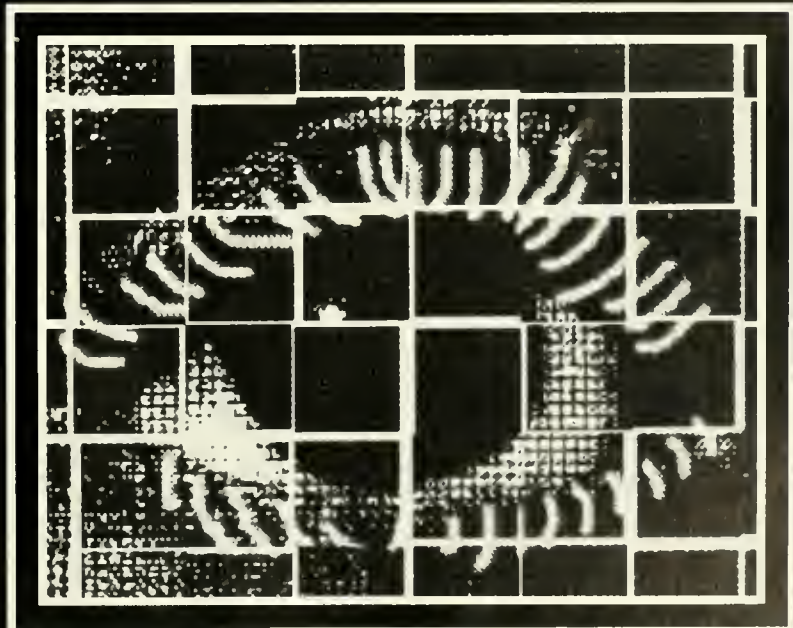








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Seeing It Through 1993

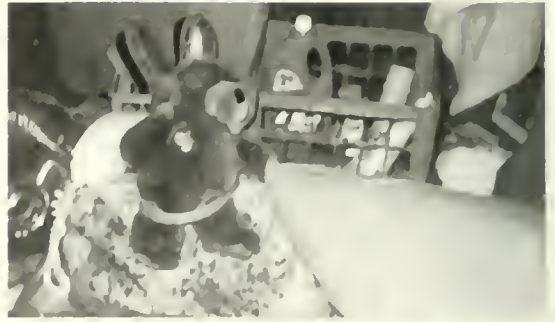

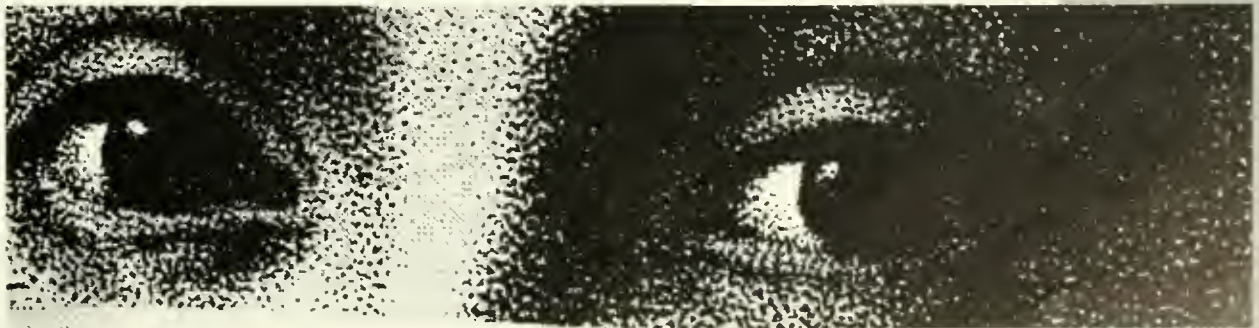
Signs of Change Seeing Our Campus Through A Fence

