## Louis Untermeyer To Appear Before Student Assembly In Steele Auditorium

Culture comes to the CSC campus on Monday, August 17, at 10 a.m., when Louis Untermeyer, the famous poet, editor, critic and anthologist, appears at Steele Auditorium. All students, including those who claim that CSC is a vast intellectual wasteland, are urged to attend this assembly.

With some fifty volumes to his credit, Mr. Untermeyer is one of the great names in contemporary literature. An anthologist of long-standing repute, he has seen his works, "A Treasury of Great Poems" and "A Treasury of Laughter" reach an ever-widening public. Best known among his books

of original verse is perhaps the "Selected Poems and Parodies."

Widely acclaimed for his service to American letters with the publication of "The Letters of Robert Frost to Louis Untermeyer," Mr. Untermeyer has disclosed for the first time the revealing self-portrait Frost painted of the man behind the public figure he became. He has also provided an enduring record of an intimate literary friendship, to such an extent that Frost has made the statement, "There are times when I think I am merely the figment of Louis' imagination."

In 1961 a singular honor was conferred upon Mr. Untermeyer when he was appointed Consultant in English poetry to the Library of Congress, where he now serves as Honorary Consultant in the Humanities.

Many printable epithets have been applied to the witty, gay, and ageless man of letters. William Rose Benet called him "The American Heine." Amy Lowell declared that he was "the most versatile genius in America." And Helen Grace Carlisle says that he is "the liveliest personality" she has ever known. CSC students look forward to Mr. Untermeyer's appearance.

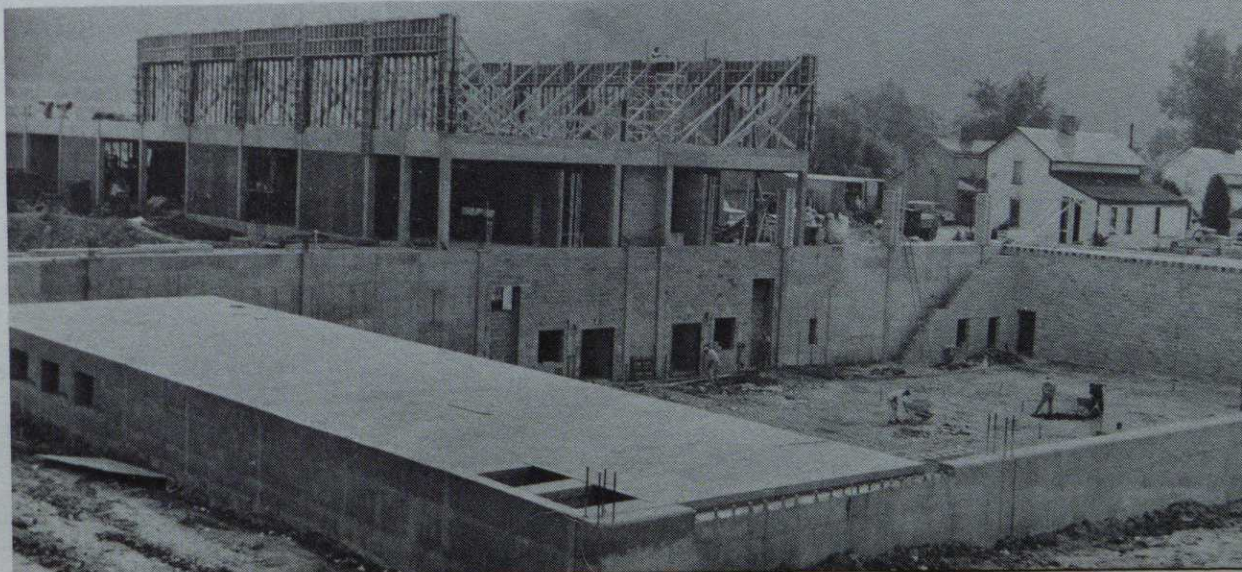

# GYM CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS

The combined gym-classroom building, which is half completed, will be ready for use on February 5. The H-type construction will shelter seven classrooms, one large basketball court with a balcony at each end, a seating arrangement of roll away seats will accommodate 3,400, and a swimming pool. Lockers and showers will be housed in the basement and a movable divider will enable recreation for the men and women at the same time since there are no passage ways.

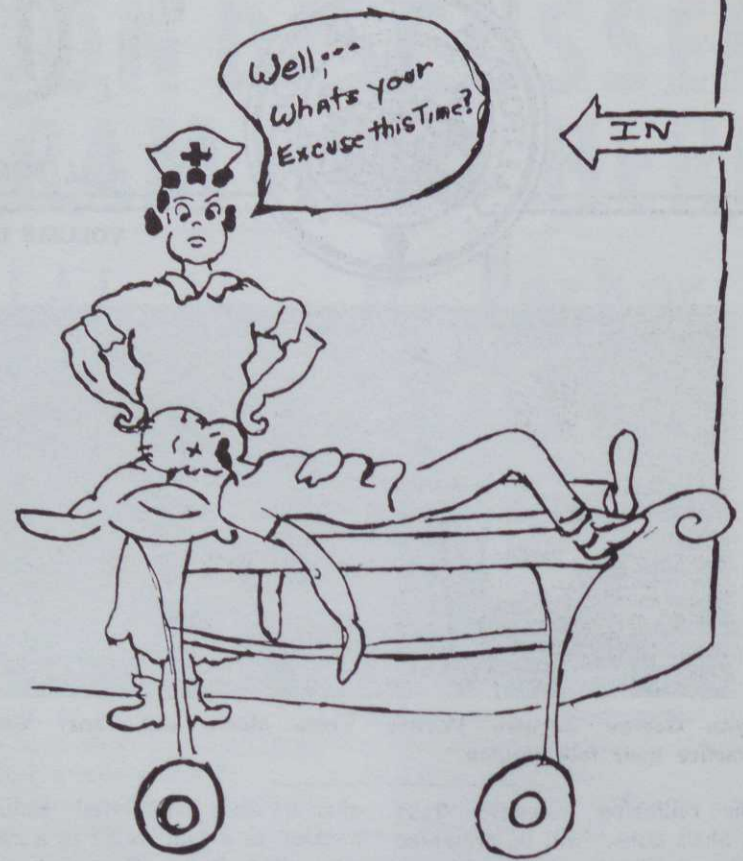

Five students of Burnet Junior High School, under the direction of Mr. Carl F. Lander, Jr., a 1961 graduate of CSC and teacher of graphic arts, have won awards from the First International Exhibit of Exhibit of Student Printing.

The prize winning project consisted of a program cover and four inside pages which required fourteen separate hand-fed impressions on the letterpress for each program.

Twelve hundred copies and 18,400 impressions were made.

The exhibit took place last summer in Canada. It was sponsored by the Association of Teacher of Printing and Allied Subjects of United Kingdom and the International Congress of Printing Education.

Only 47 awards certificates were presented.
