There's something about Margie Adam which makes your heart stop and your mouth go dry. One minute she's there, as big as life, singing from a soul which must reach down to her toes; the next, she's all ebony and ivory, completely consumed by the instrument before her. Watching her at the Steinway, it's easy to lose track of who is playing whom. And so it was on Sunday, November 7, when Margie performed to a full house at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Erie.

It has been many years since Margie last toured. When she came off the road in 1984, the wellsprings had run dry. Listening to her now, it is difficult to believe that the Muse she fought so long to recapture could ever have been out of reach. Yet perhaps it was as elusive as she.

Margie's music defies definition. It is at once spiritual, poetic, political, humorous & intense. If art defines the artist, it is easy to see why Margie's eclectic style holds such wide appeal.

The true test of a musician's ability rests on how well s/he communicates with an audience. It is here that Margie's light shines most brightly. With her, the audience embarked upon a fabulous tour which combined moving lyrics, stunning instrumentals, wry wit, and just plain fun. Margie's performance was a cause for celebration in which Pink Sands and the Erie lesbigay community should indeed "celebrate the distance each of us has come."

Acceptance Comes in Small Steps

In 1987, the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders* (third edition - revised) was published and made available to the psychiatric community.

The manual is a psychiatric "bible" enabling psychiatrists and other mental health professionals to diagnose mental health disorders based on symptomology. For the gay community, this revision boosted our fight for acceptance by deleting almost all references to homosexuality.

The traditional psychiatrist view of homosexuality was as a psychosexual disorder resulting from disturbed relationships between parents and their children. As recently as 1973, many clinicians supported this view while others wished to reclassify homosexual behavior as a category of sexual dysfunction. Still others wished to drop homosexuality from the manual and view it as a normal variant of sexual behavior. On December 15, 1973, the American Psychiatric Association no longer considered homosexuality a mental disorder. A new category was established and called sexual orientation disturbance. This category remained when the third revision of the manual was published, but it was changed to ego-dystonic homosexuality. Their diagnosis referred to individuals who experienced homosexual arousal while stating an interest/desire in increasing heterosexual relationships. Their desire is most often due to societal pressure and not internal need. The trauma of these conflicting desires supposedly disables the individual from establishing healthy relationships (especially sexual). The revised third

edition dropped this diagnosis, citing its use only 13 times since the introduction of the third edition in 1981. The diagnosis is currently referred to as sexual disorders not otherwise specified. This diagnosis is still given to individuals reporting persistent distress over their sexual orientation and experiencing the inability to form healthy intimate relationships with those they are truly attracted to.

But even with the move toward viewing homosexuality as a disorder only if disabling because of societal pressure, gays still object to any mention of homosexuality in the manual. The mere mention of the label still gives the appearance of "sickness." In late 1993 or early 1994, the manual will be released with possible changes to this diagnosis. This revision may delete all reference to homosexuality and see it as a normal variant of sexual expression. At least in the psychiatric community, we will be seen as we really are—normal—and this will hopefully move us a small step closer to acceptance in society.

- COUNTRY INVITE Lynne S., Line Dancer Extraordinaire, would like to send out a friendly invitation to come dancing: "If you're looking for something fun and free to do on Wednesday nights, when those midweek nothing-to-do blues hit, come out to Lizzie Borden's for country line dancing! Our official hours are 9:30 to 11:30, but sometimes we start at 9:00 and don't stop till 2:00. Our very patient and talented teacher, along with her many helpers, help us learn at least one new dance every week, as well as reviewing the ones we've already learned. So even if you're brand new to line dancing, you can jump in at any time. It's more like a party than a regular club night, so grab a friend and stop by Wednesday to dance or just to watch!"
- TV CANCELLATIONS Paula Poundstone's television show got the axe after only two shows. And the wonderfully gay-friendly *The Joan Rivers Show* has been cancelled, and will be off the air at the end of the year. Replacement Shows: Henry Winkler will play a Rush Limbaugh-like right wing talk-show host in Fox's new sitcom, *Monty*. (That's entertainment???)
- TV veterinarian **Steve Kritsick** announced on ABC's *Good Morning America* that he is gay and has AIDS. He says he came out because of a desire to help others, and wants to be "a spokesperson for life."
- ☆ OCCASIONAL EXPOSURE Last month, we noted that CBS's Northern Exposure had two recurring characters who were gay men. Some readers have complained that they haven't seen them on the show yet, perhaps because of a misunderstanding about the term "recurring char-