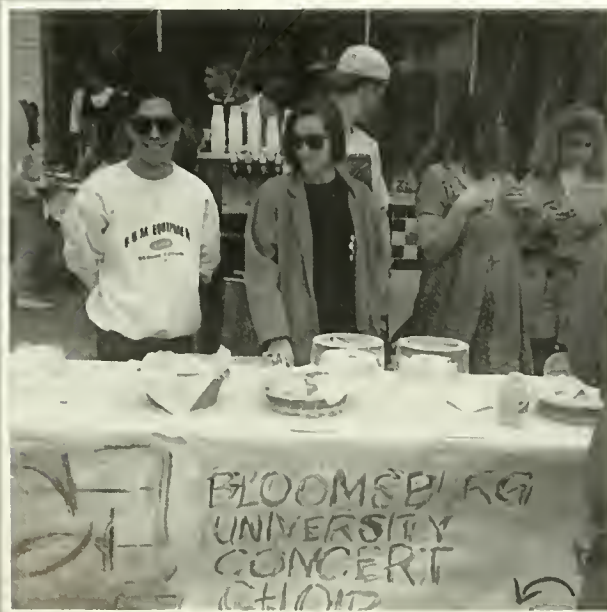

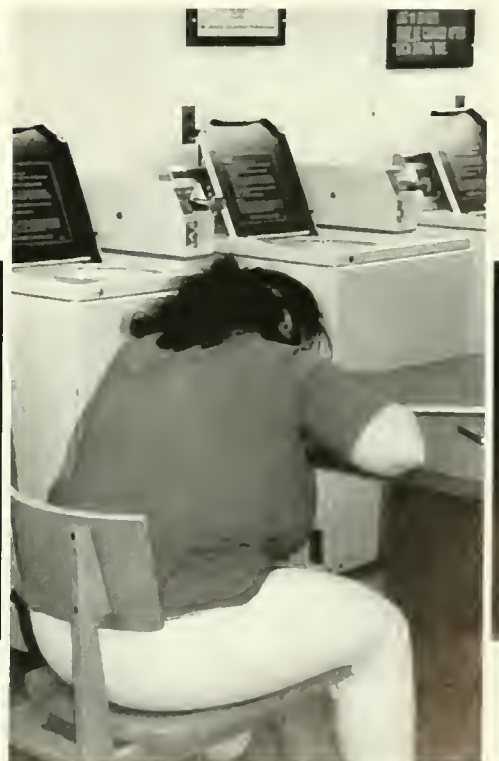


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Money, Money, Money!!

