

Transitions

DIED: Kerry Stoner, founding executive director of the Pittsburgh AIDS Task Force, died June 2 of complications due to AIDS. He was one of a group of dedicated volunteers who in 1985 helped to organize the PATF.

DIED: Craig Rodwell, early gay rights activist, of stomach cancer. He was 52.

Rodwell began organizing the gay community in New York's Greenwich Village in late 1950s. He organized the Mattachine Young Adults in 1964 as well as protests against police harassment of the gay community. In 1967, he opened the nation's "first gay liberation bookstore", the Oscar Wilde Memorial Bookshop (which is still in business). He was one of the leaders of the Stonewall rebellion in New York in 1969 (against police harassment of gays), which is considered the beginning of the modern gay rights movement. Ayear later he organized the first gay pride march.

Gay Rights Progress: No Stopping Us Now!

There are a lot of gains being made for lesbigay people. We're living in some pretty exciting times. Here's what progress has been made, just in the past couple of months.

Couples

© The Vermont Supreme Court has ruled that a lesbian may adopt her lover's biological children. That ruling in effect establishes that lesbians can be "legally recognized parents," according to Julie A. Frame, who represented the two women in the case.

The two women, Deborah Lashman and Jane Van Buren, have lived together since 1986. During that time, Van Buren was artificially inseminated and gave birth to two sons, in 1988 and 1991.

The Vermont Social and Rehabilitative Services investigated the family after Lashman went to court to adopt the children, and determined that the adoptions were in the best interest of the children.

Justice Denise Johnson, in a unanimous opinion for the five-member court, wrote, "When social mores change, governing statutes must be interpreted to allow for those changes in a manner that does not frustrate the purposes behind their enactment."

"To deny the children of same-sex partners...the security of a legally recognized relationship with their second parent serves no legitimate state interest."

University of Pittsburgh has given partial domestic partner benefits to its faculty who are involved in committed same-sex relationships.

Norway has legalized same-sex marriages, the second country in the world to do so. Denmark legalized same-sex unions in 1989. Similar legislation is pending in Sweden and Finland.

Anti-Discrimination Policy

◎ In April, Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena issued policy statements endorsing the hiring and promotion of lesbians and gay men and ending discrimination against employees on the basis of sexual orientation, age, race, cultural background or disability. In June Pena spoke to a gathering of several hundred federal workers gathered in the DOT courtyard to kick off Washington D.C.'s Pride Week celebration. Pena is the first Cabinet secretary in any federal administration to have ever participated in a Pride Week event.

Other federal agencies have begun to adopt antidiscrimination policies. Among them are the Department of Agriculture, the General Services Administration, and several regional offices of the National Park Service.

The American Medical Association's House of Delegates voted on June 15 to ban discrimination against gay and lesbian doctors.

Clinton Administration

© Roberta Achtenberg has become the first openly gay or lesbian nominee to be confirmed by the U.S. Senate, by a vote of 58-31. The lesbian activist is now the assistant secretary for fair housing and equal opportunity in the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Conservatives like Jesse Helms, Pat Robertson, and Jerry Falwell helped organize strong opposition to Achtenberg's appointment.

Some Senate members criticized Helms' homophobic attacks. Senator Claiborne Pell D-RI, in a speech endorsing Achtenberg, for the first time spoke of his openly-lesbian daughter, who is president of the Rhode Island Alliance for Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights; Pell said he would not want to see her barred from a government job because of her sexual orientation. PA Senators Wofford and Spector voted YES on Achtenberg, as did Ohio's and NY's Senators. (Thank them for their support!) Gregory King, of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, said, "The Senate vote is a significant milestone in our

Opinion: A Fundamentalist Fag's Point of View*

Growing up in a Baptist household required a degree of willpower I never quite achieved. Sunday sermons proclaimed the world was full of temptations that had to be avoided in order to walk closer to God. Most of the temptations were sexual or were activities that led to sex. Dancing, drinking, premarital and extramarital sex were all damned and partakers of such were to be avoided due to their "ability" to seduce the weak in spirit. Homosexuality always seemed to hold a place all its own when it came to sin. The act of homosexuality actually seemed worse than sin, as I grew up hearing words such as "perverse" and "abomination". The idea of attraction to a member of one's own sex seemed foreign to me, even as I eyed the male models in the Sears catalog. Childhood naivite allowed me to hear descriptions and definitions but kept me from applying them to my pre-adolescent desires and curiosity. My "perverse" desires only took on a name when I described to my father an infatuation I had for a boy on my brother's football team. His reprimand forced me into a secrecy that still exists today.

