normal existence and became desperate for emotional support. When they went into various hospitals with Nicholas, they became aware of many other families experiencing similar turmoil. They gave considerable thought to the plight of these families and to what could be done to help to relieve their burden. One way that they felt that disabled children and their families could benefit was through a recreational camping environment.

The illness of Nicholas Wolff and the impact it had on his family was a crucial factor in providing the unique idea for Camp Victory... a camp which any child with special needs could attend worry-free, knowing that expert medical care would be readily accessible at all times. The site is named Camp Victory because Nicholas means victory, implying the conquering of adversity.

Land for Camp Victory has been purchased in Greenwood Township, Columbia County. For ease of mobility and access, the camp is being built in an area of gently sloping terrain. The site comprises 35 acres of rustic woodland, open fields, a stream and a large pond for fishing. The architectural rendering of proposed buildings now includes 10 cabins, a dining hall, a "med shed" (a sophisticated medical facility to meet the needs of these ailing and disabled children), an Olympic-size swimming pool, and

Social welfare accreditation reaffirmed

Bloomshurg University's four-year bachelor's degree program in social welfare recently had its accreditation reaffirmed by the Council on Social Work Education.

Following two years of preparation by social welfare faculty from Bloomsburg's sociology and social welfare department, university officials received notification from CSWE in August stating the program's accreditation has been extended for eight years.

CSWE, which accredits approximately 500 baccalaureate and master's degree social work programs at colleges and universities nationwide, employs rigorous standards designed to improve and enhance professional social work education.

"Receiving accreditation from CSWE ensures that our undergraduate social work program has met an array of standards established by its Commission on Accreditation," says Hsien-Tung Liu, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. "These national standards of quality are continually being revised on the basis of findings from educational research, new knowledge, changing needs and experience."

According to Dale L. Sultzbaugh, associate professor of social welfare and director of the program, Bloomsburg's first social work course was taught in 1969. I. Sue Jackson, associate professor of social welfare, began developing the program back in the 1970s "and eventually it became an option for students who were majoring in sociology," Sultzbaugh recalls.

A few years after the State System of Higher Education was established, the university received state approval to develop a social work undergraduate degree program. "On April 15, 1986, we received official state approval to develop a program within a two-year period," Sultzbaugh recounts, "and in 1988, the program received initial accreditation from CSWE . . . for their standard first-time accreditation period of four years."

According to Sultzbaugh, graduates of Bloomsburg's social welfare curriculum benefit from the program's accreditation. "Students who graduate from our program can enter a variety of Pennsylvania state civil service positions as a case worker, rather than a case worker trainee . . . and this means they get a higher entry level salary," he says.

New legislation adopted a few years ago in Pennsylvania requires social workers to have a degree from a CSWE accredited program if they want to work in a hospital or nursing home with 120 beds or more. "Individuals who have degrees from non-accredited programs are no longer permitted to work as a social case worker in a nursing home or

hospital," says Sultzbaugh.

Over the last four years, about 60 percent of the university's social welfare graduates secured their first jobs as social workers in child welfare, aging and mental health agencies. Other graduates were hired as social workers in hospitals, domestic violence centers and criminal justice settings. "And another 25 percent enrolled in graduate social work programs which lead to a master's degree," Sultzbaugh adds.

In addition, Sultzbaugh indicates the social welfare undergraduate program at Bloomsburg has increased its enrollment by about 50 percent since earning its first accreditation four years ago. "We have 117 majors right now . . . up from about 80 in 1988," he adds.

Student's play performed in New York City

Reviewers describe Terrance Jenkins' play about inner-city family life as steeped in gritty realism and emotional intensity.

Jenkins, 20, a Bloomsburg University sophomore from Philadelphia's north side, says plenty of the stark plot comes from the people he knew growing up.

He is one of four writers whose work won in the national Young Playwrights Festival. His play, "Taking Control," was performed at Playwrights Horizons in New York City in early October.

For a young man, it is a remarkable experience.

But Jenkins, who has a two-year-old child back in Philadelphia, says the bright lights didn't distract him from family responsibilities and the education he hopes will gain him a career in business.

He knew that he'd have to steal several weeks from the fall semester at BU to participate, and he feels his future depends on a good academic record. So he scaled back to 12 credits and signed up for two theater courses this fall.

"I figured the theater department would be the only ones who would understand me being out of class all this time," he said.

"It got hectic when we were in rehearsal in New York," trying to help actors understand the characters' motivation, he said.

The grim plot of "Taking Control" shines a light on a dysfunctional family in which alcoholic adults have no strength to offer their children.

The three daughters in the play are raised by a grandmother. When Kelly, the oldest, becomes pregnant by her boyfriend, a drug dealer, the family reaches a crisis. The middle daughter, Tarae, finally realizes the responsibility of holding the family together will rest with her.

Said Jenkins, "Basically, I took the families I knew, but it's not like it's about one particular family."

He started using his own three female cousins' names, but later changed the names to spare them embarrassment.

"Bully, ReRe and Nedda, they are my real consins, but I put their characters in a situation they had never been in," he said.

Jenkins is aiming for a lucrative career in business after graduation and says he wrote the play only because it was a classroom assignment in high school.

"I knew I was going to make a lot of money, to get up . . . that's the basic motivation of someone where I come from," he said.

"I couldn't see writing as my life. It's challenging, but it's not some

thing I've been socialized to see as something of value."

But he admits the theater has charmed him, and now he's thinking of combining business and the stage.

"I want to know more about it.

We had to see three plays when I was a senior in high school, but now I'd go on my own," he said.

His play won first place at the Philadelphia Young Playwrights Festival and went through an intensive rewriting for a production at Temple University before succeeding in national competition.

As he wrote, he wound up getting deeply involved. "I tried my best to make it as real as possible. I cried into those sheets of paper writing it," he said.

He recently returned from helping stage the New York production, which is directed and performed by professionals. It was an exhilarating and challenging experience, he said.

And some reviews are in: One critic said the play was too long, another that it was too short, and a third called it too eventful for its 35-minute length.

Loyal to the play's origins, Jenkins says only the opinions of his high school classmates would touch him deeply.

Reflecting on his experiences as one of BU's few black students, Jenkins, who finished high in his class at Simon Gratz High School, said he has sometimes felt stereotyped both academically and socially.

"How do I feel about being here? I guess it's like a feeling that you'll find among many black students here. You feel you're just here because they need more black students up here" to fulfill state affirmative action mandates.

"I can't say everyone thinks this, but a lot of people think you're dumb automatically. You're assumed to be less than students of another race.

With every other race, they are assumed to have more brain power than black students," he said.

"Some students see you as gunshooters and are fearful of you. Some don't interact with you," he said.

Many of his outside activities have revolved around Philadelphia. The Philadelphia school board asked him to speak at ceremonies for new teachers, for example.

He chose not to mince words. "They thought I'd say all the good stuff since I won these prizes. Instead, I hit on some really hard stuff. I left them with positives, but I wanted to be sure they knew they could do things to harm a student and not even know it," he said.
