Industrial Arts Shops Observed by Visitors

On December 13, the Industrial Arts Department held an open house in the Industrial Arts Building for the purpose of acquainting the student body and the community with the functions of their department. Over 450 students, instructors, and visitors from both the community and the surrounding areas attended.

The visitors were conducted on a tour of the building and observed the shops and various classes in session. As a touring group entered the shops the guide explained its general function, then selected a shop student to explain specific machines, operational devices and shop displays. This reporter was amazed at the wide range of crafts employed by the students. The well planned and attractive displays clearly illustrated some of the reasons that our Industrial Arts Department rates among the top four in the United States. It is one of the nations most powerful industrial arts programs with graduates working in every state in the union. The success of their open house and the finesse with which it was presented are a result of the work of a well organized group that enjoys working together as a unit. CSC Women Join AAUW

Dr. Michael Duda, president of CSC, has recently been notified that our college has been placed on the American Association of University Women (AAUW) qualified list. Women graduates of CSC are now eligible for membership in the association.

AAUW, founded in 1882, is a member of the International Federation of University Women which unites associations in thirty-three countries.


AAUW purposes include the development of a study-action program in education, international relations, social studies, the status of women and the arts. It also grants graduate fellowships, for which our women are now eligible, and sponsors approximately 40 women per year from twenty different countries to study in the United States.

Becoming one of the nearly 400 branches of this association is a definite achievement for any educational institution. Dr. Duda expresses his "Congratulations to the women members of our faculty for making this eligibility possible."

Dean Issues FroshBulletin

In a bulletin given to the freshmen occupants of McCloskey Hall by the dean of Men's office several important things were noted. The bulletin revealed to the students that almost 42% of the dorm residents are making deficient grades. It was also cited that about 21% of that figure are making F grades and another 21% are making D grades. Computing these figures, it is found that about 83% are making deficient grades, 42% failing grades and 41% D's. Mentioned in this bulletin was the fact that the Dean of Men's office is greatly concerned over these apparently lackadaisical efforts and "that these figures are certainly not encouraging."

Also brought to the attention of the students is the destruction done to the dorm in the short period that they have resided there. Such things as doors and door stops have been destroyed and windows cracked. It was hinted that new rules and tighter enforcement of those already in effect are to be initiated. It was mentioned that expulsion would be the penalty for misconduct.

Coach Myles Witchey's cagers are certainly making their presence felt in the district thus far as they continue to gain momen-

tum with every game.

The Vulcans currently sport a 3-2 mark and a conference slate of 2-1. After a disappointing three point loss to Wash-Jeff in the season's opener, the locals have recorded three victories in the last four decisions (excluding the game two days ago).

If any sort of pattern can be established this early in the season it may be the manner in which the Vulcan floormen have won their three contests. On two occasions, they have been a second half ball club. In the Marietta game, CSC trailed by a dozen points at intermission. Something happened to them in the next half as they began to jell. They erased that deficit and came out of the game with a well deserved two point victory.

Less than twenty-four hours later, Coach Witchey's netmen were in action again, this time on friendly grounds against a highly touted Clarion quintet. Once again the Vulcans were on the short end of a 33-32 score at the half. In the second half the pattern became evident for the second time in the infant season. As usual, the locals came alive with Casper Voithofer, Tex Coulter, Skip Kughn and Red McDonald leading the way.

The 3-2 record so far has come as a surprise to everyone except Coach Witchey and the players themselves. They knew they could win mainly because they have the potential and desire. Most CSC fans did not expect them to win simply because we were accustomed to losing.

Indeed, the basketball future at CSC looks bright. We have the coach, the personnel, and the support. With credentials such as these, the term "winning" should no longer be scoffed. Within the next couple of years CSC may rank among the best in the district.

CSC was one of three district colleges which placed two men on the first team on the annual District All Star football team. The honors went to flanker Marvin Watson and fullback Alan Sepsi. Sepsi was a unanimous choice as he polled the third highest number of votes cast. Watson is a senior from Holbrook and Sepsi a junior from Brownsville.

CSC's mighty grapplers increased their record to 3-0 last week beating Indiana 18-9. It was a very close contest all the way with five matches being decided by one

Co-captain Ozzie Gavazzi (123) started the evening off in fine style as he scored a 2-1 victory over Jim Smalley. The score was tied 1-1 at the end of regulation period after Gavazzi and Smalley had both scored on escapes. After a check of the clock it was found that Gavazzi had more riding time and therefore received a riding time point (one minute more than your opponent in control) and the

Freshman Jerry Dumm, 130, lost his first match of the seasonlosing to Mike Graham 7-3.

In the 137-pound class Jim Dumpman scored a 5-4 victory over Paul Pots. This match was tied 4-4, but again CSC came through with the riding time point.

Pete Belch of CSC then proceeded to smash Nick Camden in the 147-pound class 8-3. CSC led now by six points.

CSC's Jim Hart, sophomore from Shaler, lost his first match of the year in the 157-pound class losing to Ed Eckberg 5-4. Again it was the very important riding time point that proved to be the difference in score. At this point CSC's lead was cut to three points.

Howard O'Neal (167) added three more points for CSC by beating his competitor 3-2. O'Neal scored on a takedown and escape to a near fall for Bill Sckrock who tried to take advantage of O'Neal's rib

Ralph Higner of Indiana got the jump on Frank Rousseau (177) and never let him out of his grasps as he scored a 6-0 victory. narrowed the CSC margin to three points going into the 191-pound class.

It was then that Freshman Joe Madia put the icing on the cake for CSC whipping his antagonist 10-9. Again the riding time point decided the victory with Madia having two minutes more than Dixon Lightcup. This made the score 16-9, favor CSC.

Barry Gasdek of Indiana in the unlimited weight class flexed his huge brawny muscles and went out to get a little glory for the losing team. However Freshman John "Mo" Mosier showed Gasdek that he should have stayed with football and crushed him 5-3.

day with a come-from-behind 75-73 verdict against Marietta. The Pioneer's built up a 12 point lead at intermission at 46-34 largely through the effort of sharpshooter Dick Sowar. The final half was almost a complte reversal of the first one as the Vulcans sliced the

home margin to 64-62 with eleven minutes remaining. Jim Vandermer knotted the contest at 64 all with a neat one-hander. With ten minutes to go, Casper Voithofer tallied a two-pointer to move the Vulcans ahead.

The charges of Coach Myles Witchey actually captured the victory at the foul line with clutch free throws. Marietta made four more charity tosses than the Vulcans but they received forty-six attempts whereas the Cal floormen only had thirty-eight tries. The Vulcans hit on 23 of 38 and the host Pioneers netted 27 of 46.

The next night the Vulcans continued on the winning road as they upset Clarion 82-72 in a SCC game at Herron Hall. During the first half neither team could gain a substantial advantage as both teams tried desperately to get out in front. The Vulcans once again played according to the script as they trailed at halftime 33-32.

With slightly over twelve minutes remaining in the game, the California quintet began to jell. They assumed a 54-52 lead at that point which they never relinquished. Tex Coulter was the sparkplug in this one as he netted 13 goals and added five charity tosses to walk away with game scoring honors of 31 points. Other Vulcans to hit double figures were Casper Voithofer with 19, Dave Ginevan with 11 and Skip Kughn adding 10. California now stands 3-2 for the season and 2-1 in SCC play.
