In the early 1970s, feminism and lesbianism blended together, and one of the products of that was something called "womyn's music." A whole lesbian musical subculture developed, with its own music festivals, concerts, record companies, publications, and performers. Out of the many talented performers in womyn's music "The Big Four" emerged: Holly Near, Meg Christian, Chris Williamson, and Margie Adam.

Adam has recorded several albums, and performed at the historic March on Washington in April of 1993. Her song, "We Shall Go Forth" has been placed in the Smithsonian Institution. She performed on NBC's "Today Show," and has been on NPR's "All Things Considered," The Morning Edition," and "Horizons."

Margie is currently on tour to promote her new album Another Place.

Her music is hard to define, but you could call it a jazzy kind of pop. She accompanies herself on piano, singing with a rich alto voice. She sings about lesbian relationships, AIDS, the environment, and other issues. Her music can be serious and pensive, up-tempo and fun, and points in between.

She'll be performing in Erie on November 7 at 7:00 p.m. The concert is at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation, 7180 Perry Highway (Route 97)



The Hunt for the Virus follows the hunt from the CDC's acceptance that AIDS could be epidemic, to Africa where they find it running rampant. Nov. 14 at 10 p.m. and 1 a.m., Nov. 27 at 2 a.m. and Nov. 28 at 1p.m.

- ☆ In *Medusa: Dare to Be Truthful*, Julie Brown spoofs Madonna. On Showtime, 11/8 2:30 a.m., 11/19 at 12:30 a.m., 11/30 at 3:25 a.m.
- ☼ TV Guide reports that after news got out that a couple CBS affiliates refused to air two episodes of Picket Fences (one of which explored attraction between two teenage girls), the ratings for the series actually improved.
- ☆ Lily Tomlin will be showing up in two half-hour programs featuring Edith Ann. The first Life and Times of Edith Ann will air towards the end of November on ABC. Check listings.
- Gannon Theater's production of Parables depicted a gay-bashing in a modern-day look at the Good Samaritan: A man is gay-bashed, and every-

body passes by him, except the compassionate Good Samaritan. The play was an original adaptation of the book *The Tales Christ Told*, by April Oursler Armstrong, and set the parables in the modern world. Director William Doan and musical director Shawn Clerkin collaborated on the adaptation.

- As you may know, gay-friendly comedian Roseanne Arnold has been writing an advice column for the five Iowa weeklies she bought with her husband Tom. Recently a 15-year-old girl wrote in to say she was afraid that she might be a lesbian. Roseanne's advice: "Confusion and crushes on other girls is perfectly normal at your age. ... Others may tell you different, but being a lesbian is OK! In general, they are great people!"
- Amay Travers, of the musical group Peter, Paul and Mary, has a song out that promotes acceptance of gay people in a gentle way. In the song, called "Home Is Where the Heart Is," a mother explains same-sex love to a small child.
- A number in *Madonna*'s national tour (called "The Girlie Show") is a medley that salutes 20 years of the lesbian and gay movement, using songs like "Express Yourself," "Deeper & Deeper" and "Why It's Hard." Also during the show, she speaks of the friends she has lost to AIDS. In New York City she complained about the bad reviews she'd been receiving, telling the crowd, "They send uptight, straight men to review me. They hate me! Don't they know I'm a gay man in a woman's body? Why don't they send gay men?"
- Two films about Chinese opera divas who are really men in drag will be released this month. The one you'll be most likely to have access to is *M.Butterfly*, with Jeremy Irons as the man who marries a woman he later discovers is really a man (duhh...). The other is called *Concubine*.
- A new alternative rock compilation benefits AIDS organizations around the world. No Alternative (Arista) pulls together 21 alternative rock acts like Soul Asylum, Sonic Youth, Urge Overkill, Nir-

