5. Purification ceremony. The Spirit of Christmas washes his hands as a symbol.

7. Ragamuffins carol without. Spirit of Christmas invites them in to share the fun.
8. Old English Play, "Saint George and the Dragon".
9. Presentation of gifts by the Y. W. C. A.
10. Selection by the College Choir.
11. Wassail is served and all sing "The Wassail Song".

Members of the faculty committee in charge of the program are Mr. W. V. Zahniser, Miss Esther Wilson, and Miss Jane S. Ludgate. Miss Genevieve Kaminski is in charge of Haven Hall preparations including decorations and table assignments.

Inside, the effect on the eye was no less amazing. The decorations, carried on under the direction of Suzanne Sack, were a blend of Christmas and patriotic symbols. Above the clamor, a gayly lighted Christmas tree held the place of honor at one end of the balcony. It was flanked on either side by our own flag and the British ensign. Around the entire balcony hung festoons of holly.

On the gym floor twenty booths and side shows, sponsored by campus organizations, vied enthusiastically for patronage. Featured among the stands were refreshments, auctions, portrait sketches by art students,

William A. Peiffer, who will graduate in June, received the good news last week that he has won an appointment to West Point, subject to rigid entrance examinations to be held on March 4-8.

"Bill" will go to Columbus, Ohio, for the examinations which will be given there for all the appointees to the entering class of 1941 who live in nearby states.

If "Bill" is successful in the rigid mental and physical tests for entrance, he will be one of the few men ever appointed to the West Point Military College from this district.

What this means to "Bill" is a four-year course of intensive education leading to a commission of Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. He will spend four years in study at the celebrated institution on the west bank of the Hudson and four years in officer service. He will receive a cadet's salary while learning, and all expenses.

Defeating the Ohio School of Chiropody from Cleveland, Ohio, by the score of 54-33, Edinboro's Red Raiders won their second game in as many starts. Edinboro led throughout the game, and at no time was their lead seriously threatened. Outscoring the Ohio quintet in every quarter, the Red Raiders proved without a doubt that they are really capable of top flight basketball. Playing steady basketball from start to finish, Edinboro showed ability on the offense as well as when they were defending their own goal. The passing and shooting showed considerable improvement, and the guarding was excellent, with each man making sure that his man never really had a chance.

High scorer for the game was Steve Crunick with 14 points. Close behind was Nick Volitich who massed five field goals in the second quarter to bring his total to 13. The rest of the fellows all shared in the scoring, proving that the team is a team, and not just two or three individuals who do it all.

With five minutes left in the fourth quarter, and with Edinboro ahead 50-30, Coach "Sox" Harrison put in substitutes for the starting lineup, most of whom had played the entire first three quarters. The reserves played together very well and succeeded in outscoring the Ohio aggregation.

Puppeteers Present Unique Program To Edinboro Audience

The Yale Puppeteers, on the evening of December 4, provided another top-notch hit on the lecture-entertainment course and in a delightfully unique program they literally enchanted a near-capacity auditorium crowd.

Their performance was brilliantly performed with nimble music and clever lines accompanying the "acting" by the puppets. Harry Burnett, one of America's foremost puppeteers, and Richard Brandon operated the puppets in full view of the audience, making the show different from the conventional puppet show. Forman Brown, who authored the music and lyrics, accompanied them from the side of the stage at the piano and supplied the interludes between acts.

Clever puppets poke fun at celebrities and mimicked such notables as Eleanor Roosevelt, singing "My Day", Martha Graham, the dancer, and President Roosevelt in fishing attire chanting "My Friends," from his rowboat.

Several of the acts achieved startling realism. The piano playing, for example, was masterly, and the difficult feats of acrobats performed by the clowns were applauded as loudly as if they had been done by living acrobats. In short, the show was bang-up entertainment, full of sly wit and comedy, giddy caricature, and fine puppeteering art.