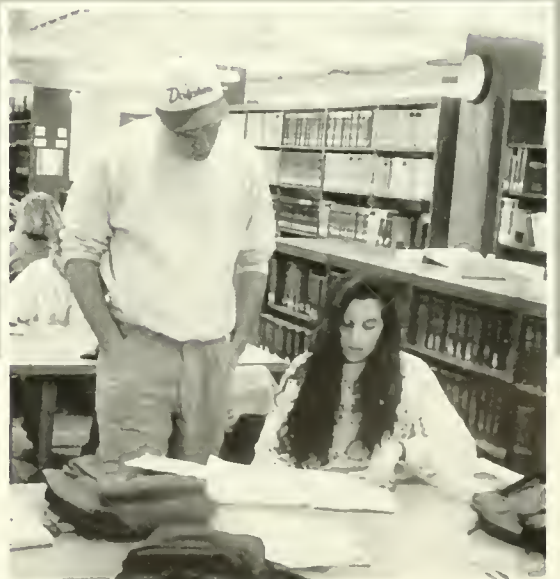

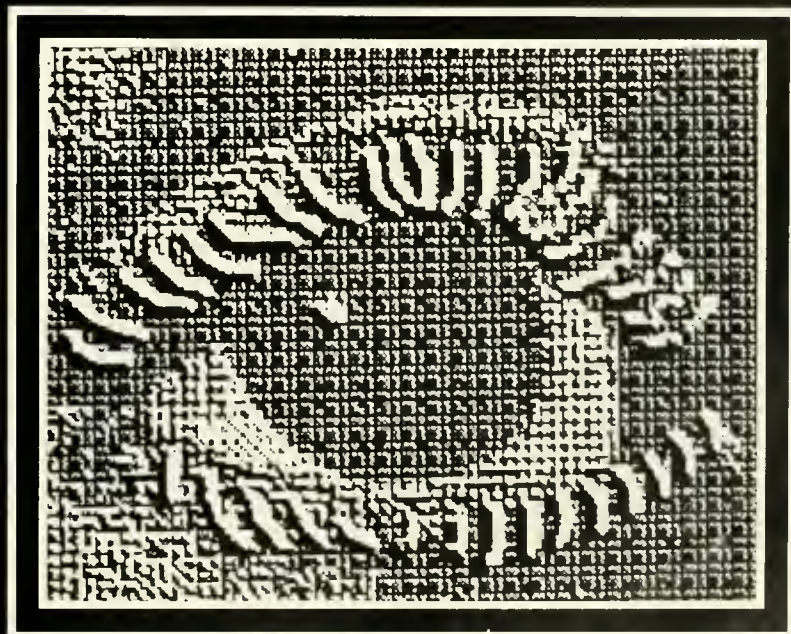

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President Harry Ausprich

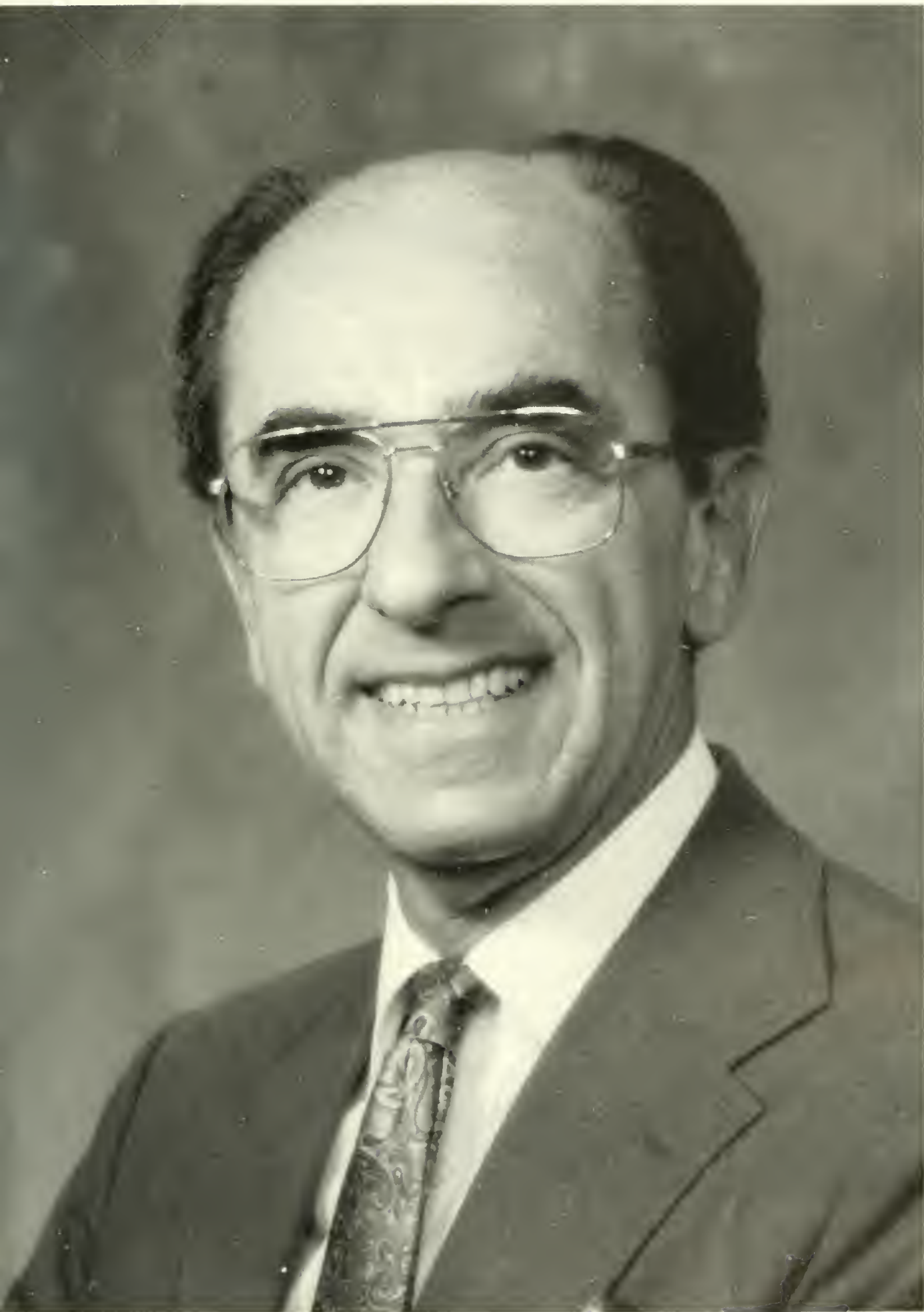

Vice- Presidents

The four Vice Presidents of our University exemplify the diversity that is felt on campus. Their education and previous work experience is as varied as their responsibilities to the University.

As Interim Vice President of Student Life, Jennie Carpenter is responsible for the non-academic life of the students. Areas under her eye include the Greek System, Campus Child Care Center, Kehr Union, Residence Life, and the Commons. Jennie Carpenter is also responsible for the Counseling Center, Student Development, Financial Aid, Career Development and Athletics.

Carol Matteson is the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost. She oversees the academic activities of the University. The Deans of all the schools report to her. She also hears from the Dean of Library Services, Assistant Vice President for Graduate Studies and Research, and her Assistant Vice President of Academic Affairs.

As Vice President of Administration and Treasurer, Dr. Parrish oversees the University's investments and budget. He is in charge of the overall management of Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable, the operation of the Maintenance Center, and University Construction. The various departments that report to Dr. Parrish are University Police, Personnel, Accounting and Computer Services.