- vana, Patti Smith, and Matthew Sweet. It should be out in stores now.
- Here's a good one: a book store owned by lesbians had a Halloween window display of scary books, and right smack in the middle was Rush Limbaugh's book!
- ☆ Country music group Confederate Railroad have caused a minor wave of male drag among country music fans. The group appeared in drag in their video for "Trashy Women," and this has inspired a lot of male country fans to try it out for themselves!
- Last month we reported that WSEE wouldn't be broadcasting the lesbian mother episode of School Break Special (called "Other Mothers") when the CBS was broadcasting it. The programming director at WSEE said that it would be taped for showing at a yet-to-be-determined later date. When we called WSEE back this month, we asked when the episode would be shown and the director said he never told us it would be shown later, just that it would be taped and sent to the intermediate unit (he did in fact tell us about the intermediate unit thing, but he also said they'd be broadcasting it at some point). When asked if the reason it wasn't aired had to do with its content, he said that it did not, that they trust whatever the network sends them, and they also trust this show because the program is reviewed by psychologists. But, he said, they just don't air School Break Special. Which is too bad, if it's true, because it's a highquality, Emmy-winning teen program that deals with the tough topics. By the way, many CBS affiliates around the country did pull this episode. The network is to be commended for being brave enough to deal with this, as are the director and the cast (who worked for scale because they wanted the story to be told...Meredith Baxter received all of \$2500 for her work in it).
- Fitness queen Richard Simmons has a new video out, called *Sweatin' to the Oldies 3* (60 min., \$79.99). *USA Today* gave the video its highest rating.

AIDS Council Update

The AIDS Council's two staff members—Mary Lee Brooks and Jeff Schwenk—have rescinded their resignations and will be staying on. "The AIDS Council Board is very happy about this," said Board president Carolyn Beck. The local media had reported on the resignations, the circumstances of which were somewhat confusing.

Beck further reports that the AIDS Council has the support of County Executive Judy Lynch. Lynch had expressed concern over the county's continued funding of the AIDS Council after hearing reports that executive director Craig Bennett had been fired (he had, in fact, turned in a letter of resignation).

"We are still concerned about remaining financially solvent," says Beck. "If anyone has suggestions about funding sources or fund-raising, please contact us. We are communicating with elected officials. Rep. Linda Bebko Jones' support in this has been invaluable, and we are in contact with others. And we have a Board member who is committed to leading the Council's development committee."

Franklin Transsexual Sues Over Job Loss

A 37-year-old transsexual woman is suing an Oil City for \$200,000 because she believes he is at least partly responsible for her being fired from her job. She had been employed at the Northwest Pennsylvania Training Partnership Consortium as an employment assessment specialist, and was fired after she began the

process of changing from a man to a woman. Kristine Holt, who was Richard Holt before the change, believes she was fired from her job because of the gender change. She said she was unaware of any problems with the public or co-workers, but said that officials at Northwest Consortium said they'd consider written complaints. The husband of a co-worker, James Nelson, did write a letter stating "careers and employment have been placed in jeopardy" because of Holt's presence, and expressing concern about violence because "we are dealing with an obviously unstable person who may pose a threat to the people in the employment office."

Besides the suit against Nelson, Holt is also seeking to be reinstated to her job.

Syphilis Outbreak

The Erie County Health Dept. reports an increase in the incidence of syphilis. Normally the agency sees less than ten cases per year, but recently they saw eight cases in only two months.

"We can't nail it down to one group," says Carolyn Beck, Epidemiological Investigator for the Eric County Dept. of Health. "It's not just one group or race. This outbreak does appear to be largely heterosexual...as far as we can see. But then, people aren't always honest about these things." She noted that this sort of outbreak seems to happen when the disease is introduced to a community, and suggested that drug use was a possible culprit in this situation, particularly if people are exchanging sex for drugs or sex for money to get drugs.

Health officials look at rates for infection of sexually transmitted diseases like syphilis and gonorrhea as indicators of how much unsafe sex is going on.

