

I thrill with pride as I see a tall handsome khakiclad lieutenant enter the gates, and I recognize a former student. Then, too, there are the men in the Marines, Navy, and Merchant Marine, for California is represented in every branch of the service. Miss Henrietta Carroll and Mr. Anthony Stavaski were the faculty advisors.




Full of fears and expectations, the Freshman class made its debut on the campus of C.S.T.C. in the autumn of 1942.




W. A. A.