As our Vice President of University Advancement, Mr Walker deals with the external relationships of the University. He represents B.U. in town matters that effect the University. Mr. Walker also oversees The Bloomsburg University Foundation, University Relations, and Alumni Affairs. He also works with the Affirmative Action program.

The uniqueness and individuality that accompanies each of these people helps to contribute to the atmosphere at Bloomsburg. With their undivided attention towards the students' academic and social life these Vice Presidents have guided us with their vision in helping us seeing it through.

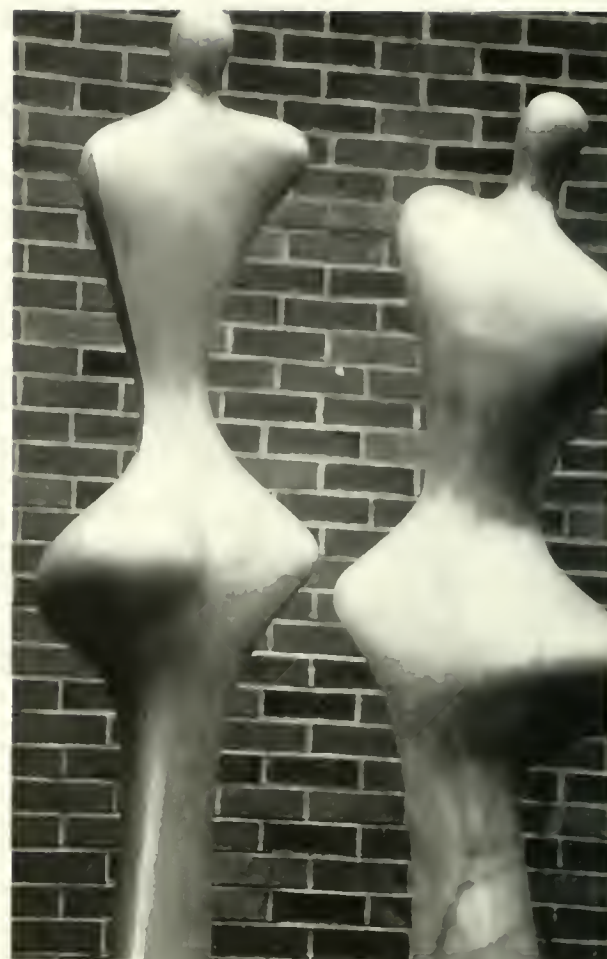

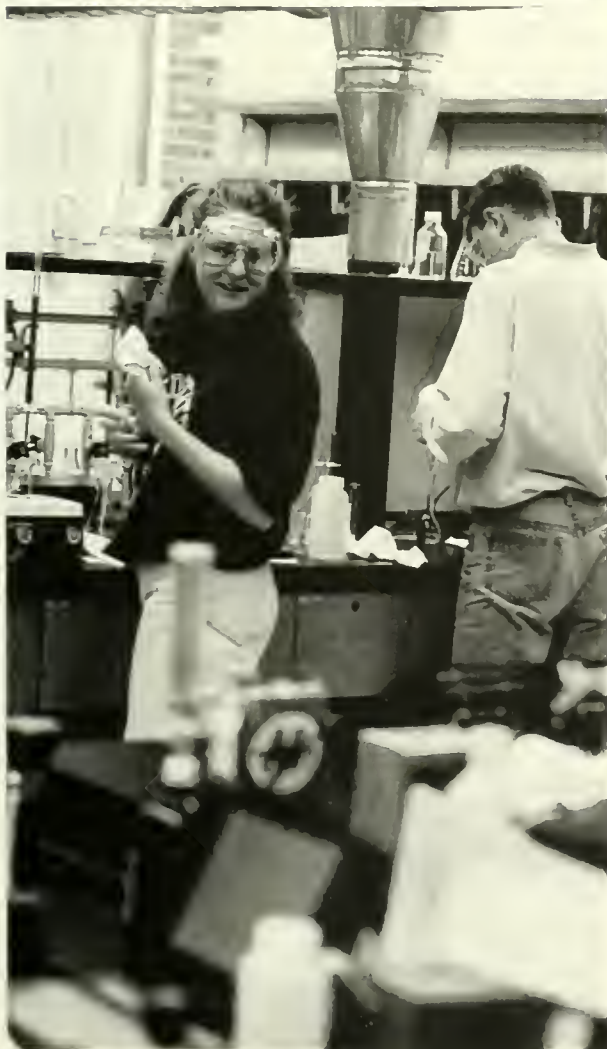


CARVER HALL

College of Arts and Sciences

The College of Arts and Sciences at Bloomsburg University offers 31 programs leading to the Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts degrees. Each degree program provides students the opportunity to gain a broad liberal arts education complimented by an in depth understanding of a specific Arts and Science discipline. When students graduate from the Arts and Science program they have vast opporrunities to enter the competitive job market or continue their education at professional or graduate schools.