Beck advises people who suspect they may be infected to get a blood test. "This disease can be very serious," she says. Untreated syphilis can lead to organ damage, brain damage and even death. If you have symptoms of the disease, please get tested. You can get tested at the health department, you can go to your doctor or neighborhood clinic if you feel more comfortable with them, but you should get it checked."

The first symptom of syphilis is a chancre (sore) in the mouth, rectum, or genitals (which may not be visible to you). The most common symptoms of the second stage include skin rash, lymph node swelling, and patchy hair loss. If you don't treat the disease at this stage, you could go on to develop life-threatening complications.

Unfortunately, 40% of syphilis cases have no symptoms. So even if you have no symptoms, you should also get a test if you have had: multiple sex partners, sex with a partner involved in illicit drugs, or sex for drugs or money.

Note also that a syphilis sore can open up a "portal of entry" for HIV, thereby increasing risk of being infected by that virus.

National/World News Bits

Censorship News

WASHINGTON—School censorship efforts became more successful in the 1992-1993 school year. According to the People for the American Way's recently-released report "Attacks on the Freedom to Learn 1992-93," a record 41% of censorship efforts were successful. Materials with Satanic references (real or imagined) were the single biggest target for censorship efforts. Second were materials with references to gay men and lesbians, and third were those materials containing obscene language. Pennsylvania had the second-highest number of right-wing censorship efforts of all states in the nation; Ohio was seventh, New York eighth.

Religion

CHICAGO—The Bible supports gay/lesbian acceptance and same-sex marriages, it is morally imperative to teach teens about safer sex and encourage them to use condoms, and masturbation is "generally appropriate and healthy." So says a draft report on sexuality for the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (ELCA), released in October.

The 21-page report, "The Church and Human Sexuality: A Lutheran Perspective," was released to the Church's pastors and church leaders. It is not an official stand by the 5.2 million-member denomination, but recommendations by a task force assigned to focus on issues of sexuality and the ELCA. Church members may respond to the report until June, at which time the task force will work on a second draft, which will deal with and incorporate those responses.

Karen Bloomquist, director of the study, points out that although the study is liberal in some ways, "This is not anything goes. There are some things they stand against." These include sexual abuse, pornography, promiscuity, anti-gay violence, adultery, prostitution, and exploiting sex in advertising. The report upholds traditional teachings about marriage and premarital sex.

A conservative groups within the ELCA has condemned the study.

The Pope and Sexuality

VATICAN CITY—Pope John Paul's newest encyclical (called "Veritatis Splendor"), reaffirms the Catholic Church's condemnation of homosexuality, contraception, alternative insemination, masturbation, sterilization, and premarital sexual relations. The encyclical's sexuality issues received the most publicity, but a lot of other issues were addressed as well. These include dissent, relationships and roles of bishops and theologians, and mortal and venial sin.

No Same-Sex Marriage in Germany

KARLSRUHE, Germany—Germany's supreme court has decided to allow that country's ban on same sex marriages to stand, while at the same time acknowledging that same-sex couples need more legal protection.

An anonymous same-sex couple had appealed the ruling of a lower court.

Labor Supports Gay Rights

SAN FRANCISCO—The nation's leading labor union has passed a resolution condemning gay-bashing and anti-gay rights measures. The AFL-CIO unanimously passed the resolution on Oct. 6 at its biennial convention. The resolution also pledges that the AFL-CIO will actively support efforts to stop anti-gay rights efforts. The resolution doesn't limit itself to sexual orientation issues, but also denounces "violence motivated by bigotry, prejudice and hate, specifically naming cross burning, police brutality, church defacement..."

AIDS Vaccine

SAN FRANCISCO—A researcher has announced that a new AIDS vaccine, called GP-120, will be tested on several thousand gay men and I.V. drug users in late 1994. Dr. Donald Francis, a researcher at Genentech Inc. of South San Francisco, stated that the vaccine has already been tested on 300 people, with "remarkable results."

