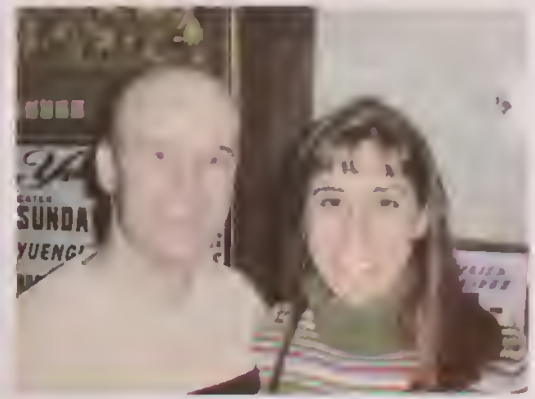

1921

Frank Klem '21 and his wife, Helen, celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary on June 25, 2003. Frank is 101 and Helen is 97. Frank began his teaching career at Newport Township School in 1926. He later served as a principal in the school district for nearly 45 years. They have a son, Frank Jr.; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

1938

George Sharp '38 has written *Gleanings*, a volume of poems written between 1925 and 2002. Pages 21 to 38 offer the Bloomsburg poems, some printed in the *Maroon & Gold* and *Obiter* while George was a student at Bloomsburg. Other verses have appeared in anthologies in England and the U.S.

One section is devoted to Christmas Eve in Denmark, a series of poems which were in the Christmas 1974 issue of *IDEALS* magazine, with photos of selected Bing and Grondahl Jule Aften plates. George's most recent poem in print, "September Eleven," reflects his impressions of that day's tragic events. His *Ballads for a Young Composer* contains a nonsense verse intended to bring attention to the sounds, not the meaning, of the syllables spoken or sung, an unusual commission given to him by a Coombs Conservatory student in 1942.

George, who earned a master's degree at Temple University in 1950, was a teacher for 34 years. He previously published *New Tales for Old*, a book of short stories (Dorrance, 1985) and *One Divided by Two*, a novel (Adams Press, 1993). *Gleanings* is offered by X-Libris on its website, www.xlibris.com/html.

The nostalgic memories he has long treasured fade rapidly as he is drawn into the dangerous realities of a community overwhelmed by crime, where old mine workings are now drug factories, and former childhood friends are now deadly enemies.

Regretfully, he realizes the world he knew in his youth is gone forever, never to return.

Barry Feudale '72 writes: "In January, I trekked the Ecuadorian Cloud Forest and summited Mount Illinzi Norte (16,500 feet) with a wonderful Quest group of 19 led by the incomparable Roy Smith. Since I had a few extra days after everyone returned home, I decided to attempt Mount Chimborazo.

"Chimbo" at 20,700 feet is the highest peak in the Ecuadorian Andes and is actually closer to the sun than Mount Everest, due to the equatorial bulge. It is a heavily glaciated and crevassed mountain with avalanche potential, but it is not unduly technical.

"Chad Mantinez, a lawyer from Stroudsburg; Chad's friend, Reggie; Marcos, an Italian world traveler; Marcello, our guide; and I left the Whymper Refuge at 11:30 p.m. After slipping and sliding on scree and talus (small stones at the base of the mountain) for about an hour, we put on our crampons (metal spikes attached to climbing boots), roped up and deployed our ice axes when we arrived at the Thielman Glacier.

"We summited about 8 a.m. and arrived back at the refuge about 12:30 p.m. I 'bonked' after about four hours of nonstop climbing. Marcello wanted to send me down due to my legs giving out and my slipping on the steep 40-50 degree glacier. I asked him to slow down the pace and we re-roped into a group of four plus two. Marcello and I summited about 15 to 20 minutes after the lead group.

"Chimbo was windy, cold and "Zhivagosome" but I found Mount Cotopoxi (19,500 feet), which I climbed with Quest last year, to be a more challenging and beautiful mountain."

