









A steam calliope plays a tune, and we know that the Show Boat is in town.

This book, in like manner, hopes to revive for the readers pleasant memories of the happy days spent during the first act of the drama of their lives.










Many different classes of shows are presented by the river theaters. A three or four act drama with vaudeville interspersed between acts is one of the favorites along the river.
























The tall, stately arches, which rise to greet the approaching student, form the time-worn portals that guard California traditions.

Twin towers, ivy clad; a weather beaten clock, which no longer tolls the hours; these surmount the Main Entrance.






Through the arch we catch a glimpse of the President's home, surrounded by leafy foliage, and protected by the two sentinels in the foreground.

California can look forward to great progress and fine accomplishments with such a man at its helm.




























Senior Class




Sophomore Class






















Freshman Class


1930 Football Season






The opening game of the season was played at Millersville, September 27, on one of those hot Fall days. The "Dutchmen" offered the Red and Black plenty of opposition before the final score of 13-7 was chalked up in favor of California.

Captain Salsi and his team kept ploughing and plunging away until the third quarter of the contest against a stubborn foe. It was in this quarter that Patterson, fullback, ploughed through the line for the first touchdown. Captain Salsi soon followed with the second tally of the game. Millersville scored their lone count in the first period of the battle.

The Californians initiated night football at Governor's Field, Charleroi, Pennsylvania, on October 4, with their ancient rival, Slippery Rock. California kicked








off and the ball was soon in midfield where it stayed for a greater portion of the game. The exceptionally fine punting of Drum kept Slippery Rock from scoring when California was forced to hold for four downs on the one-yard mark in the second period. After a scoreless first half, Slippery Rock returned the opening kick-off of the second half for a touchdown. The score remained 6-0 when the kick was blocked. The California boys then took the ball on a general march up the field and pushed the pigskin across the chalkline in the last period. The try for goal was missed, and the game ended in a 6-6 deadlock.

The next week California journeyed to Shippensburg, where they took another scalp on another very hot day. This one was hard to get, Shippensburg threatening throughout the game. "Skeezix" Krupensky, who was the star of the day, ran








wild and scored 13 of the 14 points. The final score was: California 14; Shippensburg 12.

The meeting of Edinboro at Governor's Field at Charleroi marked the second night game for the local squad. Edinboro came to California with a clean slate. The Red and Black backs kept driving and pounding away at the heavy line, but all to no avail. Rooney, fullback, did plenty of the work for the visitors, while Anderson did some fine running. As the whistle blew to end the game, Edinboro had piled up a score of 18, and the local club had failed to register.

Home Coming Day, October 25, found the Bloomsburg team visiting California. Many of the old Alumni were present for the contest, and for once a large crowd







witnessed the struggle. The Eastern boys put up a mighty good fight, but soon the local boys had crossed the line. Patterson and Capt. Salsi scored touchdowns for the Red and Black, and the game ended, California 13, Bloomsburg 0.


The following week found the boys from Northern West Virginia, Fairmont, closing the home season for California. The visitors were expected to present a tough fight, according to reports. It was in this game that all of the California squad saw action. Despite the numerous substitutions of inexperienced players, the visitors were unable to cross the goal line. The locals kept piling up touchdowns until the final count was California 32, and Fairmont 0.







The following week, California visited the Teachers College at Clarion. It was at this school that California threatened to quit "clicking." The Red and Black squad was unable to do any scoring, and Clarion held the upper hand by a 2-0 score as the half closed. The second period was a different story. The scores began to pile up, and in a few minutes, California was leading. More touchdowns were made and the final reading of the score gave California 24, and Clarion 2.







The season closed at Indiana on November 15. Indiana scored one touchdown before the half ended. When the second half started, California came back with a determination to win. Quarterback Kent called signals for plays on every part of the field, and finally a long pass found its way into the hands of "Red" Neill, who was behind the goal line. The Red and Black team was then forced into dangerous territory and a punt was blocked, giving Indiana a safety. This ended the scoring for the day, and California came back with the short end of an 8-6 score, to close the season.







1930-31 Basketball Squad



1930-31 Basketball Season


The Red and Black team had Kent, Neill, Vernallis, Sisson, Cree and Hazel-baker from the varsity squad of last year. Among the newcomers were Peters, Feldman and Hokji.

The first game of the season was played on the local court against St. Vincents College, on December 16, with Neill, Cree, Sisson, Kent and Vernallis in the starting lineup. This game proved to be one of the most exciting played on the home court. The whistle blew at the right time—just when California was leading by one point, 27-26. Neill was the high scorer for the Red and Black, scoring 12 of the 27 points.

Two days later, the local boys traveled to Fairmont. The Red and Black quintet brought back another victory when they took the West Virginia five over by a 31-28 count. Kent was the high scorer in this contest for the locals.

December 20, found Bloomsburg dominating the California court. This game broke the winning streak for the locals, as California went down to defeat by a 42-30 count. Neill again proved to be high scorer for California.





After the Christmas vacation Fairmont came to California for the return game. Christmas turkey must have improved the Fairmont boys, for they took away the game by a 59-26 score. The work of Mason and Bonar proved too much for the Red and Black. Kent came through for the most points for California.

Slippery Rock's invasion on January 10, marked the third consecutive game on the local court. California went down to defeat before a fast passing attack by a score of 30-23. Kent played best for California, scoring 12 of the 23 points.