"One-hundred percent of the humans produced neutralizing antibodies, which are cross-productive against various types of the virus," said Dr. Francis, but he also pointed out that research hadn't showed whether or not they were producing enough to actually protect against infection by the virus. So far the only reported side effects have been sore arms. The vaccine could be available by 1997.

Dr. Francis, a doctor with the Centers for Disease Control until 1992, when he retired in anger and frustration. He was one of the first in the scientific community to sound the alarm about the AIDS epidemic. His real-life role in AIDS activism was described in Randy Shilts' 630-page account of the early days of the AIDS epidemic, "And the Band Played On," and he was also depicted in the HBO docudrama of the same name.

AIDS Czar on Teen Sex

WASHINGTON—AIDS adviser Kristine Gebbie told a conference on teenage pregnancy that the United States needs to take a more positive attitude toward sexuality and to stop dealing with sex "in terms of don'ts and diseases." Until we change our attitudes, she said, "we will continue to be a repressed, Victorian society that misrepresents information, denies sexuality early, denies homosexual sexuality particularly in teens, and leaves people abandoned with no place to go."

Gebbie made the remarks Oct. 20 at conference sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Social Health Association, and the Association of Reproductive Health Professionals. By October 21, Gebbie's stand was altered—apparently by the White House—with Gebbie issuing a statement that emphasized sexual abstinence and responsibility to prevent HIV infection.

New, Improved Condoms

Look for condoms made of polyurethane to be made available in 1994. According to reports, the new condoms will be an improvement over those made of latex: they allow more sensitivity, they can be used with oil-based lubricants, and are stronger and more transparent.

The Arts

WASHINGTON—Despite efforts by the Christian right to abolish the National Endowment for the Arts, the House has voted 304-119 to extend the agency for another two years. Christian right organizations had mounted a campaign against federal funding of the NEA, pointing to projects with gay or "pornographic" content.

Many House members were swayed by the argument that actress Jane Alexander, the newly-confirmed NEA chairwoman, should be given the chance to do her job.

During Alexander's confirmation hearings, she pledged to mediate between artists producing works with gay or sexually-explicit subject matter and those who are offended by that content.

NEA supporters have argued that opponents of the agency use examples that are either incorrect or out-of-date.

The bill now heads to the Senate.

Coming Out Day Events: What Happened

The Behrend group (Trigon) blended Coming Out Day with something called Ally Day, a day in which non-gay supporters of gay people could come out too, by showing their support.

Trigon had originally planned to do Coming Out Day, then decided that they wanted allies to come out, too. "This campus is extremely homophobic," Trigon president Sharain Naylor said. "If heterosexuals celebrate too, it helps to create a better environment."

From 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., there was an art show and table set up in Behrend's Wintergarden. The art show featured over 20 paintings and photographs by local people, and was coordinated by Christelle DeCrease from Cup-a-ccino's.

The table carried brochures and newsletters, buttons, lapel stickers, bumperstickers, leaflets, and T-shirts. Those materials reflected both Coming Out Day and Ally Day sentiments, with a strong emphasis on Ally Day. There was also a sign-up sheet for allies, which said, "I am an Ally to Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual People. To show my support and acknowledge their rights as people, I sign below." Allies indeed did show their support, staffing the table and helping in other ways. "It took many Allies to put this event together," said Naylor.

At 7 p.m. there was a film called "Not All Parents are Straight," shown in Reed Lecture Hall. The film was about parents who were lesbians or gay men.

After the film there was a reception back in the Wintergarden, with food generously donated by La Bella Bistro, Pie in the Sky, and South Gate Pizza. About 100 people mingled, met, and schmoozed. In addition to the artists and Behrend students and faculty, there were a lot of others in attendance: EGO sent a big delegation up, there were people from GALA-10, Mercyhurst, the Unitarian Universalist Congregation, Womynspace, Bridges and EGCN, and others. Representatives from these organizations each said a little about what they did.

The day was clearly a success for Trigon and a landmark event for lesbigay people at Behrend. The

school newspaper put the event on the front page and page 3, and Naylor reports that the atmosphere at the school has become more open and accepting.