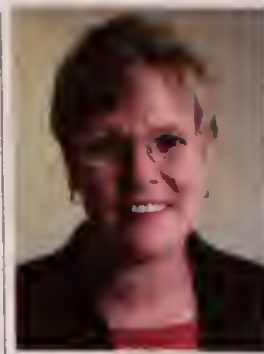

Born February 3, 1933 in New Philadelphia, he received his bachelor's and master's degrees in art education from Kutztown University. He earned his doctorate in art education from Penn State University in 1985. He was also a registered expressive art therapist.

During this retirement he enjoyed pursuing his artistic endeavors and spending time with his family and friends at his cottage on Fishing Creek. He served locally as a police sketch artist and hospice volunteer. One of his favorite post-retirement activities was serving as volunteer art therapist with terminally ill patients at Geisinger Medical Center.

BSEd Leads to International Consulting

One of the wonderful things about getting a degree in education is that you can't even imagine the magical roads it can present to you. Never did I dream that my career would be so circuitous, so exciting or that I would end up with my own small international consulting company, traveling all over the world, doing work I love.

Teaching was not my first choice. But what a happy conspiracy it was that fate led me to it.

I still remember my senior year in high school, eagerly waiting outside the guidance counselor's office, wondering what amazing opportunities he would offer me. I was a good student, and my teachers and mother trained me to believe I could do almost anything.

The boy ahead of me was in there for over an hour. I thought of the probing questions he was being asked: "What are your favorite things to do?" "What do you do the best?" "What excites you?" He finally came out, glowing, and with sheaves of paper and several catalogues. When I sat down, Mr. X said, "Well, you are a good student. Would you like to be a nurse, an airline hostess or a teacher?" That was it. One sentence of guidance and a poor one at that.

That was a long time ago, and it was my first major collision with gender differences. In response to my questioning, he had simply said, "Sam is a boy." End of discussion. I confess that I rudely told him if I couldn't be a doctor I wouldn't be a nurse and if I couldn't be a pilot I wouldn't be a hostess. I stormed out crying, with one catalogue—from Bloomsburg State College.

It was a fortunate decision and one for which I will always be grateful.

Bloom gave me more than teaching techniques. The personal interest of each of the professors, the guidance in issues ranging from social protocol (who can forget learning how to measure exactly how far from the edge of the table the

flatware should be, or why not to crumble your crackers in your soup?—we rolled our eyes and laughed but we learned!) to moral values (PC considerations went out the window—if you were "bad," your surrogate parents made sure you heard about it—and were duly punished), the push for precision and high standards, and the compassion for others.

I look back fondly especially on professors such as Dr. Devoc, who convinced me I could be a poet, and Dr. Maietta, who opened up a whole new world by encouraging me to go to graduate school.

Of course there were the extra curricular memories as well—the coffee shop where we were treated to "Boost the Hooskies" by the kindly Greek owner every time we came in, Hess' and the beer parties, playing in the band for the football games, strutting down the runway for the fashion shows, being in the school productions—what a well rounded group of experiences we were offered!

Too many friends unfortunately have faded from contact, but association with them then, and with some even still, helped frame my life. Just a few: Joan Christie was a role model, Curt English taught me dedication to a cause, Vivian Scott and Martie Molchan challenged me to face myself in new ways and set my value system, and Harrison Morson, above all others, demonstrated the true meaning of personal integrity.

I hold all of these remembrances and cherish them.

As for my career: after graduating from Penn State with an MS in communication, I spent time in Boston as an audiologist for the federal government, then married my husband Phil, went back to Penn State to finish my doctorate. When three children popped up in short order and I put the degree on hold.

I helped set up one of the first Head Start Programs in New Jersey, as well as developed the first Infant Stimulation Program. I taught and lectured at the University level at Fairleigh Dickinson University, Penn State, Raritan Valley College and Harvard University at the same time practicing



audiology and speech pathology in my home office. I started a fund raising chapter and then trained fund raisers on a national level for a hospital out in Denver, in gratitude for saving our older daughter's life from a debilitating lung disorder.