California carried its losing streak away from home when the Indiana quintet was met at Indiana on January 17. The Red and Black boys were compelled to return home with the small end of a 45-34 score. Kent again proved to be the high scorer for the locals.

The week end of January 20, found California at Latrobe, battling the St. Vincent boys. The St. Vincent quintet was successful in handing out a 28-12 defeat to the visitors.

Millersville came to California on February 6, and proved to be good enough to put California on the wrong side of a 36-26 score. Kent and Vernallis were high scorers for the California team.





The next evening Indiana paid a return visit. All the thrills that could be found in any one evening were found in this game. Fast passing and good defenses marked the playing. Krupensky, out all season with injuries received in football, was in the lineup for the first time. Five baskets made him high scorer for California. Indiana finally lost out 41 to 40.

The Red and Black quintet then went visiting for two days to Clarion and Slippery Rock. Defeat was met at both schools. The Clarion quintet dealt out a 26-22 defeat, and the Slippery Rock five made it even worse by handing out a 48-26 score.

When Edinboro came from the lake region on February 21, the local boys were ready to turn over a new leaf, and turned back the visitors with a 38-24 score. The Red and Black did some fine passing, bringing the ball down the floor within shooting distance often enough to provide a four-point margin. Neill and Vernallis were high scorers for C. T. C., having five and four baskets respectively.

The California State Teachers College track team met with much success during the 1930 season. Meets were scheduled with the Shippensburg Teachers, Clarion Teachers, and Indiana Teachers, respectively. California was victorious over Indiana and Clarion, but they lost to an excellent team from the east, Shippensburg.

The first meet of the season was with Shippensburg Teachers

College at California. The Easterners brought a very fine squad to California and carried the laurels back home by a score of 64-41.

California journeyed to Indiana on May 11, to take on their old rival. The result was in doubt until the last event of the day, which was the relay race. The last meet of the season was held at California with another rival, Clarion Teachers College. This meet was thrilling from the first event until the last. The relay again decided the final score, and once more the Red and Black boys came through with a $64\frac{1}{2}-59\frac{1}{2}$ win.



Cross Country


The 1931 Cross Country squad was made up of four veterans, Henderson, Gamble, C. Buell, Sutherland and Anderson, a Freshman. Buell served as captain and led the boys throughout a fairly successful season.

The first meet of the season was against the Bloomsburg harriers. The cross country team of that school journeyed with the football team to meet the local runners on October 25. The visitors trounced the Red and Black team, counting for the first, third, fourth, seventh and eighth places, to win by a 23-32 score. Henderson, Gamble, Sutherland, Buell and Anderson finished in respective order for the local boys.


November I found California competing in the meet sponsored by the Allegheny Mountain Athletic Association. Here, the local boys were competing with five college teams and two independent teams. Henderson, the outstanding star of the team throughout the whole season, finished fifth out of a field of fifty participants. Although the local boys were unable to capture any of the medals, they gained fourth place among the other teams entered.

The last meet of the season, and perhaps the hardest to win, was with the Indiana Teachers on November 15. Henderson finished as first man, with Gamble coming in fourth. The sixth and seventh places were captured by Buell and Sutherland, respectively. At this point of the contest the score became tied, as an Indiana man scored the eighth place. Anderson was the only Californian in the field, and by his sprint at the last moment, brought a 27-28 victory to California.









Tennis 1930

The 1930 tennis team, under the coaching of Prof. I. C. Keller, had one of the most successful seasons ever experienced by any California tennis team. The team faced a four-match schedule with Waynesburg, Uniontown Jr., College and Indiana, and also participated in the Western Pennsylvania Teachers College Tournament. The Red and Black won every intercollegiate match and also the Teachers College Tournament.

The men's squad was made up of Victor Krupensky (Captain), William Hall, ohn Bosson, Paul Gibson and John Hentz. The women's squad was made up of Dorothy Reichard, Laura Buttermore, Margaret Wilkinson and Grace Wegley.

The first match was played at California with Waynesburg College, only men participating. California was victorious by a 4-2 score, losing only one doubles and one singles match.

Another affair strictly for men was conducted with the Pitt Junior College at Uniontown. The Juniors were unable to win a match, and consequently, the Teachers earned a 6-0 victory.

The next meet was held at Indiana on May 10. This was an eight-match encounter, with the women participating. The Red and Black team again came back with a 7-1 victory. The men won all of their matches, while the women lost the doubles match.

On May 13 and 14, the Red and Black team journeyed to the Western Pennsylvania Teachers College Tennis Tournament at Slippery Rock Teachers College. The three Teachers Colleges entered in this tournament were Indiana, California and Slippery Rock. The final scores for the tournament were as follows: California 12, Slippery Rock 6 and Indiana 6.

The last meet of the season was held at Waynesburg. California again came through by defeating their opponents by a 4-2 score.

The outstanding player of the year was Captain Krupensky, while Bosson showed promise of developing into an excellent contestant.


The hockey players were divided into two groups; namely the Seniors and Freshmen. These groups were then subdivided into Senior Teams A and B, and Freshman Teams A and B.


To All Other Prominent People






Eurhythmics Club





Dixon Hall Council


Every woman student living in Dixon Hall is a member of this association. This organization is democratic, in that each girl has the right to express her opinion in all affairs.






