The Bus Trip By Dee Foll

The Erie March on Washington Committee and Edinboro Gay Organization chartered an Anderson Tours bus leaving from Erie, Edinboro, and Meadville. For awhile there, it looked like it wasn't going to come together. Even at the beginning of April, there were only three or four people who'd signed up for the bus. Two EGO members--David Neubauer and Scott—put in enormous amounts of energy and really helped make the Erie bus happen.

DeeDee Foll, a former Edinboro student and EGO member, relates what happened on that bus trip.

The bus that left from Erie was filled to its legal capacity, with all seats full and three people in the aisle. We were ahead of schedule all the way down.

The atmosphere on the bus was interesting. On the one hand, people were quiet, and the mood seemed heavy and calming, like a fog. But at the same time, people were very excited about what we were about to do.

People on the bus were congenial and respectful to one another. There were different areas of the bus for people to do different things. People who wanted to sleep went to the back of the bus, and people who wanted to watch movies on the VCR stayed up front. We passed around a notebook for people to record their thoughts before and after the March, and that went over really well. Also, some people talked quietly amongst themselves.

There were some straight and bisexual people on the bus, people who didn't know a single soul on the bus, but they just believed in the whole freedom concept and wanted to support the cause.

The bus driver was just great. He set out a dish of candies for us, and was really friendly to us. We stopped

March Media Coverage

The March on Washington was all over the print and broadcast media--locally as well as nationally. Here's some of the coverage of interest to area people.

MTV interviewed younger passengers of the bus from Erie. Two of them, Jamie Pifer and a woman who did not want to give her name, were shown full face on MTV (nationally!) talking about their impressions of the March. Jamie Pifer has a tape of that broadcast.

On Friday, April 23, WICU came to Michael Mahler's home and filmed him leaving for the March. He stated that the March on Washington was for equal rights, not speical rights.

On Saturday, April 24, The *Weekender* put the story about the March on the front page, with the headline, "Gay Community is About to Invade US Capital." Although the article provided a balanced account, some people in the local gay and lesbian community were bothered by the use of the word "invade," which communicates that the March is a negative, destructive action.

Saturday April 24, WSEE-TV's Randy MacIlwain interviewed Sally Meiser from the Erie March on Washington Committee. She explained that the March was about civil rights. The camera focused on Meiser's button, which said "Hate is Not a Family Value."

The front page Monday's *Erie Morning-News* carried a color photo of numerous gay and lesbian March participants who were on motorcycles, carrying full-size, fluttering rainbow flags. A number of local gay and lesbian readers were disappointed or offended by the photo the paper chose because it didn't show the size of the March and they felt it went for the stereotypical or "fringe" images of the gay community instead of showing typical gay/

The most memorable parts of the march were, number one, the number of people, and the fact that everybody got along, everybody was so tolerant and accepting of everybody else, even thought there was a wide variety of people there. The one thing that really struck me was, when we were over in the vendors' area, PFLAG had a booth, and you could go up and get a hug from somebody's mom. And that was so neat that they were there and they'd just hug anybody who needed it.

We had instances where we would be on the metro or at restaurants, and people would take one look at us and would move away from us. And then we had other times when we'd get on or off the metro, and there'd be people standing there waiting to get on or off the metro and they'd clap for us.

There was an awful lot of openness in town, the entire weekend. Everywhere you went, people had their buttons on. And nobody bothered us. It was a really different experience from what life normally is like.

Saturday came and it was time to pound the pavement and see the sights. First was the Vietnam Wall, and since my uncle died in the that senseless War, it was very moving to me. How sad for me that all we have left, except his memory, is 9 letters on marble slate. After viewing that, my friend and I traveled to the Smithsonian Buildings. In our journey there we came upon another memorial, "The Names Project," or the AIDS Quilt. This piece of work was so contradicting, I didn't know where to start. The colors were vibrant & alive, yet to me they represented death. All these souls who had succumbed to AIDS were being "displayed" happily. This was hard to understand. I didn't see one dry eye and since no one cries alone in my presence, Ijoined in. Then all of a sudden, the message was there. All of this color and brightness was there for a reason. It was a celebration! There was an overcast of death pushed out by the love for the souls taken so early. Friends, family and "new friends" were not only mourning, but in a way they were saying, "We knew you, we cared for you, we will fight for you..."