Religious fervor (fundamentalism) can be an incredible force, and I witnessed its power many times in church services. To serve God and follow His Biblical plan can become a fire in an individual's life that shuts out all other endeavors. Many call this fanaticism, and it causes shivers in one's spine when the names of Robertson and Falwell are spoken. This fanaticism is not unique to fundamentalists and could certainly be applied to some who follow gay activist groups. And yet it is accepted and applauded when in our ranks, and abhorred elsewhere. I am not proud of the intolerance and hate that some fundamentalists preach, even though my life is rooted in such beliefs. But neither can I respect the same behavior when coming from many gays. Many say that they want tolerance and yet fail to practice it in their own lives. The Golden Rule is very applicable for both sides but seems to be trivialized as something parents tell their children in order to stop fights at recess. You must practice what you preach, for actions truly speak louder than words.

I firmly believe homosexuality was decided for me biologically, and I yearn for the day the "world" recognizes this. Until that day arrives, I can only hope for acceptance, or at the very least, tolerance. But as I look for this from others, I must search for it in myself as well. Tolerance only requires respect for another's beliefs and the capacity to allow their practice. It does not force acceptance or approval, two things we may strive for but not see in our lifetime. Tolerance is not much to ask from fundamentalists or gays. It alone could end the animosity that echoes from television, pulpits and march platforms. It could also end the secrecy that existed between a boy and his father and now a man and his family.

We also see EGCN as a vehicle for celebration of the goodness and diversity of the lesbian, gay and bisexual communities. EGCN is a cooperative effort between lesbigay groups and individuals to help our community develop and thrive.

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The LGLV Report: PA's Anti-Gay-Bashing Bill

Hate Crimes Bill Soon Before PA State Senate and House

The Problem: Anti-lesbian and gay violence is on the rise throughout the Commonwealth and is getting more violent as well. A recent report for the US Department of Justice noted that "Homosexuals are probably the most frequent victims" of hate violence. In recent reports, Pennsylvania Attorney General Ernie Preate notes that hate crimes against lesbian and gay people are a problem in Pennsylvania. A recent study found that Pennsylvania had the most gay related murders in the nation, the second most incidents of police abuse, and the ninth highest rate of physical assaults. Locally and throughout the State, juries and judges as well, often give more lenient sentences for gay-bashing than in normal assault cases.

Hate crimes are crimes committed because of the victim's race, color, religion, national origin or sexual orientation. A recent report commissioned by the National Institute of Justice noted "the most frequent victims of hate violence today are blacks, Hispanics, Southeast Asians, Jews, gays and lesbians. Homosexuals are probably the most frequent victims." Hate crimes are not just attacks on individuals; they are an attack on an entire group of people because the attacks are intended to intimidate that group, and the fear they generate can victimize all members of that group.

The Proposed Solution: Pennsylvania has already recognized the problem of hate crimes against other minority groups when the Ethnic Intimidation Act was passed. The law provides for steeper penalties when crimes are determined to be committed because of the victim's race, color, religion or national origin. The Senate Bill number is SB 1218.

The Hate Crimes Bill will amend the Ethnic Intimidation Act by adding sexual orientation to the list of covered categories. Prosecutors will be able secure sensible punishments against criminals who have until now been able to literally get away with murder. And once some cases have been prosecuted and won under this law, crimes, especially assaults, will decrease.

The Debate: Many legislators may look at this Bill as an attempt to legitimize the status of being gay or lesbian. This is not the case and it is important to steer them away from such debates and get them to focus on the real problem or this Bill may not be enacted. The LGLV suggests the following arguments:

- Violence against lesbian and gay people is a pervasive problem in Pennsylvania and is a more serious crime than a non-bias crime because of its terroristic nature (it is a threat to attack all lesbian and gay people).
- 2. Bias crimes against lesbian and gay people are typically sentenced less severely than crimes are in general.
- Pennsylvania has already recognized the need for bias crime legislation when the Ethnic Intimidation Act was passed.
- 4. The United States Government recognized the problem of hate crimes against lesbian and gay people when sexual orientation was included in the Hate Crimes Statistics Act, which was signed into law by President Bush.
- Counter the argument that gays and lesbians cannot be equated to other minority groups, or that it is not the same as attacks against members of other minority groups, with the Statement that those other minority groups who have experienced hate crimes are lobbying for this bill today.
- 6. This is an anti-crime, pro-law enforcement Bill.
- 7. This is a pro-family bill; lesbian and gay people have families and when bashing occurs, it affects negatively the family of the victim, and the threat implied by the bashing also negatively impacts the entire lesbian and gay community, and their families.

