Our Campus

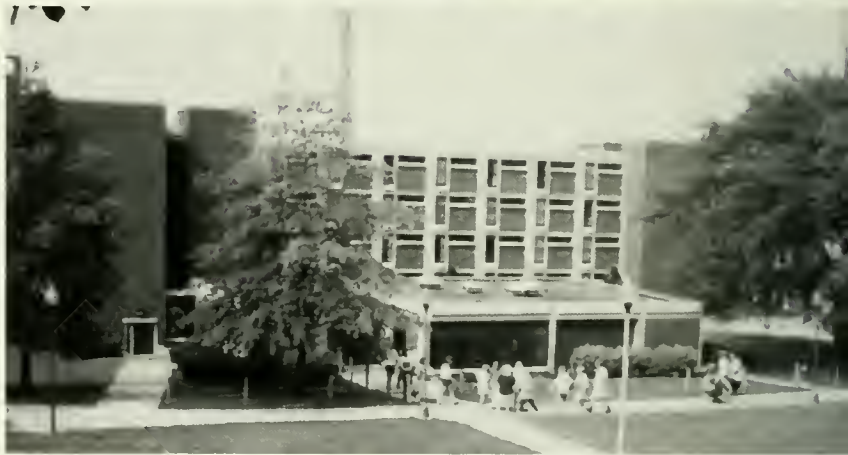

Fall Move-In

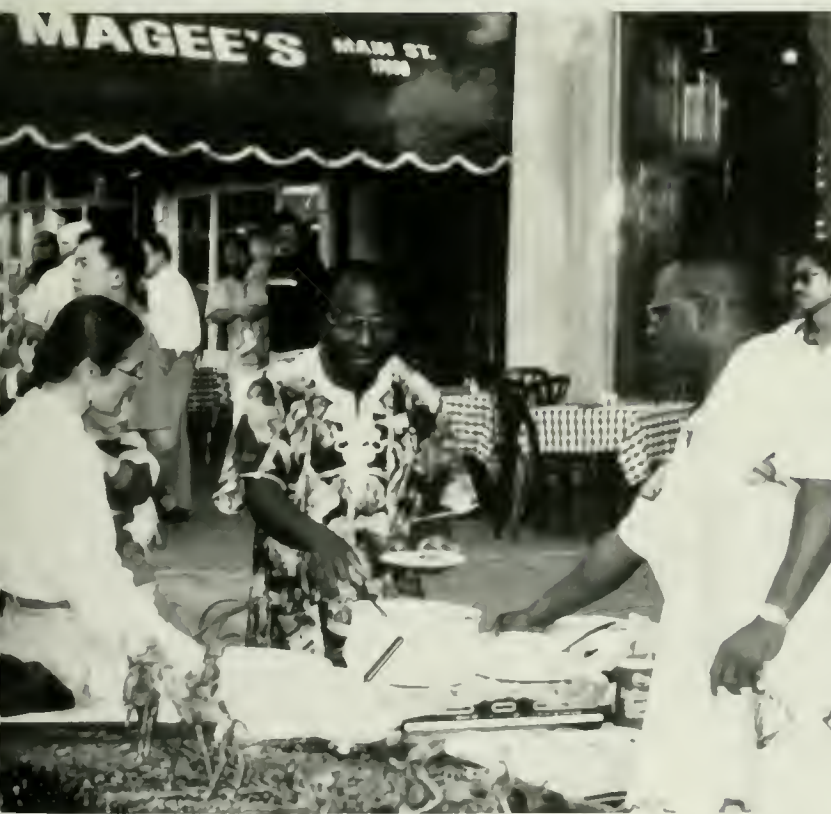

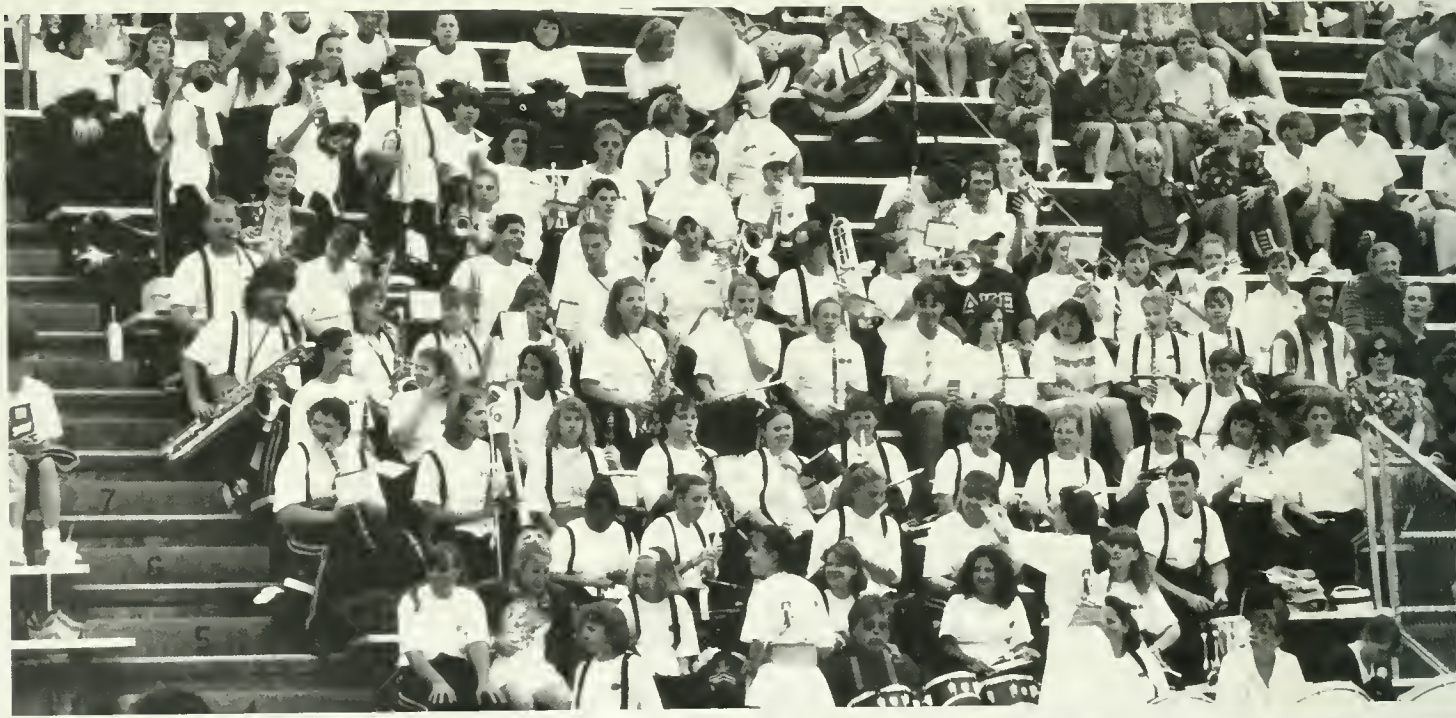




Community Street Fest

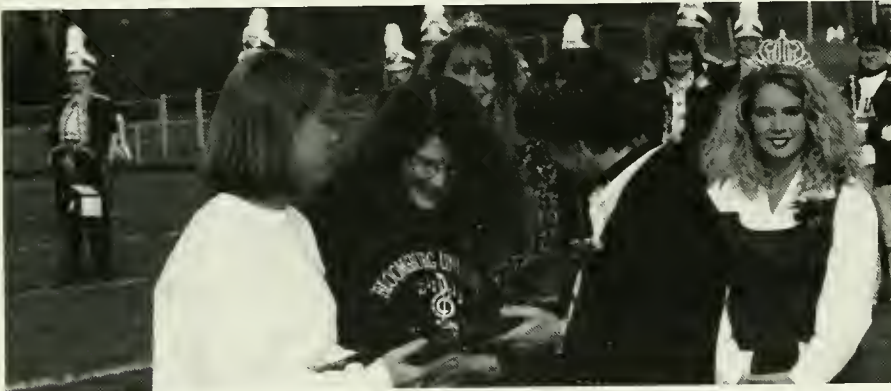

History



...A New Beginning

Academy, Literary Institute, Literary Institute and State Normal School, State Teachers College, State College, University - such has been the metamorphosis of our present University in Bloomsburg. It is difficult to believe that the history of our school dates back over a century, when electricity, automobiles, hard surface roads and other luxuries common to us today were either unheard of or still in their infancy. But the fact is, that in 1859 a private academy was opened in the town of Bloomsburg. It was successfully conducted for two years by C.P. Waller, a graduate of Williams College. Later, public school teachers taught at the academy during their summer vacations...





In 1856, D. J. Waller, drew up a charter providing that this school be known as the Bloomsburg Literary Institute for the promotion of education in the ordinary and the higher branches of English literature, ancient and modern languages, and the sciences. This charter was subscribed to by worthy citizens of Bloomsburg.

In 1866, the school was taught by Henry Carver, of Binghamton, New York. His was an unusual influence and personality, and he had much to do with molding the school's early policies. He saw the need for a new building, and insisted that it was essential to the future development of the Institute. Mr. Carver assured the trustees that \$15,000 would build a suitable building. When people expressed their doubts that the type of building which he had planned could be built for that amount, he assumed, in addition to his regular duties as teacher, the offices of architect and contractor. His energy and enthusiasm seemed boundless...

That building, the present Carver Hall, was dedicated on April 4, 1867, with a gala observance by the townspeople. A parade, headed by the town band, marched from the old building, somewhere near the present Catholic church, to the new one. A fine bell for the tower was purchased with \$1200 secured through popular subscription raised by three members of the first class at the new school - D. J. Waller, Jr., George E. Elwell, and Charles Unangst.