- acter." So here's some clarification: a regular character appears regularly, like Ed or Maggie. A recurring character shows up from time to time, but isn't one of the regulars...like Chris's African-American brother Bernard.
- RIVER'S END Hollywood suffered a tragic loss last month when 23-year-old actor River Phoenix died from a drug overdose. Among the many movies he appeared in was My Own Private Idaho, which revolved around a group of male prostitutes. Phoenix decided that the movie should show love between his character and another man, and wrote the whole scene himself. In an interview with The Advocate, the interviewer said he thought that might have been the first romantic declaration of love between two men in a commercial American film, and River responded, "That's beautiful. Blood Donor Appeal

January is National Volunteer Blood Donor Month, and blood banks all over the country will be encouraging all healthy, safe blood donors to roll up their sleeves and save a life in 1994.

They are also concerned, however, about people who donate blood as a way of getting an "AIDS test." A spokeswoman for the Erie Community Blood Bank appeals to people not to do this. "With the

AIDS epidemic sweeping the nation, it is very important for the blood bank to to recruit healthy donors. There are eight tests performed on each pint of blood collected to insure the safety of Erie's blood supply. We strongly discourage individuals from coming to the blood bank for an AIDS test. It takes anywhere from four weeks to six months for your body to develop antibodies against the AIDS virus. Someone who has



been recently infected and donates would pose a severe threat to the community blood supply. One infected donor can change the lives of many people.

"There are two designated sites in the Erie area where individuals can get free testing. These sites include the Erie County Department of Health, and the Minority Health Education delivery system (MHEDS). It is very important for individuals who feel they may be at risk to be tested at one of these designated sites." People living outside Erie County can call their local health departments or AIDS offices for locations of sites near them.

An added note: Sometimes people can feel a lot of pressure to give blood if their co-workers are doing it. If you have allowed yourself to be pressured, and you have reason to believe you may have been recently exposed to HIV, be sure to tell that to the person doing intake. If you didn't do it at the time, make sure you call them back afterwards and tell them.

Jamestown AIDS Office Update

The sudden cancellation of a benefit for the AIDS Community Services Southern Tier Office in Jamestown has resulted in rumors about the state of that organization.

The benefit had been set up at Sneakers by Dennis Long, who was Director of Volunteers with AIDS Community Services' main office in Buffalo. He abruptly quit his position, and the benefit was canceled without much explanation.

The cancellation came from Long and not the main office. "Nobody was more disappointed than I was that the benefit had been canceled," said David Paul, who works through the main office and is Community Educator to the Gay and Lesbian Community. "I see these events as a really good educational opportunity. I talk with people and hand out condoms, buttons, brochures, and things like that."

He adds that Long's resignation has caused the agency to think about how Long's newly-vacated position is set up. "We're going to make the next person responsible to other people in the agency," he said. "And we're hoping to get someone who knows how to attract volunteers who are interested in AIDS. A lot of

the volunteers that Long attracted got involved because of him. After he left, a lot of those volunteers left as well. We'd also like to see more of an effort to involve diverse communities: African-Americans, Hispanics, women..."

Long could not be reached for comment.

Paul stated that he would like the gay and lesbian community of western New York to know that they are welcome to contact him for information, to get him to speak somewhere, or to give input. Call him between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. at AIDS Community Services (716)847-0315.

National/World News Bits

Pittsburgh Native Heads National Task Force

WASHINGTON—A Pittsburgh native has become the new head of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. Peri Jude Radecic, 33, became executive director of the 32,000-member gay rights organization on Nov. 1. She is replacing Torie Osborne, who resigned in September. Radecic (pronounced RAD-asik) has been working for gay and lesbian causes since she was a teenager. When she was just 15, she did lesbian-feminist programming at a Pittsburgh community radio station. She was the director of the National Organization for Women's lesbian project, and has spent the last several years lobbying for the NGLTF on gay civil rights, health care, AIDS prevention and education, and anti-gay violence. She is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh.