Well, happy to be able to be at the quilt, I know that as a gay male I need to do what I can, for legislation, for more money, better education on AIDS, and an expansion on the rights everyone should have to live life with dignity and respect. To be able to walk, in public, hand in hand, whether it be for the Vietnam Wall, the Names Project, or for all the love and compassion I felt at the quilt that day. -Mark Anthony Yeast

I guess the high point was when I ran into the Christian fundamentalists on the subway. There was a young kid, he was about 19 or 20, and he had on an Iowa hat. You could tell he was one of the corn-fed boys.

He had his Bible in his hand, and asked me, "Why are you here?" And he basically said that to the whole subway. I told him because we were fighting for our civil rights. And he said, "Well, what do you want?" I told him that we want the right to be free, and to the pursuit of happiness, and the entire Constitutional thing.

He kept asking questions about what we believed in. He asked at one point if we believed in God, and I said, "Well, Yeah! Most of us are Christian, and we have our study groups where we sit down and study the Bible like you do. If you learn nothing else from the Bible, the one message Jesus Christ was trying to get out is to love your neighbor as you love yourself, and treat them the way you want to be treated. That's all we want, is to be treated like human beings, and not to have our children taken away from us, and not to be kicked out of our apartments, and not to be fired from our jobs." He kept asking questions, and I kept answering them, and at that point the subway had gotten quiet (everybody was listening), and he said, "Do you think I'm wrong to believe what I believe?" I told him, "It's a free country, you're entitled to believe whatever you believe, but you don't have the right to force your beliefs on me or on us." He asked "Could I read you something from the Scriptures?" Isaid "You can read or say whatever you want, but I don't have to listen." He said, "Well, why do you do this when the Scriptures say it's wrong?." He started pulling out a passage for me. Now the kid who was with him was black. I said "You know there are people who believe that black people are an abomination, and that they are not equal to white people, and that they don't have any rights. And those same people can reach into those Scriptures that you're holding in your hand, and pull out passages that they will tell you that it states, that it's a fact, in God's word, that black people have no rights. Do you believe that? Do you believe that this man here has no rights? We're all human beings, and we all have rights. And that's all we want are our rights. We don't want privileges, we don't want quotas, we just want the right to live and be happy."

As we were getting further into it, the guy got concerned about getting off at the right place. I said, "Don't worry, we're getting off there too. We won't leave you." As we were getting off the subway, I said, "Have a safe trip home!" And he turned around said, "I'll think about what you said if you'll think about what I said." And said "Sure I will, that's a promise."

I started thinking that if we could just talk one-on-one to Christian fundamentalists. Because they don't look at us as people. They look at us as a group. And it's easy when you're going this group against that group. But when you bring it down to one-on-one, it's not so easy to do that.

I went down with a carload with four other guys. It was very moving to see so many people simply able to just be who they are without shame or fear. I wished that I could have walked down the street with the man I love, but he wasn't able to make it. (But we did walk hand in hand on Presque Isle last week. The March is a moveable feast, after all!)

Thomas Murphy, the association's spokesman, stated, "No other single recent event, including the record-breaking 1993 presidential inauguration, has ever made such an impact on the nation's capital, making it a financial landmark for the city." Murphy said he accepted the March organizers' estimate of 1 million participants.

at a couple places on the way down and the way back. The places that we stopped at were just loaded with people traveling to the March. It was a nice build-up to the event. I pretty much sat by myself at the rest stops and just watched the people...the smiles that they couldn't get rid of, the laughing and joking around. There was a real sense of togetherness.

We pulled into DC about 7:30 a.m. A woman from the March on Washington organization came on our bus to welcome us and to give us some helpful information. She gave us information like how to use the subway, what number to call in case we got lost (they would come and find you), and that we were in an unsafe part of town and should not walk alone. It made us feel a lot more comfortable to have all that information.

