Native Of France Scheduled To Talk

Madame Jacqueline de Leon will be the assembly speaker on November 3rd. Since her school days at the Sorbonne, where she studied under the great historian, Gason Rageot, her interests have been in the educational, political, and social fields. She is a familiar platform personality in France, where she speaks about other lands, their peoples and problems. In America, on the other hand, she speaks of France and its way of life.

During recent years her work has required her to travel throughout the world - to Africa, the Vear East, Russia, and the I States. In 1947 she was asked by the French Government to conduct a survey of children's bookpublishing in the United States and to study the teaching of French in American schools.

A wide acquintance among the contemporary leaders of France affords her uncommon glimpses behind the scenes in the political and cultural life of her home country. For her lectures in America this fall she comes from recent interviews with some of the most prominent of her compatriots.

She is, however, familiar with the problems of the "little man" in France. This knowledge was gained during her years of social work with the settlement houses and child-placement centers of Paris.

Madame de Leon speaks fluent English. She has served as interpreter at several international business conferences and during 1944-45 was attached to the U. S. Army Headquarters in Paris as an inter-

Booters Cop 1st; Blank Thiel, 3-0

After downing a green Thiel team, 3-0, at Edinboro Friday afternoon, Coach "Sox" Harrison's booters will journey to Indiana this Friday in an attempt to win their second straight game. The Oct. 22 tilt with Indiana is the last for the home forces until an engagement with Grove City winds up the season.

The Red Raiders shook off a scoring slump by tallying three times against the scrappy Thiel eleven. The defense also performed well in stopping repeated Tomcat penetrations. Both of these factors contributed to a richly deserved triumph.