College of Business

The College of Business at Bloomsburg University is designed to equip students with the skills and experiences necessary to succeed in the highly competitive business world. Graduates generally enter directly into the job market in business, industry, or government, although these programs also provide excellent preparation for further studies at professional or graduate school.

The college is made up of five departments. The faculty members in each of these departments bring a wide range of academic backgrounds and professional experiences, ranging from doctoral degrees from some of the worlds most respected universities to job experiences at some of the nations top corporations.



College of Professional Studies

The College of Professional Studies offers a variety of professionally oriented degree programs through the School of Education and the School of Allied Health Sciences. Each degree program in the School of Education and Allied Health Sciences begins with a broad base of course work in the humanities, natural sciences, social sciences and mathematics. 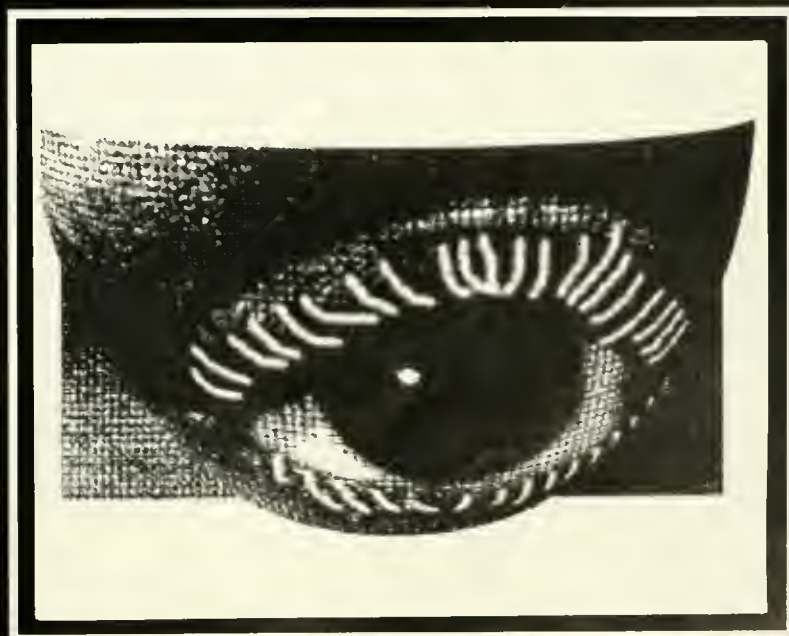






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ELWELL

That's seven stories high, about the length of a football field, and houses approximately 600 females? Elwell Hall, of course. Rumor has it that Elwell is the largest women's residence hall out of all the Pennsylvania State System Universities.

Elwell Hall was built in 1969 and named after George E. Elwell, Esquire. It is the only hall on campus that isn't named after a neighboring county.

Take everything, 'Hotel Elwell,' as it is frequently called, has its advantages and disadvantages. When residents were asked about the advantages, they responded "You meet a lot of people", "There's a lot of storage space in the rooms", "It has its own computer lab", and, "It has a big laundry room so you never have to wait!" And what did residents not like about living in Elwell? "Moving in is quite an experience with 600 girls and all their clothes", "Long walks to the bathrooms", and "Having broken down elevators, and having to walk up never-ending steps!"

It is quite an experience living in Elwell, but the memories and friendships will leave an everlasting impression.



MONTOUR

Four stories tall, Montour, an all men's hall, is located at the bottom of the campus near Old Science Hall next to the Kehr Union Building. Montour was completed in 1964, the same year as Schuylkill, and lodges about 250 students.

Located on every other floor in Montour are television lounges and vending machines. On the other floors are study lounges for those who need "peace and quiet". Also, as in all the other halls, Montour has a large recreation room that is used to hold hall and campus social events.

Although the residents of Montour have had to live with waking up to a great deal of noisy construction this year, it has only enhanced the friendships and memories made in this 'unique' living situation.