Host Mark Modlo was pretty even-handed in the interview, and with one exception, avoided sensationalizing the subject.

Mark started the interview by asking the women why come out? Kim said she thinks it's important for gay people to come out because coming out counters discrimination against gay people. In coming out, gay people will show that "we're like everybody else." She said she also sees it as a way "to build our community and make us stronger and reduce our personal limitations." DeeDee said that in this interview she'd like to have straight people express their concerns about gay people so that we can talk about it. She also said she

wanted to know why so many people are angry at gay people.

Mark stated that there must be a certain risk that the women were taking in coming out, and asked how this fit into their employment picture. Both women said they were lucky because people where they work are pretty accepting (they work in the same place). DeeDee said, "We should take advantage of our situation when we are in a situation where we can be free to do things like this...to come out and be open with ouselves, so hopefully we can provide support for other people and make a change somewhere along the line."

But, said Mark, heterosexuals will ask, why have this day to proclaim being gay, when straight people don't proclaim days to be straight? Kim said if straight people would just stop the gay-bashing and such, there wouldn't be a need for special days. She said it's homophobic people who create the need for days like this, that we're not trying to shove this down people's throats, and we don't want special rights, but just want the rights that everybody else has. Mark responded, "That seems fair."

He then asked about the various ways to come out. DeeDee said that a person doesn't have to come out in the media or to a group of people—which can be very scary. It can also mean self-acceptance, which can be very hard for gay people, but which is important for personal growth. Coming out can also mean coming out to one good friend, being honest with yourself and your friend, or coming out to your family.

The first person who called into the show said she thought the subject was disgusting and she was sick of hearing about it, and the second caller said gay people "have to hide because they're doing something that's not normal." Modlo responded, "What's not normal—having loving emotions for another human being? How can we sit in judgment?" The caller, still on the line, responded, "Because I'm a Christian."

A lesbian then called in and said, "They seem to have a very distorted view of what's normal. We as gay people get bombarded daily, constantly, with the heterosexual lifestyle...television, radio, advertising. And we don't even have the right to have one day to tell people and to try to make them understand what we

Military Policy Causes Confusion

President Clinton's "don't ask, don't tell" military policy has gone the way of gays and lesbians who have recently come out in the armed forces...it has been placed on standby reserve status.

The October 1st implementation date has come and gone, but there is currently no ban on lesbians and gays in the military due to events that have left many totally baffled.

Å key player in the effort to end the ban is federal district court judge Terry Hatter, whose ruling in the Keith Meinhold case has forced the government to temporarily comply with his order to stop the ban. Indeed, Defense department spokeswoman Kathleen deLaski has stated that eight individuals who had been on standby reserve status during the six month debate on the ban are now welcome to return to active duty if they so choose.

But if the government wins an appeal now, or if the matter ends up before the Supreme Court and the ban is found constitutional, then the legislation recently passed by Congress will be even more restrictive than Clinton's "don't ask, don't tell"—and lesbians and gays will have lost a very important battle.

A chronology of events to date:

September 9: The Senate, by a 63-33 vote, approves an amendment to the Department of Defense Authorization Bill which brands homosexuality an "unacceptable risk" to military morale. Stricter than "DA, DT", the amendment makes no mention of stopping witchhunts or even-handed enforcement of the code of conduct, but allows a future Secretary of Defense to reinstate the policy of asking recruits about sexual orientation. Both PA Senators-Wofford and Specter-vote for this amendment.

September 23: Judge Terry Hatter threatens to charge Defense Secretary Les Aspin with contempt if he and other senior Defense officials can't "show cause" for continuing to enforce the policy against gays and lesbians. Hatter had ruled the ban unconstitutional in the Keith Meinhold case.

September 28: The House of Representatives approves an amendment which codifies the "DA, DT"

policy, but with the same harsher provisions contained in the Senate version. In the 301-134 vote, PA Representatives Ridge and Clinger vote with the majority. In the process, the House rejects two other amendments concerning the ban, one of which would have ended the ban completely.

