
Pronounced Dead

Lt, Kenneth R. Allen

First Lieutenant Kenneth Richard Allen was killed in Germany March 1, his parents were informed by telegram from the War Department,

Lt. Allen was wounded in action December 19, 1944, and returned to action with an artillery unit last month, after recuperating from wounds of the shoulder and arm.

While a student at Bloomsburg State Teachers College, Lt. Allen enlisted in September, 1944, and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., with an infantry outfit. He was selected to take an officers' candidate course at Fort Sill, Okla., and was then transferred to the artillery. After being commissioned he was sent to Camp Butner, N. C., later returning to Fort Sill for an extension course. Following completion of the special course, Lt. Allen was sent to Camp Pickett, Va., and late last year was sent overseas, arriving in England, October 5, 1944.

Kenneth Richard Allen was born in Shamokin, May 9, 1922, and was graduated from Shamokin High School in 1940, after which he enrolled at Bloomsburg State Teachers College, He was well known throughout this region as a talented drum major, performing with Shamokin High School band, and later with the Bloomsburg State Teachers College band, He taught drum majoring at Danville, Since childhood, Lt, Allen was a member of the Trinity Episcopal Church and Sunday school,

Surviving are the parents and two brothers, Private James Allen, who is with the army in Belgium, and Howard, radio operator, who has been reported missing in action since September 17, 1944.

Lt. Allen was awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds sustained in action.