In the autumn of 1867, James P. Wickersham, then State Superintendent of Public Instruction, was travelling through Bloomsburg on the train. He saw the school on the hill "ablaze with lights," and thought the location of the Literary Institute would be ideal for a State Normal School. Negotiations were begun, and in 1868 at a meeting in which Mr. Wickersham addressed the citizens of Bloomsburg, it was decided that under the act of 1857 a normal school could be established. Consequently, a dormitory was built at a cost of \$56,000. On February 19, 1869, the school recognized as a State Normal School, combined with the Literary Institute. In September of that year, there were 150 students enrolled in the Normal Department and so in the Model School...

Principal Carver left in 1871. Charles G. Barkley, Esq., a former county superintendent of schools, acted as principal from December, 1871, to March, 1872. His successor was the Reverend Hewitt, rector of the Bloomsburg Episcopal Church. He served as principal until June, 1875. Dr. T.L. Griswold was then principal until 1877. Those early years were trying ones, full of dissappointments and hardships. Subscriptions were hard to collect, and often the trustees met obligations on their personal responsibility. Another blow came in 1875, when the dormitory was completely destroyed by fire. However, the trustees and people who had failth and confidence in the school again furnished money, and in 1876 built a larger and more handsome building, Waller Hall...

In the fall of 1877, Dr. D. J. Waller, Jr., became principal. For thirteen years the school grew under his guidance. The Model School (Noetling Hall) and the east wing of the dormitory were built during his time as principal. When Dr. Waller resigned in 1890 to become State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the school was in a prosperous condition. Dr. Judson P. Welsh served as principal of the Bloomsburg Literary Institute and State Normal School from 1890 to 1906. During his administration the gymnasium and an addition to the four-story dormitory were built. Science Hall, built from plans made by Dr. D. S. Hartline, was completed in 1906, just after Dr. Welsh's resignation...



