Ghostly shades of the past find a haunt within the walls of Old Main.






The "Little Theater "was not always "little" as this photo taken before ceilings were lowered and partitions were built shows an excerpt from the 1891-2 school catalogue from which this was taken reads, "The chapel, on the second floor of the main building, is a magnificent hall, not surpassed, if equalled, in any similar school in the State. It is 110 feet long, 44 feet wide and 22 feet high, and has seating capacity for one thousand persons."

While now used for such mundone purposes as meetings and classes, the Little Theater once rung with the voices of William Jennings Bryan, Frederick Douglass and Edward Everett Hale and with music such as provided by the Pittsburgh Orchestra under the bator of Victor Herbert.