As soon as we got off the bus, tons of people came at us, asking us to buy a gay newspaper, or take part in a survey, or some other thing. MTV was there and they interviewed some of the people on our bus. Jamie Pifer and a woman, both from Erie, were actually shown on MTV.

There were vendors all over, selling food and drinks, gay T-shirts and other merchandise. Because we got into town a few hours before the March, we broke up into little groups and went sight-seeing. We'd go to see the AIDS Quilt, the Vietnam Memorial Wall, the Reflecting Pool, and other things.

The March was divided into 99 contingents—all the 50 states, plus groups like gay veterans and parents groups. The people on the bus went to the Pennsylvania section. We ran into a lot of other Erie area people there, and that was nice.

The people from the March organization counted the marchers by going up to each marcher, taking their name, and giving them a pink sticker that said they were counted. The National Park Service said there were only 300,000 people at the March, but there's no way that was true. There had to be at least a million people. There were so many of us, we couldn't all march at once, but would have to wait till our section could move forward. The Pennsylvania section stood 3½ hours before we were even able to start marching, and there were still 66 sections behind us!

After waiting around so long, people were starting to lose their enthusiasm. But once we started to march, the enthusiasm came rightback. It was incredible, the amount of people, hanging out of buildings, out of trees, stop lights, everywhere!

After the March, people were exhausted, and sprawled out everywhere, resting up. And thirsty! You couldn't get out of line to get a drink, so if you didn't bring something to drink, you'd be dying of thirst.

On the way back, as the trip home began, people were excited, talking and happy about what we had just done, where they had gone, and things like that. People didn't seem to be gayed-out, though I was getting there. But it was too big of an event, it filled you with too much pride and inspiration, that it would have been hard to get gayedout.

I do feel different since then. I was so proud to have been a part of that event. I would not have missed it for the world. So many people in one spot, for the same reason.

Maybe our time has come. Sometimes you can get geared up for something and it turns out to be a false start. But this time, it feels for real.

♥ Harvard University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology will be offering family health insurance coverage to employees involved in committed relationships with the same sex.

■ Hawaii's Supreme Court ruled the state's ban on gay marriages may be unconstitutional because it amounts to sex discrimination, which is illegal in Hawaii. The court said that marriage was a civil right, and when the state dictates who may and may not marry, it violates the guarantee of equal protection under the law. It could take up to two years for the state to settle the issue, which could greatly influence the legal status of same-sex marriage in other states.

Johnnie Phelps, Sam Nunn, and the Ban: An Opinion

In 1946, Sergeant Johnnie Phelps, under direct command of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, dutifully agreed to draw up a list of suspected lesbians in her battalion. "But," Phelps courageously disclosed, "You've got to know, when you get my list back, my name's going to be first." The order was rescinded after Sergeant Phelps explained that most of Eisenhower's key personnel would be gone, a move both gutsy and true. Nonetheless, this attempted purge of lesbians would be repeated many times over, usually with success. The rate of lesbian discharges would average 3-4 times those of gay men, according to government statistics.

With the number of discharges so disproportionately high, I was puzzled over the lack of attention given to lesbians in the military—surely this information would be a valuable implement to counter arguments by proponents of the ban. On May 10, the nausea I felt as a result of viewing C-Span was an indication that the shameless video assault by Senator Sam Nunn had reached its intended target—i.e. men—while purposely excluding anything which might weaken its focus—i.e. women.

The "Sam Nunn Entertainment Hour"—the rights no doubt are being bid on by the National Enguirer-was shown in its entirety because, as Sen. Nunn put it, "The American people have to know." The half-hour I witnessed on Nunn's little PR ploy exposed the true arrogance of the military's male power-elite. The segment was rife with views of bunks, bathrooms, and shower stalls. The only thing missing was a shot of a naked cadet bending over in the shower for soap with that deer-caught-in-theheadlights look of panic in his eyes. I saw no women being interviewed, in fact, no women whatsoever. Arguably, women's opinions have rarely been solicited throughout the debate, because, simply, this is a man's problem. Nunn's focus was to exploit the fears of men because this is where his battle will be won. After all, it is up to real men to not only protect and defend the US from being invaded by demented freedom-haters, but to protect themselves

from what these same leaders have presented as the certain undoing of military cohesion: sexual harassment.