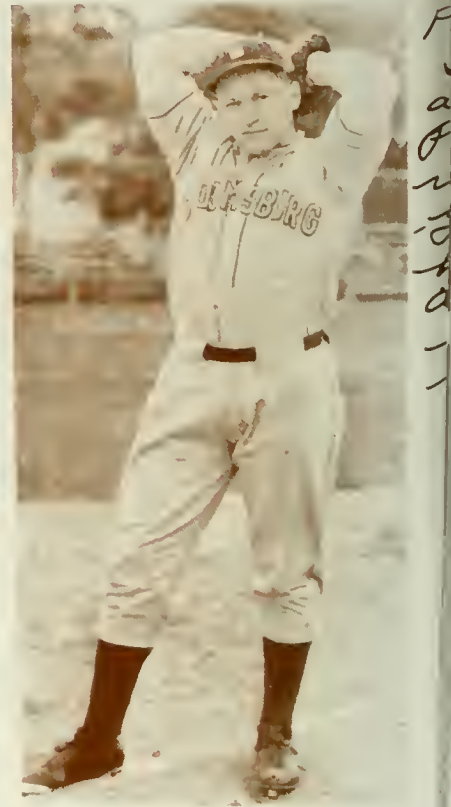

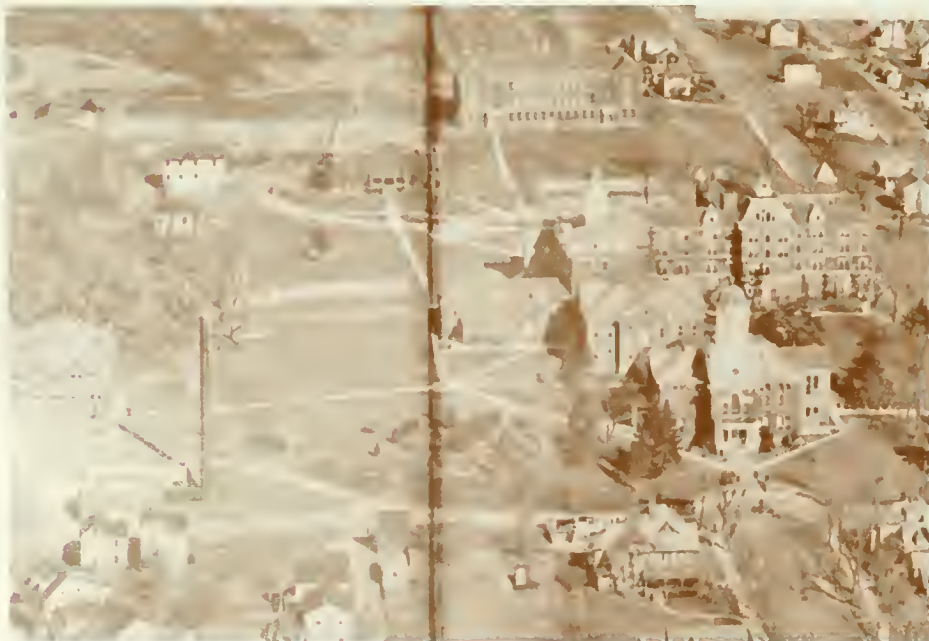
Dr. D. J. Waller, Jr., responded a second time to the summons of the trustees, and returned as principal until 1920, when he retired from active duty. He was succeeded by Dr. Charles H. Fisher, who came to the school from the State Department of Public Instruction. His principalship extended from 1920 to 1925. It was in 1920 that the State purchased the school and changed the name to the Bloomsburg State Normal School, dropping the "Bloomsburg Literary Institute." During Dr. Fisher's administration extension courses were instituted and the Bloomsburg public schools were opened to the teacher training service of the Normal School. Dr. G. C. L. Riemer, also from the State Department of Public Instruction, followed Dr. Fisher and served until 1927...

The State Council of Education of June 4, 1926, authorized the State Normal School to confer the degree B.S. in Education to graduates of four-year courses in Elementary Education and in Junior High School Education. May 15, 1927, the Council changed the name to State Teachers College at Bloomsburg.

Dr. Francis B. Haas, also a former State Superintendent of Public Instruction, succeeded Dr. Riemer in July, 1927. During the administration of Dr. Francis B. Haas the curricula offered by the college were enriched by the establishment of a Commercial Department under the direction of Professor H.A. Andross...

Under the administration of President Francis B. Haas (1927-1959) great progress was made in the teacher education program, and a new degree program in business education was initiated.

Upon the appointment of Dr. Haas as State Superintendent of Public Instruction in 1959, Dr. Harvey A. Andruss, then Dean of Instruction and a former Director of the Business Education Department, was appointed president, a position he held until his retirement in 1969. During World War II, the U.S. Navy V-12 Office Training Program was conducted on the Bloomsburg campus. As a result, a campus building was re-named Navy Hall. In 1957, a division of special education was instituted, and today Navy Hall still houses the program...

In 1960, the school's name was changed to Bloomsburg State College. Authorization was received shortly thereafter to grant the Bachelor of Arts degree for liberal arts programs in humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences/mathematics. Graduate study, leading to the Master of Education degree, also was inaugurated in 1968, approval was received for the Master of Arts degree, in 1976 for the Master of Business Administration, and in 1982 for the Master of Science in Nursing. A cooperative doctoral program in elementary education began in 1982...

Bloomsburg is a strong, multi-mission institution offering curricula in the liberal arts, business, nursing, allied health sciences, and teacher education. Degree programs are offered at the associate, baccalaureate, and master's level in addition to the cooperative doctoral program. Commonwealth legislation created the State System of Higher Education on July 1, 1983, and the institution became Bloomsburg University. Bloomsburg's then president, Dr. James H. McCormick, became the system's interim chancellor and later the first permanent chancellor...

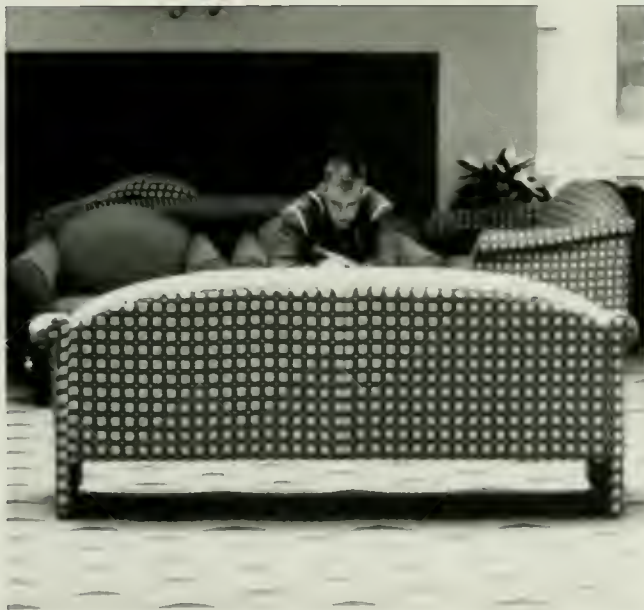

A New President





Dr. Jessica Sledge Kozloff began her duties as the 18th president of Bloomsburg University on July 1, 1994.

Dr. Kozloff formerly served as vice president for academic and student affairs for the State Colleges of Colorado, consisting of Western State College, Mesa State College, Adams State College and the urban campus of Metropolitan State College in Denver.

Prior to joining the Colorado system, Dr. Kozloff served several positions at the University of Northern Colorado, including executive assistant to the president, assistant to the vice president for academic affairs and assistant dean of students and director of academic advising.

Dr. Kozloff has held faculty positions at the University of Nevada - Reno, Colorado State University, the University of Northern Colorado and Metropolitan State College.

While at the University of Northern Colorado, she taught numerous graduate courses in college student personnel administration and leadership.

Dr. Kozloff also served as an American Council of Education Fellow during the 1985-86 academic year and was elected chair of the Council of Fellows in 1992.

She has been a member of the Commission on Higher Education, the Technical Advisory Committee to the Higher Education Scorecard Project, and the Task Force on Foreign Language Education and Cultural Studies.

Dr. Kozloff has also been a project consultant for the Effective State Action to Improve Undergraduate Education and has been a panelist and moderator at many administrative workshops.

