The Fifteenth Annual Homecom-, ing will be held at California State College, California, Pennsylvania on Saturday, October 24, 1964. The theme of this year's festivities will be "Famous Quotes".

Highlighting the program will be the Homecoming Parade, which will form at 12:05 p.m. at Steele Auditorium. It will proceed down Third Street, past the Judges' Stand at Fleck Dormitory, turn right at Union Street, and continue up Second Street to the J. Albert Reed Library on the California State College campus. This year's parade will consist of approximately thirty-five units, featuring area bands and drill teams as well as the traditional and colorful floats. The United States Air Force is expected to exhibit a rocket. Also featured in the parade will be the Tam O'Shanners, a group of sixty young girls from Somerset, Pa. They will also present a program at 2:10 p.m. at the Community Booster

Dr. Michael Duda, president of the college, and Dr. Irvin Shutsy, president of the Alumni Association, will serve as honorary Parade Marshalls.

LOANS TO FRESHMEN

Gov. William W. Scranton announced last week his plans to ask the 1965 General Assembly to expand Pennsylvania's new student loan program by extending it to freshmen.

The governor made the announcement in a speech Thursday at the 125th convocation of Bloomsburg State College. Earlier Scranton had dedicated the new Harrisburg Community College, the first such two-year institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth.

In his Bloomsburg talk, Scranton said the student loan program was "off to a faster start in Pennsylvania than in any state which had previously begun a comparable program." Under the program, the Commonwealth guarantees education loans made to student by banks. At present, only sophomores, Juniors and seniors are eligible.

Scranton said loan applications amounting to more than \$2 million have been approved for over 3,000 students, since June 8. The governor's office in Harrisburg, meanwhile, announced that the West End National Bank of Shamokin had become the 1,000th bank to join in the

Scranton told the convocation that he also intended to ask the legislature to revise public school subsidy payments, increase the salary of the Superintendent of Public Instruction and establish a Commission on Cultural Affairs. "The single most important reason for the existence of our Commonwealth is education," he said.



The California State College Colony of Theta Xi Fraternity was founded in the Spring of 1961,, as Kappa Theta Gamma. The original members numbered fifteen as CSC's newest fraternity began to grow.

In the Fall of 1962, still as Kappa Theta Gamma, the fifteen charter members took their first pledge class and began to think of their fraternity on a national scale.

It was later decided that Kappa Theta Gamma would become a colony of Theta Xi. On December 5, 1962 the twenty members of KTG became pledges to Theta Xi National Fraternity.

Since that date Theta Xi has continually progressed on the CSC campus and now ranks as a leader in Greek activities. The officers for this semester are as follows: president, Richard Winters; vice president, Herman Fry; recording secre'ary, Henry Millon; corresponding secretary, Joe Yukish; treasurer, Patsy Botti; history, Murray Peterson, and parlimentarian, Gene Ritsert.

The present residence of the men of Theta Xi is 115 First St., in California. Their former address was 420 Fourth St.

Although still a Colony, Theta Xi has constantly been a growing, active force on the California Campus and promises to continue being an asset to the climate of the school.

Competition will also be keen between the various clubs on campus who are participating.


The Newman Club and Tucis
