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




































































## Student Life














#### A Home Away From Home

Dining downtown can prove to be very fulfilling. With the variety offered, who could ask for a better selection.


#### Our Town

The system, UNIVAC 1100-21 has a main memory storage of one million characters of information. BASIC, COBOL, FORTRAN, and ASSEMBLER are typical examples of languages used on this system.


makes the quality of our education so great . . . our one-on-one interactions with the faculty and administration.

Win or lose, all athletes should be commended for their ambition and perserverence. They give of themselves to help bring some honor and distinction to Bloomsburg State College.



The 1981 Field Hockey season proved to be a great success for the BSC Huskies and coach Jan Hutchinson. They closed their season in November with an overall record of 19-4-2. Their victories included second place finishes in the Trenton State and PSAC tournaments, first place in the Regional tournament and the first ever Women's National Title at BSC.

The Huskies opened their season at Trenton State, bringing home from the tournament a second place finish. They went on to win ten of the next twelve games, earning a third place seed in the PSAC tournament held at Slippery Rock. The Huskies beat second seed Millersville to play in the finals; however, lost to first place Lock Haven 1-0, to finish second in the state. Returning to BSC, Bloomsburg lost and tied the final game of the season.

Their record of 13-4-2 was good enough to get them a fourth seed in the EAIAW Mid-Athlantic Regional Hockey Championships held at Glassboro State College in New Jersey. The Huskies worked their way through the ranks by beating Messiah, Gettysburg, and Salisbury, to cop a first place finish. Then it was on to the AIAW Division III National Championships held at Sweet Briar College in Lynchburg, Virginia. Seeded second the Huskies drew a bye in the first round and went on to defeat teams from Calvin, Michigan; Brockport, New York; and Lynchburg, to bring home the title.














# Seniors














## Fall, Back-to-School, and the Bloomsburg Fair
















# Commencement Convocation

Nyad is a full-time commentator with ABC Sports announcing a broad range of events covered by the Wide World of Sports. But, she is also considered to be the greatest long-distance swimmer in the world. From 1969 to 1979 she competed in races down the Nile, across the Great Lakes, and in dozens of bodies of water throughout the world. In 1979 she swam 89 miles from the Bahamas to Ju-

piter, Florida, the longest swim in history.

Originally, the marathon swim was scheduled from Cuba to Florida, but her attempt failed because of bad weather and a poor navigator."

She says that the same determination and discipline she used as a swimmer will help her become the best commentator.

Nyad urged the graduates to use the same intensity, effort and courage as they begin their careers.




OBITER is Latin for "a passing" or "a journey." This is what our years at BSC have been. We have passed from our age of innocent youth and have started our journey on a life of our own.

#### **Tuition Hike Rescinded**

During Christmas break, Pennsylvania's state colleges and university received an unexpected, unpleasant Christmas gift; a tuition hike of \$75.00 for the spring semester.

Reasoning for the rise in tuition was attributed to delinquent salaries to faculty. With the assistance of the Association of Pennsylvania State Colleges and University Faculties (APSCUF), faculty members filed a civil suit against the State College and University Directors (SCUD). In December, 1981, the suit was settled in favor of APSCUF.

During spring registration, the Commonwealth Association of Students (CAS) lobbied at BSC. They petitioned students, parents, and faculty for a total of 3500 signatures for their cause. Student tension was at an all-time high. Michelle Kessler, BSC's CAS coordinator, said, "Students were fired up and outraged about the hike."

Student Solidarity Day, February 11, proved to be one of the biggest events at BSC for this year, and possibly for years to come. Miss Kessler; Karen Chawaga, CGA president; Dr. Larry Jones, Vice President/administration; Tom Gordon, student representative/board of trustees; held a press conference in the Kehr Union. Over 500 students attended a campus rally carrying signs and plaquards voicing their opposition to the tuition hike. The rally attained local and state wide recognition in the news media.

By February 22, months of hard work paid off. The State Supreme Court ordered a temporary injunction against the SCUD tuition increase. On February 24, the SCUD board, rescinded the \$75.00 increase.

#### Bomb Threats Plague Campus Security

What do Hartline Bakeless, Sutliff, Centennial, Old Science, Northumberland, and Luzerne have in common? They were the sites of several bomb threats which plagued BSC this year.

The first of 23 threats, was received in November, and the threats continued until late April.


According to Dr. Frank Davis, Assistant Vice President of Administration, a system of tracing calls was placed on a random selection of dormitory phones. As a result, two male dorm students were charged with two separate bomb threats. This being a federal offense, the students face a maximum penalty of five years in prison and/or a \$10,000.00 fine.

At no time were any bombs found in any of the campus locations. However, the college pranks disrupted exams, classes, and activities causing ill-feelings among students and faculty.



#### Landis Named Head Football Coach





Landis, 32, a native of Linwood, New Jersey, helped guide Dartmouth to an Ivy league cochampionship with Yale this season and worked with the Big Green defense that led the entire ECAC, in team defense, allowing just 13.7 points per game.

Dartmouth veteran head coach Joe Yukica commented, "Among the young coaches that I have come across in my experience, I regard him as one with very high potential to be a head football coach at the college level. I'll go one step further and say that a better head

coach prospect will be difficult to find."

The new coach lettered for three years at Penn State and played in the 1969 and 1970 Orange Bowls in the Nittany Lions' defensive backfield. In 1970 he was named to the All-East defensive team and was also honored as South Jersey's College "Athlete of the Year." He went to Penn State from Mainland Regional High School in Linwood where he was a varsity starter for all four years and gained All-American honors. He also played varsity basketball for three years and baseball for four years.

Joe Paterno, head coach, Penn State, commented on the appointment, "George Landis is one of the brightest young coaches in the East. He has been successful in everything he has done. Based on his versatile athletic



background and his commitment to football, I feel very confident that he will be successful at Bloomsburg State College."

His coaching experience started at Penn State where he assisted on the Nittany Lions' staff while earning his graduate degree. He was defensive backfield coach at Villanova and Cornell Universities before taking a head coaching position at Mainland Regional High School, where he served for two years. In 1978 he joined the Dartmouth coaching staff as defensive backfield coach.

The new coach, who received a unanimous recommendation of the committee, began his duties at the start of the Spring semester.



#### Concert Committee Schedules Unsuccessful Bands

The concert committee scheduled Ian Hunter and Gary U.S. Bonds for a September engagement in Haas Auditorium. In late October, the concert committee provided Todd Rundgren and Utopia. However, student attendence was poor and less than half the expected amount of tickets were sold.

Reasons for low attendance were voiced as: bands were not appealing to the majority of BSC students; high cost of tickets; poor scheduling. On the defense, the concert committee claimed that bands which might have sold more tickets, were not touring and band prices were out of BSC's range.