A Texas native, she earned a doctorate of philosophy degree in political science from Colorado State University and holds a master of arts degree in political science and a bachelor of science degree in education from the University of Nevada - Reno. An author, lecturer and consultant, she is an associate with the Academic Affairs Resource Center of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

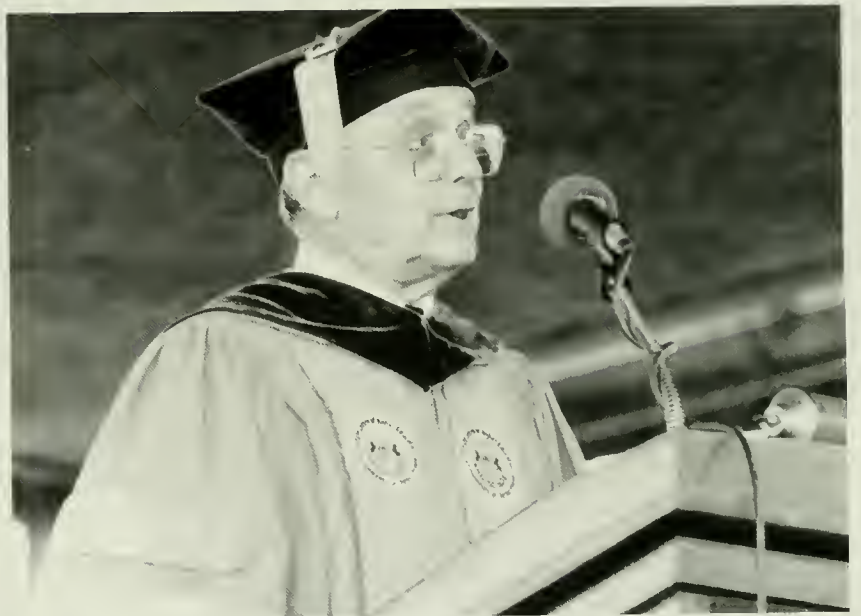

The College of Arts and Sciences

Department of Music

"Our students have the advantage of being in a program that is small enough to ensure they receive personal attention from the faculty to grow musically to their full potential. I enjoy helping students learn the intricate detail of music." -Stephen Wallace, D. Ed., Chairperson

Music requires self discipline. Musicians have a responsibility to prepare properly. They must love what they're doing and be willing to devote countless hours perfecting their skills.

The Department of Music offers opportunity for creative activity and self-expression as well as the cultivation of student's talents. Students receive an education that prepares them for varied professional opportunities.

The bachelor of arts degree in music allows the music major to select one of two specializations, music history-literature or applied music-voice, piano, organ, strings, woodwinds or brass. Both areas offer strong preparation in harmony-theory, music history, ensemble participation and repertoire.

Bachelor of Arts graduates have a variety of vocational opportunities: private teaching, church music, performing groups, composing and arranging, music libraries, and facets of the music industry such as retail, printing and recording.

Department of Anthropology

"Anthropology majors learn about the diversity and breadth of the human experience. They are exposed to unique opportunities and to a caring and committed faculty. Students learn about the diversity underlying all culture and come to appreciate people for who they are and what they do. Anthropology is the most liberating of all sciences. Students have the opportunity for a career where they are constantly involved in new discoveries and increased cultural understanding." — Robert Reeder, M.S., M.A., Chairperson

Anthropology promotes global cultural awareness through classroom studies of cultures everywhere. Anthropology, the study of humankind, attempts to establish useful information and generalizations about people, their behavior and their cultural and biological origins, in order to arrive at the fullest possible understanding of human diversity.

At Bloomsburg, anthropology is divided into three areas: cultural anthropology which studies ways of life in societies across the world; physical anthropology which traces human origins and biological variability; and archaeology which seeks to explain human behavior by studying material remains from past cultures.

Study in these three disciplines is interwoven so students come to see the whole picture of humankind: how humans have evolved, what problems they face, what solutions are possible, and what the future might hold.

Department of Art

"The most common motivation for students who study art is the desire for self-expression. Our art faculty recognizes this and we structure our program to that end." — Kenneth Wilson, chairperson

"With courses in ceramics, crafts, design, drawing, photography, graphics, painting, and sculpture, art students with diverse professional aims may pursue creative interests and skills that will be a source of deep personal satisfaction throughout their lifetime." Complimenting the will to create is the desire to understand the history and principles of art, to gain an appreciation of great works of art from the past and present, to appreciate the aesthetic and stylistic innovations of any given age, thus gaining an increased awareness of one's artistic and cultural heritage. Within the major there also is a strong undercurrent to perceive art as an academic discipline. Studio courses reflect and support this liberal arts purpose as well as building competence in selected media. Art history courses provide a structure for an understanding of the arts while developing the ability to research and write.

The art program is consistent with the university's aim to be a center of learning in the arts and sciences. Through a finely tailored course of study, art students enjoy opportunities for advanced study and pursue specific career goals, preparing for careers as artists, art historians, museum curators, design and advertising consultants, urban planners, and educators. Students choose between two basic areas of study: art studio and art history.





College of Business

Department of Accounting

"We need to learn new information management skills and constantly evaluate our methods if we are to remain competitive. The intent of the program here at Bloomsburg is to prepare our students not just to enter but to contribute to a professional area of accounting." — Burel Gum, chairperson

"Accounting is the language of business." Approximately 550 undergraduates are currently majoring in accounting, making it one of the most popular programs of study at the university. Housed in the College of Business, the degree program requires a total of 63 semester hours — 27 semester hours devoted to accounting courses- and culminates in a bachelor of science in Business Administration.

The program's curriculum is tailored to address the demands confronted by today's professional accountant. Students learn how to accumulate and summarize information, to analyze and interpret results, and to present information which often becomes an important element in the decision-making process.

The program also emphasizes the importance of communication skills, both written and oral. The successful accountant spends more time working with people than with numbers, and more time helping others to reach decisions than tabulating figures. Accounting is an information system, not a mathematical system.

Department of Economics

"The wisdom of how we use these scarce resources will ultimately shape the quality of life for the ourselves and for future generations." — W.B. Lee, Ph.D., chairperson

The Department of Economics at Bloomsburg University offers a systematic study of the economic activities of government, business, and consumers. The core of the curriculum enables you to master basic principles of economics, develop analytical skills, and interpret economic phenomenon. To accommodate the diversity of interests on the undergraduate level, the department has three tracks open to economics majors- two culminate in a bachelor of arts and one in a bachelor of science.

Department of Marketing

"The marketing faculty seek to facilitate the student's learning process through distinct and challenging courses. Courses focus on major knowledge segments within the marketing discipline. Faculty encourage and stimulate students to research, understand, and apply marketing knowledge. Students and faculty are partners in the learning process through their active efforts in and outside the classroom." — Stephen S. Batory, DBA., chairperson

Students majoring in marketing study the free enterprise system and the process by which products are produced, distributed and sold in the market place. All aspects of the distribution of goods, ideas and services, from advertising and market research to sales promotion and consumer behavior studies, come under review in contemporary marketing analysis.

One of the strongest assets of the Department of Marketing is the faculty. Experienced in the field and active in professional marketing organizations, they frequently give presentations and publish articles on marketing to remain on the "cutting edge" of the field. They take pride in their ability to offer students one-to-one attention with a nurturing environment.