Like the spoiled child who feels compelled to take every toy a playmate picks up, some of these same men have repeatedly taken liberties with women, claiming innocence and overreaction when an incident is brought to the public's attention. What the gay issue was done to men, in effect, has been to threaten to pry the toys out of the spoiled child's hands and give them back to the playmate. As a result, the most pitiful irony comes to light—these powerful men suddenly understand what years of abuse of women has not made evident—that sexual harassment is a tangible, humiliating experience. All these big, strong men have suddenly turned sensitive on us overnight, and expect the American public (women included) to react with proper vigilance to this atrocity.

As July draws near, a compromise seems imminent. Senator Nunn will surely get his way, much to the delight of straight America. The lesson to be learned is not as much about hatred and homophobia as it is about power and politics; for even as top military brass offer dramatic testimony defending the ban, stories surface about how differently these same men react off the record. This may be a bitter pill to swallow, but it serves to inspire some to step up the fight. Just ask Sergeant Phelps.

Gays in the Local Media: Out & About LGLV-Erie in the Erie On April 5, Mizner was a gue

On March 31, the headline across the top of the Erie Daily Times' front page read "Erie Area Gay Group Solicits Candidates' Views." The article discussed the candidate questionnaires that the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters' Erie chapter sent out to some 200 candidates in primary races in the eight counties that that chapter served. LGLV-Erie spokesman Michael Mahler is quoted as stating that the League does not endorse candidates, and that the questionnaires were only for purposes of informing voters. Erie County Democratic chairman Ian Murray said that he was neither encouraging nor discouraging candidates about filling out the questionnaires, but did state that the party was concerned about responses being used against a candidate. Erie County Republican chairman John Mizner said that he was discouraging candidates from filling out the questionnaires. Mizner stated, "We don't want to know who all the gays and lesbians are, but all these people should come forward and engage in a public debate. Is it (the League) one person who makes himself a group?"

Afterwards, several letters to the editor appeared on the subject. Greg Valiga wrote in (April 14), stating that Mizner seemed to be off on his own. Chris Young, LGLV chairman, wrote (April 12) in to correct errors and explain that theelectoral process needs good information. Michael Mahler wrote in (April 8) asking why the paper thought it was necessary to feature the LGLV so prominently. A couple anti-gay letters were also published.

Pat Howard of the *Erie Daily Times* wrote an article ("Questionnaires, Gays and Candidates" April 10) in which he responded to Mahler's objections to the Times making the questionnaires a front page story. In the article, Howard explained--with a good bit of sensitivitywhy the media would consider gay issues more newsworthy.

On April 4, WSEE-TV had a story with interviews by Michael Mahler and John Mizner. Mahler stated that if gays are important enough to talk about, they should be important enough to talk with. On April 5, Mizner was a guest on Barry Dane Steinhagen's show on WLKK-radio. Another caller was Linda Bebko-Jones, who won the 1st District state representative race after facing a homophobic campaign against Republican Jerry Knight. Mahler called in, stating again that if the LGLV was important enough to talk about, they should be important enough to talk with. Jerry Knight called in and claimed that the LGLV was not sharing its information. Mr. Knight wrote a letter to the editor that was reportedly read over the air and appeared later in the *Erie Daily Times.* In the letter, Knight indicated that he was getting irritated with LGLV and Michael Mahler.

Speaking to Groups

On March 31, a lesbian and a gay man—Sally Meiser & Doug—spoke on a panel at Mercyhurst College celebrating Diversity Month. The title of the plan was "Different Faces of Love." Also on the panel were an interracial couple, an American man and a Japanese woman who were married and Sr. Marlene Lehmkuhl, faculty advisor of GALA-10. The panel was facilitated by Randy MacIlwain, a reporter from WSEE-TV 35. MacIlwain discouraged hostility from the audience. Most of the people attending were accepting and open.

In May, Sally Meiser and Jim (a local gay man) spoke to a Human Sexuality class at Mercyhurst College. They were encouraged to talk about their lives and the students had very good questions and the discussion was very good.