Washington, D.C. federal judge Louis Oberdorfer blocks the discharge of Navy lieutenant Richard Selland because he revealed to his commander that he was gay. Oberdorfer said the Navy was "perilously close" to being in contempt of judge Hatter's January ruling.

September 30: Hatter amends his earlier ruling which declared the military's ban unconstitutional. The judge broadened the ruling by prohibiting the armed forces from changing the enlistment status, denying enlistment, creating records, and interfering with promotions based on sexual orientation. This could possibly make the "DA, DT" policy illegal. Hatter had threatened to fine Pentagon officials \$10,000 a day, but didn't find the government in contempt.

deLaski tells reporters that the military will delay implementing "DA, DT" to allow the Pentagon to advise the armed forces about new guidelines.

October 1: The government asks an appeals court to block the ruling outlawing the ban until the appeal can be heard. The lawyers said the order would prevent implementation of "DA, DT" and the recent amendments passed by Congress.

October 7: The Clinton Administration tells the armed forces to suspend actions against gays and lesbians.

October 9: The appeals court refuses to overrule Hatter's order. Department General Counsel Jamie Gorelick said the Pentagon would appeal to the Supreme Court if the appeals court delays. Meanwhile, deLaski announces that the Pentagon "will seek extraordinary relief from the Supreme Court" to delay the enforcement of judge Hatter's ruling.

October 18: The Justice Department denies a decision has been reached to ask the Supreme Court to block the Hatter decision.

Marine Sergeant Justin Elzie will be returned to active duty because of Hatter's order, and deLaski

confirms that seven others on standby reserve status can return to duty if they want.

UPI reports that there is no drop in morale after nearly three weeks with no ban on lesbians and gays in the military.

October 20: Elzie returns to duty with no repercussion.

October 21: Pentagon officials begin pushing for Supreme Court intervention, but the Justice Department resists because Solicitor General Drew S. Days is still not ready to argue the necessity of an emergency stay.

October 29: In response to request by Clinton administration, Supreme Court rescinds Judge Hatter's injunction preventing the military from discriminating against lesbigay people in the military. The ban is back in place (except for Keith Meinhold). Case now goes back to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals for a hearing on the merits of the case (as opposed to the injunction). The appeal is expected to be heard in December.

are. I don't think that Christians have any right to pass moral judgment on anybody. I believe in God, and my God loves me for what I am, and I'm created in His own image." Mark responded that he was brought up with Christian teaching that says that it isn't natural, that two penises don't go together and two vaginas don't go together. The caller replied that we believe that way because some people programmed us to believe that, but it was only unnatural to him because he didn't have those feelings and wasn't born with them. "What you do is unnatural to me," she said. Mark replied, "No problem."

Another caller called in response to the issue of penises not going together and vaginas not going together by saying that there's a lot more to sexuality than just intercourse. Mark shifted into his only jab at sensationalism here, talking about how the meaning of life was about procreation. When the caller said that one doesn't have to be heterosexual to procreate, and that there were alternative means of procreation, Mark made a crack about how "Ovaries now emit sperm."

During a break for news, the two women told Mark they didn't want to get into this area, and were very uncomfortable with the direction the discussion was going in. When the show resumed, Mark got back on track, saying that there clearly was more to sex than just intercourse.

The next caller was a 67-year-old straight woman who had worked with Kim and DeeDee for several years. She said she liked them a lot and "They were two wonderful people to work with. And when I looked at them and talked with them, I never thought of what they were doing in their bedrooms. I just talked with them like they were any other person. They were wonderful to us." Mark raised the issue with the caller that it would be annoying to have people look at you and be thinking of what you did in bed.

