White Lectures On Phases of China

Presents Colored Pictures—Wears Oriental Regalia

China, a romantic land of brilliantly harmonious color, came to Edinboro as J. Henry White, well known traveller and photographer, delivered his illustrated lecture on Chinese Culture and Art at assembly Monday morning.

Mr. White took his audience, which included the student body of Edinboro High School as well as the college students, on a fascinating tour of the spots of scenic beauty in China. Among the views were pictures of the Great Wall of China built ten thousand years ago by ten million men. The pageantry of the city of Peking, and the magnificent architectural splendors of the palaces, pagodas, and other Chinese structures were shown by the speaker who accompanied them with interesting comment.

For eight years Mr. White traveled in the Orient studying Chinese customs and photographing the glory of the Chinese civilization. His colored photographs are among the finest that have ever come out of the country and from time to time, groups of them have been published in the National Geographic.

As he spoke he was attired in a native costume of the people of China. He told of the significant position the country has held in the international situation in the past few years. "It was the invasion of Manchuria by the Japanese that started the ultimate downfall of the League of Nations," he said. He went (Continued on Page Two)

DRAMATIC CLUB OPENS TENTH ANNUAL TOURNAMENT TONIGHT

Vivid Portrayals of Tragedy and Comedy To Be Staged By Student Directors-Actors

College Will Feature Educational Assemblies

Awards Will Be Announced After the Next Group of Plays

With most of the preliminaries pertaining to college taken care of, the assembly programs are turning for entertainment to a series of professional performances and lectures. Thus far two of those scheduled have already appeared in October. These were Gordon Bennett, photographer and adventurer, who showed us a realistic picture of life in Communist Russia; and a portrayal of the cultural aspects of China and the city of Peking by J. Henry White of the Explorer's Club of New York City.

Additional educational entertainment is in store for us upon the dates of November 8th and 11th, when Mr. Macy of Girard College and Lt. Col. Winfield R. McKay of the State Armory at Erie will give addresses. Mr. Macy, who is business advisor and personnel director at the college, and the author of several articles about vocational guidance, is well versed in his field. His subject will be of interest to everyone.

In observance of Armistice Day, Lt. Col. Winfield R. McKay will speak before the assembly upon Monday, November 11th. Following that, upon November 13th, a special program will be presented by the Polomene Potters.

The performance this evening of three one-act plays will open the Edinboro Players' tenth annual production of the Tournament of Plays. During the ten years, since 1930, the Players have presented sixty plays, all student directed, acted and staged.

The plays this year are of unusual quality and cover a variety of moods. They include two tragedies, two comedies, one serio-comedy and one pantomime. As in previous years six plays are being staged, three this evening and three on the evening of November 30. Those we shall see this evening are as follows: "The Duchess Says Her Prayers", directed by Mary Esther Dailey; the cast includes June Howard, Pat Godfrey, and Ralph Knopp; the scenery is by Ponziano Manning; "A Moment of Darkness", directed by Robert McKinney, with Robert Ulrich, Mary Esther Dailey, Jean Baldwin, Jane Vaughn, Gurley Mae Himes, Evelyn Glenn, Ellen Haiston, and Sally Wilson in the cast; scenery by Patricia Masterson. "A Cup of Tea", directed by Earl Madigan; included in the cast are Will Schaaf, Marjorie Martin, Betty Miller, and Raymond Graves; scenery by David Heath.

The plays will be judged for awards in acting, directing and scenery. The judges this year are John Hulbert, director of dramatics at Allegheny College and secretary of the National Theatre Association; Mrs. Jesse Kennedy Skalak, director of dramatics at Lawrence Park High School; and Mrs. Marjorie Vincent, of the Erie Playhouse.

College students will be admitted free of charge, tickets for others are 20c for one evening, 35c for both.