In the late '70s, I became the chief operating officer of a small financial advisory firm. Shortly after that, I was invited by the *Washington Post* to advise them on some issues they were having regarding an acquisition they had just made. A conversation with Kay Graham and some of her staff led to a six month contract and was the start of my consulting career.

Within the first year, my clients included AT&T, Nabisco, Exxon, and several other Fortune 100 companies as well as

Relationships: The Key to Doing Business in Japan

When I accepted my first consulting assignment in Tokyo 15 years ago, I was deluged with advice. Some of it was good; a lot of it was misleading. Much of it was based on stereotypes, and many of those stereotypes evolved through the eyes of Caucasian men.

Although times and attitudes have changed markedly over the years, a lot of misconceptions linger.

First and foremost is the idea that American women have a much more difficult time doing serious business in Asia. This is especially true in Japan, where women have been trained to be subservient and where even today, few Japanese women hold positions of prominence in most corporations. Interestingly, this attitude crumbles in the face of what is almost the "mysterious gender," where American women are seen as neither the aggressive white male, nor the accommodating Japanese female.

Even more interesting is the fact that the greater our differences, the more likely our success. Tall stature, blonde hair, along with maturity (yes, Japan is still one of the delightful countries that respects age), and credentials are what command attention. Respect is earned, and this is where short, dark haired women can gain equal footing. The right combination of confidence and sincere humility are key to establishing relationships in Japan. And nothing, absolutely nothing, can be accomplished without appropriate, well-nourished relationships.

Which moves to another critical misconception: "Be sure you get a firm commitment, get it in writing and

maybe even bring your lawyer with you. Japanese do not hold to their agreements." The concept of commitment is very different in Japan as opposed to America. I have found at least two elements that get negotiators into trouble. First, there is the tendency of Westerners to conclude prematurely that an agreement has indeed been made. Assent by Japanese initially means, "Yes, I understand," or "Yes, I agree with the concept." Failure to pursue the relationship and to clarify contingencies and what-if scenarios can prove disastrous. Commitments are first and foremost to the relationship, and are often modified by changing situations or conditions.

Research has confirmed that women are more likely to be flexible in this regard and thus often have an advantage over businessmen who want the contract fulfilled regardless. They may win the particular battle, but not be invited back for a larger deal or longer-term relationship. If by circumstances, they are forced to continue to work together, it can be an ongoing contentious situation of mutual distrust.

Because relationships are so critical and cannot be overemphasized, it is prudent to use third party intermediaries to introduce and reaffirm credibility. Most business in Japan, by Japanese, is done this way and it makes for a much smoother transition. It is frustrating to me, and I am sure, to the Japanese, when this aspect of their culture is viewed as non-important or that "takes too much time."

Only a year ago, following a talk I gave to senior global executives on this very topic, one of the Americans came up to me afterwards and said he was so impressed with my speech that he wanted to hire me to teach his newly formed

department in Japan how to do cold call setting. It was an outstanding example of blatant non-listening. One of my Japanese clients who was standing by laughed, squeezed my arm and quietly said, "Sometimes, Doris, you shouldn't even try."

To repeat, much has changed in Japan over the past several years: 15 years ago I was an anomaly—a white woman traveling without her husband, doing business in a highly culturally chauvinistic country. I don't remember seeing any thing remotely resembling diversity in the faces I passed on the street, sat with in the dining rooms or worked with in conferences. Now diversity is taken for granted and I almost miss the shy stares, the awkward but gracious greetings (Do I bow? How low?).

Last month I was told by one of my clients that I "share my knowledge and techniques with total respect for the other culture." I cherish that as the deep compliment it was intended to be, because that is exactly what we should try to do. And I highly recommend and encourage that more women take the opportunity to work in Japan.

A few years ago I left Goldman Sachs and returned to my small corporation where I am now, still coaching senior executives, moderating strategic conferences, and running developmental programs.