College of Professional Studies

Department of Curriculum and Foundations

“Teachers specializing in elementary education find satisfaction and a measure of pride in guiding young children as they experience their initial excitement and fulfillment in learning. Teachers focusing on secondary education have opportunities to guide youth as they shape their first adult thinking.” — William O’Bruba, Ph.D., chairperson

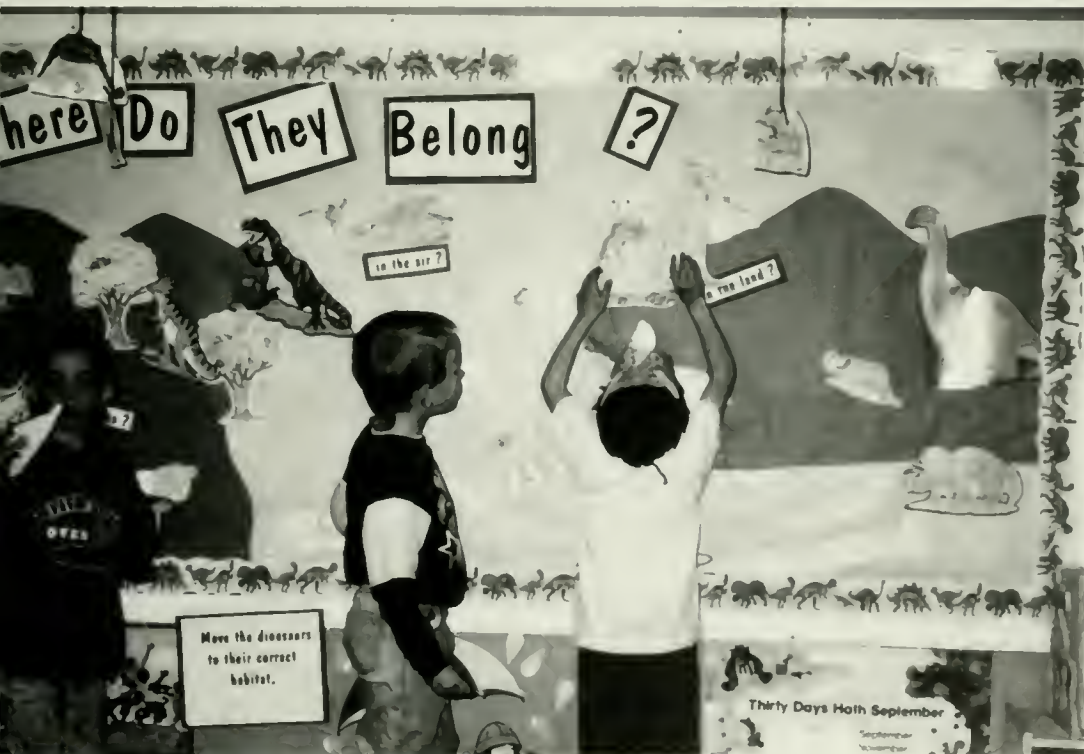
Working with young children and feeling the excitement of watching human learning at its earliest stages are at the heart of early childhood education. By the year 2000, the United States is expected to experience a severe shortage of teachers. The Department of Curriculum and Foundations includes teacher education programs in elementary, early childhood, and secondary education; educational foundations; and the Reading Clinic. All departments are accredited.

Facilities are modern and up-to-date technologies are available including a course in educational computing. A state-of-the-art computer laboratory enables students to learn current advances in computer-assisted instruction. Students are required to spend time observing and assisting in actual classroom settings through two field studies courses offered in the sophomore and junior years. These courses prepare students for the actual student teaching experience.

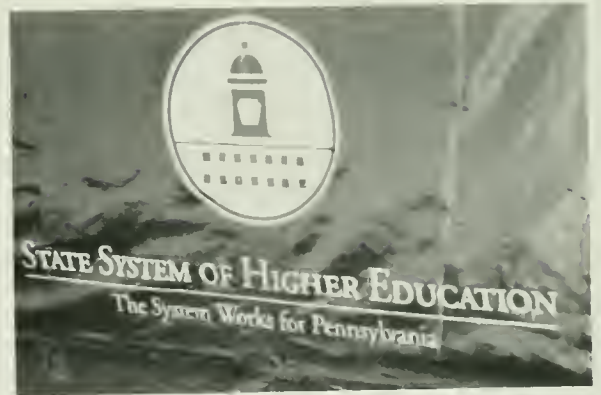

Elwell Hall

What is 9-stories high, is about the length of a football field, and houses over 600 females? Why it's Elwell Hall, of course.

Elwell Hall was completed in 1968 and was named in honor of Judge William Elwell, a former trustee; his son George E. Elwell, a graduate and a former trustee; and his grandson G. Edward Elwell, a graduate and a French instructor at the university. It is the only hall on campus that is not named after a neighboring county. In addition to over 300 rooms, Elwell has recreation rooms and lounges, a guest suite, study rooms, computer lab, and apartments for staff. The Campus Child Center, the Residence Life Office, and the AFSCME office are all located on the ground floor.

Rumor has it, "Hotel Elwell" is the largest women's residence hall of all the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education residence halls.





Montour Hall

Montour Hall is a four-story male residence hall. It houses 250 students and is divided into 2 wings complete with recreation and lounge facilities, study rooms, guest suites, and apartments for resident staff members. It's original construction was completed in 1964; the same year as Schuylkill Hall.



Columbia Hall

The newest residence hall on campus, completed in 1970, is nestled in a corner of the campus allowing for a little bit of privacy. It is 9-stories high and houses 400 students and a special apartment for the Residence Director. Every odd floor is equipped with kitchenettes, microwaves, and a television lounge. The even floors are used as study lounges.

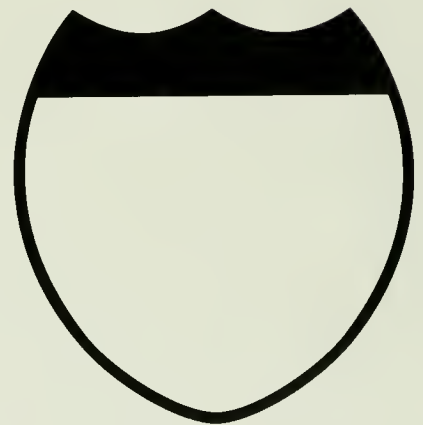
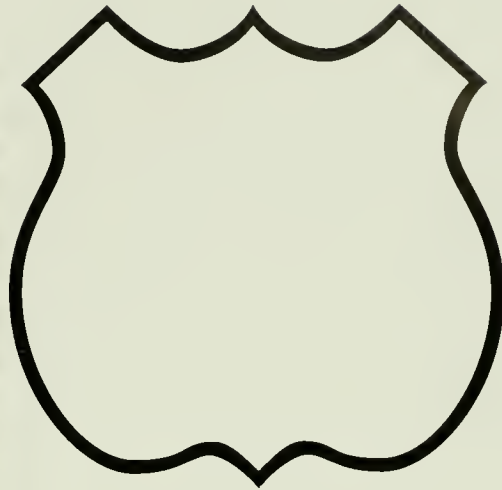