Education News

NEW YORK—New York City high school students will be able to get condoms-on-demand from their high schools, unless their parents forbid it. The policy comes from the city's new schools chancellor, Ramon Cortines, who had opposed condoms-on-demand during his election campaign. New York City has one of the highest rates of HIV infection in the country.

Cortines also plans to go alter the school district's Children of the Rainbow curriculum, which some parents allege promotes the "homosexual lifestyle." According to a vague description offered by a Cortines spokesman, the changes will result in a curriculum that condemns discrimination without necessarily promoting diversity.

Gay Kids Get Cigarette Money

BOSTON—\$450,000 cigarette tax money will be going to programs aimed at improving the lot of lesbigay teenagers in Massachusetts.

The Governor's Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth had recommended implementing programs to develop support groups for gay teens and anti-harassment policies in the schools, train teachers in suicide prevention and stopping violence against gays, and to provide family counseling. The Education Department plans all-day workshops around the state for teachers on harassment of gays at school.

Bisexual Rats

AMSTERDAM—Dutch scientists announce that they were able to created bisexual behavior in male rats injected with a hormone-like substance called ATD. They report that sexually mature male rats injected with ATD tried to mate with both sexes. They also noted that sexual orientation changed with time of night.

The research is published in the December issue of *U.S. Behavioural Science*. The researchers are careful to point out that their findings are about rats, and that no such changes have yet been demonstrated in human beings.

U.S. Senate Passes Hate Crimes Bill

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Senate has voted 95 to 4 to dramatically increase sentences for people convicted of hate crimes, including gay-bashing. The amendment (called the Hate Crimes Enhancement Sentencing Act) was passed as part of the Omnibus Crime Bill.

The passage of the billis "a landmark vote of major significance to the lesbian and gay community," said a spokesperson for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, which is the nation's largest lesbian and gay political organization. According to HRCF Executive Director Tim McFeeney, Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun (D-IL) and Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) deserve special praise. "They were able to squelch the effort of Senator [Jesse] Helms to remove sexual orientation from the bill," said McFeeney. "Helms was really out-maneuvered."

The legislation increases the penalty for hate crimes by at least three offense levels over the present

sentencing guidelines. Hate crimes are defined in the bill as any crime in which the defendent intentionally selects a victim because of race, color, religion, national origin, disability, ethnicity, sexual orientation, and gender. Daniel Zingale, Public Policy Director at HRCF, notes that the bill sends a message to local law enforcement officials that hate crimes should be aggressively prosecuted.

The bill also authorizes funds for efforts to combat violence against women.

Why Hate Crimes Law is Needed

NEW ORLEANS—Gay-bashers here brutally attacked two straight men who they mistakenly thought were gay. One of the men died of his injuries, and the other was seriously injured. The attack occurred Nov. 11 in the French Quarter, a district that is popular with gay men. Three men were charged with first degree murder in the attack and jailed without bond.

No Military Recruiters on Buffalo Campus

BUFFALO NY—As long as the military discriminates against gays, military recruiters must stay off the campus of Buffalo's state law school. New York State Supreme Court Justice Dianne Lebedoff made the ruling Nov. 18, stating that the presence of military recruiters at the state university violates Governor Mario Cuomo's anti-discrimination order.

Although the ruling applies only to that school, an attorney for the group that brought the suit (Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund) said it should apply to all of New York's state universities. Military recruitment is limited or banned in other law schools in the state, including Columbia University, the University of Albany, and Syracuse University.

U.S. Gov't to Study Lesbian Health

WASHINGTON—Lesbian health issues will be figured into the largest women's health study the federal government has ever conducted. The project is called the Women's Health Initiative, and is being conducted by the National Institutes of Health.

Areas of investigation will include testing the assertions that lesbians have a higher incidence of breast and gynecologic cancers, and heart disease.

Lesbian health activists had lobbied the NIH for several months.