I'm a published researcher in the areas of speech and hearing therapy as well as business issues. I continue to make presentations on business topics to groups as varied as the Conference Board in New York to economic groups in Tokyo to young women just getting started in the business world.

I am toying with possibilities for the next turn in the road and have some ideas—next chapter yet to be written. All of my experiences draw on my teaching training at least to some extent, so I have put my years at Bloom to good use.

Now that Bloomsburg State College is Bloomsburg University, just imagine the expanded possibilities for the students there now! May they appreciate and profit from their experiences as much as I have.

I live in Basking Ridge, New Jersey with my husband Phil who retired to become, as he refers to it, "a local artist," and our daughter Sheryl who has Down Syndrome. Our lawyer/psychologist yoga-studio daughter, Irene, is in California with her husband and four year old daughter. Our son, Stephen, has his own software company, OPTAS, outside of Boston, where he lives with his wife and three children.

Science teacher participates in songbird watch

Cristy Boyer Mulherin '99, a fifth grade science teacher in Rockaway Township, NJ, was invited to travel to Hungary to participate in an Earthwatch Expedition researching the migration of European Songbirds. The expedition took place on the Oseca Landscape Reserve, approximately 30 minutes south of Budapest in central Hungary. The reserve is a well-known sight to avid bird watchers in Eastern Europe.

As a participant on the research team, Cristy was responsible for patrolling the mist nets that were set up to catch the songbirds. The nets had to be checked every hour from 5:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Whenever a bird flew into the net, it had to be carefully removed and taken back to a central ringing site.

Once the birds were collected from the nets, they had to be banded by a licensed ringing officer. Cristy then assisted in taking body mass measurements and recording data in log books.

Depending on the weather and time of day, anywhere from one to more than 100 birds could be collected every hour. Some of the more common types of birds that were banded were the Great Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Spotted Flycatcher, Long-tailed Tit, Blue Tit, Chaffinch, House Martin and Great Spotted Woodpecker.

The research team took part in the day to day activities carried out at the camp including washing dishes, doing laundry, shopping for food and cooking. Meal preparation for 15 to 30 people was done in a kitchen area located in the center of the camp. All hot water for the dishwashing had to be boiled on a propane stove. Laundry was washed in two separate machines, one for washing and one for spinning that water out of the clothes. As in most of Eastern Europe, there was no electric dryer. Clothing had to be hung outside to dry, a process complicated by the fact that it rained for most of the trip.

Cristy had an opportunity to meet and talk with many native Hungarians. She learned about the country's political and cultural history listening to first hand accounts.

"Learning about the fall of Communism from someone your own age is a much more powerful lesson than reading about it in a book," she reflected. "It also made me realize how important it is to bring people into my classroom to talk to my students, rather than relying solely on a text book."

Participating on a research team is an experience Cristy has taken back to her classroom. "I put into practice the skills that I tell my students about," she said. Cristy developed a habitat unit around her experience, allowing her class to explore the area around their school, recording and tracking various data throughout the year.

"The Hungarian experience opened my eyes to the variety of habitats that exist within just a few feet of my classroom."

During the past school year, Cristy received a Toshiba America Foundation Grant in Math and Science allowing her to construct a weather station on the roof of the school. She also purchased software and a monitor so that students can track the weather from the classroom.

A Day in Hungary Journal excerpts Earthwatch Songbird Migration Expedition

4:45 The alarm goes off, but I have already been awake for an hour. I have been listening to an audio tape of swallows that has been playing outside all morning. Miklosh put the tape on late last night in hopes of attracting swallows into the mist nets.

5:15 We have just released the birds from last night's catch. Watching the swallows fly out of the basket and circle above the camp is absolutely beautiful. It's time to get a warm cup of tea and get ready for the day.

6:00 This is the first control of the day. We will check the nets every hour until 9:00 PM. At least, that's the plan. The weather has been interfering with the schedule daily.

7:00 I really enjoy checking the nets for birds. I have to be so careful and gentle when I remove them from the nets. Some of them get themselves so tangled. I think of it as a puzzle. "Where should I start, the feet or the wings?" I carefully unwrap each bird until it is free.

