## A History of Ivy Day

The increasingly rapid current of passing years has swept away a numher of B. S. T. C.- traditional observances and han caused other- to become -o condensed and accelerated as to be barely recognizable by early almmni. Our ammal Ly Day Exemine fall in the latter category.

When I! Day originated on campus, about 1909. (1911 is the first one meorded in the cotlege scraphook), the exercises actually consisted of a combination Iyy Day oration. Clas- Night program. and pre-siew of Commencement, rolled into one. The 1912 program is fairly exemplary. The ctan-s of 1912 was "gowned in the clans colors" and carried ropes of dai-ies whish were the raso flower. The procesion stated at the noth end of the growe, weaving in and out of the tree- until they reached "the natural tage ju-t north of srience Hall." After planting the iny along the northwe-term cormer of hatitute Hall (non Carver HaH). the (dars. followed by frimeds. relatives. and alumi retumed to the grove where the clats song was sung. after which a welcome wan extended by the dano president. The Ity Oration wa- then presented. followed by the anarding of clase numeral- to member-
of the basketball and track teams. The chase peem. which had beem chomen previonsly in a comtent wat recitad by the author. An addrene was given by Prof. Demis, a faculty member, amd finatly, the president of the college. Dr. D. J. Waller. spoke to the graduating clas- With minor variations. thin was the gememb procedure for the next 24 years.

Until recently, weather permitting, the exercisen were heh in the Growe. Before the presemtation of the pergola by the dar- of 1916. program- were conducted on approximately the same site which the pergola now oceupies, but either on a temporary wooden platform or on a gras- carpet -trewn with evergreens.

Athough the erection of the pergola was authorized by the clas- of 1916. it was not fimished in time for their lyy Day program; therefore the clan- of 1917 was the first to use it.

The clases were one gowned uniformly in their re-pective clas- colors. hut later changed to white dremes or suit with ties, sashes, or carried pennante with the clase colors.

There is no record of the year 1919-1923 in the college seraplook, but it is presmed that the progran-were muth like thoer of preceding years.



The 1921 Isy Day introduced a new type of program. stre-sing poetry and the enactment of certain of the clasics. These features predominated for the next five years. Part of the entertamment wa- described as follow-: *At the somod of Pan's trimpet, wenty wood nymphe attired in costume of green appeared from the woot- beyond the pergola and gave a dance of nature." Several poetic references to ivy were made in the Iry Oration, one of which was a portion of Dichens" line- from Pickuck Papers:
"Fawt he stealeth on, though he wear no wing-
And a staunch old heart has he:
How chasely he twineth. how chose he ching-
To his friend the huge wak tree!
Whose ages have fled. and their work detayed.
And nations have seattered been:
But the stout old in! shall never fade
From its hale and hearts green.
Creeping where no life is seen.
A rate old plant is the iny green."
In 1925. Ivy Day and Clas- Vight became more specifically divided. Many traditional features of Isy Day, such ar the clase poem, class will.
prophecy and history were incorporated into the Clans Night program. Also the number of lengthy epeeches wan radieally reduced. The clans song was retamed in the isy exercises and other features were substuted for thon disearded. In 1925, the play "Rohin Hoor" wan enarted lyy the senior group.

In 1926 the Semiors baved chilly wind- to prement a Greek pageath on the pergola.

The play Oberon and Titania from A Midsummer Night's Dream was given in 1927, in addition to the nsual proces.ion, the ivy planting oration, and singing of dasm smge. This was the firs year that a git was chowen to give the Isy Oration. The young woman so honoted was Miso Evelyn Harris, of Bernick. Having one hokeng gromd, the women held sway for the mext four yeare with fome conecotive female wators.

The chase of 1928 dramatized three Greek myths. hecatuse of inclement weather, the program was held in the anditorim.



Among other ont-tanding feature of the 1930 oration. the following anomymou- referene to I w was included:
-Then wrill return and seeing it on high.
Shall read a life of living history.
Strong tendrik and bright foliage abose.
Behon turn branches and the fading leaf.
Thus shall we do. Thus conquer. This fail!
We- the common branches of one sine arise
sprung from this hill and nurtured neath these akies!"
Sperial frature of the "31. "32. and "33 program- were foth danter and Mat dancen which had been premented earlier in the yar at part of the May Das exercier.

1931 wa- the firt year that there were no dance or other features. The iry was planted, the Oration given, and Wime Woore led the group in singing " Matroon and Gold" and the Alma Water. From thi year on, the Iyy Day wherranter were of a -imple nature.

The Oration of $19: 3$ dealt with the $-y m b l i s m$ of iry and it- parallelism to the future of the da-s. as did the peene of other yeare. Joha Me.Gren. the oratore adid, in part: "Of conre we would plan to do graduate work.

For just as the isy need contimal nomri-hment to keep it ative and growing. He too need constant intelleethal nomrishment if we wish to attain our full growth.
1936. which matked a guarter century of Iry Days, wa- highlighted hy a eries of thythm clog danere on the pergola be fue sonior girls. That year. for the firet time, a lawn party was held for almmi, friendes and relatives. following the Ivy Day exereses. This took the place of the Clas- Night program. and the parties were hedd with lew exeptions for the next seren years.

In 1913 the party was still a feature, Int Clase Night was atso held.
1911 wat a wery guiet year, with little heside the ()wation being wheduled.

In 1915. simple exereise were hedd after the Bactalaureate semom, in the moming, and this has leen the custom for the pat fonm years.

Than- we have traced the transition of Ivy Day through the years: from the elaborate classical teremony of the early $1900^{\circ}$ s to the brief simple exereise of today. No matter how the formal procedure in changed to comform to the times ivy and its sombolism will alway remain the same.
