





DR. ROBERT M. STEELE, President

For many years California has been known as the friendly college. A constant and consistent effort through the years has been made by the administration and the faculty to justify its reputation as such and to increase friendly contacts among all members of the college community.

The philosophy on which California operates regards all members of the college—students, staff and employees—as persons, working together to promote the highest degree of self improvement on the part of each one. Consequently, there is developed and encouraged a recognition that each individual has an important function to perform. While each one's service may differ widely from another's, all are necessary, all are important and all are recognized.

It is by no accident that in planning and carrying on general college activities and especially student activities, faculty members and students serve together on committees, most of whose chairmen are students. Here, as equals, faculty members and students come to know each other, learn to respect each other and share each other's points of view. Out of this give and take in life situations and in and out of the classroom firm friendships are formed and a campus atmosphere is created which is even noticed by the casual visitor to the campus. Strangers visiting the campus for the first time frequently remark about a friendly "Good Morning" greeting or an offer of help from students entirely unknown to them.

More emphasis is placed at California on the real worth of individuals than on the accidents of creed, color, or social and financial standing. California's societies and fraternities are integrating rather than divisive factors. Membership is gained by interest, ability and worknot by social standing. And while these societies conduct a varied social program it is one devoid of snobbery and aloofness.

The boy or girl who works to amplify a slender budget is respected as highly at California as the one whose allowance is large enough to more than meet his needs. What one is and what one does are more significant in our student body than what he merely possesses. Our possessions, generally speaking, have been given to us. Our friendships will be largely those we have earned and "a man to have friends must show himself friendly."

The quality of friendship like that of mercy "is not strained." "It is twice blessed. It blesseth him that gives and him that takes."



In this respect we have formed friendships that will not end with the close of our college careers. The future may find us traveling in different directions, but the memories of the friends we have made will always be with us.



class will always be remembered as one of the friendliest that California ever graduated.



Shattuck took the first punt and slipped it to O'Hara who went forty-five yards for the first score. From then on the T.D.'s came thick and fast. Shattuck and Pollard registered touchdowns while Dochinez grabbed the ball from mid air and ran thirty-five yards for six points.

Even the subs could not be stopped as they ran through, around, and over the Bisons. Fairheller, Kramer, and Simmons continued to score for California. The longest run was credited to Kinder who took a punt on his thirty and ran to the goal for six more points. Bickle succeeded in making good five out of ten extra points. California racked up a total of eighteen first downs to Bethany's one. The final tally was 65-0.

MILLERSVILLE

The Vulcans ended a fine season by downing their final opponent at Millersville 14-7 on November 12. The Marauders of M.S.T.C. stunned the Fire Gods by scoring the first seven points of the game Angered by this surprise touchdown the Vulcans retaliated by marching seventythree yards only to be stymied on the Marauders' seven yard line. Following several punt exchanges, Mitchel Bailey picked up a Millersville fumble on their own two yard line and Pollard shoved across for the score. Bickle's conversion tied the score. In the fourth quarter Anders and Zelinski were instrumental in scoring the second and winning touchdown.


This final victory assured California a tie for the Penn State Teachers' College Championship and boosted our winnings to seven.










Baseball