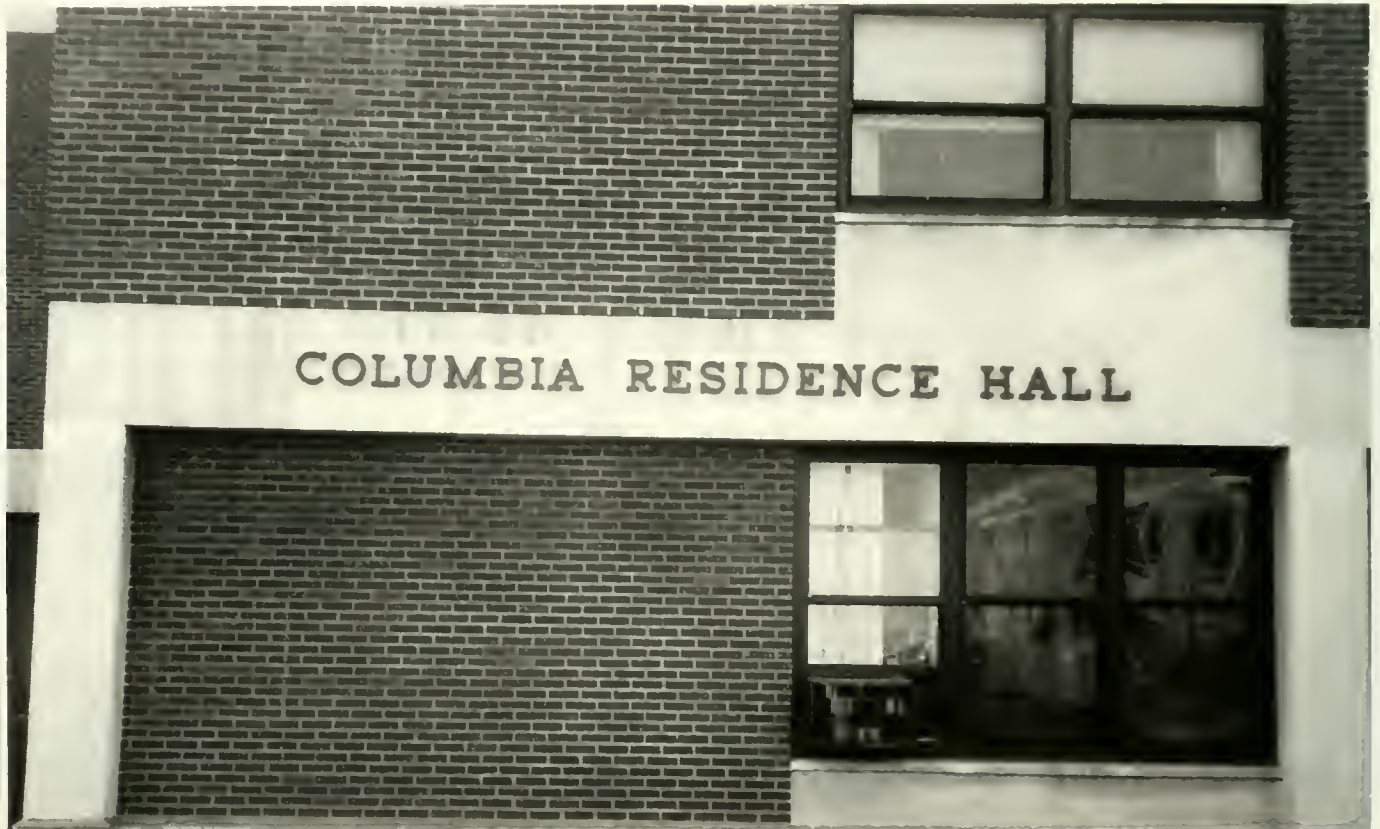
COLUMBIA

The newest residence hall on campus, completed in 1970, is nestled in a corner of the campus allowing for a little bit of privacy. It is nine stories high, housing 400 students and a special apartment for the Resident Director. On the odd floors there are kitchenettes equipped with microwaves. Also, there is a television so students can occupy themselves while waiting for a fresh bag of popcorn to pop. On the even floors, there are study lounges.

Getting to all these floors is easy due to a newly installed elevator, the fastest on campus. The huge hall lounge, located on the first floor, has a sound proof piano room, a sewing machine, a stationary exercise bike, a pool table, and several vending machines.

Columbia is an active dorm and hosts movies and aerobics in its lounge, and participates in volleyball tournaments.

To the women that live in Columbia Hall, it is their 'home away from home', and the Residence Life Staff in Columbia does its best to fulfill that goal.



LUZERNE



Situated in the heart of Bloomsburg University's campus is Luzerne Hall. A men's hall, occupied by about 300 students, it is centrally located next to the bookstore, Northumberland hall, and the favorite outdoor hangout, the basketball courts.

Luzerne was completed in 1967 and houses a recreation and television room, and a Resident Director's apartment on the first floor. There are also television lounges and quiet study rooms on the second, third, and fourth floors.

Luzerne residents have a wide variety of activities to choose from in order to entertain themselves in between classes, studying, and sleeping. These events include co-ed social mixers to touch football on the front lawn.

