The Activity fee at Edinboro is \$7.50 per semester, and from that we receive admission to practically all activities, the Spectator, The Conneauttean, and other publications and privileges. The staff at Kutztown wishes to raise their activity fee from \$10.00 a semester to \$11.25 in order that they may be able to give the yearbook to every student free, instead of selling it to them and taxing the seniors each \$7.50 in order to finance it. What do you think of this comparison?

WE'RE JUST AS GOOD

Is it true that Edinboro and the other State Teachers Colleges receive the "left overs" in regard to the quality and standing of the students attending?

We were heartily assured by Dr. Suhrie a short time ago that the cream of the crop is by no means centered exclusively in the Liberal Arts Schools. Extension Work is Becoming Great Factor

The day students at Edinboro aren't the only commuters. Twelve members of the faculty leave the campus every week to teach extension classes in communities in the Edinboro district.

Mr. Bates teaches in Erie on Mondays as do Dr. Crawford and Mr. Heinaman. On Thursdays, Miss Wilson has a class in Erie. Dr. Christensen has two in Erie then in addition to those he has in Franklin on Monday and Tuesdays. Miss Ketcham and Miss Whitney also go to Franklin on Thursdays.

On Mondays, Mr. Mallory has a Literature II class in Albion, and Mr. Ellenberger teaches in Meadville. Dr. Atkinson teaches in Titusville on Tuesdays and in Springboro on Wednesdays. Mr. Heinaman has a class in Conneautville Tuesdays. Mr. Zahniser teaches in Cochranton on Tuesdays and Union City Thursdays.

These seventeen classes enable hundreds of people to be served by Edinboro who would otherwise be unable to take this work.

To the School—

Dear Editor:

In answer to a letter in the last issue of the Spectator, I, as a representative of 162 women on the Edinboro Campus, would like to present a few facts and raise two questions. Why is there this present unfair division in the money allotted for women's and men's sports? Why not remedy this situation?

The facts:

On this campus there are approximately 50 men participating in organized sports—30 in football and 20 in basketball. These 50 men are receiving \$1500 for two activities—basketball and football.

Out of 162 women about 150 are participants in 20 or 25 sports offered them. How much money is allocated them? They are supposed to receive \$300 a year, or in other words, \$2 for each person. The proposed suggestion that the men receive \$3 and the women \$1 out of an increased allotment of \$5 per student seems obviously unfair.

Are there equal rights on this campus? The women would like an answer.