Commuter



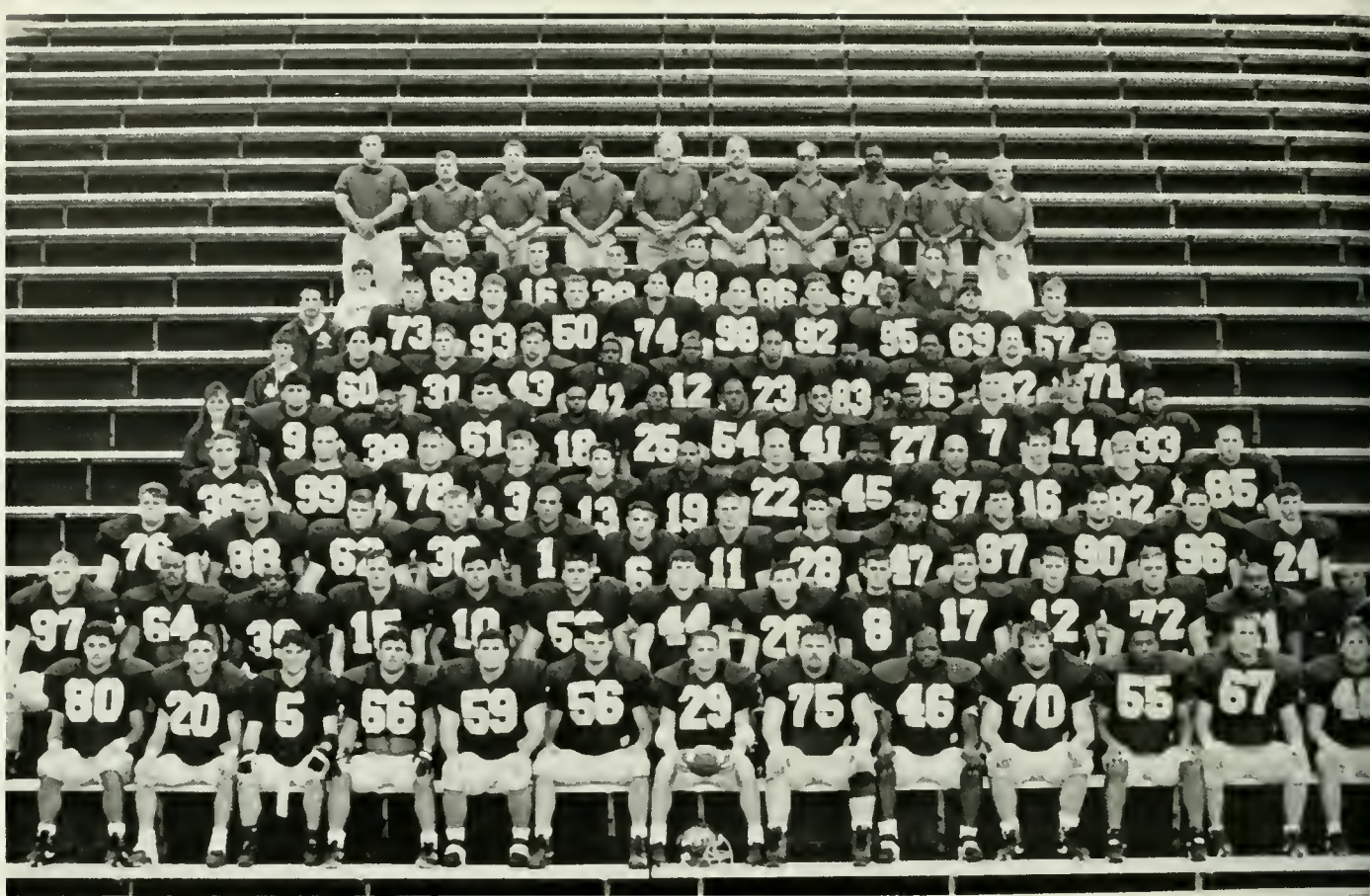

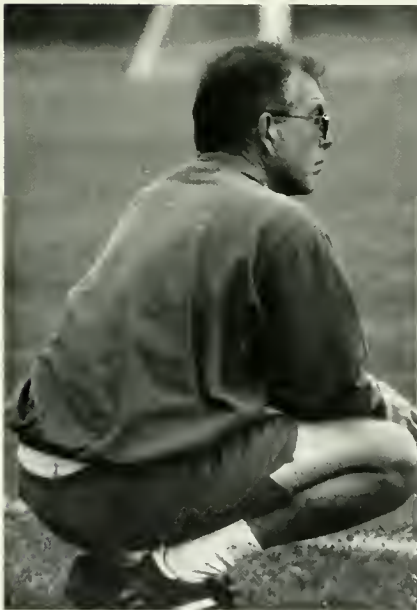


Men's Soccer

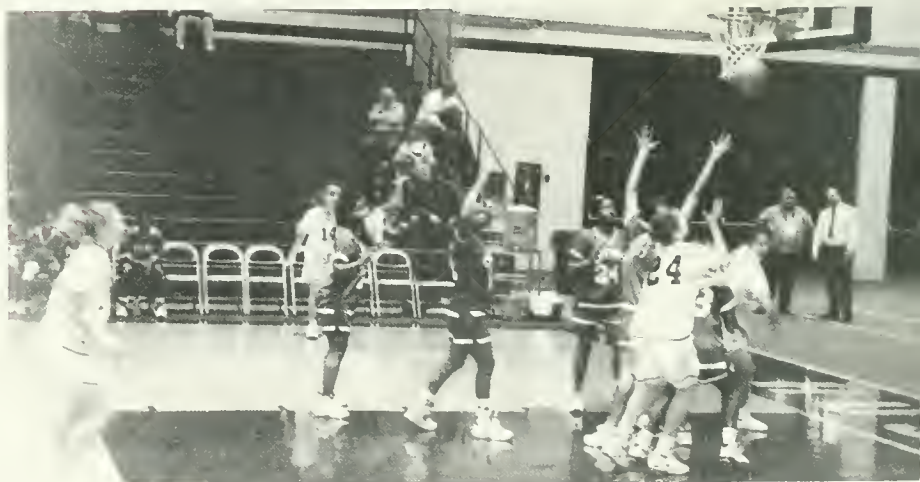
Men's Basketball

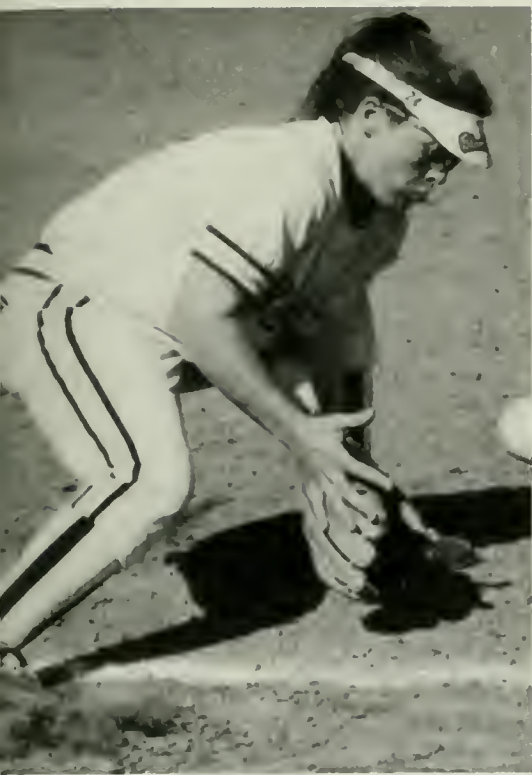
Softball

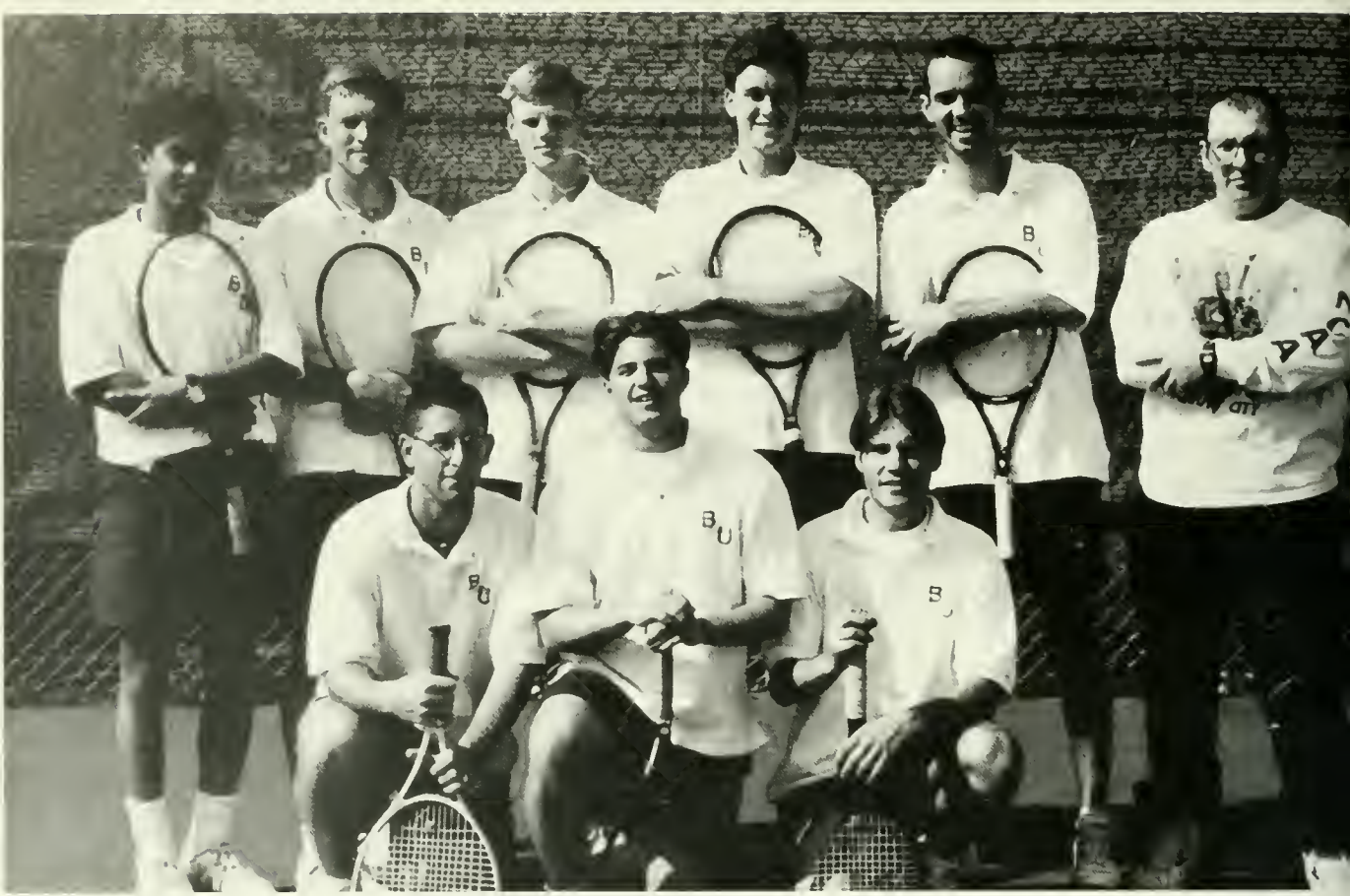


Lacrosse

Bloomsburg University ranked nationally as a "best value"



Bloomsburg University has been rated a "Best Value" in higher education among regional universities by *U.S. News and World Report* magazine. ■

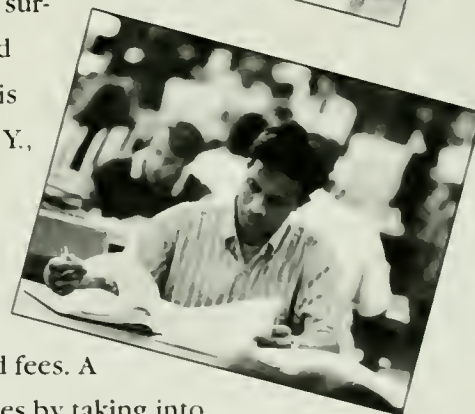
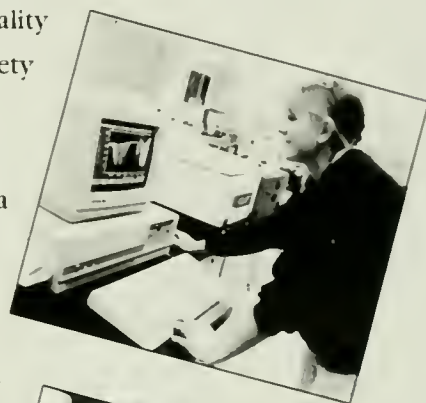
In the *U.S. News* best value rankings, published in October 1994, Bloomsburg University is ranked fourth among regional universities in the northern part of the nation. Other regions represented in the survey are south, west and midwest areas of the nation. ■

The best value rankings are based on a quality score *U.S. News* determined using a variety of factors and dividing that score by the total of tuition, fees and room and board for the 1994-95 academic year. Only institutions with a quality score in the top 20 percent in their region or top 50 percent in the nation were even considered for the best value rankings. ■ In placing fourth on the survey, Bloomsburg University is ranked with Trenton State College, which is first; SUNY College at Geneseo, N.Y., second; and Rutgers State

University at Camden, N.J., third. ■

Bloomsburg University was rated based upon its tuition for out-of-state students of \$3,676 per semester for a total yearly cost of \$11,400 including room, board and fees. A second component of the survey lists university values by taking into account grants that students receive. However, public universities such as Bloomsburg, are still ranked based upon their out-of-state tuition. ■ Ninety percent of Bloomsburg students are Pennsylvania residents, and pay \$1,477 tuition per semester for a yearly cost of \$7,010 a year including room, board and fees. ■

This is not the first time that national publications have taken notice of Bloomsburg University. In 1990, *Money* magazine ranked Bloomsburg University 30th for its quality relative to price in comparison to public institutions throughout the nation. In 1993, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked Bloomsburg in the top 25 percent of northern regional colleges and universities.