Whatever the means of entertainment may be, the men of Luzerne make friendships and memories that last a lifetime.



LYCOMING

Lycoming Hall is the smallest women's hall on campus, housing 250 students on five floors, the ground floor being reserved for upperclassmen. It opened in the fall of 1976, and is surrounded by the Kehr Union, the University Store, the Commons, and Edwell Hall.

The women in Lycoming enjoy the flexibility found within their dorm rooms. Because the furniture is not fixed, as in the other six, the residents find it very easy and fun to play the role of interior designers by moving the furniture around to make themselves feel at home.

In addition to great rooms, the Residence Life in Lycoming offers a wide variety of social events to keep the women busy. Such events include the sponsorship of Women's Awareness Week, a mock wine and cheese party, movie nights, and a tree decorating contest in downtown Bloomsburg. The women of Lycoming have certainly made their hall a 'home away from home.'



NORTHUMBERLAND



Northumberland, also known as 'North', is one of the three male halls. It is situated in the center of the University's campus, surrounded by Columbia Hall, Luzerne Hall, Montour Hall, and the basketball courts.

It houses about 200 students on three floors. The first floor consists of a large game room, equipped with ping pong table, and vending machines. Also located downstairs is a study room and the apartment of the Resident Director. The second and third floors houses students.

The North men pass their time away in between classes, studying and sleeping, by attending hall social functions, participating in snow ball battles on the back lawn and joining in on late night yelling matches between the two wings.

Whatever their meaning of fun is, living in Northumberland is everything hall life should be like. . . especially living without parents!!



SCHUYLKILL

Schuykill Hall, established in 1954, is a female hall on campus, and it is reserved for upperclassmen. Each floor consists of two wings, which are separated by class. It has four floors and occupies 250 women. In the basement, is a large recreation room and on the upper floors, are television lounges and study rooms.

Located at the lower end of campus, Schuykill is nearby the Kehr Union building, Carver Hall and Old Science Hall. Throughout the year, the hall has had activities such as movies, study breaks, intramural sports, an ugly R.A. contest, and mixers between wings. Also, residents participate in service projects for the community.



MONTGOMERY APARTMENTS

There comes a time when most students feel a need to move on, er, move off actually. No matter how much you cherish 'quiet hours', or those golden moments waiting for a shower, or the tempting food at the Scranton Commons; you make the decision to sacrifice all that in favor of FREEDOM. The Deephers received their charter on Sept. 7, 1991. Since this time the sisters long have followed a quest to obtain sisterhood in order to share with it's members, scholarship to transcend academic potential, service to help the community and social activities. At Delta Phi Epsilon, "Esse Quam Videri — To Be Rather Than To Seem To Be", is not only a motto, but a quality the sisters pride themselves on upholding.

Phi Sig Sig's colors are blue and gold and their flower is the American Beauty Rose. Their motto is "Aim High." Ten women of different religious backgrounds bonded together in September, 1913, in New York, to form the Alpha chapter of Phi Sigma Sigma. Commencement Remarks Excerpts

May 15, 1993

I intend my remarks for the members of the graduating class, and I will base my remarks entirely on my own experiences. Occasions like this invite brevity, and brevity invites candor; and I will accept both.

The work that I did during my career that was most important was operating on the human mind. I know that the brain uncovered for operation is the most beautiful organ in the body, and the organ responsible for the soaring achievements of our civilization. It is paradoxical that it is also responsible for the most outrageous human behavior. There is too much outrageous behavior in this world, in this nation, and as in nearly every other, in this community and on this campus. During the time that you have been at the university, you have lived with the threat work, we all begin at the same place; square one. It is true that there are a few really gifted people in this world. But most of us are dealt, the fear, and the fact of violence. Accusations have been made which, if unfounded, are as evil as the acts that they allege.

I would like to pause at this point to express my gratitude to my parents, because it is relevant to the rest of my remarks. When I was very young, my father suffered a severe illness which he survived, but from which he never completely recovered. Consequently, my sisters and brother and I were raised under the most frugal circumstances. I can say this about poverty; it is sometimes embarrassing, but the sunsets are just as beautiful, and I have the fondest memories of my childhood. At the time my father suffered his disabling illness, he was on the faculty of a college; a black college; a black college in Alabama, Talladega College. And because of his and my mother's grace and example, my sisters and brother and I were relieved at the very beginning of our lives, of the terrible burden of bigotry, for the rest of our lives. And it is a burden, and it soils very human endeavor that it touches.

Recently there was a spring frolic, off campus but in which some of you may have participated. It may have gotten a little boisterous, and it was so graphically reported that those who would not think more deeply, or who wanted to believe it, would conclude that it was mostly what happens at the university. It raised some money for a good cause, and nobody got hurt.