Paula Ettelbrick, from the National Center for Human Rights, credits the Clinton administration with making possible the inclusion of sexual orientation issues. "This is one area where having a new administration makes a big difference," she said in an interview with *The Advocate*.

Lesbian Moms Lose Kids

NORMAN, Okla.—A lesbian mother, Donna J. Fox, lost custody of her two daughters Sept. 29 for the sole reason that she is a lesbian. Custody was granted to the children's father, Fox's ex-husband. The court ruled that even though Fox was a fit mother, the children "might encounter future prejudice by a disapproving society" because of their mother's sexual orientation.

BENTONVILLE, Ark.—A judge ruled that a lesbian mother's two children should be removed and custody awarded to the mother's ex-husband. The judge made the decision because the mother's "gay lifestyle would subject the children to ridicule and embarrassment."

World Health Organization: Stop Laws Against Condoms and Gays

MANILA—The World Health Organization (WHO) on Nov. 25 appealed to governments around the world to get rid of laws that discriminate against gays and ban promotion of condoms. The agency said that these changes are needed in order to stop the spread of AIDS.

WHO is an agency of the United Nations. The statement was issued by the WHO Asia-Pacifica regional office in the Phillipines. "It is essential to remove impediments to the dissemination of frank and informative messages about sexual health, as well as those that hinder people from receiving and acting on prevention messages," said a WHO newsletter.

HIV & Lesbian/Bisexual Women

SAN FRANCISCO—A study of lesbians and bisexual women in San Francisco has revealed some startling findings:

25% of women who call themselves lesbians have had sex with men in the last three years.

The HIV infection rate for the women in this study (1.2%) was three times higher than that in the general population of adult or adolescent women in San Francisco.

Among the women who reported having sex with men, many reported unprotected sex with a male partner in the past three years. Over half (56%) reported unprotected oral sex, 39% reported unprotected penis-vagina intercourse, and 10.9% reported unprotected anal intercourse.

Some women were having unprotected sex with gay men or bisexual men. 14.6% had unprotected oral sex, 9.6% had unprotected penis-vagina sex, and 3.2% had unprotected anal intercourse. Bisexual women were much more likely than lesbian women were to do this.

Among those having sex with male I.V. drug users, 6.4% reported unprotected oral sex, 5.2% unprotected penis-vagina sex, and 1.7% unprotected anal intercourse.

As far as sex between women, 91.9% reported unprotected oral sex, 28.8% unprotected sharing of sex toys, and 25.2% unprotected vaginal fisting.

The researchers found no clear evidence of womanto-woman transmission among the HIV-infected women in the survey.

The study was conducted by the AIDS Office of the San Francisco Department of Public Health. The study was done on 498 lesbians and bisexual women 17 years old or older, at 25 different locations in San Francisco and Berkeley CA in 1993. Survey locations included such varied places as bars, lesbian/bisexual events, pride parade, dance clubs, street fairs, film festivals, and sex clubs.

The researchers concluded that "Although the rates of HIV infection among lesbian and bisexual women are currently low, these rates may rise given the high levels of risk behaviors in this population. These studies suggest that targeted prevention programs should be expanded to address the needs of lesbians and bisexual women."

Vatican & Condoms

VATICAN—The French scientist who co-discovered the AIDS virus urged the Vatican to take another look at its ban on condoms.

Luc Montagnier, speaking at a Vatican convention on children and society, said, "I don't want to give lessons to the Church but I do invite it to be more pragmatic and tolerant," he said. He told of priests who would not give communion to couples if it was known that the couples used condoms. "If AIDS is a diabolical disease," he said, "no method to beat it can itself be considered diabolical." Citing villages in Uganda that are being decimated by the disease, he said, "To beat the disease they need an various weapons, that of abstinence, that of faithfulness, and that of the condom."

Graham Apologizes

TV evangelist Rev. Billy Graham apologized on Oct. 6 for saying that AIDS may be a judgement from God. He made the "judgment" remarks on Sept. 26 in Columbus, Ohio. Graham blames fatigue for the

remarks, and said he didn't really believe AIDS was a judgment. In his apology, he told of meeting people with AIDS, and said, "I have put my arms around them, and personally told them that I love them."