8:00 One more net check and then we will have breakfast. Zsóka made the most delicious French toast. Everyone watched very closely as I covered mine with butter, cinnamon, and sugar. It was a good substitute for maple syrup, but not a popular one with the Hungarians.

9:00 We aren't getting as many birds as usual. The light rain seems to be picking up. I have been going on the dry reed bed trail in hopes of finding more birds. The tree cover seems to be just thick enough that we are still finding birds there.

10:30 The rain is picking up. Tibor, our head researcher, has asked that we check the nets every half hour. It is dangerous for the birds to be left in the net in the rain. We are checking more often, but there are fewer birds. I am weighing all of the birds that come in from the nets this hour. First, Tibor and Miklosh check the bird's molting stage and assess the amount of fat they have. Next, the bird is measured and banded. Then, I weigh it on a spring scale and release the bird.

11:30 Tibor has decided that we should close the nets for a few hours. It seems very easy to close them, but you have to do it in a way that keeps them from getting too tangled. It's very hard to open wet twisted nets.

12:30 I have been looking forward to a nice hot lunch. Today we are having chicken soup. It feels good to have something so warm. I feel like I have not been dry in days. Even if it is not raining, my hair is still wet from my shower. They do not use hairdryers here. I think I'll start wearing my hair in braids.

13:00 Since we have some free time this afternoon, Bilkish and I decided to wash some clothes. What an adventure! The "washing machine" only runs for about three minutes. Our clothes are so dirty that I am going to run them through twice. Next, the clothes have to be transferred to a spinning machine. That actually does a very good job of getting the water out. As for a dryer, no such luck. There is no machine and no sunshine. We'll have to hang everything on a drying rack on the porch. I can't wait to put on clean, dry socks.

15:00 The nets are still closed so I am looking for something to do. It is not my day to help with the chores, but I am going to mop the floor anyway. It gets

dirty in here very quickly. Our bedroom could use a thorough mopping. Someone has been wearing their shoes inside.

19:00 The nets were opened about a half hour ago. I was so excited to go out on a run until I got to the reed bed. There was not one, but two blue tits. For such a small and beautiful bird, they sure bite hard. The entire time you are extracting them from the net, they are squawking and pecking at your fingers. I'll get one out, but I think I'll let József take care of the other one.

20:00 I went back out to the reed bed to check the nets. I can't believe this trail. Some people won't even go out on it, but personally, it's my favorite trail. It starts out with a short muddy walk through the forest. The trail soon gets so wet that you must walk on narrow wooden planks. In the reed bed, there are two planks on each side of the mist nets. Underneath the planks is murky, bog water of varying depths. Towards the end, it is past my knees. I know this for a fact because I fell in the other day. It's pretty easy to do when the boards get wet and slippery. Still, it is my favorite trail.

21:00 Dinner was delicious. It was a traditional Hungarian Goulash. I could get used to this kind of food. This control was the best one of the day. Each trail had at least ten birds in the nets. I found my favorite bird, a long tailed tit. It is the cutest bird I have ever seen and it has the most beautiful song. I think Tibor is going to be banding these birds for at least another hour.

22:00 I know that I should be going to bed now, but two days ago, I bought a pack of UNO cards at a small store in Oseca. We have been having a great time playing cards. It hasn't mattered that half of the group speaks English and the other half speaks Hungarian. I have been learning the numbers and colors in Hungarian. Tonight we are only playing in Hungarian. This card game has really helped me make a lot of new friends.

24:00 I fall into bed, exhausted. I need to get a few hours sleep before my alarm goes off at 4:15.

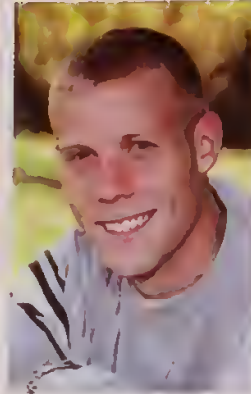