I share with others another perspective of student life at the university. You came to Bloomsburg University at no small cost, and at no small sacrifice to join with your fellow students, to relate to the faculty, to bask in the tradition of this institution of higher learning which stretches back over 150 years to its founding in 1839.

You came to acquire the skills to begin your careers; in order to provide a standard of living for yourselves and your families during your working years, and in order to assure security and contentment in your eventual retirement.

You explored, experimented and indulged in the different ways to spend your leisure time; either as a participant or as a spectator.

You participated in the social activities that drone on, on a university campus, adding substance and value to your collegiate experience, without attracting the attention or stirring the juices of investigative journalists.

You practised your community conscience, held hands from the campus to the community, worked with Habitat for Humanity, helped build Kidsburg, and sent clothes to school kids in Harrisburg.

And you did all this within the civil ambiance of the university; and if we can not depend on our colleges and universities to preserve and protect the civility in our society, where can we turn?

I know this, that you have acquired all the equipment that you will need to compete successfully in this world. It may be that graduates of larger and more prestigious universities find more doors open to them in the job market, but on the first day of work, we all begin at the same place; square one. It is true that there are few really gifted people in this world. But most of us are dealt an average hand from an average deck and we have to play with what were dealt.

There are two qualities which provide an advantage in a competitive world; a willingness to work, and a good disposition. Whenever I found myself at work in a competitive situation, all things otherwise

being equal, I assumed that I would win, because I would outwork any competitor. It worked for me.

Although I had indulged, if not enjoyed, a short fuse early in my career, when I became the president of Geisinger, I realized that that kind of responsibility drives the temper out of you because you can not afford it. You can't please everybody and you don't have to please everybody; but you have to be fair to everybody. I don't think I can recall anything in my career or in my life, that was done in anger, that was really good. I know this; that if you do anything when you are really angry, you had better be really right; because you have played your last card, and if you are wrong, you have spent your respect and credibility in one shot.

I mention this because there is so much anger in society. In every forum, public or private but especially public; there is a tendency to escalate every issue to confrontation. I just hope that while we are tearing at each other's throats we are not slitting our own throats.

I was told recently that a graduate today may expect five career changes during your working years. I hope that doesn't concern you. There are so many things to do in this life, and I have often said that I think everyone would be fortunate to have a career change every ten years.

Thirty six years ago, after four years of medical school and six years of neurosurgical training, I came to Geisinger to begin my clinical career, at the age of thirty six. Sixteen years later I transitioned into administration and spent the next seventeen years with that, retiring two years ago. But fifty years ago next month I graduated from Cornell University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Hotel Administration. If anyone had told me that day that I was destined to become a brain surgeon, it would have blown my mind. And if anyone had said the day that I started medical school that I would ever again use my education in hotel administration, I would have scoffed. But it contributed to my decision to go into administration at Geisinger, and was useful during the rest of my career.

Meanwhile the experience of making decisions in the practice of neurosurgery, most of which are made alone and many under urgent circumstances, facilitated the ability to make decisions in administration, most of which are made more deliberately and in concert.

The point I wish to make, is that whatever you learn, and whatever experience you gain, is cumulative; and you will undoubtedly use all of it in whatever you do for the rest of your lives. I hope that your career change decisions will be like mine; the need to decide to change from something you enjoy doing to something you believe you will enjoy even more. Those are difficult decisions, but they are good decisions.

Incidentally, I expect that every member of this graduating class has an academic record as relevant to admission to medical school as mine was when I graduated from hotel school. I mention it to urge you to keep it in mind. Remember that if you become bored or burned out, brain surgery is a good backup career.

There is a fantasy that it passed down from generation to generation, that the old days were the good old days. The old days were not the good old days, and I would defend that if I needed to or had the time. In spite of everything, these are the good old days; at least they are your days.

So you came to Bloomsburg University, and you grew a little older, you gathered the wisdom to guide your own destinies, and you found a place that you can return to, to refresh your friendships, your memories, and your minds, for the rest of your lives.

That, it is my perspective, is why you came and what you came to do; and you did it, and you had a little fun. And if the fun ever goes out of the joy of learning or life itself, none of it is worth it. But you got it done. You wouldn't even be here this afternoon, except that you got it done.

I can not wish more for any of you, than that you have opportunities and experiences like I have had, and I know you will. I hope that you will love this land and this republic; a nation that maybe suffers partly because we hear so much as little children that grownups don't cry.

Thank you for the privilege of sharing with you this glorious day for you and your families. Congratulations; and good luck!