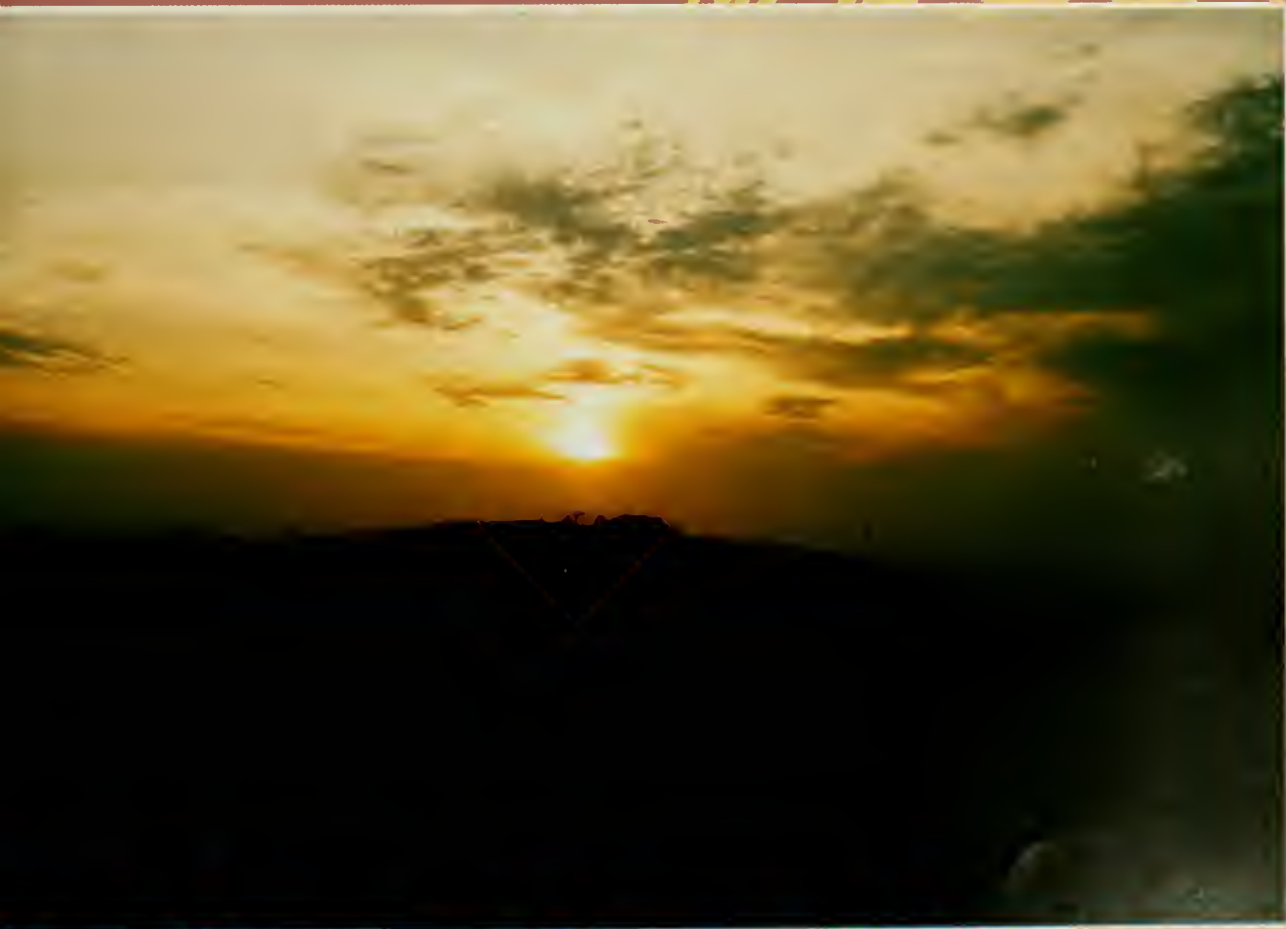

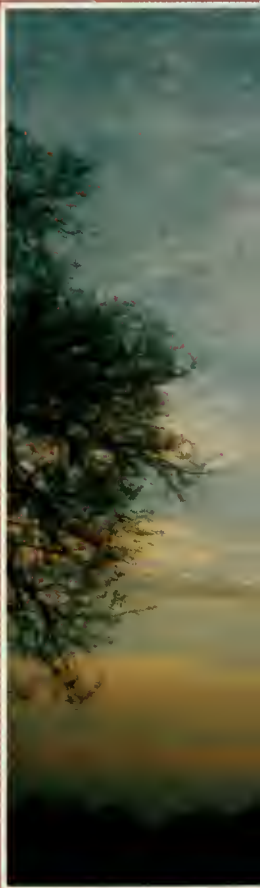

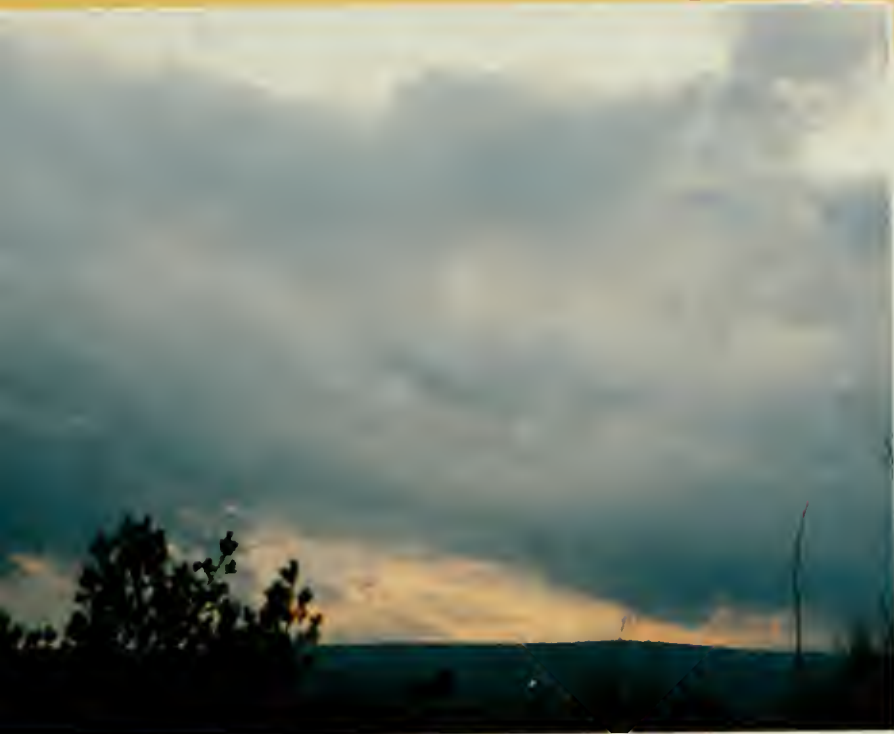
