Edinboro Frosh Rate High in Tests

Stand Near Top in American Association Scores

An elaborate program of testing, sponsored by the American Association of Teachers Colleges showed that Edinboro ranks high among a great number of other teachers colleges who participated in the program. The tests were given to the entering freshmen of each of the schools last fall.

In an average of two intelligence tests the Edinboro freshmen ranked thirteenth in a group of the twenty-four who took the tests.

Edinboro was tenth in the group of twenty-seven who were tested in English, and fifth in the group of twenty-six tested in Elementary Education. In the ratings of the combination of the English and the Elementary tests, Edinboro freshmen placed fifth in the group of twenty-three schools who took it.

These ratings were announced by Dr. Ross in the special assembly program last week.

New Buildings Are Nearly Complete

Lack of Equipment Holds Back Acceptance

Little doubt remains but that the seniors of 1939 will be unable to hold their commencement exercises in the new auditorium.

Although the new buildings are now 99.55% structurally complete they will not be finished for the final State Authority acceptance until about April 1. Before the school finally accepts them, every building must be completely furnished and have been accepted by the State Authority. Structurally complete means that the building is finished only as far as the actual construction is concerned. At present, minor errors, such as a misplaced clock and other minor constructions, are being checked and corrected. The errors in spelling in the auditorium, which were overlooked by the resident officials, will be corrected.

Informality Solution

The new power plant is not yet complete, but final work is now progressing and it will be ready for service within a month. The basement vault in back of Haven Hall has been transformed, and therefore made water tight. This will save from fifteen to twenty days.

In and around the edifices, comfort and beauty are observed everywhere. In place of the boys' showers in the old gym, there are twenty showers in each wing of the new gym. There are ten on each floor and ten in the basement on each side of the swimming pool. Those who have not entered the new gym will be interested to know that the swimming pool is 60 feet long, 20 feet wide, and estimated 15 feet in depth at the deepest part. In the center of the gym will be a circular run-off track which will encircle the new football field.

In all, about a year's work remains to complete grading the campus and beautifying it.

COLLEGE ENROLLMENT HIGH

There are 8,357 students enrolled in the fourteen State Teachers Colleges in Pennsylvania. Of these, 4,907 are men and 3,450 are women. In the fourteen colleges the enrollments range from 165 in Cheyney to 1549 in West Chester.

There are 130 men and 162 women students at Edinboro listing only the full-time students.

RED RAIDERS HIGH IN STATE

At the close of the season the Red Raiders stand near the top in the percentage ratings of Pennsylvania college teams, compiled by the Associated Press. Only four colleges have a better percentage of wins and losses than does Edinboro.
