## Language

Coach Danks, known to his many friends as "Lefty," was gifted with that faculty of wimning and holding the admiration and respect of the students with whom he worket. As a student of football and gridiron trategist. he had few equats in scholastic circles. His record of ninety one wins, twentyseren losses, and nine ties while coach at Milton High School stands as testimony to his coaching skill.

IIis death was a severe blow to the athletic program of the college. lmt the ideals of sportwmanship and fair play for which he stood and the fighting spirit he instilled in his teams will contme to guide Maroon and Gold athletic teams in the years to come.

Mr. Danke" sudden death in September just before the seazon heran was a great hock not only to the luothall team but to the entire college commonity. Mr. Hoch asenmed the reins and did a fine job.

A highlight of the " 46 searon was the introduction of night fuotball on a large scale. Of the cight games played. five were of the are light variety. three at home and two away. In all probability, all future home games with the exception of the Ilomecoming Day tiff will be played under the lights.

The first fracas of the year against srong Nansfield saw the issue end in a $0-0$ stalemate. The line play of luth teams was untstanding, hat the great llarky "cement blocks" were far superior. This turned out to be Mansfield's only hemish of an wherwise perfect season.

It Jersey Shore, the lluskies had tromble with pass defense and fell to Lock Haven. 20-12, in a thriller. Clarion's heavier team proved the difference in a drenching rain which saw the Husky altack bog down almost complptely, losing to the Golden Eagles, 6-0.

The lid-lifter against Lock Haven saw the Havenites win, 3-1. After a scoreless first half, the Bald Eagles tallied a goal in the third period. However. the Huskies knotted the count on Conrads boot. The visiting Havenites put the game on ice with two more scores to win the game.

Playing two strong elevens in two days was the task Oct. 25-26. Rider College, of Trenton. \.