What you can do: Sign a card to be mailed to local State House and Senate members stating your support for passage of the Hate Crimes Bill. LGLV will soon be making cards available at local bars and gay and lesbian events.

The Ban: The Countdown Begins...

WAR—This simple three-letter word is so much a part of the gay-lesbian-bisexual struggle that we barely take notice when it is used. With the religious right declaring Holy War on the movement, it is assumed that anytime we attempt to take a step forward to achieve equality, we will find ourselves involved in another battle. It is therefore somewhat hard to comprehend that the pressing issue today is our right to be included in fighting wars, especially since our country doesn't go out of its way to protect us from hatred, violence, and discrimination.

Nonetheless, organizations nationwide are stepping up the pressure on Washington as the mid-July deadline for lifting the ban in the military approaches.

The Human Rights Campaign Fund claims their "Operation Lift the Ban," along with the support of gay America, has turned things around inside the Beltway. HRCF has hired an influential lobbying firm to help out, the Speak Out program has sent 150,000 telegrams to key legislators, and HRCF has been instrumental in bringing exmembers of the Armed Forces before the Senate to testify in favor of lifting the ban.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has implemented a simple strategy involving lobbying and grassroots organizing. Their ACTION PLAN stresses calling and writing Congress; this plan is endorsed by military heroes Margrethe Cammermeyer, Tracy Thorne, Heide De Jesus, and

Keith Meinhold. Martina Navratilova has been successfully employed to increase fund-raising. NGLTF is working with a coalition of organizations which include the ACLU, People for the American Way, and the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, among others.

The Campaign for Military Service is the upstart organization; CMS has continually criticized HRCF and NGLTF for their slow response to the right-wing campaign. Campaign Manager Tom Stoddard takes a realistic approach to ending the ban: employ our allies and families to help, since we are in the minority. CMS has compiled an impressive list of endorsing organizations and has submitted a very clear proposal for ending discrimination based on status.

Contact your local State Senator by phone or letter and voice your support for the bill and ask that they co-sponsor the bill. (The name and addresses of the State Senators and House Members are listed in the government listings in the phone book and will appear occasionally in this column). Ask your friends and family to do the same. These calls are counted and make a difference. Remember to use the bill number! (SB 1218 for Senate)

Voice your concerns regarding this bill on local talk radio stations.

Make a contribution to the LGLV and support their fund-raising efforts so that they can continue to lobby for passage of this bill throughout the State.

Become an active member of the LGLV and join their effort to lobby local legislators for passage of this bill.

The American Civil Liberties Union, of course, is also involved in the issue, launching a nationwide postcard campaign. Earlier this year, the ACLU of Pennsylvania conducted petition drives; locally, these petitions were targeted toward influencing Tom Ridge's decision to support the ban. Larry Frankel, Legislative Director of ACLU-PA, states of the successful Erie-area petition drive, "I cannot tell you how impressed I am...! know that my national office is hoping that we can put a lot of pressure on Ridge. [This] is a big part of that campaign."

Locally, the League of Gay and Lesbian Voters has attempted to generate grassroots support by leafletting and distributing the ACLU postcards to be sent to the Senate and the White House. The League is currently negotiating with Erie Cablevision to include the pro-gay video "To Support and Defend" in its local access programming.

© In late April, Donna Shalala, new Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, met with 18 lesbian AIDS activists to discuss AIDS issues specific to the lesbian community. The activists had been trying to arrange such a meeting for the past six years.

Legalizing Our Private Lives

© In Nevada, it is no longer a felony for consenting adults of the same sex to have sex in private. A law dating back to 1911 made gay sex—even in private—a felony. In June, that incredible law was made history.

© Russia has decriminalized male homosexuality, repealing a law that made consensual male-male sex a crime. Lesbians were not acknowledged in the old law.

The Irish Parliament has decriminalized homosexuality over the objections of the Roman Catholic Church. This struck down a 19th century law making the offense punishable by life in prison. This brings them into line with the European Court of Human Rights standards.