Alternative to Condoms Hoped For

BERNE—The World Health Organization (WHO) has announced it is working on the development of a new foam or gel that could kill the AIDS virus inside a woman's vagina. The U.N. health agency said it believes that such a substance would give women more control over safer sex and could be ready within two or three years.

Research has shown that currently-available spermicides do seem to lower transmission of sexually-transmitted diseases. However, there is some concern high dosages and frequent amounts of spermicide could irritate and damage the vaginal wall, thus facilitating HIV transmission.

Male condoms remain the most effective means of preventing HIV transmission, and should be used even when a spermicide is applied.

Gay Rights Votes Around the Country

(Now You Have 'em, Now You Don't, Now You Do, Now You...) Colorado Anti-Gay Law

Blocked

WASHINGTON—The Supreme Court ruled on Nov. 1 that the state of Colorado cannot enforce its anti-gay rights amendment until state courts have decided its constitutionality. The Colorado amendment, known as Amendment 2, struck down gay rights laws in the cities of Aspen, Boulder, and Denver, and prevented any more pro-gay rights legislation from going into effect. Colorado voters passed the amendment with a 53-47 per cent margin, in the November 1992 election.

A suit against the Amendment 2 was launched by the three cities whose gay rights ordinances were being struck down, and by nine Colorado residents (one of whom was Martina Navratilova). In January 1993, state Judge H. Jeffrey Bayless blocked the enforcement of Amendment 2, and the state Supreme Court upheld that ruling, saying that the Amendment 2 "expressly fences out an independently identifiable group" from equal citizenship. "A citizen's constitutional rights can hardly be infringed simply because a majority of the people choose that to be," the court said.

The amendment led to a boycott against Colorado, and the state has lost more than \$20 million in cancelled meetings and conventions.

Federal Judge Blocks Cincinnati Anti-Gay Vote

CINCINNATI—In Cincinnati, a federal judge has blocked a vote that would have removed sexual orientation from its anti-discrimination policy, saying that the amendment was unconstitutional. In the Nov. 2 election, Cincinnati voters voted 62 per cent to 38 per cent to pass the anti-gay rights action. It is believed that this may be the first time a federal judge has made such a decision. The action is expected to stand unless overturned by another court.

Cincinnati's year-old human rights ordinance—passed 7-2 by City Council—prohibits discrimination in housing, public accommodations, and employment, on the basis of race, gender, religion, age, marital status, disability, Appalachian origin, or sexual orientation.

U.S. District Judge S. Arthur Spiegel said that the anti-gay rights amendment violates the U.S, Consititution's First Amendment (the right to petition) and 14th Amendment (equal protection clause).

Two Oregon Towns Defy Pro-Gay State Law

OREGON—Voters in the Oregon communities of Oregon City and Kaizer have voted in favor of antigay rights measures in their communities. The votes defy a recent state law that bans such ordinances.

Are the defeats to civil rights in the recent election in Cincinatti and Lewiston, Maine not frightening? People having rights and equality does not happen by accident. You can bet that no one invites you to come out from the back of the bus. Think about it.

The whole military thing is an emotional roller coaster for me; when the Supreme Court decided to let the new ban be enforced, I felt betrayed. When Desert Storm was going on, I remembered writing letters to service people after having read Ann Landers. I thought of all the people who had fought and died for our country who were also lesbigay. Then there was this sneaking suspicion that the argument basically devolves down to American servicemen (notice how women don't count) are supposedly wusses who live in dread fear that someone will (gulp!) look at them. Maybe we would have lost in the Gulf War if the Iraqis had simply asked the Americans for dates? Is this

incredibly vain and stupid or what? One cannot and should not legislate people's civil rights out of existence. It was good hearing about the favorable decisions in the Elzie Turner and Joey Steffan cases. Mayhap there is hope.

You have hopefully seen the condoms that Bridges & Dignity have purchased and are making available to the community at the bars and various groups. Amusingly enough, the restaurant at the end of the movie is named Bridges, which Sally Field, playing Robin Williams' wife, says is her favorite restaurant. Coincidence? Hmmmm...