Mike Mahler called in and raised many points about hatred, mentioning how it causes high numbers of gay teens to become suicidal. He remarked on people who use religion as an excuse for hatred, saying that "Religion does not equal hatred of gay and lesbian people." He also said that if the purpose of life is to procreate, and people who choose not to procreate are

condemned to burn in hell, then that includes the Roman Catholic clergy and Christ himself. He mentioned a dear friend who is a devoted Christian and who is sickened by the hatred so many Christians show toward gay people, brought up Biblical admonition, "Judge not, lest ye be judged," and pointed out that people seem to pick and choose what parts of the Bible they'll go by, and said, "I saw no members of the

Christian community stand up when a gay man was murdered a couple years ago." On the issue of coming out, Mike pointed out that studies show people who personally know gay people tend to be more accepting of them, saying that "People have to realize that gay and lesbian people are the people they already know and love..." as co-workers or members of the family or church.

DeeDee and Kim talked a little about how a straight person can think you're just wonderful until they find out you're gay, and suddenly when they find out you're gay they see you in a whole negative light. Kim said there was no choice in being gay, that "It's who I am, and I can't do anything about it."

A straight Catholic woman called in and said she was always upset about anti-gay attitudes among Christians. "How these people treat anyone as meanly and in such hate as these Christians do is amazing to me, because that's not the Chris-

tianity I was brought up with," she said. She talked about people picking and choosing what parts of the Bible they'll follow. "Gayness is in nature. It's natural. God created it. When people call it unnatural, they're calling one of God's creations unnatural." When Mark brought up the recent Papal Encyclical (which condemns homosexuality), the caller said, "I believe the Pope is wrong. He's promoting hatred and he's wrong."

A lesbian called in to tell about coming out eight years ago in Meadville's tool and die industry, and how surprised she was when she was accepted with open arms. She closed with, "I just wanted to call and say 'Hang in, everybody, there is hope!" She closed by cheering Kim and DeeDee on with, "You go, girls!"

For closing remarks, DeeDee said, "Coming out is a very, very important part of your self-acceptance, and we all need that to be peaceful with everyone else." Kim said, "Just because somebody's different, whether it's being gay or something else, give them a chance. You

don't have to understand it (the difference), but don't hate them because of it." Mark summarized their message as being about diffusing hatred and seeking the healing effect of understanding, and closed with "I hope that it's successful."

Kim went to work shortly after leaving the studio, and discovered that everyone there had tuned in to the show. She said there were a few people who didn't know she was gay, but they commended her on "having the guts to do something like that." Neither DeeDee nor Kim reported any problems after their appearance on the show.

A short commentary on Kim's and DeeDee's first call-in radio appearance The two women were scheduled on the morning show because WLKK's program manager (who also co-hosts and would

have interviewed them), had encouraged it, stating that she and her co-host would handle the issue with more compassion. The two had felt reassured by the impression that they might be handled with respect, and that the program director had received background materials on Coming Out Day and DeeDee's personal experiences coming out. On the morning of the interview, they arrived at the station feeling relatively self-assured, but that assurance was shattered when they found that the program manager (who was



going to do much of the interview) had suddenly called in sick, and she had not prepared her co-host at all (he had not seen the materials she was given and had not even been told that there would be guests on the show.) That was the point at which Dee Dee went from selfassurance to panic. DeeDee said that after that, she can't even remember what she said because she was so terrified. Kim didn't react so strongly, but reports that she was thrown off by all that.

At this point we need to direct our comments to that program manager and to other media people who will be contacting our community for people to interview: Please try to be sensitive to how frightening it is to come out in the media. It is much more scary than speaking about a city ordinance or a theory on UFOs. Nobody's asking you to agree with everything or even anything that they say, just understand how important it is to them that you treat them with respect and consideration. It's good for your business to be able to have gay people willing to talk openly to you, and there are people in our community who welcome the opportunity to do so. But if you treat these people insensitively, your supply of interviewees will dry up.

By the way, after the interview, Kim and DeeDee spent some time talking about the interview. After they settled down a little, Kim said she felt exhilarated by what they had just done, and the two looked at each other and said, "Let's do that again!"
